THIS IS STAFF RECOGNITION WEEK!

It's a week of, by and for the administrative, service and support staff as the University kicks off the first Staff Recognition Week April 21-25. All faculty, staff and students are invited!

The week begins on Monday, April 21, with Chancellor Uehling seeing what it's like to work in a staff member's job--in the morning, she'll try her hand at performing crane operator Bob Southerland's job at the UMC power plant.

Then at 2 p.m., the Staff Recognition Awards ceremony will take place in the Memorial Union Auditorium. Chancellor Barbara Uehling will present \$750 awards and plaques to four staff members, nominated as outstanding from each of the staff classifications. The ceremony also includes a tribute to the late Maj. Mick Deaver, associate director of the UMC police force.

Other events of the week include:

-- On Tuesday, April 22, the chancellor will meet with staff in a rap session from 2 -3:30 p.m. in Ellis Auditorium.

-- On Wednesday, April 23, employee rights and privileges is the topic of a lunchbag seminar from noon to 2 p.m. in S-203 Memorial Union. It's a chance to ask questions about employee rights and problems affecting your life at UMC; frank talk about everything from criteria for merit increases to employee grievances, led by Interim Equal Opportunity Director Ruth Jones and Personnel Director Ramona Howard.

-- On Thursday, April 24, a lunchbag seminar featuring all you ever wanted to know about the economics of higher education but were afraid to ask: the secret stuff like who really does the work. You. It'll be led by Walter Johnson, associate professor of economics, from noon to 2 p.m. in S-203 Memorial Union.

-- On Friday, April 25, Marilyn Moats Kennedy, author of the book "Office Politics:

Seizing Power/Wielding Clout," will lead a lunchbag seminar on how to master office politics to protect your job, how to harvest from the grapevine without getting tangled in it and how to get things done without being done in from 12:30 to 2 p.m. in Ellis Aud.

The week is sponsored by the Employees' Staff Advisory Council with the support of the Chancellor's office.

Jane Brinton, interim dean of the School of Nursing from 1973 to 1975, will preside at the ceremony.

FACULTY COUNCIL MINUTESMarch 20, 1980Executive Committee of Office of Environmental Health and Risk Management

In response to Provost Koeppe's request that the Faculty Council designate a faculty member for appointment to the Executive Committee for the Office of Environmental Health and Risk Management, Richard G. Hoft (Electrical Engineering) moved (Fisch seconded) that Council recommend J. Malcolm Asplund (Animal Husbandry) as faculty representative. The motion passed.

Visit of Mel George and Tom Collins

Council members inquired of Vice President Mel George concerning the proposed funding of the Washington Library Network. Dr. George explained that funding for the online catalog was held by UMca and suggested that approval probably would not influence campus library acquisition funding. He also treated questions about the technical suitability of the proposed system and the impact of immediacy in this decision.

Associate Vice President Tom Collins was introduced to explain the University of Missouri Institute for Scientific Technology (UMIST). Dr. Collins discussed the research interrelationship between industry, the University, and the federal government and indicated that the purpose of UMIST would be to organize University response to important research projects and funding without distorting the mission and structure of the University. He responded to several questions concerning the initiation and implementation of projects. Methods of incentive for faculty and departments were also discussed.

Dr. George gave a brief summary of the status of the Academic Tenure Regulations revision.
