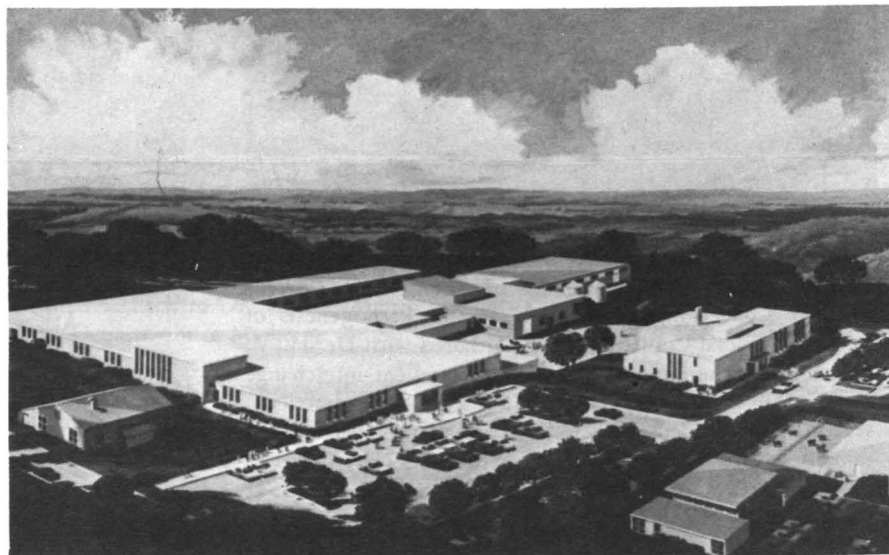
Two Deans Named

The appointments of Dr. E. Allen Corley as Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and Dr. Leonard W. Dewhirst as Assistant Dean for Student Affairs in the College of Veterinary Medicine completes the appointments of the administrative staff. Both appointments are for half-time with Dr. Corley and Dr. Dewhirst devoting half-time to their respective departments.

Dr. Corley is presently professor and chairman of the Department of Medicine and Surgery, a position he has held since September 1972.

Dr. Kenneth D. Weide, Dean of the College, said in announcing Dr. Corley's appointment, "Dr. Corley combines a working knowledge of educational and service responsibilities of the College with first hand knowledge of Veterinary Medicine in Missouri and the nation. We are indeed fortunate he has agreed to accept these added responsibilities."

Dr. Corley received a B.S. from Clemson University, a D.V.M. from the University of Georgia and a Ph.D. from Colorado State University. He was appointed an instructor at the University

of Georgia after receiving his D.V.M. in 1957 and was named assistant professor in 1960. In 1963 he began graduate study at Colorado State University and was in charge of the elbow dysplasia project and later an NIF Special Fellow. Dr. Corley received a Ph.D. in 1966 and was appointed an associate professor of veterinary physiology and pharmacology at the University of Missouri. In 1968 he became professor of veterinary medicine and surgery.

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Five Conferences Held in May



Two participants in the Seventh Conference on Clinical Veterinary Neurology and Neuroscience cornered one of the speakers, Dr. P. Litwak, after his presentation on "Current Theories Concerning the Treatment and Pathogenesis of Traumatic Spinal Cord Injury," co-authored with Dr. H. V. Mendenhall. The program provided an excellent interchange between university researchers and teachers and practicing veterinarians. Students also were in attendance. Participants came from areas throughout the United States. Dr. James E. Breazile was the chairman of the conference, held May 24-25 at the University of Missouri.

Participants had the opportunity to look at slide-tape and computer assisted programs at the International Educational Workshop of the Teachers of Veterinary Public Health and Preventive Medicine and the Pan American Health Organization held May 3-8 on the Columbia campus. Thirty-four registrants representing all Schools and Colleges of Veterinary Medicine in the United States and Canada attended the Workshop which was planned by a committee headed by Dr. Lloyd A. He was an instructor in zoology at Kansas State University from 1952-57 until his appointment as assistant professor of animal pathology and assistant animal pathologist in the Arizona Agricultural Experiment Station at the University of Arizona. In 1960, he was named associate professor and associate animal pathologist and in 1963 professor of animal pathology and animal pathologist. In 1972, he was named professor of veterinary science and animal pathologist.

Dr. Dewhirst is a member of the American Society of Parasitology, American Microscopical Society, American Association for the Advancement of Science, Southern Arizona Veterinary Medical Association, Arizona Veterinary Medical Association, Sigma Xi, Phi Kappa Phi, Gamma Sigma Delta and Alpha Zeta.
