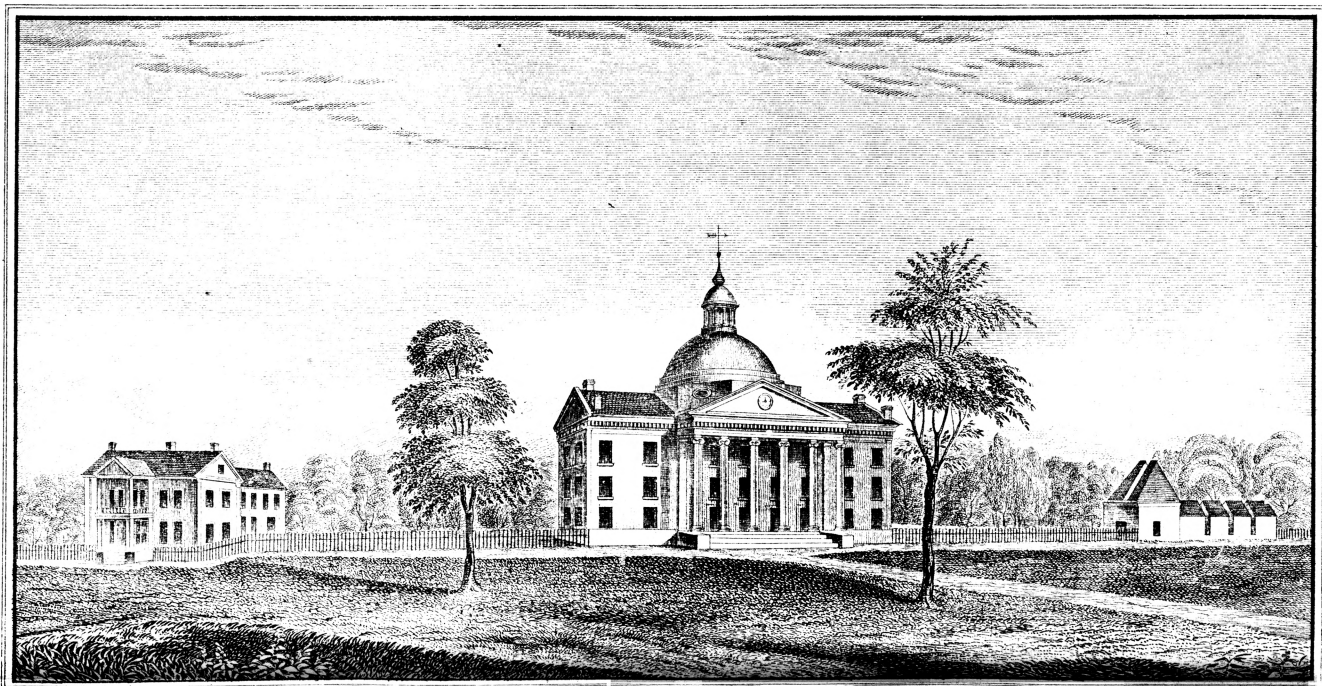

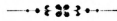

A MEDICAL DEPARTMENT of the University was established in 1845. But as the Catalogues of the University do not furnish the details for giving the history of that connection, any effort in that behalf must be postponed until additional facilities may be obtained.

MATRICULATION.

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In order to admission into the University, each student is required, by ordinance of the Curators, to present to the President a certificate from the Treasurer of the Board, that his bill for tuition and contingencies has been paid; and no drawback is allowed for absence in any case.

Indigent students, recommended by the Curator of the Congressional District in which they reside, are admitted into the University free of expense, except the contingent fee of one dollar per session.

Students whose age is under fifteen years, or whose progress in learning is very limited, are advised to resort to the Primary Department.

When an applicant for admission into the University has been connected with any other incorporated seminary, he should present satisfactory evidence to the Faculty of an honorable standing in the Institution from which he comes.

It is highly important that students should be present at the opening of the session, since the loss of a few days, at the beginning, breaks the connection of their studies, and occasions material embarrassments.

SESSIONS, VACATIONS AND EXPENSES.

The SESSION of the University commences on the first day of October, and terminates on the 4th of July.

The VACATION extends from the 4th of July to the 1st of October, and the Christmas recess, from noon of the 22d of December to the morning of the 2d of January.

DEPARTMENTS OF INSTRUCTION.

PHYSICS, ASTRONOMY AND ENGINEERING.

PRESIDENT HUDSON.

In this Department instruction is given to the Junior and Senior classes. The Juniors commence with the theory of Natural Philosophy, which they learn by recitations of a text-book. After they have made some progress in the theory, lectures are delivered with experiments illustrating theoretical principles, and applying them to the practical and useful purposes of life.

The Seniors pursue a like course in Astronomy. After mastering the theory of the subject in the recitation room, they go to the Observatory, and apply their theories to practice in the determination of such useful elements as latitude, longitude, time of day, variation of the magnetic needle, &c., &c.

The structure of Roads and Railroads is explained in the room, and afterwards illustrated with instruments, in the field.

ANCIENT LANGUAGES.

PROFESSOR MATTHEWS, *aided by the two Associate Professors,*
SHIELDS AND PRICE.

In this Department, the instruction is conducted by recitations of text-books, accompanied by frequent interrogations and copious explanations. Especial attention is given to Classical Geography, Chronology, Mythology, and to Roman and Grecian Literature.

CHEMISTRY AND COGNATE BRANCHES.

PROFESSOR SWALLOW.

While the officer of this department relies to some extent on text-books, the major part of the instruction is communicated by lectures illustrated with experiments and specimens. The

Laboratory is furnished with an extensive apparatus, which enables the Professor to render his lectures very complete and satisfactory.

The Geological and Botanical Cabinets are very extensive, and amply sufficient to illustrate the full course of lectures on Geology and Scientific Agriculture, to be delivered in this department.

ETHICS, METAPHYSICS AND BELLES LETTRES.
PROFESSOR JACOB.

All the subjects of this department are taught mainly by recitations of text-books. The Professor encourages discussion, and many points are mooted between himself and his students at considerable length. His explanations assume the form of familiar lectures.

On this Department chiefly rests the burden of criticising original speeches, declamations and compositions.

MATHEMATICS.
PROF. HEAD.

In this Department are taught pure and mixed Mathematics. The adjustment and use of the Quadrant, Compass and Theodolite are fully explained, and heights, distances and surveying are illustrated by practice in the field.

NORMAL DEPARTMENT.
PROFESSOR PRICE.

The course of studies in the University is so arranged as to permit those who wish to qualify themselves for school-teaching, to have every opportunity to do so. In each Department the instruction is intended to be *normal*; in addition to which, lectures are delivered by the Normal Professor on the various subjects which demand the special attention of the professional teacher.

Thus it will be seen that the University affords all such facilities for studying the theory and practice of teaching as are afforded by the best Normal Schools.

MODERN LANGUAGES.
MR. HAINER.

The Modern Languages taught in the University are French and German. The officer who gives this instruction is a Hunga-

rian gentleman, who speaks the above languages with as much fluency as he does his native tongue.

DRAWING AND PERSPECTIVE.

MR. ALEXANDER.

The instruction in Drawing is divided into several parts, viz : ARCHITECTURAL DRAWING, or the representation of buildings, illustrating perspective by the exhibition of front and end views, and showing the relief that may be given by shading, to various parts of a building, such as window caps, pillars, pilasters, cornice, &c.

TOPOGRAPHICAL DRAWING, or sketches of tracts of ground, sites of towns, villas, &c., exhibiting water courses, bridges, trees, and such other objects as diversify the landscape.

BOTANICAL DRAWING, or the delineation, by shades or tints, of flowers, plants, and sundry specimens in Botanical studies.

PRIMARY DEPARTMENT.

The Primary Department was established by an act of the General Assembly, approved December 12, 1855. It was designed to meet the wants of such students as are too young or too little advanced to enter the University. The President and Professors of the University direct the course of study, and exercise a supervisory care.

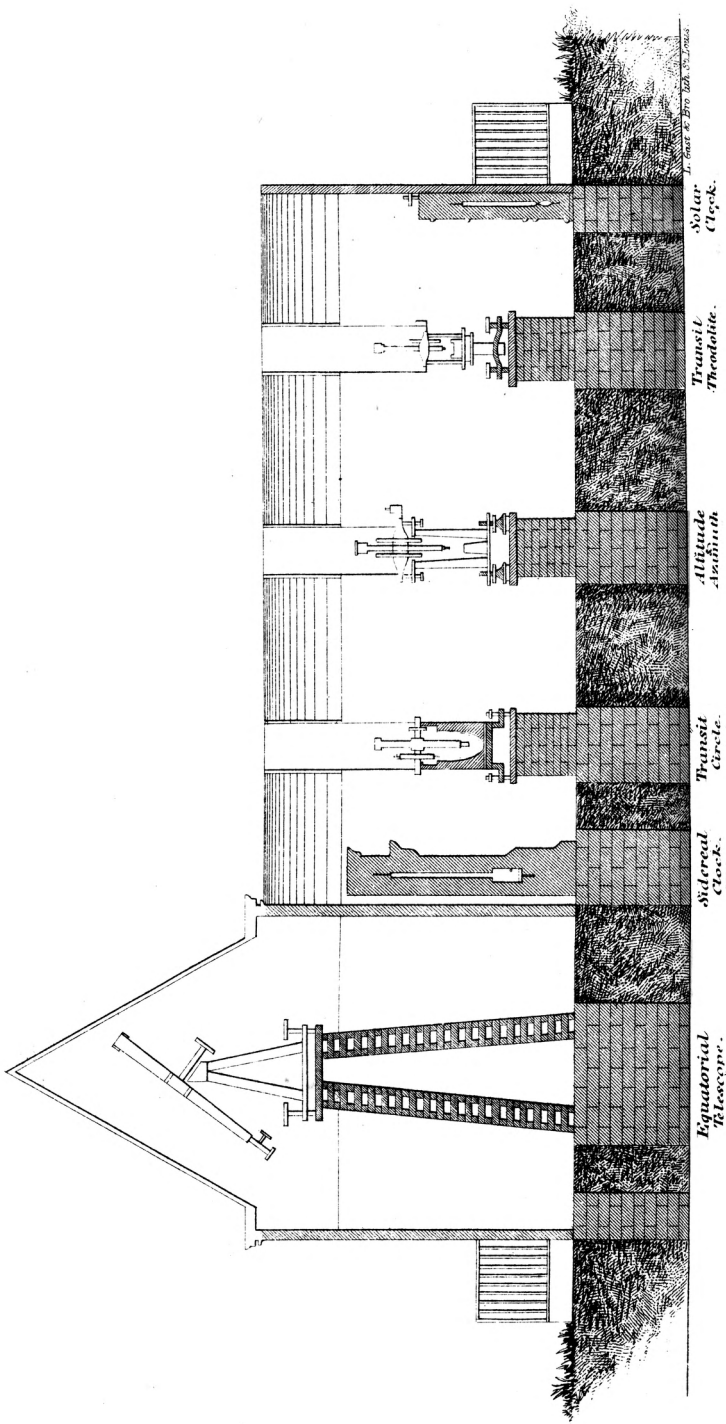
A comfortable seat is provided for every two students, and in front of them stands a desk, suitable for writing, cyphering, or the reception of books.

The tuition in Primary Department is \$12 50.

OBSERVATORY.

The Observatory stands west of the University edifice. It is forty-four feet long, fourteen feet wide, fourteen feet high in the equatorial room, and ten feet high in the transit room.

The roof of the equatorial room is a cone, which revolves on eight lignumvitæ balls, and is confined to the building, only by its gravity. The roofs of both rooms are intersected by shutters for the convenience of observation. The instruments stand on stone slabs, which rest on pillars that descend about six feet into the ground, and have no connection with the floors.

The equatorial room contains an Equatorial Telescope, by FITZ of New York. The transit room contains a Sidereal Clock by STOKEL of New York, a Solar Clock by RIGGS of Philadelphia, a Transit Circle by BRUNNER of Paris, an Altitude and Azimuth Instrument by SIMMS of London, and a Transit Theodolite by GREGG of New York. Besides the foregoing instruments, the outfit includes a sextant, mercurial horizon, barometers and thermometers.

Observations are made in the observatory as often as the wants of instruction require; and the times of observation that are most commonly adapted to the exigencies of the case, are noon and night.

APPARATUS, CABINET OF MINERALS AND LIBRARY.

The OUTFIT of Instruments and other facilities for illustrating the principles of Natural Philosophy, Chemistry and the cognate branches, has been increased by appropriations from year to year, and is now very full and complete.

The CABINET OF MINERALS was originally purchased from Prof. E. H. LEFFINGWELL, and has been greatly augmented by additions made by order of the General Assembly through Prof. G. C. SWALLOW, the State Geologist.

Yearly additions to the Cabinet will continue to be made during the progress of the Geological Survey.

The number of specimens in the Cabinet is 120,000.

The LIBRARY is regularly improving, partly by purchases and partly by presents from the General Government of sundry valuable works. The number of Volumes in the Library of the University, is about 2500; the number of Volumes in the Libraries of the two Literary Societies, is 1000; total number of volumes, 3500.

EXAMINATIONS, COMMENCEMENT AND DEGREES.

There are three EXAMINATIONS in the University.

1. An EXAMINATION of the new students, is held at the beginning of the session, for the purpose of ascertaining their scholarship, and assigning them to the classes for which they may be qualified.

On the occasion of these examinations, the Faculty generally commend the full course of study to students whose age and means render such a course advisable.

2. An EXAMINATION of the Senior Class is held during the second week in June, in order to determine what members of the class are qualified for graduation.

3. A general examination of the other classes is held during the last week in June, and on the 2d of July the members of the Faculty meet for the purpose of deciding what students shall be promoted to higher classes.

THE COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES

Take place on the 4th of July—but when the 4th of July falls on Sunday, the commencement is held on the 3d of July.

On this occasion, the Curators, Faculty, students, and such citizens and strangers as incline to attend this exhibition, assemble in the chapel of the University. Orations are delivered by members of the graduating class, and the exercises of the day are closed with the conferring of degrees.

DISCIPLINE AND LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

The DISCIPLINE of the University is intended to be mild and suasive, as far as circumstances permit. If, however, students manifest such moral obliquities as render them unworthy members of the body collegiate, they are returned to their friends without exposure, when it is practicable so to do; and it is only in cardinal offences that the Faculty resort to *public* and *exemplary* punishment.

When a student enters the University, the discipline of the Institution allows him a credit of one hundred merit marks, and he is charged on the record with such demerit marks as arise from misdemeanors and neglect of college duties. When it is ascertained that his demerits reach twenty-five, he is admonished, and a letter of notification is sent to his parent or guardian. When the number of demerits reaches fifty and seventy-five, the same course is pursued; and when the number reaches one hundred, he is excluded from the Institution by the operation of law, which is rendered effective by an announcement of the fact by the President.

When a student wishes to leave the University, either temporarily or permanently, he should confer with the President, in order that charges for absence may not accumulate against him on the record of demerit. It is hoped that absences from the Institution for the purpose of visiting friends, &c., will be discouraged by parents and guardians, because such absences interrupt a student's progress, and greatly diminish the pleasure and profit of his literary pursuits.

FORUM EXERCISES.

At the first bell in the morning, the Faculty and Students assemble in the forum of the University. At the second bell, the students take their proper seats, the Secretary of the Faculty passes over his roll in order to ascertain what students are absent, and the Chaplain performs Divine Service by reading a portion of the Holy Scriptures and offering prayer.

At the 5th bell, the Faculty and Students re-assemble in the forum for the purpose of attending to declamation and composition. These exercises fall within the charge of the Professor of Belles Lettres, who, in addition to his own criticisms, invites his colleagues to make such comments as they may deem proper to the occasion. All compositions and original speeches that are partizan in politics or religion, are expressly prohibited.

LITERARY SOCIETIES.

There are three Societies connected with the University, viz: the Athenæan, the Union Literary, and the Society of Alumni. The Athenæan and Union Literary Societies have spacious and well furnished halls in the University edifice, and hold weekly meetings for improvement in debate, oratory and composition. At the close of the session, they have exhibitions, which consist of original addresses and the conferring of diplomas upon such of their members as belong to the graduating class.

The Society of Alumni is composed entirely of graduates of the University. It holds an annual meeting, on the 3d of July, and is addressed by an orator, previously selected from its own body.

The objects of this Society are the promotion of education, especially in the halls of Alma Mater, the reunion of early

friends and co-laborers in literary pursuits, and the revival of those pleasing associations which entwine themselves about academic life.

GENERAL REMARKS.

The University of the State of Missouri was chartered by the Legislature during the session of 1838-'9, and went into full operation under its present organization on the first of January, 1844; since which time it has been in successful operation, affording to students the educational advantages ordinarily enjoyed in similar institutions.

The University edifice, a spacious, tasteful and commodious building, was erected at an expense of about \$85,000, by the liberality of the citizens of Boone county, in which it is located.

The annual revenue of the Institution, exclusive of fees for Tuition, is the income of a State fund of \$100,000, being the proceeds of the sales of lands, donated by Congress to the State for University purposes. The principal is well invested, and is legally inviolable.

Columbia, the seat of the University, is situated near the centre of the State, ten miles north of Providence on the Missouri river. The town contains about fifteen hundred inhabitants. It is confidently believed that no location combines more advantages for the site of a literary institution. It is not surpassed in healthfulness, and in those social, moral and religious influences which are conservative of the character of young men, and promotive of good order and industrious habits of study.

The University is easily accessible by the river during the greater part of the year. At the landing at Providence, carriages will always be in readiness to convey passengers to Columbia. To this point a plank road is completed. There is also constant communication with St. Louis, and with the upper counties by stage.
