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OUTSTANDING WOMEN FACULTY SOUGHT FOR ALUMNAE ANNIVERSARY AWARD

The Alumnae Anniversary Committee is now accepting nominations for its 1980 award, given annually to a female faculty member making an outstanding contribution to education at UMC. The \$1,000 award will be presented during spring commencement.

Selection is based on professional accomplishments and recommendations from alumnae, faculty and students. Full-time female faculty with the rank of instructor through professor are eligible. Persons currently on leave of absence do not qualify.

SEARCH BEGINS FOR OUTSTANDING STAFF; FOUR \$750 AWARDS TO BE PRESENTED

Awards of \$750 and plaques will be given to four outstanding administrative, service and support staff at a staff recognition ceremony April 21. The awards, established this year by Chancellor Uehling and the Staff Council, will recognize staff who have contributed to the University and the community through job performance, relationship with associates, and the furthering of the missions and values of the University.

Money for the awards has been made available through the Alumni Development Fund.

One award will be presented to a person from each of the four staff groups: administrative/professional, secretarial/clerical, crafts/maintenance and technical/paraprofessional. Selections of the winners will

be made by a committee comprised of Staff Council members, staff at large, faculty and students. Any full-time staff member not on staff council is eligible for nomination. Nominations may be made by any UMC faculty, staff or student.

The awards ceremony and a reception at the Chancellor's residence for the recipients will be the kickoff for a special staff Recognition Week, April 21-25, with seminars and activities of interest to staff.

Nomination forms will be available soon, according to Alan Jones, chairperson of the Staff Recognition Committee.

Tap Day ceremonies, which have been observed at UMC for more than half a century, have been scheduled for April 16.

So that faculty and students can attend this event, Chancellor Uehling has authorized classes to be dismissed on that day from 9:15 a.m. to 10:15 a.m. Since the time adjustment may cause an inconvenience to some faculty, the chancellor says that by providing considerable advance notice, she hopes that teaching schedules can be amended to accommodate the ceremony.

Recognition of initiatives of Mortar Board, QEBH, Mystical Seven, LSV and Omicron Delta Kappa will take place on Francis Quadrangle near the columns. Master of ceremonies will be Norman Moore, vice chancellor for student services.

EVENING PARKING PERMITS AVAILABLE FOR UMC STUDENTS; NIGHT PARKING STILL FREE AFTER 5 P.M.

Students with late afternoon classes at UMC may now purchase special "evening permits" that allow parking on most faculty and staff lots from 3:45 p.m. to 5 p.m., according to James Joy, manager of parking operations.

Parking is free after 5 p.m. in all campus lots except WC-19, behind Middlebush.

"We wanted to make parking as convenient and as safe as possible for such students, many of them local residents who commute to campus after work," Joy says.

When a survey of faculty and staff lots revealed that after 3:45 p.m. some 800 spaces were available near classrooms, evening parking permits seemed practical.

The special stickers, good until the end of the semester, are \$7, half the cost of a normal sticker. They are now available at the Parking Operations Office, 816 Conley Ave., across from Jesse Hall.

FELLOWSHIPS AVAILABLE FOR GRADUATE STUDY ABROAD

The Graduate School has funded two \$1,000 fellowships for graduate study abroad in 1980-81, says Meyer Reinhold, professor and chairman of the Task Force for Graduate Fellowships Abroad.

To be eligible, students must have completed their comprehensive exams for a Ph.D. or comparable requirements for the highest degree offered by their programs by the end of this semester. The student must also be involved in research where travel abroad is necessary.

Each department can nominate one student for the fellowships. Nominations should include a description of the research project, certification that travel abroad is necessary, and letters of recommendation by the department's dean of graduate studies or chair.
