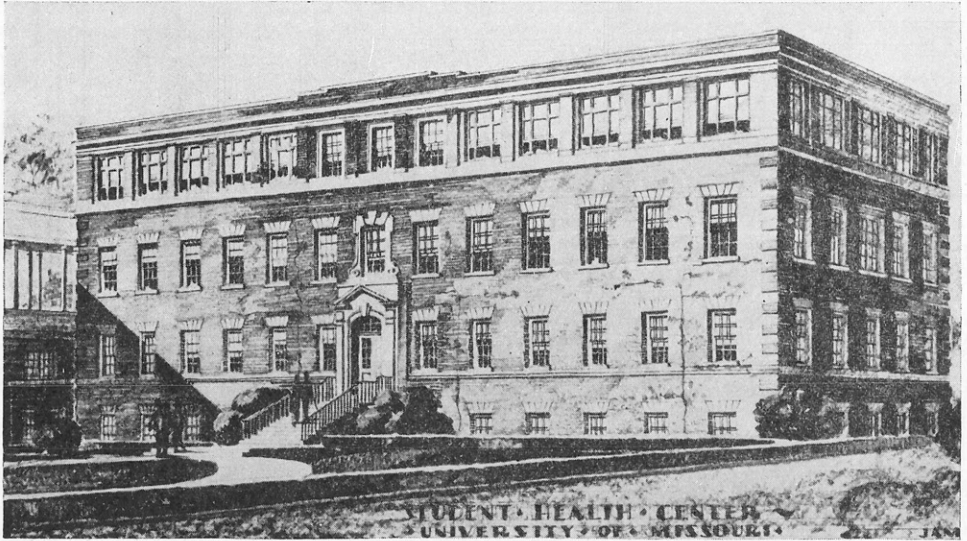

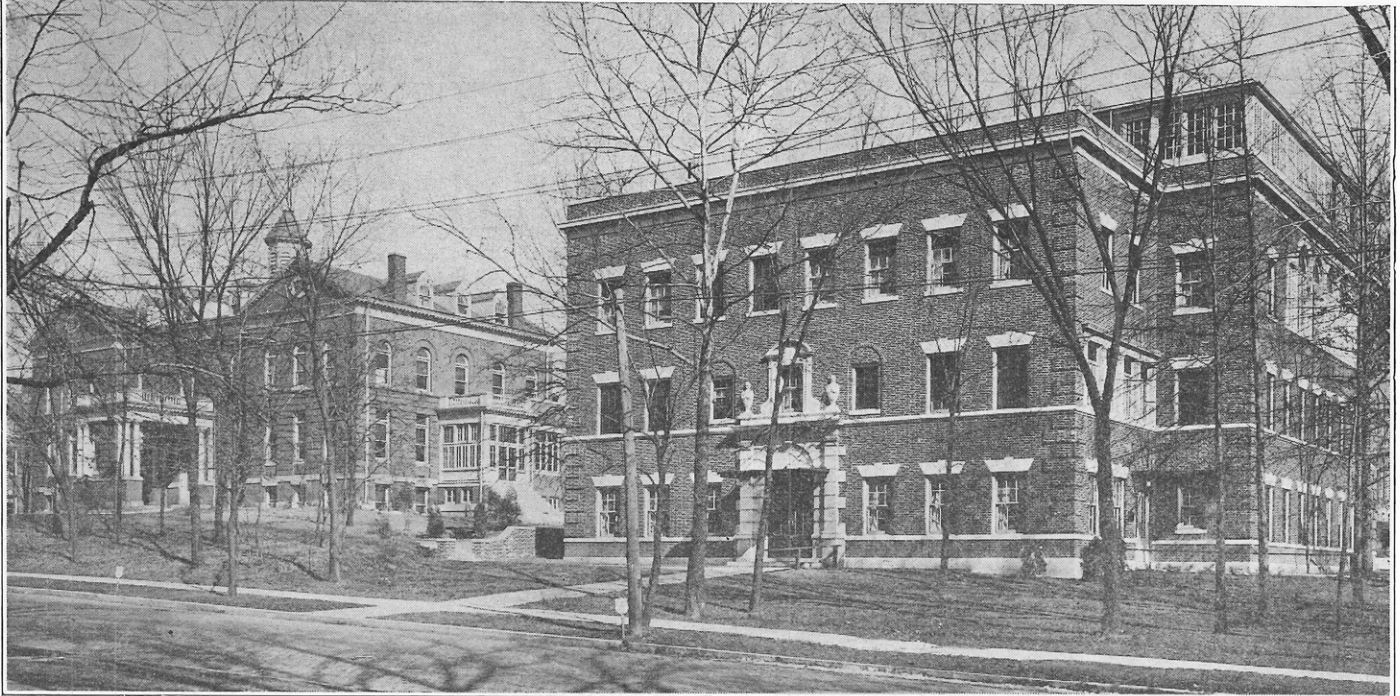

SCHOOL OF NURSING ANNOUNCEMENT

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

The School of Nursing of the University of Missouri was established in 1901. It was reorganized as a University School of Nursing in 1920. A three year combined program in Nursing and Arts and Science was approved by the faculty of the College of Arts and Science. The Board of Curators agreed to confer the Degree of Graduate in Nursing (G. N.) upon all students who fulfilled the requirements of the School of Nursing.

OPPORTUNITIES IN NURSING

The profession of nursing may be divided into three branches: Private Duty Nursing, Institutional Nursing, and Public Health Nursing.

There is an increasing demand at the present time for nurses who have had college preparation in addition to the nursing course. Well prepared nurses are needed particularly for teaching and executive positions in all of the fields of nursing. The nurse who has had college training in addition to the nursing course, has a decided advantage in securing good positions after graduation.

The University of Missouri School of Nursing has distinct advantages, in that it offers the student the chance to accumulate credit toward an academic degree, in addition to completing the requirements for a nursing degree.

Students in the School of Nursing are given all of the privileges offered to other University women. The required courses in Physical Education offer a valuable means of recreation. Opportunities are given to students to attend concerts, plays, and athletic events sponsored by the University. Since much of the class work is given by the members of the faculty of the University, student nurses have the opportunity of making valuable daily contacts with teachers and other students in the University.

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

Applicants for admission to the University of Missouri School of Nursing must be graduates of a four year fully accredited high school, which meets the requirements of the College of Arts and Science of the University of Missouri. Students who have had college work before entering the School of Nursing are given preference over students who have had only high school work. Applicants should be preferably between 19 and 30 years of age.

The following requirements must be met before the applicant can be accepted:

1. A transcript of high school credits must be sent to the Registrar, University of Missouri, and a duplicate copy sent to the Principal

of Nurses, University Hospital. If the student has had college work, a transcript of college credits must be sent also. Students will not be accepted unless high school and college grades are average or above.

2. A physical examination blank will be sent with the application blank, and is to be used as a record of certification of the applicants health. The examination must be done by a reputable physician. It is to be accompanied by statements from the physician saying that the applicant has been successfully vaccinated against Smallpox and Typhoid Fever.
3. A certificate from a dentist is required, saying that the applicants teeth are in good condition.
4. A personal interview is requested whenever possible. If it is impossible for applicant to come for a personal interview, a small recent photograph should be sent with the application.

SUMMARY OF THE NURSING COURSE

Students receive their practical training in the University Hospitals. The course includes instruction in Medical Nursing, Surgical Nursing, Nursing in Communicable Diseases, Diet Therapy, Operating Room Technique, Orthopedics and Physiotherapy, and Nursing in the Out-patient Departments. During the senior year students affiliate for six months at the University of Minnesota School of Nursing in Minneapolis, for work in Obstetrics and Diseases of Children.

HOURS OF DUTY.—During the first semester or preliminary period, students are on duty 2 hours a day after the first four weeks. During the remainder of the time in the School of Nursing, they are on duty from 4 to 8 hours a day, the amount of time depending on the number of classes the student has during the day. They are given six hours off on Sunday, and one free afternoon each week.

VACATION.—One month of vacation is given each year, usually during the summer months.

GOVERNMENT.—Student nurses live in the nurses home. They are members of the Womens Student Government Association of the University, and conform to the rules and regulations of that organization.

LENGTH OF COURSE.—The course in nursing as offered to high school graduates is a three year course. At the completion of the course, they are given the Degree of Graduate in Nursing (G. N.) and 54 hours credit in the College of Arts and Science. This includes four hours of credit for Physical Education.

A two and one-half year course in nursing is offered to students who have had college work, providing they have had as much as 34 hours of the following subjects:

Composition and Rhetoric.....	6 hours
General Zoology.....	5 hours
Inorganic Chemistry.....	5 hours
Organic Chemistry.....	3 hours
Foreign Language (Same foreign language).....	10 hours
Introductory Mathematics (not required if student has had 3 units of high school mathematics).....	3 hours
General Sociology.....	3 hours
General Psychology.....	3 hours
General Bacteriology.....	3 hours
Elementary Anatomy.....	3 hours
Elementary Physiology.....	5 hours
Preventive Medicine.....	2 hours

Students who enter as high school graduates should be able to complete the work for an A. B. Degree in two years and a summer term, after they complete the three years nursing course.

Students who have had as much as three semesters of college work before entering the School of Nursing, will be able to complete the work for an A. B. Degree in one year and a summer term, after they complete the two and one-half year nursing course.

The University of Missouri does not grant B.S. Degrees in Nursing, but an arrangement is being made with the University of Minnesota, whereby students who have had the nursing course at the University of Missouri can complete the work for a B.S. in Public Health Nursing, or a B.S. in Nursing Education at the University of Minnesota.

FEES AND EXPENSES.—Student nurses pay the regular University fee of \$3.50 per credit hour for courses taken in the School of Arts and Science, and \$4.25 per credit hour for courses taken in the School of Medicine. They do not pay fees for courses taken in the School of Nursing. There are no additional laboratory fees or deposits.

Each semester, all students in the University are required to purchase activity tickets, at a cost of \$5.75. The tickets entitle them to attend concerts, plays, and athletic events sponsored by the University.

Students who are not bona-fide residents of Missouri are required to pay non-resident University fees of \$25.00 per semester.

EQUIPMENT.—Students are required to purchase their own uniforms. The uniforms are made after the student enters the School of Nursing, and

are sold to the student at cost. Other necessary equipment is included in the following list:

- One pair of well made low heeled (with rubber caps) plain white oxfords.
- Watch with a second hand.
- Fountain pen.
- Four sets of plain underwear.
- Bathrobe and slippers.
- Raincoat or cape and galoshes.
- Two laundry bags.
- Simple party dress.

All washable articles of clothing are to be plainly marked with name tapes. (Sterling Name Tape Co.; 8-14 Washington St.; Winsted, Conn.)

MAINTENANCE.—Students are given full maintenance, including room, board, and laundry. They live in the nurses home, near the University campus. They do not receive an allowance while they are enrolled in the School of Nursing.

LOAN FUNDS.—Students who have difficulty in meeting the expenses of the course can usually borrow from regular University Loan Funds after one semester of satisfactory work. A complete list of Loan Funds will be found in the regular University catalogue.

- 3 months theory and practise in Diseases of Children

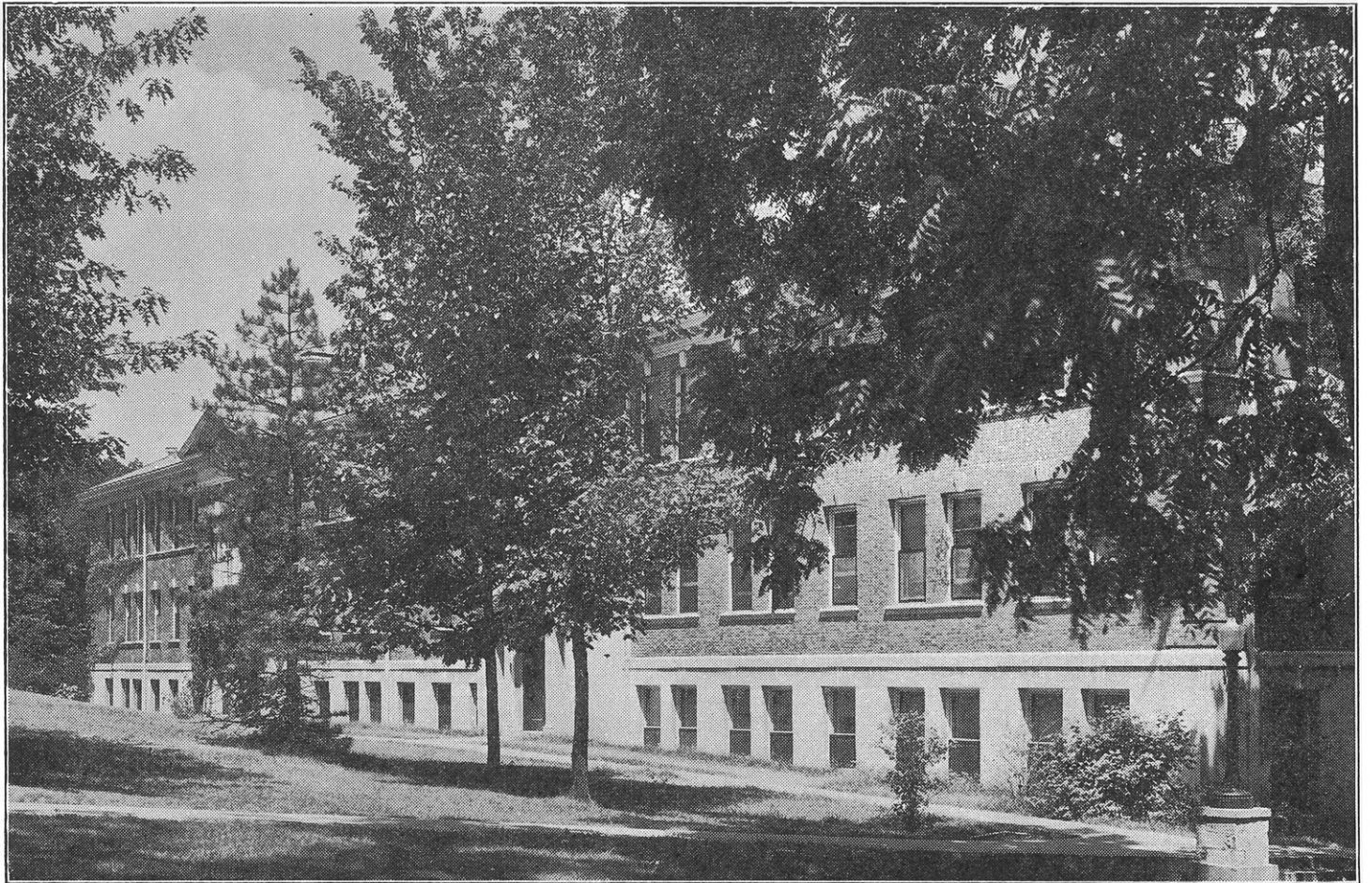
