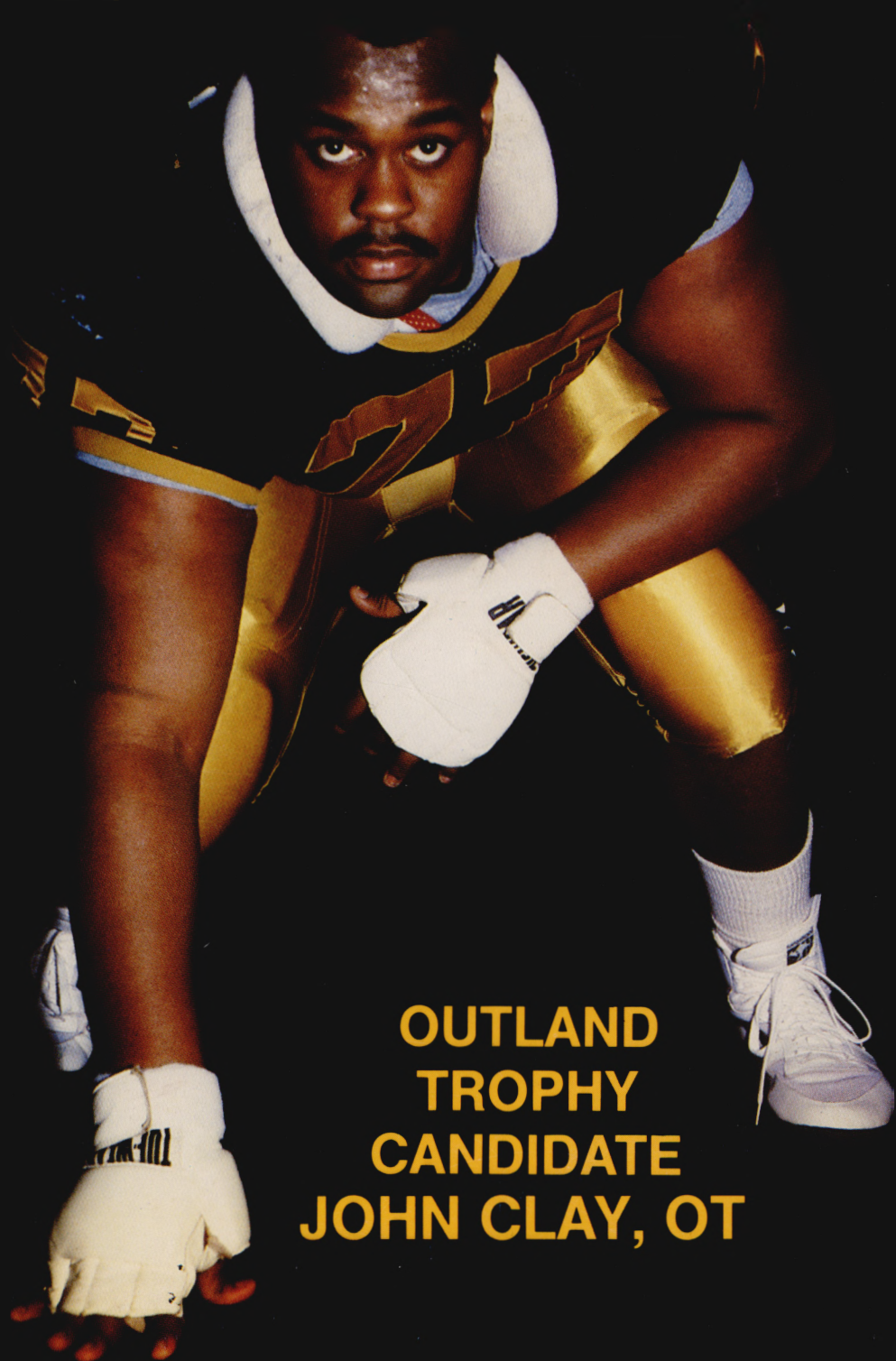

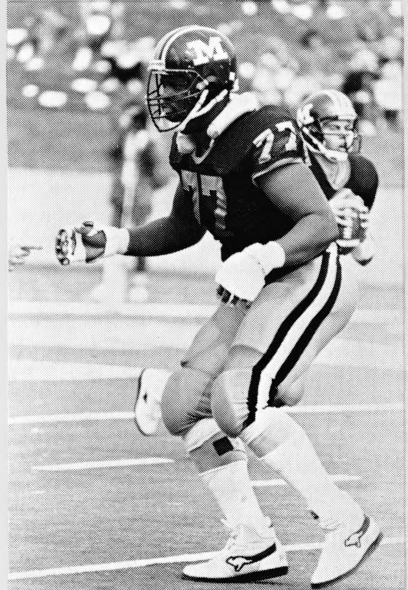

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MEMO: To Press/Radio/TV Staffers

Press Credentials: Contact Bob Brendel, Sports Information Office, 374 Hearnes Building, Columbia, MO 65211. Office Phone: (314) 882-6501, ext. 238. After 5 p.m., or on weekends, call (314) 882-4720.

We prefer to mail credentials at least one week in advance of the game, however, when time does not permit, credentials will be held in your name at the Westside Will Call Window, located near the press elevator at Faurot Field.

Press Parking: Members of the working media will be issued press parking permits on a single-game basis. The press parking area is just southwest of the stadium, near the Food Service Building, in Lot C. Entrance to the lot is the second entrance south of Stadium Blvd. on Providence Road (Route K).

Sideline Photographers: You must pick up an armband in the elevator area on game day, to gain admittance to the sidelines. This is your official badge, and University Police are instructed to chase any photographer, or other casual bystander, not displaying the armband. A new one is issued for each game.

Telephones: Media outlets are encouraged to order their own telephones by contacting General Telephone Company of the Midwest (314) 876-3699. Two outside lines are maintained by the Sports Information Office, to be used on a first-come, first-served basis, and users must pay all long-distance charges.

Game Services: Staffers will receive game notes, statistics, programs and flip cards prior to kickoff. The in-house P.A. announcer will keep you abreast of play-by-play, records set, scores, and quarterly stats. Quickie stats will be distributed at halftime, and a complete book of stats (scoring summary, team and individual offensive stats, defensive stats, drive charts, quotes and play-by-play) will be available soon after the game in the statisticians room, located at the north end of the press level. PLEASE DON'T ASK FOR STATISTICS UNTIL SETS ARE COMPLETED.

Post-Game Interview: Coach Woody Widenhofer conducts his post-game press conference in the conference room of the Dutton Brookfield Athletic Facility (located west of the stadium, across Providence Road). Writers are invited to sit in on Coach Woody's post-game radio show. SID Bob Brendel will be present to assist with player interviews, which may be conducted in the Brookfield locker room following the completion of Woody's show.

The Missouri locker room is open to all accredited members of the media.

Weekly Interviews: Coach Woody is available in his office generally from 11:30 a.m. until noon. You may call his office directly (314) 882-2213. He's also available on the practice field immediately following practice.

During the pre-season, players are available for interviews both before and after practice. Once the season begins, however, players will not be available after Wednesday, unless special arrangements are made with the Sports Information Office. **THE LOCKER ROOM IS OPEN AFTER PRACTICE.**

To conduct a telephone interview, please contact Bob Brendel. Players will be instructed to return telephone calls COLLECT during the evening hours. Home phone numbers will not be released.

Hotel Accommodations: Members of the media unable to make motel reservations on their own or in need of direction should contact the sports information office (314-882-6501).

How To Reach Columbia: The University of Missouri is easily accessible by air or auto. Columbia is located on Interstate 70, midway between Kansas City and St. Louis. Several airlines offer service to Columbia Regional Airport, which is located approximately 10 miles south of town, on U.S. 63.

How To Reach Faurot Field: Memorial Stadium/Faurot Field is located at the intersection of Route 740 (Stadium Blvd.) and Route K (Providence Road).

When approaching from the east, exit

Interstate 70 at U.S. 63 South. Proceed to Route 740 (Stadium Blvd.) and follow it west to the stadium.

When approaching from the west, exit Interstate 70 at the first Columbia exit, again Route 740 (Stadium Blvd.) and follow it east to the stadium.

When approaching from the north, exit U.S. 63 at Interstate 70. Proceed west to Providence Road and follow it south to the stadium.

When approaching from the south, exit U.S. 63 at Route 740 (Stadium Blvd.) and proceed west to the stadium.

BIG EIGHT MONDAY COACHES BRIEFING

The Big Eight Conference hosts individual telephonic press conferences with each head football coach beginning at 10:55 a.m., every Monday morning during the season, starting Sept. 1.

The conferences are conducted by speaker-phone from the league headquarters in Kansas City, Mo., and media may attend the sessions or participate via long-distance telephone services. Radio stations on the Kansas City Royals Baseball Network may record the sessions via a hookup with WIBW radio, or may program a satellite receiving dish to: WESTAR III, IF 64.3 MhZ, Transponder 2.

Media wishing to participate in the sessions via long-distance services should contact the Conference office. A small, standard fee is charged.

The Monday schedule for football will feature Iowa State coach Jim Criner at 10:55 a.m., followed by Kansas State coach Stan Parrish at 11:05 a.m., Oklahoma State coach Pat Jones at 11:15 a.m., Oklahoma coach Barry Switzer at 11:25 a.m., Nebraska coach Tom Osborne at 11:35 a.m., Missouri coach Woody Widenhofer at 11:45 a.m., Kansas coach Bob Valesente at 11:55 a.m., and Colorado coach Bill McCartney at 12:05 a.m., CST.

BIG EIGHT WEEKLY SATELLITE HIGHLIGHTS

'86 OUTLOOK

The woes of last year's 1-10 season will not be soon forgotten at the University of Missouri. But second-year coach Woody Widenhofer has good reason to think his 1986 Tigers can turn things around. Improvement in experience, depth and team speed should give Ol' Mizzou a better-than-even chance to start the road back to a contending role in the Big Eight Conference.

"We suffered from a lack of quality depth and leadership in our upper two classes last year," Woody said. "A lot of people from the classes of 1981 and '82 were gone, for a variety of reasons. We ended up playing a lot of young people and paid the price. But we were still competitive. We lost six games by eight points or less (including decisions against Nebraska, Oklahoma State and Texas). The experience we gained last season should give us a chance to win those close games this year."

Woody's adroit recruiting should begin paying a benefit this year, too. To provide some upper-class leadership and depth, he recruited ten junior-college standouts and reaped a windfall when Drake University dropped its football program and its four

top players transferred to Mizzou—where they're immediately eligible. Five of the JUCO transfers, and all of the Drake refugees were on hand for spring football. All nine came out of spring as starters, or second-teamers.

OFFENSE

RECEIVER—This was Missouri's most troubled position last season, as only all-Big Eight **Herbert Johnson** made it through the season without injury. Johnson got his chance when Adrian McBride was felled in the second game, and "Junebug" went on to set a Missouri record with 49 receptions for 806 yards.

Last year's injury bug, however, enabled a number of other people to get experience, which now makes Mizzou's receiving corps one of the team's most solid units. **Victor Moore** is back opposite Johnson following his best spring practice. But both returning starters will be tested by two other returnees and two newcomers.

Walkon **Craig Lammers** got a chance last season when injuries struck, and responded by catching 15 passes, to earn a scholarship from Coach Woody. **Patrick Overshown** came to Mizzou as a world-

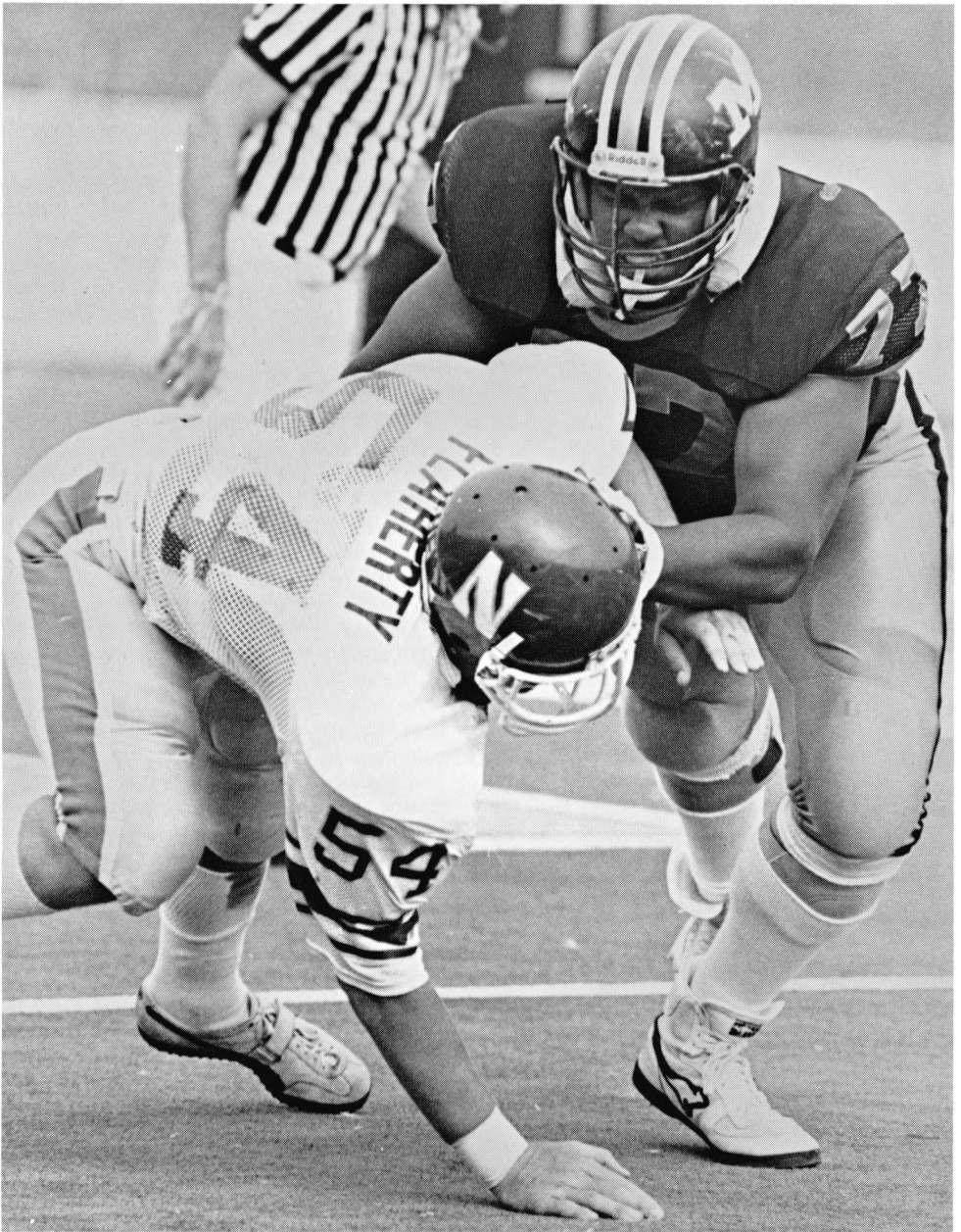

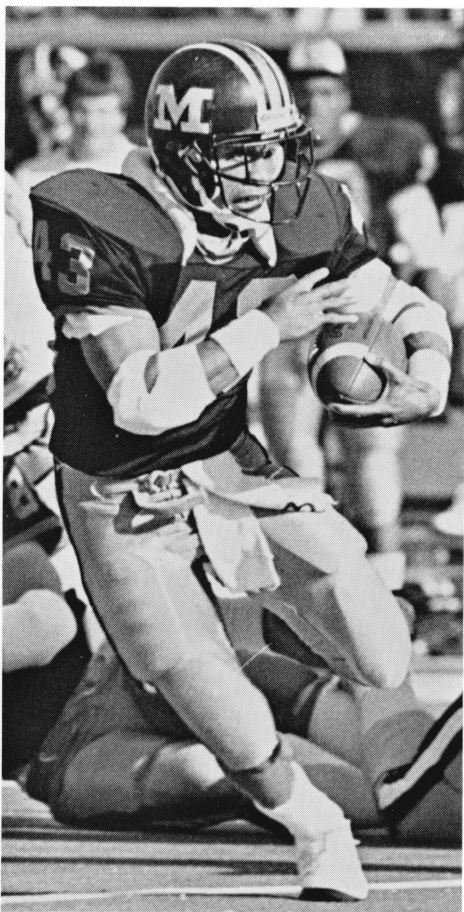

class sprinter, but was hurt most of last season, and missed the spring.

Impressive in the spring was JUCO all-American **Robert Delpino**, who caught four passes in the Black-Gold Game for 144 yards to earn MVP honors. Also, Drake transfer **Kevin Hagens**, redshirted there last season, showed well in the spring.

At tight end, senior **Joe Close** will have to avoid the injuries that have plagued him throughout his career to hold off the challenge of **Brent Peterson**, an all-MVC choice last year at Drake.

INTERIOR—Offensive coordinator and line coach Bill Meyers has no worries here. This is a solid unit, led by one of the best guard-tackle tandems in the country—all-

America right tackle **John Clay**, a leading Outland Award and Lombardi Trophy candidate, and right guard **Phil Pettey**. The two bruisers were major reasons why little Darrell Wallace was able to dart for only the third 1,000-yard rushing season in Missouri history last year.

Senior **Dal Lockwood** gained valuable experience, starting seven games, at center last season, and solidified his position in the spring. Former defensive lineman and fullback **Michael Scott** was moved to center in the spring, but suffered a knee injury that cost him valuable time. Junior college transfer **Curtis Wilson** is also a possibility at center.

The left side returns junior guard **Jeff Rigman**, a starter in all 11 games last year, and **Ted Romney**, a senior transfer from Drake, who earned second-team, all-Missouri Valley honors last year, and fit right in during the spring.

QUARTERBACK—Sophomore **Ronnie Cameron** inherits the quarterbacking reins from the ever-present QB duo of Marlon Adler and Warren Seitz. Despite a sore arm in the spring, he held off redshirt freshman **Brent Cook**, demonstrating the quick feet it takes to turn a busted play into a big gainer. In Cameron's only quarterback action last season, he completed five-of-seven passes for 69 yards and a late touchdown against Kansas.

Cook, though, is a smooth passer with great confidence. Holdovers **Jeff Henning** and **Alex Fedak** provide insurance in the wings.

RUNNING BACK—Slithery **Darrell Wallace** was the highlight of the '85 season, rushing for 1,120 yards, only the third 1,000-yard rushing total in school history and the first in 16 years. He missed most of the spring with a broken wrist, which enabled senior **Vernon Boyd** to earn plaudits as the top back in the Black-Gold game, with 132 rushing yards. Toss Parade Magazine "Player of the Year" **Tony Vanzant** into that group, and Missouri is set with quality tailbacks.

Coach Woody spent much of the spring looking for help at the fullback position, where the Tigers netted only 300 yards last season. For the third straight year, **Ed Esson** grabbed the starting fullback job, but must avoid the injuries that have prevented him from holding that honor during the regular season. Senior **Jon Redd** had a solid spring, and offers Mizzou a back who can play either the halfback or fullback spots.

Redshirt freshman **Tommy Stowers**, a former running back, was impressive in the spring, and needs only to improve his blocking skills. Former linebackers **Chris Jensen** and **Doug McGhee** were also shifted to the fullback position, and offer depth.

DEFENSE

DOWN LINEMEN—The Tigers return defensive end **Dick Chapura**, who was second on the team with 98 tackles last year, and led Mizzou with seven QB sacks. Also back is nose tackle **Darryl Darling**, an impressive freshman who's upped his weight to 250 for his sophomore campaign. **Marland Beaudean** and junior college transfer **Jeff Cross** will battle for the right end position vacated by Rick Klohmann. Veteran **Scott Vollet** also re-

turns at end. Redshirt freshman **Lee Johnson** was impressive in a brief spring try at nose, and will play both there and at inside linebacker as the season progresses.

LINEBACKER—In Missouri's 3-4 alignment, having a lot of capable linebackers is a necessity, as the Tigers learned last season. Five players with starting experience, however, return. As freshmen, inside 'backer **Terry Walker** and outside man **Steve Vandegrift**, were two of Missouri's bright spots. As sophomores both should start to blossom. Veteran inside linebacker **Mike Vestweber** enjoyed his first injury-free spring and is touted by Coach Woody as a future NFLer. He'll call the defensive signals. Another senior, **Gary Justis**, is back bigger and stronger after missing most of last year with a leg injury. Also back is senior **Bo Sherrill** who started some at both inside and outside positions last season. He missed the spring but offers quality depth.

New to the linebacking corps are the aforementioned Johnson and **Darren MacDonald**, also redshirted as a freshman last season. Junior college transfer **Maurice Character**, with 4.5 speed, showed big-play capabilities in the spring, and former nose-guard, senior **Cory Cathcart**, showed well in a move to inside linebacker in the spring.

SECONDARY—It's still a young one, but barring the injuries that shredded this

unit last year, it's bound to be improved and will feature more experience. **Erik McMillan**, the Tigers' leading tackler in 1985 with 109 and a leading "all" candidate, has been moved to strong safety to take advantage of his aggressiveness. His weak safety spot goes to Stan Long, who acquitted himself well as a rookie on the strong side.

The corners will be manned by sophomore **Pat Ray** and junior **Rodney Shepherd**. Missing is **Cordell McKinney**, who won a starting position as a rookie last year, but will miss the 1986 season after spring knee surgery. Ray would have been a starter last season, but missed the entire campaign with a badly pul'ed hamstring. Sophomores **Kenny King** and **Jesse Holmes** (a Drake transfer) are also pushing for starting time on the outside.

Three-year letterman **Cameron Riley** can play either safety position and is a valuable commodity to the defense. Junior **Ron Mitchell** and redshirt freshman **Scott Mitchell** are also safety candidates.

KICKING—Already one of the most prolific kickers in school history, junior **Tom Whelihan** will handle both the punting and kicking in 1986. The double-duty is nothing new to him . . . he ended his freshman year that way and averaged over 45 yards per punt. As a placekicker, he set records in '85 with 16 FGs, a long of 54 yards, and an accuracy rate of .615.

COACH 'WOODY'

Robert 'Woody' Widenhofer Head Football Coach

The disappointment of posting a 1-10 record in his first year as head coach of the Missouri Tigers was tough for Woody Widenhofer to take. Despite fielding a team virtually devoid of seniors and juniors, he'd seen his first Tiger unit take such teams as Texas, Nebraska and Oklahoma State to the wire. Six times Mizzou lost by eight or fewer points.

But to alleviate the problems, Woody hit the recruiting trail, and for the second straight year, he reaped a class considered to be one of the top-15 in the country. Included in that group was Parade Magazine "Player of the Year" Tony VanZant—the first such nationally acclaimed player to ever sign at Missouri. His junior college recruiting, which brought in five players in January, and four more who will arrive in August, was considered to be in the top-three.

They'll join a solid nucleus of players who return from last year, including the Tigers' top 1985 performers—Outland Trophy candidate John Clay, running back Darrell Wallace, wide receiver Herbert Johnson, defensive end Dick Chapura, linebacker Steve Vandegrift and strong safety Erik McMillan.

"Missouri should never be 1-10 again," Woody says emphatically. "This state has too many resources for that to happen. I guarantee you, the high school football played in Missouri is as good as there is in the United States. Every year, 40-45 top Division I prospects are right here. We can win with the talent from this state. Since we can only sign 25-30 players per year, it puts a premium on your evaluation of talent."

To that end, Woody has sent his coaches into all of Missouri's 322 football-playing high schools during each of the last two Springs. "I've told my coaches, 'The quickest way to get fired is to fail to do your job recruiting.' We're visiting every school, whether it has a prospect or not. Some of these coaches had never seen a Missouri coach. Now, they're getting a better feeling about us, and they'll help deliver the top players to the state university."

Robert "Woody" Widenhofer (pronounced



WIDD-un-hoff-urr) became the University of Missouri's 28th football coach on Dec. 19, 1984. He succeeded Warren Powers, returning to his alma mater where he played as a linebacker under Dan Devine in the mid-1960s. He's the first UMC graduate to lead Tiger footballers since legendary Don Faurot (1935-56). "This is a special place to me," Woody says.

Coach Woody, as his players call him, brought impressive credentials to Columbia. He was the defensive coordinator of Chuck Noll's Pittsburgh Steelers—four-time Super Bowl champions. He left in 1983 to become head coach of the USFL's Oklahoma Outlaws. Thus, he's a coaching rarity—a man who's been a head coach on the high school, college and professional levels.

At Pittsburgh, Woody coached three all-Pro linebackers—Jack Ham, Andy Russell and Jack Lambert—during an 11-year stay. Ironically, Woody played behind Russell for two years at Missouri, then coached him for seven seasons at Pittsburgh.

Associations like those have helped in recruiting, too. Those players, and others like Joe Greene, Terry Bradshaw and Doug Williams, have been involved in the recruitment process, and have also appeared at Woody's summer camps, along with Tiger stalwarts

like Kellen Winslow, Eric Wright, James Wilder, Kurt Peterson and Demetrious Johnson.

Woody says he learned a lot about himself, his coaching staff and his players during the trying days of 1985. "The biggest difference between professional football and college is the number of hours each day you have to spend with your players. We only get them for a couple of hours, and they might come to practice having had trouble on a test, or a fight with their girlfriend. We learned to keep things simple."

This time around, the coaching staff knows the attributes of each player better than a year ago, and the squad understands the coaching philosophy. And, the staff has relocated in the new Tom Taylor Football Complex, adjacent to the Dutton Brookfield Training Facility.

Woody was instrumental in making the contacts that resulted in a \$180,000 contribution from Taylor, a Dallas businessman and alumnus, to build a new building to house the football staff, the athletic dining hall and academic counseling unit. The staff moved from the Hearnese Center in May.

"Now, a player can walk off the practice field, shower, eat dinner, and get to work on his studies without running all over campus," Woody says.

Woody also talks about the commitment of his staff. "I had four coaches who turned down substantial job offers (during the off season) to stay. We all feel we have a job to

Jack Lengyel Director of Athletics

A new era in Missouri athletics began March 4, when Jack Lengyel was named by Chancellor Barbara S. Uehling as Miz-zou's athletic director. The 50-year-old Lengyel (pronounced LING-ull) returned to the Columbia campus after three productive years as athletic director at Fresno State University. He had previously spent three years as associate athletic director at Mizzou.

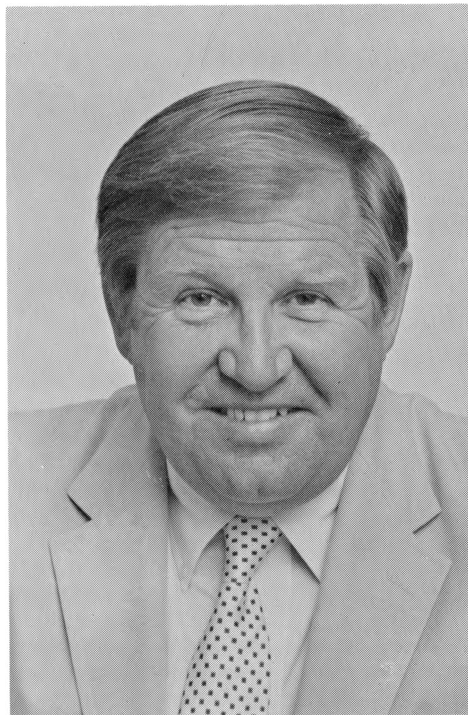
Lengyel's charge to the department upon his arrival was simple. "Our motto will be 'Service-Service-Service'. When our fans come onto this campus, they should feel like guests in our home. We need to be a family."

As a close-knit "family", Lengyel feels the athletic department can more effectively mount successful athletic programs that have as their central focus the best interests of the student-athlete.

Interfacing athletics and academics is a top priority of Lengyel. For instance, he plans to place a tenured faculty member into the Tigers' position of director of student-athletes services. He also believes firmly in the use of athletics as a vehicle to promote academic units on campus. His "Ag Day" promotion for the Utah State game is designed to provide tickets to Missouri farmers to draw them to Columbia. Once here, the School of Agriculture will have the opportunity to offer seminars and a major speaker. Other plans call for an "Honors Day", when academic areas can invite the state's top high school scholars to campus for an open house, then take them to a football game.

Lengyel grew up in Akron, Ohio, and won letters at Akron University in football, lacrosse, swimming and track, along with a degree in physical education. He has a master's degree from Kent State.

During a coaching career that spanned 22 years on all three NCAA university levels, he was head coach in the sports of football, lacrosse, baseball, wrestling, swimming and track. In 1971, he was the man tabbed by Marshall University to rebuild its football program after the fatal plane



crash that wiped out the team and its coaches in 1970.

"I've taken the Jeep and drug the baseball field, washed the uniforms and picked up the players . . . When I talk with coaches about their sport, they know I've been there as a coach and that I can relate to them and their problems," he says.

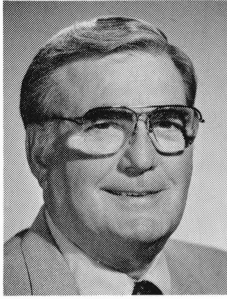
In 1974, Lengyel went into private business in Louisville, Ky. After a successful sales career with Gamble Bros., he returned to athletics as associate athletic director at Louisville, and in 1980, came to Missouri.

At Fresno State, he took a program that was on probation when he arrived, instituted programs of institutional control and accountability for all booster groups, improved old facilities and added new ones, added effective fund-raising and marketing strategies and saw 11 sports achieve national top-20 status during his final 18 months there.

Lengyel's family—"my first order of responsibility"—includes Sandy, his wife of 30 years, sons David and Peter, both graduates of the U.S. Naval Academy, and daughter Julie, a graduate of the University of Kentucky.

Dick Tamburo **Associate Director**

Dick Tamburo joined the Missouri staff in May, following Jack Lengyel from Fresno State. The 56-year-old Tamburo supervises the department's operations and was instrumental in helping Lengyel with the re-organization of the Missouri athletic department staff.



At Fresno State, he served as associate athletic director for six months, where his duties were much the same as they are at Mizzou. He managed operations, the organizational chart, and NCAA compliance.

During his tenure as Arizona State director of athletics from 1980-85, Tamburo maintained a 23-sport Sun Devil program. ASU was the only Pac-10 Conference school that did not drop a sport because of financing during this time. At the same time, he increased all women's sports to their NCAA scholarship allotment. He renegotiated ASU's radio contract from \$50,000 to \$500,000 and added promotional activities of a \$1,000,000 value per year for four years. He implemented plans for stadium expansion, an increase in basketball seating, a new softball stadium and renovation of all athletic offices.

Tamburo spent 1978-80 as director of athletics at Texas Tech, where he increased Red Raider Booster Club contributions from \$250,000 to \$500,000 and initiated plans for a new baseball field. He served at Illinois from 1972-78 as associate athletic director and previously had a two-year stint at Kent State.

Tamburo coached collegiate football for 13 years including nine years at Arizona State, under Frank Kush. He then moved to the University of Iowa for four years.

As an offensive lineman at Michigan State, Tamburo earned all-America honors. The teams he played on posted a 26-1 record in his three-year (1950-52) career. He was drafted by the Cleveland Browns but opted to play a year in the Canadian Football League for Hamilton. He entered the Army in 1954.

Tamburo, a native of New Kensington, Pa., graduated from Michigan State in 1953, with a degree in police administration. He and his wife Marie have three children, and six grandchildren.

John Kadlec **Assistant Director**

John Kadlec returned to his alma mater in July to direct Missouri's fund-raising arm.

He came to Mizzou after heading Kansas State University's fund raising. During his eight years as assistant athletic director with



the Wildcats, Kadlec built Kansas State's donor base from 600 to 2,350. He raised more than \$9 million in eight years, including \$3.2 million in a capital campaign for the Wildcat's new basketball arena.

The move to Kansas State began Kadlec's administrative career when he left coaching in 1978. He had served as an assistant football coach at Kansas State from 1960-1966.

As an all-conference guard for the Tigers in 1950, Kadlec played in the East-West Shrine and Senior Bowls. He served two stints as a Missouri assistant coach, 1952-60 and 1966-78. During his days at Mizzou, he worked with coaches Don Faurot, Frank Broyles, Dan Devine and Al Onofrio.

He earned a bachelor's degree in education from Missouri in 1951 and a master's degree in the same field in 1952.

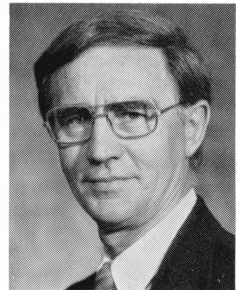
Kadlec and his wife Mary have three daughters and a son. He is a native of St. Louis.

Gary Filbert **Assistant Director**

Just before the start of the basketball season last year, Gary Filbert moved from assistant basketball coach to assistant athletic director.

Filbert still works with the basketball program, and also monitors many of Mizzou's non-revenue sports.

Since assuming his new position, Filbert was also heavily involved as a consultant to the expanded Show-Me State Games, contested largely on the University of Missouri campus.



A former Missouri basketball player and longtime cage coach at Mexico (Mo.) High school and Missouri Western State College in St. Joseph, Filbert spent three seasons on Norm Stewart's staff. He directed Stewart's summer basketball camps and fall coaching clinics, in addition to his practice and game-coaching duties.

A native of St. Joseph, Filbert attended Benton High School, then interrupted his college studies to spend four years in the U.S. Marine Corps. He returned to Mizzou in 1952, winning three letters as a varsity basketball player under coach Wilbur "Sparky" Stalcup.

As head basketball coach and athletic director at Mexico, Filbert compiled a 290-110 won-lost record from 1955-69, and produced seven state tournament teams.

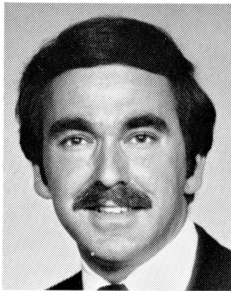
At Missouri Western, where he was also assistant athletic director, his teams were 210-160 from 1969-82. He won "Coach-of-the-Year" honors three times in NAIA District 16, and twice took teams to Kansas City for the NAIA Tournament.

Besides his degree from Mizzou, Filbert holds a master's degree from Northwest Missouri State. Filbert is married (wife—Glenda Jo) and the father of six children.

John Rawlings **Assistant Director**

Over 75 full-time and part-time employees report to Rawlings, who oversees the department's personnel matters, facility operations, the equipment room, athletic dining hall, computer operations, concessions and payroll.

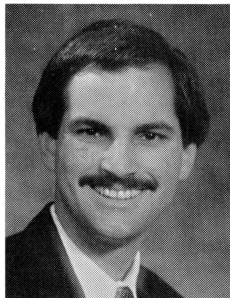


Rawlings has been with the University 15 years in various fiscal capacities.

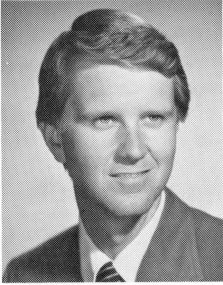

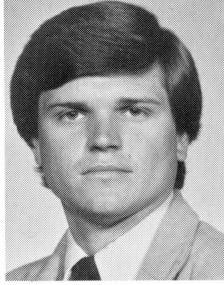
He joined the Mizzou program in 1981, after earlier stints at Georgetown and Rice Universities.

John Clay, all six-foot-five, 285 pounds of him, has often been referred to as an off-the-field "gentle giant" by some sideline observers. But between the sidelines and on the field, watch out. That's when John Clay, the gentle giant, becomes "Big John Clay," the University of Missouri's not-so-gentle Outland and Lombardi Awards candidate.

"I guess people just expect me to be something I'm not—a big, rowdy guy who bullies people around. But I just like to relax and take it easy," says the Tigers' offensive right tackle.

"But when it's time to play football, it's different. Of course you can't be gentle playing football—it's an aggressive sport, and I try to play the sport like it's supposed to be played, even though that's not my personality."

Indeed, on the field, Clay plays football the way it was meant to be. Many feel he's the most dominant blocker ever at Missouri, where standout tackles have been commonplace.

"I think he's got the God-given talent that it takes," Missouri Coach Woody Widenhofer says. "He's got size and strength. His on-the-field work habits are very good. He has, I believe, as good a lateral movement for a big man as anybody I've ever seen."

"He's an outstanding athlete and he's extremely coachable," says Missouri Assistant Head Coach Bill Meyers, who coaches the Tigers' offensive line. "When you show him or teach him something, he not only can digest it mentally, but physically, almost immediately, he can begin to perform exactly what it is you are attempting to teach him."

When the Tigers need short yardage, they run behind Clay, who played a major role in Darrell Wallace's 1,100-yard rushing season in 1985. "You like to know, when the offense needs a yard, who you can line up behind and go over," Widenhofer says.

Twice an all-Big Eight selection, Clay was

also second-team all-America last year. This season, Clay will again contend for national honors and other accolades.

"I believe he is a definite Outland Trophy candidate, and if he plays up to his potential, I don't think there is another lineman in the country that can compare with him," Meyers says. "If he plays as we foresee he will, he should win the Outland Trophy and the Lombardi Trophy in the same year."

Clay, meanwhile, is able to keep all the hoopla regarding his superior play in perspective.

"I'd really rather see us win nine or ten ball games instead of the (individual) post-season honors," he says.

"I guess that's part of it—to promote the product, your player at the university. But I feel if you win ball games, good things will happen. The better record we have, the easier the honors will come."

From Northwest High School in St. Louis, Clay has an avid interest in music and has played the saxophone for a number of years. In fact, when Clay first came to Missouri, he considered majoring in music education, but had to forego that because of the time demands involved.

"I like to listen to a lot of jazz," he says. "When I came here, I was here to play football, but I also loved music, so I decided I had to make a choice. It wasn't a real hard choice—I really wanted to play football."

Since changing his major to commercial recreation, Clay has dreamed of owning and operating a family fitness center. But he has something else to take care of first—one more season of collegiate football, and then a professional playing career.

Both Widenhofer and Meyers, both former pro football coaches, agree that Clay should be a sure-bet, first-round NFL draft choice next year.

"I have never seen a more dominant lineman at the point of attack on the run

and pass," Meyers, who coached the Pittsburgh Steelers' offensive line in 1984, says. "I think the man is gifted, and I think he will continue to improve and work on the little things that will get him everything he wishes to achieve."

Perhaps more amazing than all else, however, is Clay's size. It may be hard to believe, but it is true that Clay's father John stands at five-foot-six, and his mother Barbara Jean only an inch taller than that.

"I think when he was born, the good Lord saw fit to give him the size and strength, and a chance to make it as an offensive tackle," Widenhofer says. "He's got the ideal physique for an offensive tackle. With all the other things that he

has, he has the potential to play for a lot of years. I would be very surprised if he is not drafted as one of the top 10 or 15 players in the country."

Clay has been able to keep thoughts of playing professionally in perspective, as well.

"Probably the biggest thing that keeps me from looking ahead is I know that it can end in one day. Any play, my career could end with an injury," he says. "So I'm not looking past anything—I'm taking things one day at a time. When the time comes, it will be all the more exciting."

"I just thank the Lord and keep going on, one day at a time. That's the biggest thing. Don't look ahead because the next day is never promised."

'Big John' Says . . .

(On attention from honors) "It adds pressure on me to work a little bit harder to live up to the pre-season expectations. It would probably be easier if I was just another one of the guys. I feel pressure from all the hype, especially in the pre-season, but it's nice to have. I'm blessed to get the opportunity for these honors, but I'd rather see us win, then enjoy them after the season."

(On his technique) "I'm good, but I can get a lot better. I've been fortunate to have had two real good coaches (Larry Beightol, now offensive line coach of

the Atlanta Falcons, and Bill Meyers). They're both great teachers, and they push you to be the best you can be. I'm at the point where I'm trying to improve some of my weak points and perfect the things I do well. There are some little things I can do better . . . something as small as locking out with my left hand on pass blocking or finishing a block. As a football player, I was blessed with the athletic ability to play the position. One of my real strengths is movement. I get pretty decent movement coming off the ball."

(On college football in general) "Football prepares you for a lot of things in life . . . it helps you to overcome adversity. You've got to be mentally sound to play football, because it's not easy to go out there every day and bang heads; to go to school. You know, you've got to get up at maybe 7:00 a.m., for meetings, and it helps you with your time management, say for a job . . . you won't be sleeping late. Football prepares you for just a lot of everyday things in life."

(On his goals) "I always wanted to play football. When I was small, I'd watch football on TV, and when I got to high school, I started playing. It wasn't something that I just walked in and, bam, I was able to do. I had to work at it. I worked real hard my freshman year in high school, got a lot better my sophomore year, kept getting better and eventually won a scholarship to Mis-

souri. Then, I got here and was red-shirted. That was a learning experience . . . it taught me that everything in life won't always go the way you think it will. I thought I was going to come up and play right away. When I got red-shirted, that put a halt to some of my plans. I had to adjust. Then Coach Beightol came in . . . he helped me . . . he pushed me. Then Coach Meyers . . . he's great. Not many guys get to play for such good coaches."

(On pro football) "I always had it in the back of my mind that I wanted to play football professionally some day. When I was a little kid, I dreamed about the NFL, but I couldn't look past high school. I took it one step at a time. Do good in high school, do good in college . . ."

(On his musical interests) "I still pull it (the saxophone, which he started playing in high school) out every once in a while, but I don't have as much time for it as I used to . . . Over the summer I play it more. (says his favorite musicians, all jazz recording stars, are David Sanborn, Earl Klugh and Grover Washington).

(On technique changes under Bill Meyers) "The biggest change when Coach Meyers first came on was he emphasized lockout of the arms and getting the opponent extended away from the body, and driving that way. We didn't really have a big whip of the arms like we did under Coach Beightol. But this spring, we went to whipping the arms a bit more, and now, whipping the arms with the lockout is great. I like it a lot. I'm going to get that perfected. It's a great advantage. If you can whip the arms and lockout too, you get a lot of movement on the line of scrimmage."

(What's most important in blocking?) "I'd say there's a 60/40 split. Technique is 60 percent of it. Brutally just dominating the guy with strength, I'd say that's 40. But you've got to use the proper technique even for that (using strength) to happen."

(On his running mate, RG Phil Pettey) "We work real well together; better this year because we know the offense a bit better. Phil is a real mature guy. He knows his position well. He's a veteran. It helps that we're both seniors. I look

for big things for the whole offensive line, we're all experienced."

(On his size . . . Note—his father is 5'6", his mother 5'7") "As I got older I got larger, and kept growing. A big growth was my sophomore year (in HS). I grew like three or four inches, and gained 25-30 pounds.

"I'm bound to gain weight when I go home, because the meals are always there (and his father is a chef). Good cookin. Wake up—nice breakfast—biscuits and sausage, ham and bacon, eggs, rice—sunnyside over—orange juice, milk . . . everything is there. Nice dinners, too. It's just great. But, I've got to try to put a limit on it."

(What other position would he like to play?) "When I was coming up, I always wanted to be a middle linebacker or a tight end. But, I've always been on the line. I started off as a center in high school, but I didn't like having to shift the ball, then try to block the guy with him having that advantage. But, I really respect the center because you've got to snap the ball and block at the same time with a noseguard wailing on your head."

(On Coach Woody Widenhofer) "He doesn't seem like he's on that upper plateau, saying 'I'm the head coach and you're the ball player.' He'll come up to you, laughing, show you a technique or something. He treats you like a man, and that goes a long way . . . when you're treated like a man instead of just a football player."

Coach Widenhofer Says . . .

(His general impressions) "I think John's picked up all of our techniques very well. I think, also, he's a fine leader for us. He's a very conscientious person. Our players look up to him. I think you'll see him even emerge as more of a leader this year than ever before. He seems to be a very quiet individual and somewhat of a private person, but he leads by example."

Game 1—September 14, 1985
NORTHWESTERN 27, MISSOURI 23
 Faurot Field, Columbia, Mo.

It wasn't the opener that everyone expected, as Woody Widenhofer's debut as Tiger head coach went awry, with the Northwestern Wildcats upsetting Mizzou, 27-23.

The game, the first played on Faurot Field's new Omniturf surface, had its share of peaks and valleys. NU jumped to a quick 17-0 lead, with two TD runs by Stanley Davenport.

Late in the first half, a 21-yard pass from Marlon Adler to Warren Seitz took the Tigers to the NU 5, and Adler rolled right to score with no time left on the clock.

The momentum carried into the second half, as the Tigers needed only eight minutes to knot the score at 17. Adler completed 23-of-33 passes for 318 yards—the third-highest total in Mizzou history—led the Tigers on two consecutive scoring drives, the first ending on a 35-yard Tom Whelihan field goal, and the second producing an 11-yard run by Manny Henry.

Northwestern took the lead for good with 13:38 remaining, on a John Duvic FG. The Wildcats scored late when Mike Greenfield hit Curtis Duncan from the four.

Adler connected with Ed Esson for a two-yard TD pass with two seconds remaining.

When Craig Lammers raced into the end zone with a 33-yard scoring pass from Warren Seitz with 0:42 remaining in the first quarter, a 40-year scoring drought against the Texas Longhorns had ended. Although the play tied the score at 7-7, Texas survived several Mizzou threats for a 21-17 victory.

At the three-minute mark of the first quarter, a Marlon Adler pass went through Adrian McBride's hands and was picked off by cornerback Stephen Braggs. Three plays later, Charles Hunter ran 26 yards for a TD. Hunter went on to rush for 112 yards, 95 in the first half.

More adversity was to come for the Adler-McBride duo. Adler was forced to leave the game with a sprained back. Then, McBride was lost for the season with a fractured collarbone.

But their replacements—Seitz and Lammers—finally got the Tigers on the scoreboard. For Lammers, a walk-on freshman, it was his first collegiate pass reception—on his first play.

A 36-yard run by Bret Stafford put Texas up 14-7 at halftime, and Texas stretched its lead to 21-7 on an eight-yard run by Anthony Byerly.

But the Tigers fought back. After recovering a fumbled punt, Seitz scored from 16 yards out, bringing the Tigers to within 21-14.

The only other scoring came on Tom Whelihan's 53-yard field goal, tying Greg Hill for the longest in school history.

Game 3—September 28, 1985
INDIANA 36, MISSOURI 17

It was the "Steve Bradley to Kenny Allen Show" for Indiana, as the Hoosiers defeated the Tigers before 46,763 at Faurot Field.

The loss—the fifth consecutive against a Big Ten opponent—dropped Missouri to 0-3, its worst start since 1973.

On the Tigers' first possession of the game, they moved 70 yards in 14 plays of ball-control offense. When Tom Whelihan ended the drive with a 33-yard field goal, the Tigers led for the first time in 1985.

Behind the running of Darrell Wallace, Miz-zou took a 10-point lead midway through the second stanza. In a drive that saw Joe Close catch a 2-yard touchdown pass from Marlon Adler, Wallace ran four times for 47 yards, including bursts of 18 and 19 yards. Wallace went on to rush for a career-high 117 yards.

Then the Bradley-Allen fireworks began. with 3:05 before halftime, Allen faked a Tiger defender out of position, caught Bradley's pass in full stride and ran 68 yards untouched into the endzone.

On the first play of the second half, line-backer Steve May recovered an Adler fumble. Six plays later, on fourth-and-two from the Tiger five-yard line, Bradley rolled into the endzone to give Indiana its first lead of the day.

Fifteen unanswered points for the Hoosiers, including two more Bradley touchdown strikes, sealed Mizzou's fate. Bradley threw for 265 yards, with 183 to Allen (on 10 receptions).

When Eric Drain leaped into the endzone with 4:23 remaining in the game, it appeared that Missouri would avert its worst start in 30 years. But the California Golden Bears marched 71 yards in 9 plays, and scored the winning TD with just 2:22 left. When the gun sounded, the Tigers had dropped their seventh in a row, 39-32.

Missouri's offense had its best showing of the season, with most of the yards coming out of the backfield. Employing the option, the big man for the Tigers was little Darrell Wallace, who scampered for 196 yards on 26 carries—the second-highest rushing day ever for a Tiger. Marlon Adler added 116 yards rushing.

The Bears countered with Marc Hicks. A freshman, Hicks picked up 139 yards on the ground—including the game-winning TD—and caught the biggest pass of the game.

With Mizzou up, 21-13, Cal made a last-ditch effort to score with eight seconds before the half. Kevin Brown looked left, then threw a screen pass right to Hicks who took it 33 yards for a TD.

Tom Whelihan kicked four field goals, tying a MU record, while Adler moved into the Big Eight's No. 4 spot for career total offense.

Colorado took out years of frustration on the Missouri Tigers, handing Mizzou its worst defeat in the 50-game series between the two Big Eight schools, 38-7.

Colorado's wishbone attack rolled up 505 total yards, 390 coming on the ground, while the Tigers managed just 289 yards of offense.

The Buffaloes struck quickly and often. On their second play from scrimmage, quarterback Mark Hatcher connected with a wide open Sam Smith for a 71-yard gain, putting the ball on the Missouri three. On the next play, Hatcher scored the first of his three TDs.

On Colorado's next possession, Tiger linebacker Eric Troy recovered a fumble at the Colorado 14, and Mizzou moved the ball to the four. But the drive went backwards to the 29-yard line, where Tom Whelihan missed a 46-yard FG.

Early in the second quarter, the Buffaloes were back on the stampede. Hatcher capped an 80-yard drive by hitting Mike Marquez with a four-yard TD pass.

The Tigers averted a shutout midway through the third quarter, when Eric Drain went up the middle for two yards. But Darrell Wallace, who ran for 95 yards, sprained his ankle following a 51-yard run, and missed the remainder of the game.

The Missouri Tigers played their best game of the year against 7th-rated Nebraska, but costly fumbles, penalties and interceptions prevented them from winning their first game of the season. The 28-20 loss extended Mizzou's losing streak to 10 games, a new low in Missouri history.

The big surprise was the excellence of the Tiger defense, which held Nebraska to just one touchdown and 16 first downs. But, Nebraska was able to drive into Tiger territory for seven Dale Klein field goals, an NCAA record, from 32, 22, 43, 44, 29, 43 and 43 yards.

Top defenders on the day for Missouri included a remarkable performance from Dick Chapura, who recorded 21 tackles; Terry Walker, who in his first collegiate start tackled 13 Cornhuskers; and Erik McMillan, who had 10 tackles, two interceptions and a pair of pass deflections.

Missouri took an early lead. After the first of Klein's field goals, the Tigers scored on a 33-yard out-and-up from Warren Seitz to Victor Moore—Moore's first Tiger TD.

But Klein went back to work. He kicked four more three-pointers in the first half—also an NCAA record—giving the Huskers an eight-point advantage at the half.

But on their first possession of the second half, the Tigers narrowed the difference to two points. Mizzou drove 73 yards in 10 plays, culminating in a 13-yard TD run by Seitz.

One nationally syndicated columnist called the affair the "Crummy Game of the Week," and as far as Tiger fans were concerned, he was right. Two teams came into Faurot Field with 0-6 records; on this day, destiny sided with Kansas State.

The Tigers seemingly had their first victory of the season but the ball bounced the other way and Kansas State took a 20-17 victory.

The game had its moments. Running back Darrell Wallace set a school record with 42 carries, gaining 224 net yards—the second-highest total in Missouri annals.

The big play came with just over a minute left in the game. On fourth and 16, John Welch and the Wildcats got lucky. He threw the ball toward Gerald Alphin, and defender Erik McMillan tipped the ball. However, the tip went right into Alphin's hands, and the 49-yard play gave the Wildcats a first down at the Missouri 10. Welch hit Todd Elder on the next play for the score and Kansas State had the victory.

The third-quarter foretold the outcome. On its second possession of the half, Missouri moved 38 yards on five plays, but at K-State's one-yard line, Wallace fumbled the ball in a pile up and Kansas State recovered.

The Tigers' Tony Facinelli then picked off Welch's pass and returned it to the Kansas State 12. But lightning struck twice, with Seitz fumbling the ball away as he tried to take it over from the one.

Finally! After a year of frustration, the Missouri Tigers put together a solid effort and took advantage of breaks handed them to win a football game. Missouri stopped a 10-game losing streak with a 28-27 victory over Iowa State, the Tigers' first victory under Coach Woody Widenhofer.

Just when it looked like the Tigers were going to suffer another close loss, the Missouri offense got in gear and drove 69 yards in eight plays, including a 37-yard pass from Warren Seitz to Herbert "Junebug" Johnson. On third-and-goal from the one, Darrell Wallace went over and pulled Missouri within one point.

Coach Widenhofer and the Tigers never considered a tie. They went for two and Seitz found an open Johnson in the endzone and Missouri went ahead 28-27 with 1:11 left.

Iowa State moved 30 yards in eight plays, but a 57-yard field goal attempt by ISU kicker Rick Frank fell short as time ran out.

Certainly, Seitz, Wallace and Johnson were heroes. But this game may be best remembered for the play of Michael Scott, who had his best game of the year at defensive tackle. He also drew accolades for his play at fullback—the 6-5, 270-pounder blocked brilliantly for Wallace, who picked up 89 yards.

A determined Missouri defense shut down Iowa State's passing in the second half. Alex Espinoza threw for 199 first-half yards; but was held to just 51 after intermission.

The Oklahoma defense, rated No. 1 in the country against the rush, played well. The Sooner offensive unit was awesome. But freshman quarterback Jamelle Holieway stole the show as the Sooners crushed Missouri, 51-6.

It marked the first time since 1979 that OU had won on Faurot Field. It was the first time since 1974 that Missouri had allowed 50 or more points in a game and the worst margin of defeat for the Tigers since 1972.

Holieway proved his versatility by gaining 168 yards on the ground and passing 8 of 17 for another 168. His 324 yards of total offense broke a 14-year-old Oklahoma record.

Then there was the Oklahoma defense. While the Sooners rolled up 509 total yards, Missouri had just 219. The Sooner "D" was led by linebacker Brian Bosworth, who had 14 tackles—three for losses—and two sacks.

The Sooners sacked quarterback Warren Seitz four times and had five more tackles for losses.

One bright spot for the Tigers was the play of freshman linebacker Terry Walker. He had 21 tackles, two for lost yardage, and he also recovered a Sooner fumble.

It seems no matter how much the Tigers improved—a loss resulted. Who would have thought Mizzou could hold the ninth-rated team in the country scoreless and to 110 yards in the second half . . . that QB Marlon Adler would have a career-high 304 yards of total offense, and in the process, pass the 5,000-yard mark in career passing yards . . . that the Tigers would dominate OSU everywhere but on the scoreboard—432 yards to 367.

The Tigers played solid football—except for the final seven minutes of the second quarter. That stretch haunted the Tigers as the Cowboys won, 21-19, leaving MU with an 0-7 home slate—its first winless home season in 30 years.

Mizzou took a 10-0 lead after a Tom Whelihan field goal and an 80-yard Adler to "June-bug" Johnson bomb.

But the Tigers' fortunes took a quick turn for the worse. With 6:59 left in the half, OSU drove 80 yards to score on a Ronnie Williams-to-Bobby Riley pass of 22 yards.

On the Tigers' next possession, Johnson fumbled a pass deep in Tiger territory. Two plays later, Thurman Thomas took it in from 26 yards.

After the kickoff, Adler's pass was intercepted by defensive end Harry Roberts, who returned it 35 yards for the score. Just like that, Oklahoma State led, 21-10.

Missouri got a 54-yard field goal from Whelihan—the longest in Tiger annals—as the half ended with the Cowboys up, 21-13.

Ronnie Cameron, in his second possession at quarterback at Mizzou, took the snap from center and dropped back in the pocket. Cameron rifled a pass into the arms of Herbert "Junebug" Johnson, who waltzed into the end zone with a 12-yard touchdown reception.

The score, with 0:56 remaining, meant little to the outcome of the game. Kansas won the game, 34-20, leaving the Tigers' 1985 mark at 1-10.

But the last minute pass will hopefully bode well for the Tigers' future. In all, Cameron was 5-of-7 for 70 yards in his collegiate QB debut.

Missouri turned the ball over four times to the Jayhawks; Kansas responded by scoring three touchdowns.

Late in the second quarter, Darrell Wallace took a Marlon Adler handoff on a draw play for a gain of six yards. That moved him past Bob Steuber for the second-highest single-season rushing total in Mizzou history.

On the very next play, Adler hit Johnson for a 10-yard completion, putting Junebug into third place in Tiger annals in single-season reception yards.

Johnson ended the day with nine catches—tying a Tiger game record—for 146 yards and two touchdowns. His 49 catches was also a season mark.

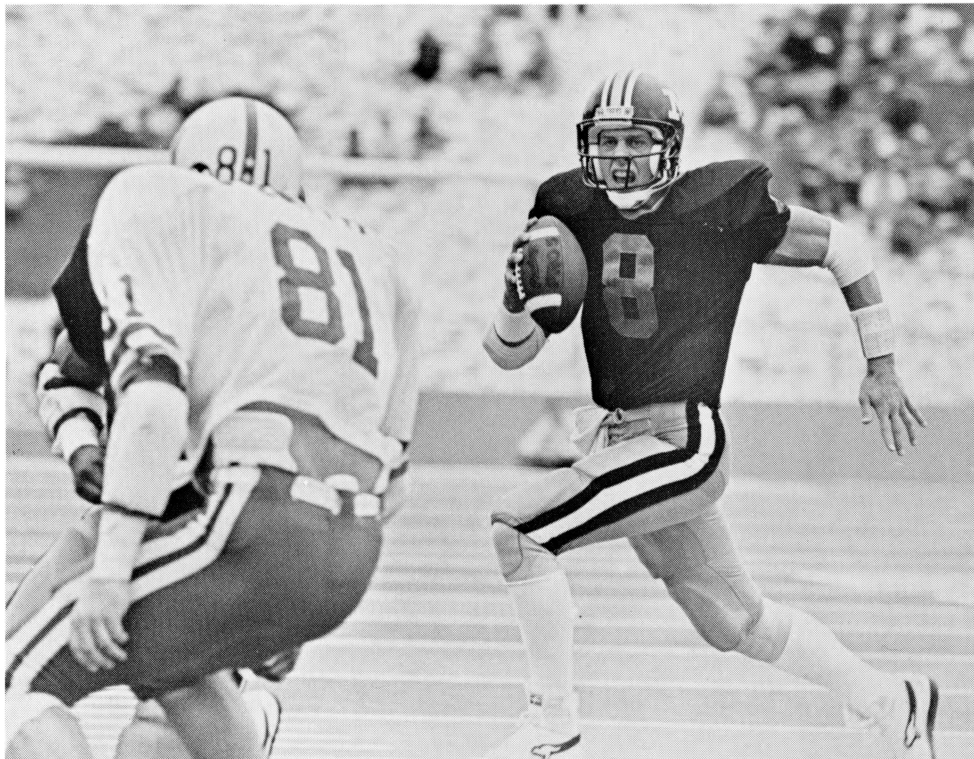

Missouri's distinctive designation—the "Show-Me-State"—originated some 87 years ago.

At a naval banquet in Philadelphia in 1899, Congressman Willard Duncan Vandiver reputedly turned the phrase that has come to be associated with Missouri. Mr. Vandiver, a Columbia, Mo., native and then a member of the House Committee on Naval Affairs, said in a speech:

"I come from a state that raises corn and cotton and cockle-burrs and Democrats, and frothy eloquence neither convinces nor satisfies me. I am from Missouri. You have got to show me."

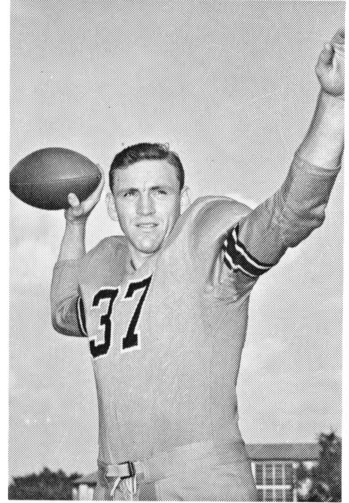
MIZZOU'S RETIRED NUMBERS

37 **BOB STEUBER** . . . More than 40 years after hanging up his competitive cleats at Missouri, Bob Steuber still holds six of the school's scoring records, two rushing marks and ranks as the Tigers' third-best ground-gainer of all time.

Steuber was the big, fast back—a 210-pounder who could turn the 100 in 10-flat—who made Coach Don Faurot's new-fangled Split-T formation such a rousing success in the 1941 and '42 seasons. Switched from end to halfback as a junior he finished as the nation's number-three rusher in 1941, and the rushing runnerup in 1942. His career total was 2,030 yards, surpassed only by recent Tiger runners Joe Moore and James Wilder.

He still holds Missouri records for: most career points (222), most points in a season (121), most career touchdowns (32), most TDs in a season (18), most career rushing touchdowns (26), most TDs rushing in a season (16), highest average per carry in a game (15.8) and highest average per carry in a season (7.6).

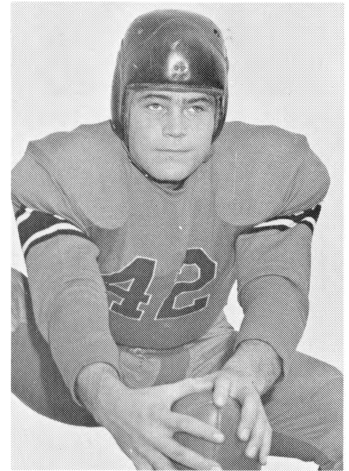
An all-American in 1942, Steuber was drafted by the Chicago Bears in 1943, but entered the service, and later played professionally with the Cleveland Browns, Los Angeles Dons and Buffalo Bills.



42 **DAROLD JENKINS** . . . A center-linebacker for Coach Don Faurot's 1940 and '41 Tiger teams, Darold Jenkins was inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1976. He captained the '41 Tiger club that was considered to be the best of Faurot's 19 Missouri teams, and went to the Sugar Bowl.

A native of Higginsville, Mo., Jenkins was named to 17 all-America teams in 1941. He later was a bomber pilot in World War II, and on his 27th mission was shot down. He spent 17 months in a German POW camp.

He attended the Missouri Law School after his discharge from the service and is now a trial counsel for the Missouri State Highway Commission.



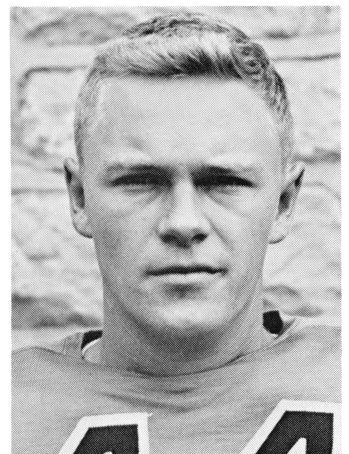
44 **PAUL CHRISTMAN** . . . Under coach Don Faurot, "Pitchin'" Paul Christman set virtually all of the passing records at Mizzou. Most stood intact until the exploits of Terry McMillan, Steve Pisarkiewicz and Phil Bradley.

Christman won all-America honors in 1939 and '40 and was Mizzou's first player to be inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame.

Following his three-year career, during which he led the Tigers to their first conference championship and bowl appearance under Faurot, Christman served in the U.S. Navy from 1941-45.

He then played four years of professional football with the Chicago Cardinals (46-49) and finished his career with the Green Bay Packers in 1950. He was later an accomplished network television analyst and commentator, teaming with Curt Gowdy on the early AFL telecasts.

A native of St. Louis, Christman died suddenly at the age of 51, in 1970.

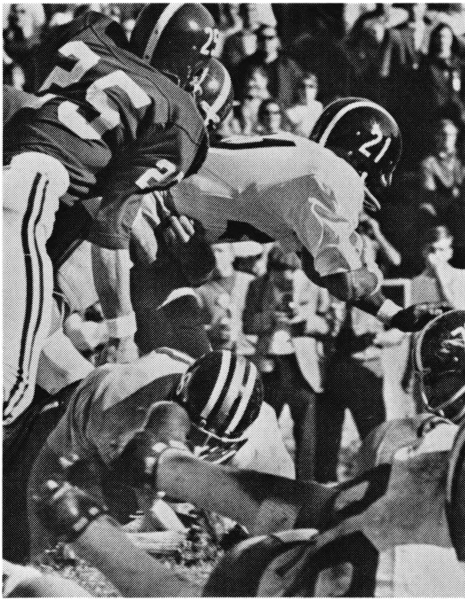

BIG EIGHT CONFERENCE

The Big Eight Conference is America's oldest such organization composed entirely of state institutions. The league was founded on June 12, 1907, when Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Iowa and Washington University of St. Louis, met to form what was then known as the Missouri Valley Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

That title was dropped in favor of the current Big Eight moniker in 1964, although along the way the conference was known as the Big Six and Big Seven.

This fall, the conference will decide a football champion for the 80th time. Administrative offices for the league are located in the River Hills/Mark I Building in Kansas City, Mo.

Commissioner Carl James, former Duke and Maryland athletic director, heads a staff of 12 persons who give leadership and direction to a full, well-rounded and respected intercollegiate program.

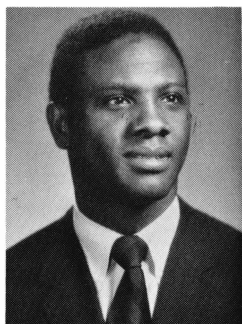

Heading the service bureau is Tim Allen, also beginning his fourth year. He's assisted by Tracie Dittimore, now in her seventh year with the league.

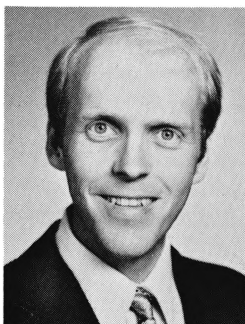
Julie Ferguson, a former Mizzou basketball player, is in her fifth year as an administrative assistant with responsibility for championship events.



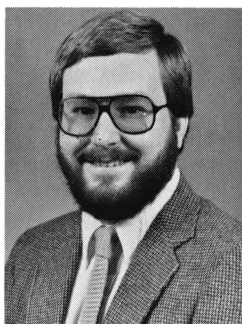

FAUROT FIELD

A new chapter in Faurot Field's storied history began in the 1985 season with the installation of a new synthetic surface—Omniturf, a product of Sportec International. The move to artificial turf ended Missouri's reign as the last Big Eight Conference school to feature a natural grass field.

The move to Omniturf was caused in large part by the deterioration of Mizzou's grass surface since construction of the south stands in 1978 limited the stadium's air flow and fostered the growth of a root-destructive fungus.

Omniturf consists of one-inch polypropylene fibers, a sand mixture filled to within ¼-inch of the fiber top, and a ¾-inch thick porous rubber pad. An asphalt sub-base was also installed at Mizzou to enhance greater shock absorption and drainage.

Ironically, Faurot Field (nee Memorial Stadium) has had an artificial surface once before—for its very first game in 1926. Construction of the sunken stadium, seating 25,000 spectators, went down to the wire in the fall of '26—with the heaviest September rainfall in 35 years contributing to the delay.

Time ran out before the playing surface could be sodded for the Oct. 2, opener with Tulane. Constant rains washed out a bridge east of Columbia, and though repaired in time, slightly more than 10,000 drenched fans showed up for opening ceremonies.

Without sod, sawdust and tanbark were spread on the field as an alternative, and the Tigers and the Green Wave played to a "scoreless-mudpie tie," Bob Broeg wrote in his book, **Ol' Mizzou: A Story of Missouri Football**.

The stadium, built at a cost of \$350,000, was the product of Coach Gwinn Henry's championship seasons of 1924-25, and the vision of athletic director Chester L. Brewer. It was carved out of "a sizeable natural valley that lay between twin bluffs south of the University," chronicled Broeg, longtime sports editor of the **St. Louis**

Post-Dispatch, and unofficial historian of Missouri football.

The block "M" on the stadium's north slope formed by white-washed boulders, has been the identifying logo for all these 59 years—though often times almost obliterated by thousands of hillside-camping fans at sellout games. Though the seating capacity is listed now at 62,000, crowds in excess of 75,000 have seen the Tigers play in Columbia, against Texas in 1979 and Penn State in 1980.

Coach Don Faurot's powerhouse Split "T" teams in the late '30s and '40s helped pay off the stadium bonds—along with Faurot's brave scheduling of Ohio State for nine straight years at Columbus, and big paydays from games with New York U. and Fordham back east.

Peak attendance in the Tigers' single-tiered football arena was 30,832 who crammed into temporary bleachers and sat on the hillside to watch Faurot's team upset SMU, 20-14, in 1948.

A year later, the stadium underwent its first facelift—with the addition of sections in the center of the west side, boosting the number of rows from 40 to 78. Those piecemeal additions continued sporadically until the summer of 1965—when the final two sections on the southeast corner were completed in the two-tiered horseshoe.

The current press box and VIP lounge was added by private subscription atop the west side in 1968. The south end was enclosed with 10,800 permanent seats in 1978, and in 1984, an expanded, glassed-in VIP Lounge and a renovated press level were completed.

The stadium adopted a new name in 1972—Faurot Field—in honor of the legendary Mizzou football coach and athletic director whose teams and administrative leadership helped mightily to pay off the mortgage. As a matter of fact, Faurot—a graduate student in 1926—helped lay the stadium's sod, now removed in favor of an artificial surface that won't bring back any memories of that soggy sawdust and tanbark mixture used for the stadium's first game.



Missouri's last crowd of over 70,000 fans was against Notre Dame in 1984, when 70,915 saw the Irish hold off a late Tiger rally to win, 16-14.

THE UNIVERSITY

The University of Missouri was established at Columbia, in 1839, as the sole public university in Missouri. The University of Missouri-Columbia (UMC) is the oldest state university west of the Mississippi River and the largest of the four campuses in the University of Missouri system. The University of Missouri's Columbia campus has undertaken its historic mission through a commitment to excellence in instruction, and scholarship and service—both on its residential campus and throughout the state.

UMC has a commitment to diversity and comprehensive education at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. Within this comprehensiveness in its educational program, Mizzou remains as the premier public institution for graduate and professional training in selected areas. Within the UM system, the Columbia campus is the only one to offer formal programs in agriculture, forestry, fisheries and wildlife, home economics, journalism, veterinary medicine and library and informational science.

Formal areas of study also are conducted in arts and sciences, business and public administration, accountancy, education, engineering, health related professions (including nursing and medicine), law, public and community services and social work.

UMC is one of only five institutions in the United States that has on a single

campus accredited programs in agriculture, business, education, engineering, journalism, law, medicine and veterinary medicine. The School of Journalism is the world's first and best-known, the College of Agriculture is on the forefront in the fight against hunger, and the School of Medicine is the catalyst for Columbia's stature as one of the Midwest's finest healthcare centers.

Mizzou's 1,310-acre campus has 257 buildings. The research reactor is the most powerful on any campus in the United States. Francis Quadrangle, the setting for the original campus buildings, is on the National Register of Historic Places. Sanborn Field is the third oldest research plot in the world—and it's where the wonder drug, aureomycin was discovered.

But, bricks and mortar aside, UMC is personified by its quality student body. It's among the nation's top-20 public institutions in the number of National Merit/Achievement Scholars enrolled. More than 75 percent of UMC's students are undergraduates. Some 33 percent are freshmen, 23 percent are sophomores, 21 percent are juniors, and 23 percent are seniors. More than 85 percent of the total undergraduate population are Missouri residents, but Mizzou enrolls students from every state in the Union, and 100 other countries.

The highest point in Missouri, at 1,772 feet, is Taum Sauk Mountain in the Ozarks of south-central Missouri. Nearby is the state's highest waterfall, Mina Sauk, cascading 162 feet down a mountainside to the valley below.

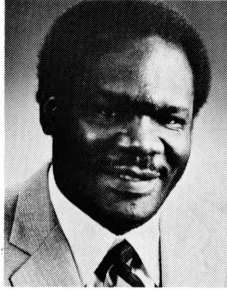

Through its satellite division, Learfield distributes University of Illinois football and basketball, the Kansas City Chiefs, and the St. Louis Cardinals baseball and football. It also continues to serve the state with its news network, the MissouriNet, and farmers with America's largest agricultural network, the Brownfield Network.

TIGER TRADITIONS

WHY TIGERS?

The nickname "Tigers," given to Mizzou's athletic teams, traces its origin to the Civil War.

At that time, plundering guerilla bands habitually raided small towns, and Columbia people constantly feared an attack. Such organizations as temporary "home guards" and vigilante companies banded together to fight off any possible forays.

The town's preparedness discouraged any guerilla activity and the protecting organization began to disband in 1854.

However, it was rumored that a guerilla band, led by the notorious Bill Anderson, intended to sack the town. Quickly organized was an armed guard of Columbia citizens, who built a blockhouse and fortified the old courthouse in the center of town. This company was called "The Missouri Tigers."

The marauders never came. The reputation of the intrepid "Tigers" presumably traveled abroad, and Anderson's gang detoured around Columbia.

Soon after Missouri's first football team was organized in 1890, the athletic committee adopted the nickname "Tigers" in official recognition of those Civil War defenders.

TIGER TROPHY GAMES

Indian War Drum . . . Issued to the winner of the Missouri-Kansas football game . . . Originated in 1935. Trophy was conceived as Indian in nature by a couple of Mizzou alumni, since Osage Indians roamed the plains of Kansas and Missouri long before the state universities were founded . . . Original intent was to stimulate new interest in longtime series that had dwindled during the Depression of the '30s and MU's alltime low in football victories . . . Supposedly authentic Indian drum was purchased in a Kansas City pawn shop . . . Autographed originally on both drum heads by KU and MU alumni . . . Tradition was temporarily forgotten for a few years but resumed on an annual basis in 1947 . . . The first game ended in a scoreless tie.

Missouri-Nebraska Bell . . . Issued to the winner of the Missouri-Nebraska football game . . . Originated in 1927. Laid aside in World War II years, and later resurrected in 1947 . . . Bell was originally stolen from a Negro church in Seward, Neb., by two Nebraska fraternities (Phi Delta Theta and Delta Tau Delta) who shared the same house . . . When each fraternity moved to separate living quarters, they battled for possession of the bell each year in a specified contest—athletic or academic . . . When in 1927, Missouri proposed that a suitable trophy be established for the MU-Nebraska football rivalry, the bell was suggested and adopted—engraved on one side with an "M" and on the other with an "N" . . . At Mizzou, the bell is cared for by the QEBH Society, while the Nebraska caretaker is the Innocents Society of Nebraska . . . Missouri won the first game, 7-6.

Tiger-Sooner Peace Pipe . . . Ceremony of smoking the old pipe was inaugurated in 1929 by Chester M. Brewer, Mizzou's director of athletics, and by members of the Mystical Seven, a University of Missouri honorary group . . . The peace pipe was donated by a Mr. R.L. Hill, an "M" man and former president of the Missouri student body . . . Ceremony takes place during halves, with Mystical Seven representing Missouri, and a similar organization representing Oklahoma . . . Missouri won the first game, 13-0.

Telephone Trophy . . . Issued to the winner of the Missouri-Iowa State football game . . . Originated in 1959. The strangest of circumstances got this rivalry underway . . . Prior to the 1959 game in Ames, a Missouri assistant coach put on his headset in the press box and got a big surprise—he could hear the Iowa State coaches chatting, since the wires were crossed and each side could hear the other . . . Northwestern Bell of Ames donated the trophy, made of Alexander Graham Bell's chief invention . . . Missouri won the first game, 14-0.
