## The Graduate School

Special provision has been made for an extensive program of graduate courses. The very large enrollment in the Graduate School during the Summer Session makes possible and necessary the offering of a wide variety of courses to take care of the needs of advanced students. As in the past, the University Summer Session will continue to meet the needs of teachers by offering a complete program of graduate courses in Education.

Work may also be carried leading to the degree in Medicine, and many of the courses in mathematics and science required for degrees in Engineering will be offered.

The advanced professional degrees, Master of Education and Doctor of Education have been received with a great deal of interest by people in Education. These degrees are offered primarily for those who are preparing for teaching and for supervision and administrative work. They are advanced professional degrees and are not research degrees. Further information relative to these new degrees will be gladly given.

### The Summer Session Staff

The members of the summer session faculty include the professors offering instruction in the various Colleges and Schools of the University during the regular fall and winter semesters of the school year. To care for increased demands in certain fields, a number of visiting professors of high rank are brought to the campus. The major and minor advisers in each department are regular resident professors.

### Student Fees

The only fees payable by summer session students who are residents of Missouri are Library, Hospital, and Incidental fees. In all divisions operating during the summer session, except the School of Medicine, the student is required to pay this fee at the rate of \$3.50 per credit hour. Charges are made, however, for a few courses in Applied Music; for certain services, such as making duplicate transcripts; for diplomas and certificates; and for certain privileges, such as the use of the golf course, the tennis courts, and for swimming. Non-resident undergraduate students must pay the regular University non-resident fee of \$25.

No fee will be charged for late registration in the summer session, and there will be no fee for activity tickets.

## Opportunities Offered By the Summer Session

The Summer Session affords you the opportunity during the vacation months to continue your work for any of the degrees which are named in this announcement. The Summer Session allows you to complete the work of one-half of a semester. In four summers you can gain a whole year.

The Summer Session offers you the opportunity to make up for time lost because of illness or for other reasons.

If you are a teacher, the Summer Session offers you the opportunity to work for credits toward a state certificate, to complete requirements for the B.S. in Education or for an advanced degree, or to increase the scope of your training in the field in which you teach.

The wide range of courses offered in practically every division of the University provides an excellent opportunity for the college teacher to extend his training or to study new developments in his field.

If you are, or desire to be, a school administrator, you may take the courses which are necessary to obtain the appropriate Masters degree so that you may be properly certificated by the State Superintendent of Schools.

Even though you may not be interested in a degree, you will find that a summer in the University will be profitable from the standpoint of contacts with leaders in various fields.

All the facilities of the University will be available for a wholesome recreational program. The facilities will include the Women's Gymnasium equipped with a large swimming pool; Rothwell Gymnasium and Brewer Field House; a golf course maintained by the University; and excellent tennis courts.

The University plays are always especially attractive. Special lecturers and entertainers are provided for assembly programs. The Men's and Women's Dinners have been feature events of the Summer Session.
