

## PHILLIP ROLAND KRAUSE

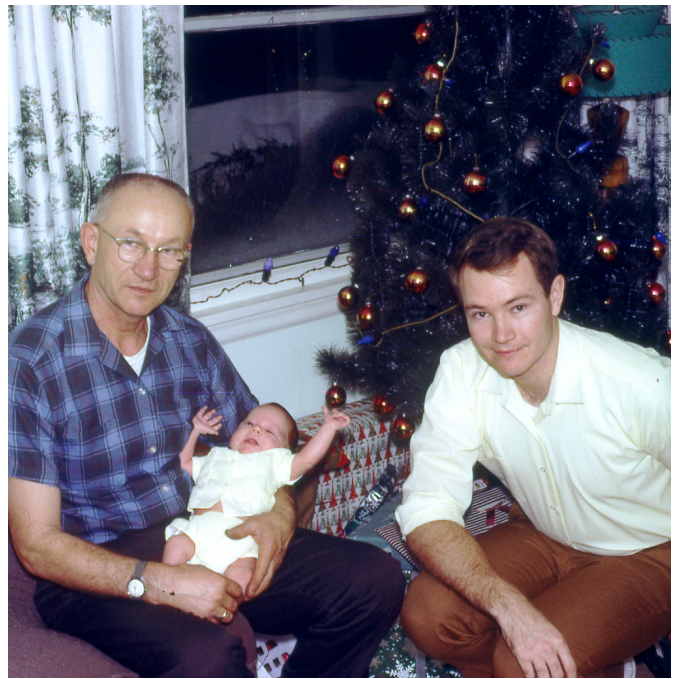
(Written text and photographs provided by Phillip Roland Krause). **Phillip Roland Krause (Phil)** was born on November 20, 1968, in Columbia, Missouri, at Boone County Hospital. He is the son of William John Krause II and Winifred Alice (Clark) Krause. Phillip was educated at Grant Elementary and West Junior High School in Columbia, Missouri. He graduated from Rock Bridge High School in Columbia, Missouri, in 1987. He was elected homecoming king at Rock Bridge High School in 1986, was a four year letterman in soccer, and a member of the National Honor Society. Phillip was confirmed in the Lutheran Faith at St. Andrews Lutheran Church in Columbia, Missouri, on May 4, 1986. During the Spring of 1990 Phillip was selected to participate in the Missouri Legislative Internship Program working with the Honorable Representative Joe McCracken (D) in Jefferson City, Missouri. Phillip graduated from Missouri State University, in Springfield, Missouri, in 1991, with a BS degree in Accounting before traveling to Perth, Australia, to visit his parents. He passed his CPA exams in 1995. Phillip was employed as a Senior Staff Accountant by Diel and Ferguson, P.C. in O'Fallon, Illinois, from 1992 to 1994, and then accepted an appointment with the Missouri State Auditor's Office under Margaret Kelley where he worked as a staff auditor for the State of Missouri in Jefferson City, Missouri, from 1994 to 1995. Phillip joined the CPI Corporation, St. Louis, Missouri, as an internal auditor in 1995 before accepting an appointment as System Administrator at Washington University, St. Louis, Missouri, where he worked from 1996 to 1997. Phillip joined The Miller Group, St. Louis, Missouri, in 1997 and worked for this company until 2004. Phillip worked as a Managing Partner for Strategic eCommerce Solutions, LLC, St. Louis, Missouri, from 2004 to 2005, before joining the Westar Aerospace & Defense Group, St. Charles, Missouri, as a Senior Financial Analyst in 2005. Phillip Roland Krause became Manager of Financial Planning and Analysis for GKN Aerospace in 2007. Following the entrepreneurial spirit of his ancestors Phillip established a company in 2010, THE CAGED GORILLA, LLC found at CAR-SOX.com, that marketed mirror covers printed with the insignia or mascot of their favorite sporting team.

Phillip Roland Krause (Phil) married **Kelley Ann McNamee** on July 4, 1997, at St. Anthony's of Padua Catholic Church in St. Louis, Missouri. They met while attending Missouri State University. She was the daughter of John McNamee and Judy (Leonhardt) McNamee of Eureka, Missouri. Kelley attended public schools in Eureka, Missouri, and graduated from Missouri State University with a BA degree in Education in 1991. Kelley continued her education and received a Master's Degree in Education from Webster University in 1995. Kelley was an elementary school teacher and taught the first, second and third grades at Eureka Elementary School, and the fourth grade at Blevins Elementary School in Eureka, Missouri. In 1997 Kelley was recognized for her teaching ability by being selected as the Eureka Teacher of the Year. Kelley was recognized again for her teaching ability in 2009 being selected as the Blevins Teacher of the Year. Phillip Roland Krause and Kelley Ann (McNamee) Krause had three children: **Taylor Ann Krause** born on June 6, 1998, at St. Marys Hospital in Clayton, Missouri; **Morgan Elizabeth Krause** born April 30, 2001, at St. Marys Hospital in Clayton, Missouri; and **Jake William Krause** born March 20, 2004, at Missouri Baptist Hospital in St. Louis, Missouri.

Phillip enjoyed hunting, a variety of sports, and was active in playing and coaching soccer. In 2007 Phillip began hunting with a bow (archery) to enhance the challenge of the hunt. His first year was very productive as he was able to harvest five white-tailed deer. One of Phillip's lifetime goals was to attend at least one of the world's major sporting events. 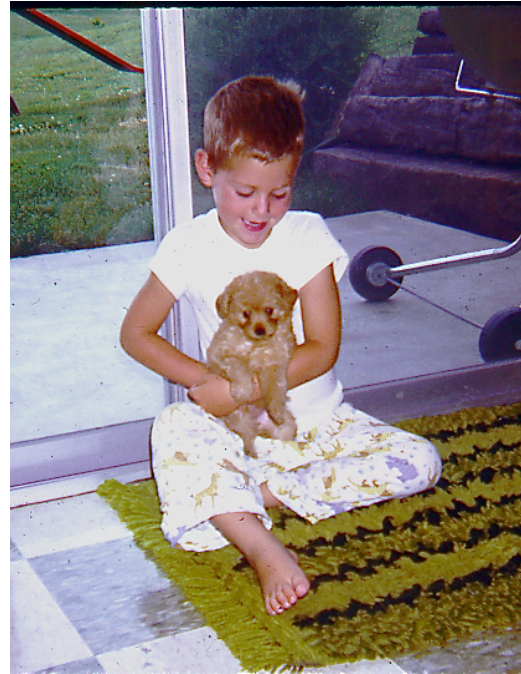

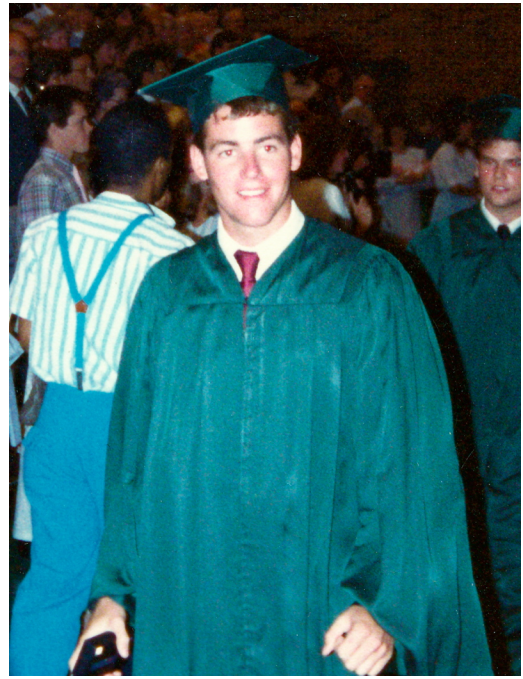

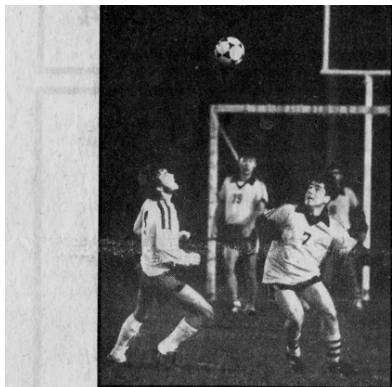

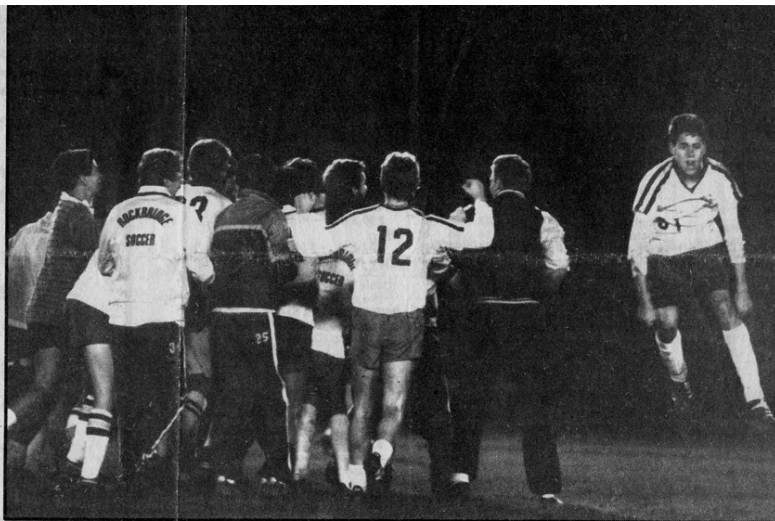

## Rock Bridge's '10-minute drill' sets up a rematch

After his players succeeded in not getting down on themselves or angry at each other — proving that practice makes perfect — Rock Bridge soccer coach Lynn Garst smiled.

"We don't want to have to do this again tomorrow," he said last night after the Bruins defeated Missouri Military Academy 3-2 in a double-overtime district tournament semifinal game at Hickman Field.

Garst continued to rally Rock Bridge, concluding: "And you know we're not gonna be playing Kemper."

The Bruins (10-4-4), in fact, play Hickman — which defeated Kemper Military Academy 4-2 — at 7:30 tonight in the district championship game. You'll recall the Bruins and Kewpies have played 220 undecisive minutes this season.

The players do. "I'm just glad Rock Bridge won," Hickman forward

Tim Pimmel said. "Some of us were possibly looking a little ahead to tomorrow. We dominated the game, but we couldn't score."

A warning to Hickman from MMA coach Bob Fedora: Don't get ahead.

MMA managed a 2-0 halftime lead against the Bruins, only to lose in the second overtime period. "It was a fluke they were up 2-0," goalie-forward Mark Schlimme said.

Forward Billy Cummiskey scored the winning goal with 4:58 left in the second overtime period. He also assisted Tom Rottjakob's goal with 3:10 remaining in regulation that tied the game, 2-2.

The comeback was a culmination of a drill the Bruins have practiced the past two weeks. The "10-minute drill" goes something like this: The Bruins are trailing 2-1 and must score two goals within those 10 minutes.

"The first few times," Garst said, "we got mad at each other and didn't score." Gradually, he said, the players realized "when you get mad at each other,

things tend not to work out."

Schlimme said. "We had a lot of problems when we got behind (earlier this season). When we had adversity, we'd get mad at each other." He remembered the Bruins' 5-0 loss at Sedalia: "We collapsed."

Garst said, "Something you can't do in soccer is point fingers at each other."

Instead, the Bruins pointed at MMA. "I thought we did better getting mad at the other team," Schlimme said. The result: Though trailing, the Bruins were confident.

When Schlimme scored on a penalty kick nine minutes into the second half, Cummiskey said, "I knew we'd do it."

Hickman's goals were scored by Pimmel, Eric Devlin, John Dauzvardis and Carey Theroff. Hickman (12-4-2) had 28 shots on goal to Kemper's four.

Kemper's goals came from Luis Caro and Rene Castro, who later was ejected from the game and promptly restored to the referee with his middle finger.

# Ruehlicke ends soccer suspense

With the beginning of the state soccer playoffs came the final chapter of the city championship. For the third consecutive year, Rock Bridge has won the district title with a victory over Hickman last night at Hickman Field.

As usual, the teams kept things suspenseful. Had this been just another regular season game, it would have been yet another tie. But the state playoffs demand a winner. To that end, up to four 10-minute sudden death overtime periods are prescribed to be followed by penalty kicks.

The Bruins and Kewpies took it into the third overtime tied at 1. Jan Ruehlicke kicked the winner in the game's 102nd minute.

The goal came on a direct free kick from about 30 yards directly in front of the goal. Once Ruehlicke kicked it, there wasn't much anyone could do but watch. The shot went over the wall of Rock Bridge defenders and away from goalkeeper Butch Carson.

"He has a very good touch on the ball and he really made a super shot," Hickman coach Jeff Wallace said. "I mean, that was a fantastic shot. Right over the top, about three inches over the top (of the wall) and about three inches under the bar. That takes good touch."

It was even more beautiful from the Rock Bridge sideline. "The free kicks that we take within shooting range, we have Tommy (Rottjakob), Jan and usually Phil Krause involved," Rock Bridge coach Harry Lewis said. "They take the free kick based on what the defense does. That particular free kick was strictly improvised by Jan.

"It was just an exceptional shot, very well placed."

For the creator of such a shot, it was one of a kind. "It was the most important goal I've ever scored," Ruehlicke said. "Butch stood in the right corner and I only chipped the ball over the wall and into the left

corner. It was in there."  
It was a long time between goals for the Bruins. Jack Hildebrand had opened the scoring six minutes into the game.

Rottjakob put a crossing pass in front of the goal from the right side. Hildebrand took what the defense gave him.

"The defender, instead of heading the ball out, headed it straight up and I just ran under it and kicked it straight in," Hildebrand said.

For a long time, on a field slickened by a game-long drizzle, that goal looked as if it might stand up. Hildebrand thought, just maybe, his one goal had a chance to be enough.

"I thought it did because a year or two ago, we won a game against Hickman like that," Hildebrand said. "I wasn't 100 percent sure, but I was hoping it would."

Standing on one's feet for any length of time was difficult enough for the players to do. Carson and Rock Bridge's Dennis Griffin excelled despite the conditions.

The closest Hickman came to scoring in the first half was a hard shot by Milon George from 30 yards out 30 minutes into the half. It was just to the right of the goal.

Drew Hamilton tied the game when his straight-on roller bounded by Griffin.

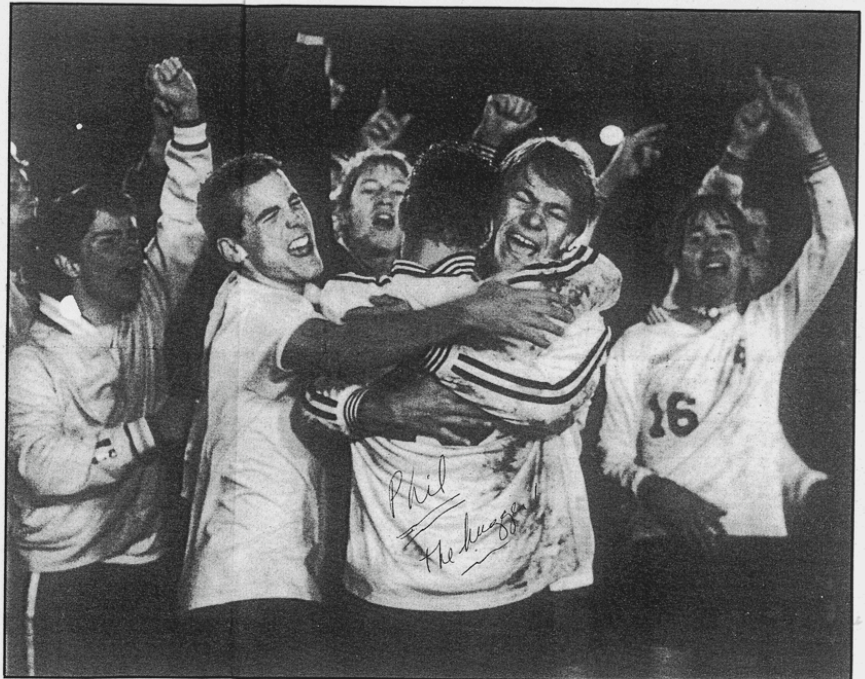
"This type of match is going to be something like that," Wallace said.

"They had a mistake and we had a little mistake and those were the first two goals."

For the final 20 minutes of the second half, the Bruins let the Kewpies take the play to them for the most part, but neither team could score.

Hickman was without freshman starter David Elliott, who was on crutches. "He hurt himself in P.E. class," Wallace said. He turned his ankle.

Then, there were some Kewpies who weren't dressed for success on the wet field. "The guys that didn't have cleats on, I took them out pretty fast because they were slipping and sliding," Wallace said.

ping and sliding." Wallace said. So when Rock Bridge went into its second-half lull, Hickman was unable to capitalize. "We put too much pressure on the defense the first half and then there was a lack of concentration," Ruehlicke said.

"Usually there is a lack of concentration in a game. I think it was our second half. We were the better team in the overtime. We controlled them in the overtime."

"It was a pretty typical soccer game where two teams are pretty even because there are quite a few

momentum changes," Lewis said. Once overtime commenced, Rock Bridge applied the pressure offensively. Phil Cox, Rottjakob, Krause, Hildebrand, Ben Nelms and Hildebrand again all had scoring threats. So did Fete Hille and Andrew York of Hickman.

Back and forth. Until the end. "It's just one of those Hickman-Rock Bridge games," Wallace said. Two weeks ago they played one of those games, and Hickman won 2-0. That was on the Bruins' collective mind.

"Our whole team was really getting up for the game because of our loss earlier in the year," Hildebrand said. "I think that made us really play a lot better."

The overtime gave the Bruins time to work out their frustrations. "In the third overtime, Jan came up a little bit more to offensive half and me and Rottjakob moved a little bit more toward the wings," Hildebrand said.

As much as they like to play Hickman, the Bruins had a definite idea of how far they didn't want to take

this game.

"Our team didn't want to go to penalty kicks, so we were getting up even more and trying to get more aggressive that third overtime because we didn't want to go to penalty kicks," Hildebrand said.

"We've had good luck with it. We don't like to have games settled that way because it doesn't seem like it's fair. It's more of a luck than a skill type of a game."

"I can't take 'em. I think a game should be played out until whoever won it like we did."

A pair of Hickman and Rock Bridge soccer players have been named to the All-District 5 soccer team.
