

FRANZ JON NOBLE

(Written text and photographs provided by Franz Jon Noble). **Franz Jon Noble (Bud)** was born April 6, 1949, in Arlington, Washington, and was the fifth child, third son, of Richard Harold and Lillian Ruth (Krause) Noble. Bud was named after his grandfather, Otto Franz Krause, but because he was born soon after the close of World War II his parents used the American spelling for his name (Francis). Years later, Bud discovered the correct spelling of his grandfather's middle name, and at that time had it legally changed to Franz. Bud graduated from Marysville High School in Marysville, Washington, in 1967. Immediately after graduation Bud enlisted in the United States Marines and served his country for six years with the Marines. He was deployed to Vietnam and fought in the DMZ region of Vietnam as a machine gunner during 1968. In 1969 Bud worked off the USS Iwo Jima as BLT (911) for the Marines. After returning home from Vietnam in 1969, Bud attended Everett Community College following three years of active and three years of reserve duty. He started a business in insulation in 1972. Bud had a truck that was set up to blow insulation into the attic of newly constructed houses. In 1980 he moved to Whidbey Island and opened "Mistic Arts" where he designed and painted custom motorcycles and did skin art. He mostly designed and covered over tattoos that people did not like any longer. In 1983 Bud became a realtor and quickly moved up to associate broker for Caldwell Banker. In 1989, Bud started a Corporation which had several smaller companies within it including; Economy Chimney Sweeps, Certified Pest Control, and Noble and Associates, as consultants to the Lenders and Bankers through home inspection. He sold his company and retired in December of 2006.

Franz Jon Noble (Bud) married **Rosemary Coffey (Rose)** on December 8, 1972. Rosemary Coffey was born on November 15, 1946, in Marysville, Washington, and was the daughter of David William and Winifred (Till) Coffey. The Coffey family originally came to America (Minnesota) from England. Rose's father was born in Astoria, Oregon, on May 9, 1914. The Till family also came from England and settled in up state New York. Rose's grandfather, Bill Till, came out west with Helen Oatman and her mother was born in St. Marys, Idaho. The Oatman family also came from England and lived on Long Island, New York. Olive Oatman was Rose's great Aunt who at age 13 was captured by Apache Indians coming out west on a wagon train. She was with the Indians for 6 years before being rescued and brought back to her brother. The town of Oatman, Arizona, is named after Olive and there are several books written about her ordeal. Rose Coffey was raised on the beach in Marysville, Washington, and graduated from Marysville High School. Rose was a dental assistant starting in her senior year at Marysville High School and continued that profession for 8 years. She then worked as a Ward Clerk at Providence Hospital in Everett, Washington, for the next 8 years. Bud Noble and Rose Coffey met in the Summer of 1970. They become acquainted while in study hall at Marysville High School earlier so knew each other somewhat. Rose Coffey had married **Russ Willis** in 1965 and had two children with him: a daughter, **Laura Rae Willis**, born August 25, 1965, in Everett, Washington, and a son, **Ronald Alden Willis**, born January 19, 1969, in Everett, Washington. Ronald Alden Willis changed his name to **Ronald Alden Noble** when he turned 21 years of age. Following their marriage on December 8, 1972, Franz Jon and Rosemary (Coffey) Noble had a daughter, **Jammie Leeann Noble**, born September 3, 1974, in Everett, Washington.

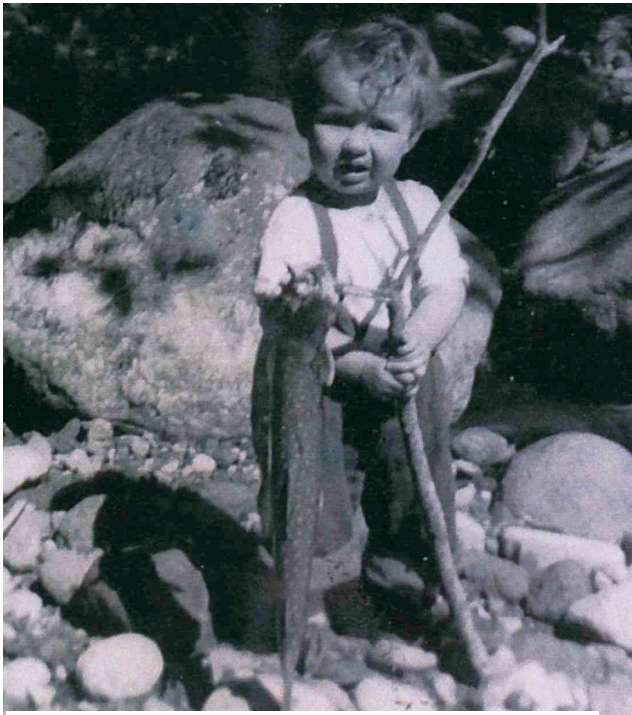
Rose always helped Bud with his businesses. In 1981 Rose started attending Skagit Valley College in Oak Harbor, Washington, and received her licensed practical nursing degree (LPN) in 1983. Rose immediately took a job with a pediatrician, but continued on to get her registered nursing degree (RN) in 1987 and then her Bachelor Science Nursing degree from the University of Washington School of Nursing in 1995 all while continuing her pediatric nursing job. In addition to that, Rose worked for Skagit Valley College as their Family Resources Coordinator for the State's Birth to Three Early Intervention Program. She identified, screened, and coordinated services for families of infants who were delayed in their development. Rose also spent 8 years as a nursing instructor for the Skagit Valley College School of Nursing. In the Fall of 2006, Rose retired from the college and promptly took a job with the Anacortes School District in setting up their Birth to Three Program. Rose also worked in the medical office.

Following retirement Bud devoted himself to his painting and maintaining and riding his Harley. Rose enjoyed skiing, scrap booking, quilting, and crossword puzzles. Rose also enjoys walking and walks 3-6 miles every day.

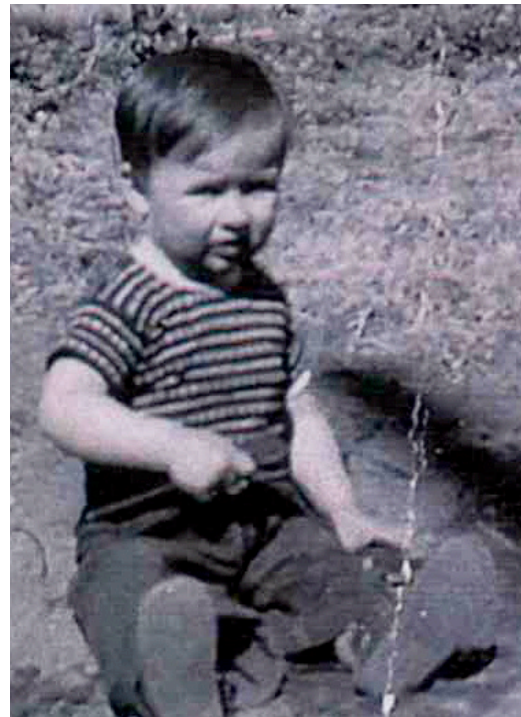
At about 2002, Bud purchased a six foot angel and had it set in concrete which was placed on an acre of forested land in Washington previously owned by his grandparents, Otto Franz and Lillian (Fadness) Krause, purchased when they first moved to Washington. This acreage was triangular in shape and was part of their French Creek property. The French Creek property was originally quite large but was reduced over time to about 40 acres. It was on this forested property that the ashes (last remains) of the following family members were scattered: Otto Franz Krause, Lillian (Fadness) Krause, Richard Harold Noble, Lillian Ruth (Bunnie Krause) Noble, Richard Earl Noble, Gerald Alfred Cook, and Winifred Arlene Coffey. A bronze plaque inscribed with each of family members name was also placed here to signify their final resting place.

Bud Noble was quite close to his grandfather, Otto Franz Krause, and remembers that his grandfather had two sayings that he relayed to him: " if you have time to kill, then work it to death" and "any damn fool can make money, keeping it is the secret". Bud also recalled a story that when he visited his grandfather later in his life, he did so riding his Harley Davidson complete with beard, long hair, and leather cap. Otto was taken aback by this appearance and told Bud that his appearance reminded him of the pioneer and immigrant days when men grew beards and let their hair grow to protect their faces and heads from the weather, in particular the winter. Plus, the leather cap to his eyes was very similar in appearance to an immigrant's cap. Otto also remarked that at one time he grew his hair and beard longer to appear older and at one time only used his initials, OF Krause, when conducting business by mail. In this way he could be addressed only as "Mister or Sir" during his early working days which helped prevent being taken advantage of due to his youth. Otto had said that at around this time, people would ask Otto Krause if his father was around so they could do business.

Bud and Rose Noble lived at Skyline Marina and had another residence in the Cascade Mountains in the Snoqualmie Pass ski area. They planed to move to Costa Rica to finish their retirement. The last known address for Franz Jon and Rosemary (Coffey) Noble was Anacortes, Washington.

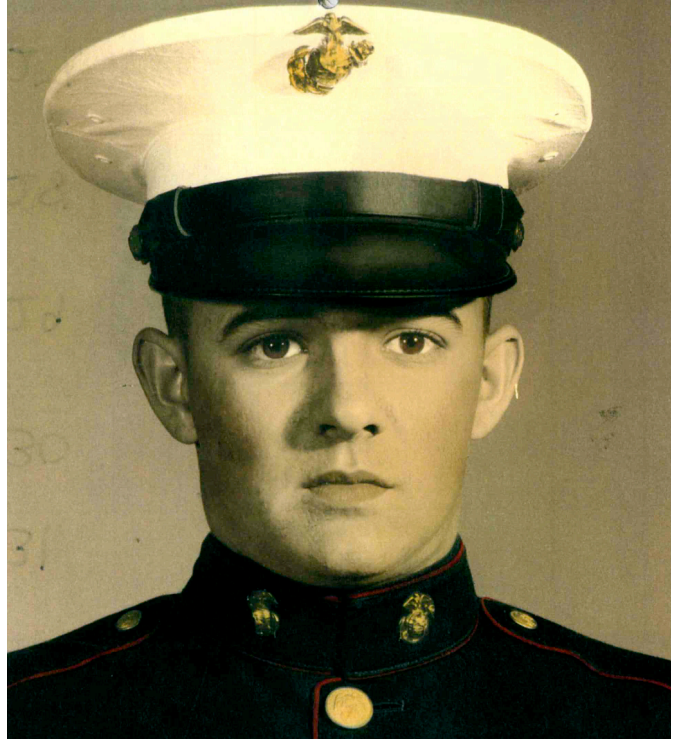

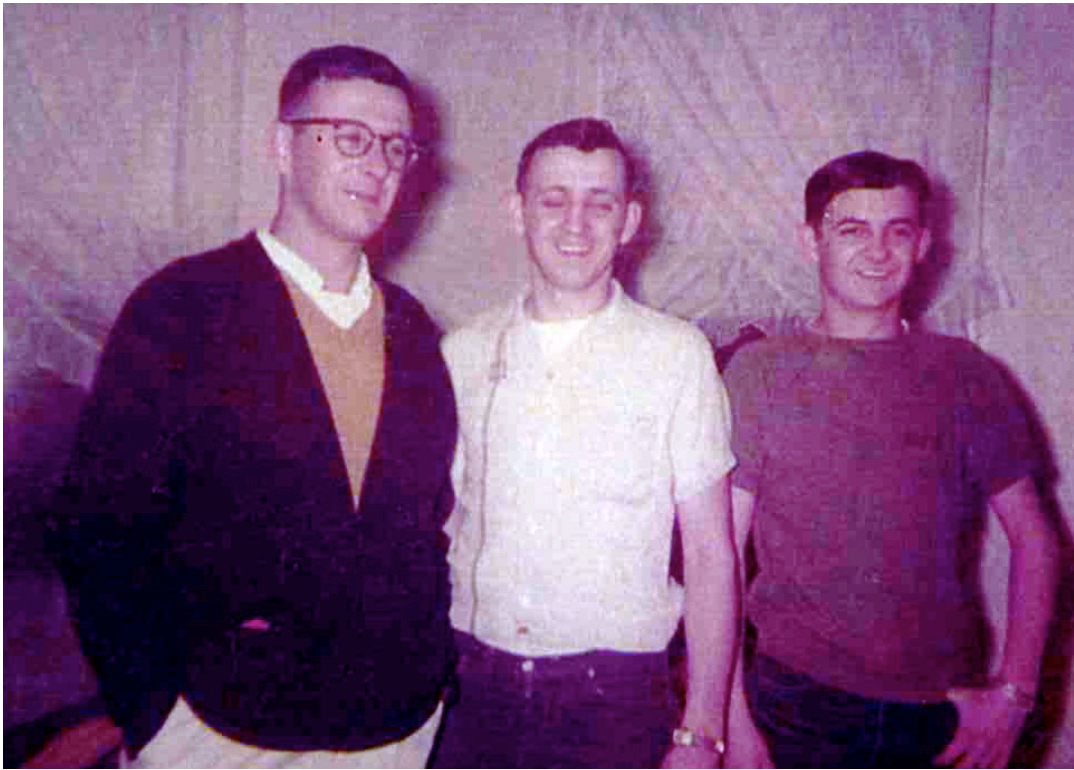

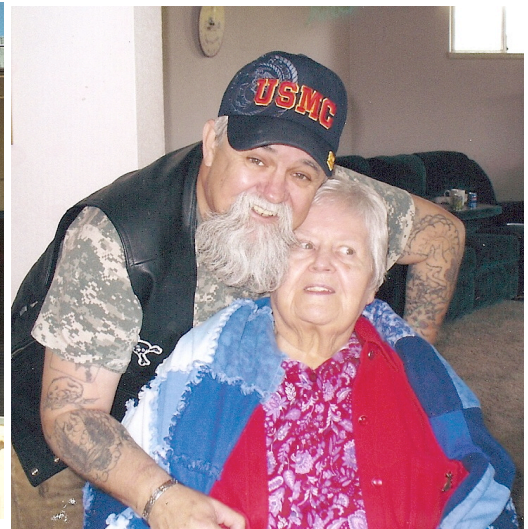

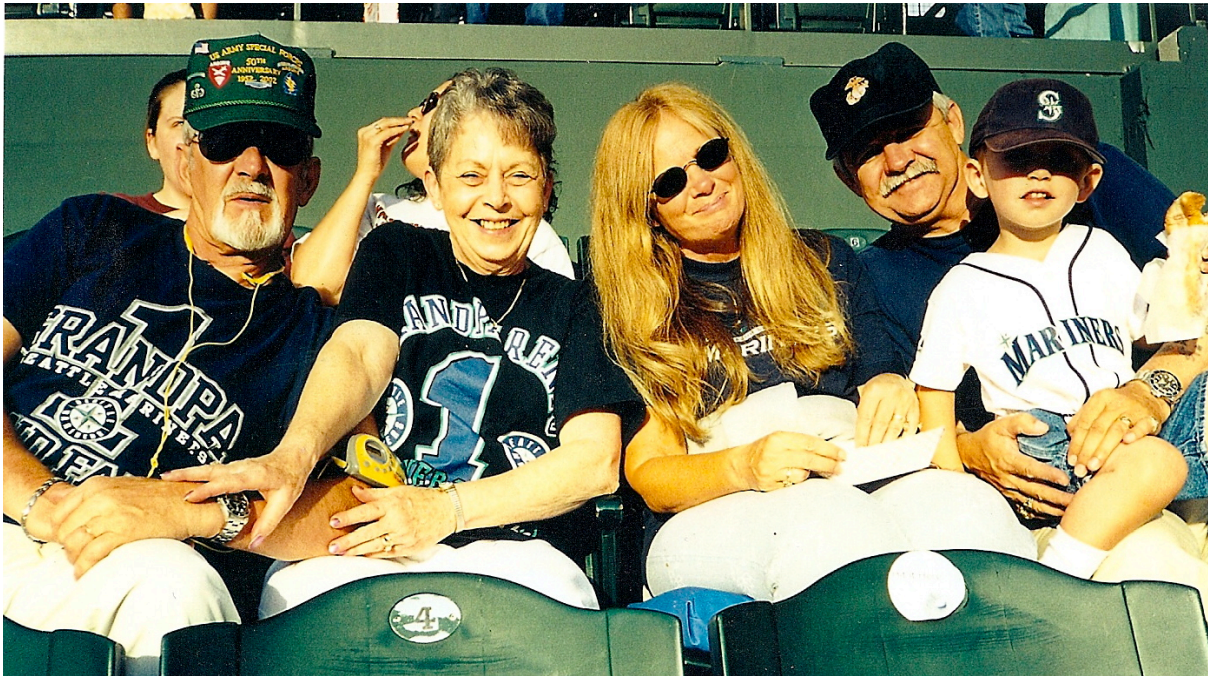

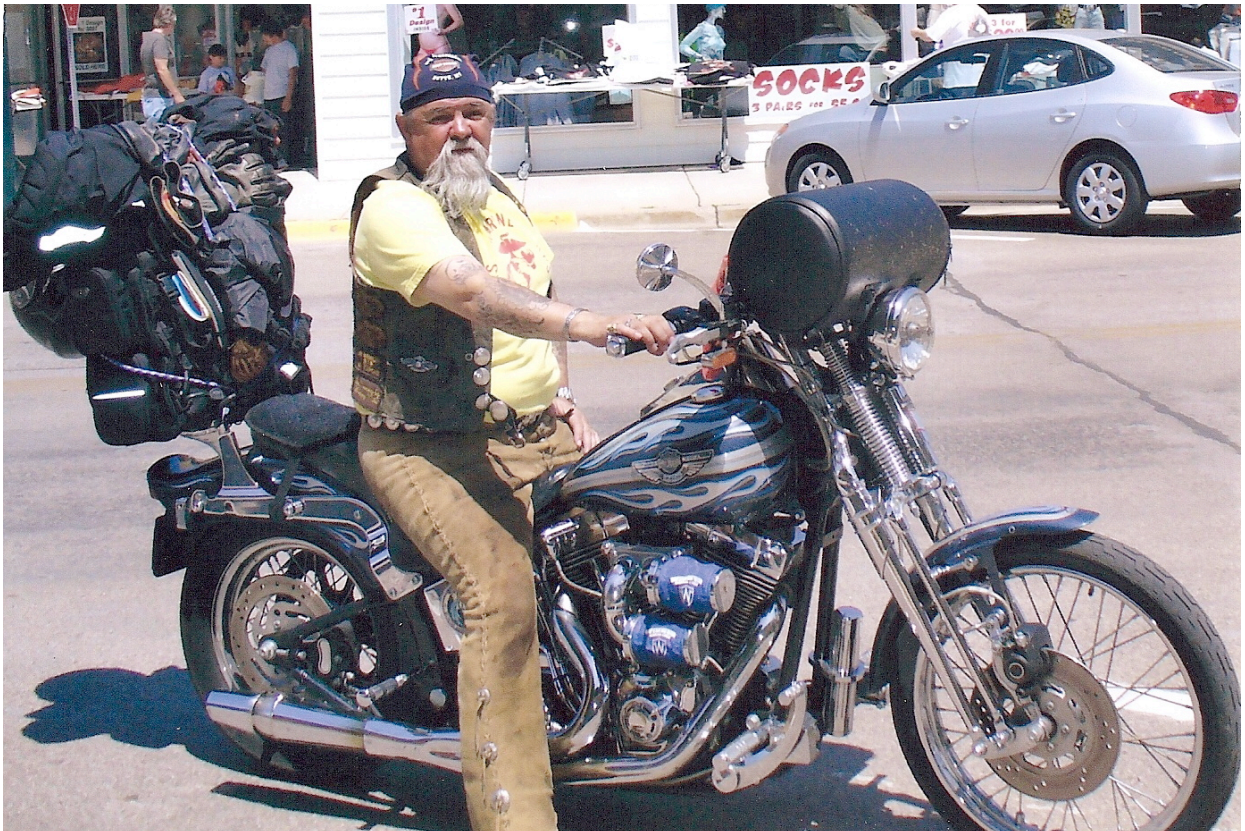
The front of Franz Jon Noble's corporate office located in Oak Harbor, Washington. Date of photograph was 2002.
