- Phase I: National Survey of Schools (2000: 14,107 > 1,423)
- Phase II: Study of Highly Successful Schools (2001-02: 100 > 98 > 6)

Identification of Highly Successful Schools

- •ML Leaders from each State Nominated 275 Schools from across the country (Winter 2001)
- •Principal Responded to Survey about Self and School's Programs and Practices
- Panel Identified 100 Highly Successful Schools
 - Processes for Change in Past 5 Years
 - •Direction for Change (Values/Beliefs/Mission/Vision/Goals)
 - Address Challenges Facing the School
 - Document Meeting Student Needs (especially achievement)
 - Turning Points 2000 Recommendations
- 98 of the 100 Participated in the Study (Fall 2001)

Data Collected from the 98 Highly Successful Schools

Principals completed extensive survey

- -Demographics of self and school
- -School Programs and Practices

Teachers completed surveys

- -School Climate/Culture
- -School Leadership
- -School Programs and Practices

Students completed surveys

- School participation
- -Self-efficacy
- -Student Behavior

Parents completed survey

- **-School Improvement Processes**
- -School Programs and Practices

Comparisons of 98 Highly Successful ML Schools to National Sample

- Grade patterns were similar; slightly more 7-8 in Highly Successful group
- Per pupil expenditures were slightly higher in Highly Successful group
- Average teacher to pupil ratios were slightly higher in Highly Successful group
- Student ethnicity/diversity very similar; slightly more Asian/American students in Highly Successful schools.
- Percent of students eligible for Free/Reduced Lunch slightly lower in Highly Successful schools.

Site-Visit Schools

- Research Team Studied All Data from the 98 Schools
- Invited Six Schools to Participate in On-Site Study
- Site-visits of Three Days (Spring, 2002)
