

## Harold F. Breimyer to receive UM's Thomas Jefferson Award

Harold F. Breimyer, UMC professor of agricultural economics, is the 1983 recipient of the UM system's annual Thomas Jefferson Award.

Breimyer is the author of a widely read extension newsletter on agricultural economic policy and, like the third U.S. President, is an advocate of the family farm tradition.

The award is given to a member of the UM community who best exemplifies the principles and ideals of Jefferson through personal influence and performance of duty in teaching, writing and scholarship, character and influence, and devotion and loyalty to the University.

The honor was announced by UM President James C. Olson at a meeting of the Board of Curators last week in St. Louis.

Breimyer will receive a monetary award derived from the interest accrued on a \$10,000 gift by the Robert Earl McConnell Foundation. He also will receive a citation during ceremonies April 13—the date of Jefferson's birth, and coincidentally, also Breimyer's.

The award will be presented by President Olson at 4 p.m. at the Thomas Jefferson monument on UMC's Francis Quadrangle.

The selection was made by a University system committee from nominees submitted by the four UM campuses.

Breimyer has combined years of service with the federal government and a Jeffersonian social philosophy to create a record of teaching, research and community service.

He was raised on a farm in western Ohio, and received his bachelor's degree from Ohio State University in 1934. Breimyer completed his master's degree in agricultural economics at Ohio State in 1935, and did additional graduate work at the University of California. He received a doctorate in economics from American University in 1960.

Breimyer was with the U.S. Department of Agriculture for many years, including a term as a staff economist for agriculture with the President's Council of Economic Advisors from 1959 to 1961.

He began his association with UMC in 1966. From 1973 to 1980 he was the Perry

Foundation Professor of Agricultural Economics. He previously taught at the University of Illinois and conducted research studies in the Soviet Union, Argentina, Guatemala, Peru, Colombia and Spain.

Breimyer has received numerous professional awards and honors. He has served as president of the American Agricultural Economics Association and was elected a Fellow of that organization—its highest acclaim. He has been on several UM faculty committees and active in professional organizations of economists and agriculturalists. He has published hundreds of articles and three books, and conducted extensive research on the organizational structure of agriculture.

Breimyer has been involved in many activities in the Missouri Cooperative Extension Service, including writing a monthly newsletter on agricultural policy, education and public affairs. Although written for Missouri readers, the newsletter is distributed and published nationwide.

On a local level, he has served as president of the Columbia, Mo., Council of Churches. He is a member of Lions International and is a retired lieutenant commander in the U.S. Navy.

## Investment managers report growth in UM's retirement trust fund

When across the nation people are questioning the amount of "security" in the social security system, UM faculty and staff can take heart in knowing the University Retirement Trust Fund is alive, well and growing through prudent management.

Investment managers for the retirement trust fund have reported to the Board of Curators that the total fund's time weighted rate of return was 21.85 percent for the 1982 calendar year.

Deposits of \$12,900,000, retained income of \$16,555,590, and capital gains of \$31,649,989 allowed the retirement fund to increase in value by \$51,105,579 to \$217,454,369 as of Dec. 31, 1982. Of the increase, 85 percent, or \$44,147,975, was achieved in the second half of the calendar year as capital market values of both stocks and bonds rebounded significantly.

The University contributes an amount equal to 9.32 percent of the regular monthly,

full-time payroll into the retirement trust fund. These funds are invested in stocks, bonds and other instruments by the University's investment agent, United Missouri Bank of Kansas City. One measurement of the health of the trust fund is that the funds' market value exceeds the cumulative net deposits by \$87,349,936 or 67.1 percent.

Investment objectives and policies that have been adopted by the Board of Curators serve as guidelines for the investment agent. Essentially, the University policy is one of a balanced portfolio with the goals of growth and current income. At the same time, the agent is given appropriate flexibility to deal with fluctuations in the security markets.

"This flexibility allowed the investors to take full advantage of the forces currently at work in the economy that have led to a significant appreciation in the value of assets, particularly during the second half of calendar 1982," UM Treasurer Donald S. Holm said.

## Olson, Cocos call for action on state revenue situation

The University will have great difficulty next year unless the General Assembly is able to increase state support beyond the \$163.4 million recommended by a subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee and the \$167 million recommended by the governor, UM President James C. Olson told the Board of Curators Friday.

"I do not foresee any chance for funding of either program improvements or of a general salary increase program in 1983-84 unless the state is able to improve support beyond these recommendations," Olson said.

Both Olson and Board of Curators President William G. Cocos Jr. called for strong initiatives and deliberate and significant actions on the part of the leadership of the state to provide a solution to the state revenue problem.

"State support is the number one revenue source, as it should be with a public university," Olson said. "State support also has been our number one

difficulty in providing for the needs of the University."

The UM president told the curators that Missourians had dug themselves the proverbial hole by, first, reducing general revenue by eliminating certain taxes through legislation and earmarking certain taxes for specific purposes and then by passing the Hancock Amendment that has further complicated the state support picture.

Reporting to the board on the recent Legislative Recognition Day, an event sponsored by the UM Alumni Alliance providing University officials and alumni an opportunity to meet with legislators, Cocos said he pointed out to the alumni group the difficulties the University has experienced as a result of uncertain, lagging state support.

"Specifically, we need action that will improve the state support, and we need to address the issues brought on by the Hancock Amendment," the board president said.

## Committee's structure adopted for long-range planning process

The Board of Curators Friday adopted the following recommendation from the Long-range Planning Committee on structure for planning:

"The Board of Curators recognizes its obligation to the citizens of Missouri to develop a thoughtful long-range plan for the highest quality University of Missouri. Therefore, it is recommended that the following structure be established for making recommendations to the board through the Long-range Planning Committee about the future of the University.

"There are to be established several committees—first, a Steering Committee to consist of President Olson, the four chancellors, the two vice presidents, the members of the Long-range Planning Committee and four faculty members to be appointed by the president upon recommendation of the chancellors and the appropriate faculty governing bodies. The chairman of the Long-range Planning Committee will serve as chairman of the Steering Committee. Second, on each campus, and in the Cooperative Extension Service, there should be established a liaison committee to work with the Steering Committee in the planning process. The membership of these liaison committees is to be approved by the Steering Committee, but each campus committee should contain students, faculty, staff, alumni, and other citizens, and be chaired by the chancellor. The appropriate

constituent organizations should be involved in the selection process. The faculty members on the Steering Committee should be members also of the liaison committees.

"The Steering Committee is to have as its charge a consideration of the issues related to long-range planning, as identified earlier by the Long-range Planning Committee, and the development of appropriate recommendations to the board about these issues on a periodic basis throughout the process. In carrying out this charge, the Steering Committee is to maintain close liaison with the Department of Higher Education and the Coordinating Board in their reassessment of Master Plan III, and with the campuses and Cooperative Extension Service through the committees established above.

"The Steering Committee will make periodic reports through the Long-range Planning Committee to the board and will take steps to ensure that its agenda, timetable, and procedures are made known and that adequate opportunity for reflection and contribution to the planning process is given to the other committees and, through them, to the various segments of the University community and its external constituencies."

The board also authorizes the University administration to recommend a qualified outside consultant to assist with the overall direction of the planning process.

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## Academic associate chosen for 1983-84

Mark Burkholder, UMSL professor of history and associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, will be the academic associate in the office of Vice President for Academic Affairs Mel George, effective Sept. 1.

The position of academic associate has been filled annually by a member of the UM faculty since 1980, with a one-year hiatus in 1982-83 because of the financial situation. The position provides an opportunity for a faculty member to gain administrative experience for a year, and it provides the UMca academic affairs office with faculty assistance and perspective on a variety of projects assigned to the vice president. Howard Mancing, UMC associate professor of romance languages, served in the position in 1980-81, and Dale Neuman, UMKC professor of political science, was the academic associate in 1981-82.

"I look forward to having Professor Burkholder in the office next year. His experience at UMSL, his scholarly excellence, and his administrative background will bring valuable perspectives to the office," said Mel George, UM vice president for academic affairs.

Burkholder joined the UMSL faculty in 1970 after completion of his Ph.D. in history at Duke University. He was assistant dean of the College of Arts and Sciences from 1977 until 1980 when he became associate dean. His research area is Latin American history.

## New system streamlines financial aid process

SAM is a hard worker. He doesn't get the Monday-morning blues or run out of steam before the end of the day. Instead, SAM toils laboriously over student financial aid data, matching qualified applicants with available funds.

SAM reports to Phil Rokicki, UMca director of scholarships and student financial aid services. Rokicki gives SAM high marks as an assistant. SAM is a computer software package.

The University's Student Aid Management System (SAM) is in its first full year of operation. SAM has plenty of work, handling \$81.7 million in grants, loans, scholarships and other financial aid for 33,000 student applicants each year.

Rokicki says the computerized system benefits the University in two related areas: streamlining the flow of information and assisting students directly.

SAM arrived at an opportune time. Requests for financial aid from UM students have grown in number during the past few years, due to several factors. Rokicki attributes the increase to inflation, higher tuition costs, an increasing inability among parents to pay for their children's college educations, and conservative administrations in Washington, D.C., that have attempted to modify and curtail federal assistance for higher education.

If SAM hadn't come along, Rokicki says, it would have been necessary to double the size of the University staff handling the growing volume of financial aid applications. Administrators viewed that option as too expensive, and SAM was adopted.

SAM arrived at the University from Sigma Systems, Inc., of Guthrie, Okla. Rokicki describes SAM as a "state of the art, on-line interactive" system that puts UM "at the cutting edge of technology" compared to other state universities.

## Research Assistance Act

### Board approves 18 projects

The UM system Board of Curators approved funding 18 projects recommended by President James C. Olson and the UM Research Assistance Act Steering Committee. The projects will require \$746,481 in state support.

Under provisions of the 1982 Research Assistance Act, promoted by Gov. Bond and approved by the General Assembly, the University's research and applied projects are selected to enhance employment opportunities, stimulate economic development and encourage private investment. The state will provide one-third of the project cost, with the remaining two-thirds provided by non-state and non-federal sources. Directors of the recommended projects now have six months to obtain the required private support.

A complete listing of the grants and investigators was published in the March 10 issue of *Spectrum*.

### 2nd competition announced

Preproposals for research or applied projects under the Research Assistance Act will be accepted through June 1, UM Vice President Melvin D. George announced.

The University steering committee, chaired by UMKC Chancellor George Russell, will use virtually the same guidelines for this second competition as were used in the

earlier round of proposal review.

The preproposal must include the description of the proposed project, an explanation of how it will enhance employment opportunities and stimulate private investment in the state, a budget, resumes of principal investigators, and an indication from the chancellor or vice president responsible for the submitting unit of possible sources of the required non-University matching funds for the project.

Faculty members with projects that might fit the objective of the research act are encouraged to submit preproposals. They should read the complete guidelines and selection criteria, which are available from the campus chancellors.

Preproposals, which should not be lengthy, must be received by George, 309 University Hall, no later than June 1. They will be reviewed by the steering committee in June, and then full proposals will be due early in September for those projects selected for further review by the committee on the basis of the preproposals.

The Research Assistance Act was passed by the General Assembly in 1982 and is funded this year in the amount of \$950,000, after the 5 percent withholding. The first awards under the research act were approved by the Board of Curators on March 25. Funds remaining after the first competition total approximately \$200,000.

## Curators approves construction plans

The UM system Board of Curators have approved architectural plans for building, renovating or adding to existing structures on the UMC campus estimated to cost \$20 million.

The projects include building an eye research facility, an addition to and renovation of Ellis Library, constructing a health sciences library and adding to the School of Medicine, and expanding and renovating the press box at Memorial Stadium.

A description of each of the projects, estimated costs and methods of financing follows:

● **Eye Research Institute:** Preliminary plans call for the proposed structure of 7,915 square feet to be built on top of the UMC ophthalmology building and another 500 square feet of space to be added on the ground level. Estimated cost of the project is \$1,020,000.

The facility will consist of three elements: research area, core support spaces and offices. The laboratory area would be a series of 10-foot by 20-foot modules. Areas will be provided for immunology, glaucoma, histopathology, biochemistry, fluorescence and electron microscopy.

The eye research facility would be funded with \$815,000 from the Roy E. Mason Endowment Fund and a \$205,000 grant from the National Eye Institute.

The eye research facility is the third phase of a six-phase project for the site bounded by the UMC Medical Center, the Rusk Rehabilitation Center and two dormitories.

The exterior of the eye research facility will be of brick and precast concrete compatible with existing buildings in the area.

With the curators' approval of preliminary plans for the facility, the project now proceeds to the final plan stage.

● **Ellis Library Addition:** The board approved preliminary plans for building a two-story addition to and renovating Ellis Library, allowing the project to move to the preparation of final plans. The project, adding 50,000 square feet and remodeling 50,000 square feet of existing space, is estimated to cost \$7,500,000. It would be funded with \$4,000,000 in state appropriations, which have been requested, and \$3,500,000 in campus funds.

The addition will be constructed on the south side of the present library. The plan envisions the closing of Conley Avenue between 9th and Hitt streets.

The addition will match the existing building height. The ground floor will house technical services, receiving room and dock functions and the historical society. The level above will include the reference department, bibliography area and additional stack and reader space.

The addition will provide space to allow the library's book collection to be expanded from 1.2 million to 1.6 million volumes. The 1,718 reader spaces will be increased by 548. The exterior appear-

ance of the addition will be similar to the present building.

Renovation work at the library will concentrate on the first floor, including the areas of current periodicals, circulation services, inter-library loan, administration, stacks/readers and card catalogues.

● **Health Sciences Library and Medical School Addition:** Final design plans were approved by the board for the construction of the Health Sciences Library and an addition to the School of Medicine.

Estimated cost of the total project is \$9,500,000. It will be funded with \$3,185,000 appropriated from the state capital improvement bond issue approved by Missouri voters last year, \$1,815,000 in private contributions and \$4,500,000 in campus funds.

The project consists of a three-story library and a four-story medical school addition which are interconnected by an east-west enclosed atrium aligning with the present School of Nursing. The medical school addition aligns with and connects to the southern half of the School of Nursing and attaches directly at all levels to the northern wings of the School of Medicine. The library will be located north of the atrium. It will contain about 50,000 square feet, over 24,000 square feet of which is open area for collections and users. The library is designed to make maximum use of daylight, thereby reducing lighting costs significantly.

The medical school addition will contain 117,752 square feet. This will correct some space deficiencies in the medical school as well as replace about 20,000 square feet in temporary buildings which will be demolished to make room for the library.

The new structures will have a brick exterior to match existing buildings in the area.

In addition to approving the final design plans for this project, the curators also granted authority to advertise for bids for the work.

● **Press Box Addition:** Preliminary plans were approved for an addition to the press box at Memorial Stadium in Columbia, and the project will proceed to the preparation of final design plans.

Estimated cost of the addition is \$2,200,000 and will be paid for with intercollegiate athletics revenues generated from the operation of the addition. No tax money will be involved. The first level of the facility will be expanded to seat 400. Seventeen skyboxes will be added to the second level of the facility seating 136.

The Tiger Lounge will continue to provide a concession area for fast foods, in addition to a complete buffet service.

Press accommodations will continue to be on the third level with broadcast booths, darkrooms, a statistics room and equipment storage areas.

The fourth level will remain an open area with space for cameras and security personnel.

The press box work will include renovating the elevator.

**James Oglesby**, UMC director of facilities utilization and assistant professor of education, has been appointed to the task group of the National Science Board's commission on pre-college education in mathematics, science and technology. The National Science Board is the policy-making body of the National Science Foundation.

**Kathleen B. Goldblatt**, dean of the UMKC nursing school, has been appointed to serve on the committee on education of the Nurses Association of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists for 1983.

**Andrew A. Lasser**, UMC assistant professor in health services management and associate director of the health services management program has been appointed a fellow of the Accrediting Commission on Education for Health Services Administration, Washington, D.C. During his term, which extends through Dec. 1983, Lasser will participate in commission activities including accreditation site visits.

**Franklin Y. Cheng**, UMR professor of civil engineering, has been reappointed to serve on the advisory group for the marginal safety of nuclear power plant buildings at Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory.

In addition, as a member of the optimization committee of the American Society of Civil Engineers, Cheng has organized a technical session on structural optimization for the society's engineering mechanics division specialty conference.

**Robert B. Denhardt**, UMC professor of public administration and associate dean of the College of Business and Public Administration, has been named to the editorial board of *Administration and Society*, one of the country's leading journals in the field of public administration.

Denhardt was also recently appointed to the National Finance and Administration Committee of the American Society for Public Administration. He currently serves as a member of the society's national council.

The National Collegiate Athletic Association has appointed **Jean Cerra**, associate director of intercollegiate athletics at UMC, to the NCAA council. Cerra will serve a four-year term among 22 representatives from Division I schools. The council establishes and directs NCAA general policy in the interim between conventions.

**Harry Jonas**, dean of the UMKC medical school, has been asked to serve as a member of the screening panel for White House Fellowships for the third time.

**Thomas Jordan**, UMSL associate vice chancellor for academic affairs, has been appointed to a two-year term on the Board of Inspectors for the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College. Jordan is among eight University presidents and chief academic officers appointed to advise the Department of Defense on the operations of the college.

## Board approves revisions in three University rules

The UM system Board of Curators approved three changes in the *Collected Rules and Regulations* at its meeting last week in St. Louis.

Section 5.0114 of the rules was amended to provide that the Curators Publication Award be offered no more than once a year to a UM faculty member for an outstanding manuscript selected by the Press Committee and published by the University Press, and that the initial stipend be \$2,500, which may be adjusted by the president from time to time.

The award was previously restricted to assistant professors.

The board also amended the residency rules to read, "Prior to consideration for residency status under these rules, all foreign students must possess resident alien status as determined by relevant federal statutes or must hold a G visa."

G visa holders are aliens assigned to international agencies in this country or their children.

The third change was a revision of the rules and regulations concerning diplomas and certificates to include a provision for the signing of diplomas by more than one chancellor in case of adoption of multicampus degrees.

## Curators award four construction contracts

The UM system Board of Curators awarded contracts for four major construction projects, three of which are being financed by state capital improvement bonds approved by Missouri voters last summer, at its meeting last week in St. Louis.

The projects, the work to be done, the low bidders and the sources of funds are:

- Wachter Construction Co. of St. Louis, low among 18 bidders, submitted a bid of \$777,936 to renovate the UMSL School of Optometry. The project is to be financed with state appropriations from the bond issue.

The work, which will take about nine months, will include architectural, mechanical and electrical renovation on the first floor of the educational classroom building and similar work on the second, third and fourth floors of the educational office building.

- Howerton Electric Co. of Jefferson City submitted the lowest of four bids received for renovation of the fire alarm system at the UMC Hospital and Clinics. Howerton's low bid was \$152,349. The work will include replacing old wiring and removal and replacement of antiquated components in order to make the system more modern and reliable. The work also will allow the fire alarm system to be computer operated.

The fire alarm project, which will take about eight months to complete, is being financed with funds from the capital improvements bonds.

- The third project being funded by the bond issue is the reroofing of the Buehler, Physics, and Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering buildings at UMR.

Missouri Builders Service of Jefferson City submitted a bid of \$201,216, lowest of nine bids received. A total of 54,000 square

feet of roof work is involved in the project which also will include some tuckpointing and insulation.

- The curators also awarded a contract for parking lot maintenance and renovation on UMSL's south campus.

The work will include building a new lot as well as resurfacing existing parking areas. Some new pavement is involved. All the work is on the south campus and will take about three months to complete.

Bommarito Construction Co. of Maryland Heights, Mo., submitted a bid of \$336,414 for the parking lot work. It was the lowest of the 18 bids received. The project is being entirely financed with money from the St. Louis campus parking fee fund.
