Preparing an Election Petition in Missouri

Initiative and referendum petitions provide citizens with the power to make and overturn existing laws. Through the initiative petition, the people can compel an election on the question of enacting an amendment to the Missouri Constitution or enacting a proposed law. Through the referendum petition, the people can compel an election to decide whether an existing law should be retained. The procedure to be followed in drafting these petitions is specified in the Constitution and Statutes of Missouri.

Although this guide deals only with initiative and referendum petitions, there are various other petitions that can be useful in Missouri. For instance, the people in a third class city with a commission form of government may draft petitions for initiative or referendum of city ordinances. The requirements for these are set out in the Statutes of Missouri. Interestingly, initiative and referendum do not seem to be available to fourth-class cities or to third-class cities with the mayor-council or city manager form of government. People in charter cities in Missouri generally have the power to compel elections through initiative and referendum petitions. The requirements for such petitions can usually be found in each individual city's charter. (Appendix F for a sample initiative petition in Columbia) However, the courts of Missouri have limited the power of initiative in cities by saying only those ordinances that the city council or governing body is itself empowered to enact can be proposed by the initiative. Petitions are also available in Missouri to initiate measures on many limited topics ranging from school re-districting to water conservation. Since such petitions are usually very involved and often have rigid requirements, an attorney should be consulted before attempting to draft one.

Obtaining signatures

The basic purpose of initiative and referendum petitions on the state-wide level is to compel particular state officials to call for a vote on a proposed constitutional amendment, a proposed law or an existing law. But before a vote can be compelled, a certain number of voters in Missouri must signify that they want such a vote by signing the petition. If enough voters sign, the people of Missouri become empowered to directly change the laws of Missouri without legislative approval.

As mentioned earlier, there are constitutional and statutory requirements that must be satisfied before these petitions become effective. Certain requirements are common to all three petitions under consideration. For instance, all three petitions can only be signed by qualified Missouri voters. A qualified voter is anyone who meets the legal voting requirements in his or her particular congressional district, but he or she need not be registered to vote.

To determine the number of signatures required, reference can be made to the official canvass of voters at the last gubernatorial election, which is available in the Secretary of State's office. For a state constitutional amendment petition, the sponsors must obtain the signatures of 8 percent of the legal voters in two-thirds of the congressional districts in Missouri. Since there are presently 10 districts, the sponsors must obtain the required percentage in seven districts. For an initiative or referendum petition on a state statute, the signatures of 5 percent of the legal voters in two-thirds of Missouri's congressional districts must be obtained.

There are additional signature requirements. Each petition may contain signatures of qualified voters from only one congressional district. When circulated for signatures, each sheet for petitioners' signatures must be attached to or contain a full and correct copy of the title and text of the measure so proposed by the initiative petition, and the petition must be filed with the Secretary of State, numbered in sequence for each congressional district. Referendum petitions must have attached to or contain a full and correct copy of the measure on which the referendum is demanded and must be filed in like manner, numbered in sequence by congressional districts.

The enacting clause

The first form requirement for a constitutional amendment petition is that it contain an enacting clause, which should read: "Be it resolved by the people of the State of Missouri that the Constitution be amended." (Appendix B.) The full text of the proposed amendment should follow this enacting clause. An initiative petition must also contain the following enacting clause: "Be it enacted by the people of the State of Missouri." (Appendix C.) The title and full text of the measure being proposed for adoption should follow the enacting clause. Also, other laws, which have been repealed, amended or placed in conflict with the proposal, must be expressly referred to in the petition. Missouri statutes require that a referendum petition contain or have attached to it a copy of the bill that the voters will approve or disapprove. (Appendix D.) There is no enacting clause requirement for referendum petitions.

Subject limitations

As to subject matter limitations, a constitutional amendment petition may not contain more than one amended, revised or new article, nor may there be more than one subject dealt with in any proposed amendment. Likewise, each petition for initiative cannot contain more than one subject, and that subject must be clearly expressed in the title of the proposed statute. Also, the Missouri Constitution prohibits proposing an appropriation law through the initiative process unless the proposed measure at the same time provides for raising revenue to fund the appropriation. The referendum petition is limited to any one bill passed by the general assembly. Furthermore, the Missouri Constitution prohibits a referendum on an emergency or appropriation measure passed by the general assembly. But the definitions of "emergency" and "appropriation" are vague and subject to judicial interpretation.

Publication requirements

There are publication requirements with regard to a constitutional amendment petition. The Secretary of State will designate in what newspapers in each county proposed amendments shall be published. If possible, each amendment should be published once a week for two consecutive weeks in two newspapers of different political affiliation in each county. The last publication should not precede the next election by more than 30 nor less than 15 days.

Filing

Every constitutional and initiative petition must be filed with the Secretary of State not less than four months before the proposed election. A referendum petition must be filed with the Secretary of State not more than 90 days after the final adjournment of the session of the general assembly that passed the bill on which the referendum is demanded.

Finally, each sheet of a constitutional amendment petition, initiative petition and referendum petition must be verified by the person who circulated that sheet. (Appendix E.)

Appendix A contains a summary of the requirements for those petitions discussed in this guide. Please note, however, that other types of petitions may have specific statutory requirements that are either in conflict with or in addition to the requirements discussed herein.

Publication requirements?	The Secretary of State will designate in what newspaper(s) in each county proposed amendments shall be published. If possible, each amendment should be published once a week for two consecutive weeks in two newspapers of different political affiliation in each county. The last publication should not precede the next election by more than 30 nor less than 15 days. (RSMo. 125.010 for more details.)
Filing deadlines and with whom?	Every petition must be filed with the Secretary of State not less than four months before the election.
Additional filing requirements?	The petition must be numbered in sequence for each congressional district.
Circulator's affidavit required?	Each sheet of a petition must be verified by the circulator in substantially the form of RSMo. 126.061 (replaces old 126.040).
	Petition for Initiative on a State Statute
Who may sign?	Any qualified voter of Missouri residing within the congressional district.
Number of signatures required?	5 percent of the legal voters in each of two-thirds of the congressional districts of Missouri.
Additional signature requirements?	Each petition may contain signatures of qualified voters from only one congressional district. When circulated for signatures, each sheet for petitioners' signatures must be attached to or contain a full and correct copy of the title and text of the measure so proposed by the initiative petition.
Form requirements?	Every petition must contain an enacting clause ("Be it enacted by the people of the state of Missouri:") and the full text of the measure. Each petition must not contain more than one subject, which must be clearly express in the title. (Directory form in RSMo. 126.031, 1971; replaces old 126.030)
Publication requirements?	None.
Filing deadlines and with whom?	Every petition must be filed with the Secretary of State not less than four months before the election.
Additional filing requirements?	The petition must be numbered in sequence for each congressional district.
Circulator's affidavit required?	Each sheet of a petition must be verified by the circulator in substantially the form of RSMo. 126.061 (replaces old 126.040).
	Petition for Referendum on a State Statute
Who may sign?	Any qualified voter of Missouri residing within the congressional district.
Number of signatures required?	5 percent of the legal voters in each of two-thirds of the congressional districts in Missouri.
Additional signature requirements?	Each petition may contain signatures of qualified voters from only one congressional district. When circulated for signatures, each sheet for petitioners' signatures must be attached to or contain a full and correct copy of the measure on which the referendum is demanded.

Form requirements?	(Directory form in RSMo. 126.021, 1971; replaces old 126.020)
Publication requirements?	None.
Filing deadlines and with whom?	Every petition must be filed with the Secretary of State not more than 90 days after the final adjournment of the general assembly that passed the bill on which referendum is demanded.
Additional filing requirements?	The petition must be numbered in sequence for each congressional district.
Circulator's affidavit required?	Each sheet of a petition must be verified by the circulator in substantially the form of RSMo. 126.061 (replaces old 126.040).
