Managing diabetics: The not so sweet side of sugar

While diabetes can be straightforward to manage, the challenging cases can be extremely frustrating. This lecture will review methods of troubleshooting and managing challenging diabetic patients.

Surgical intervention for respiratory distress

Some cases of respiratory distress require urgent surgical intervention. Unresolvable upper airway obstruction may dictate temporary tube tracheostomy, tracheal trauma may require tracheal resection and anastomosis, pneumothorax unresolvable by thoracocentesis may necessitate a thoracostomy tube, and diaphragmatic hernia may need emergent herniorrhaphy to improve respiration. This presentation will discuss these surgical interventions with emphasis on technique and pointers to facilitate efficient and effective application.

Feline urinary obstruction: Challenging complications

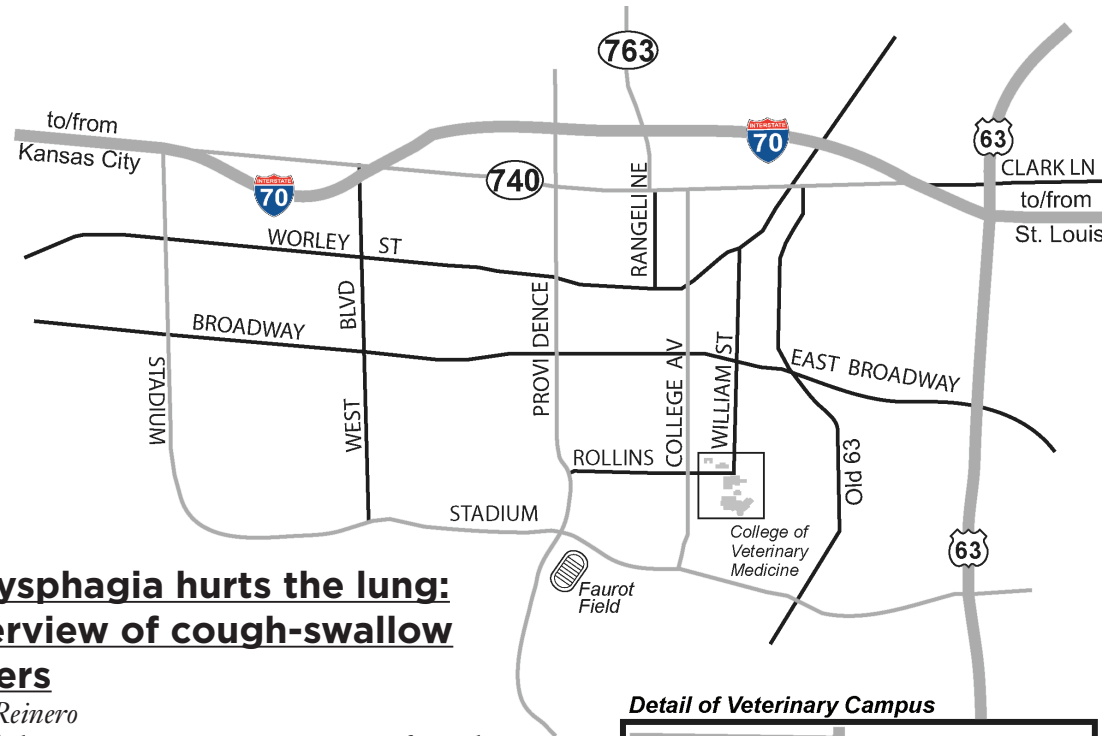

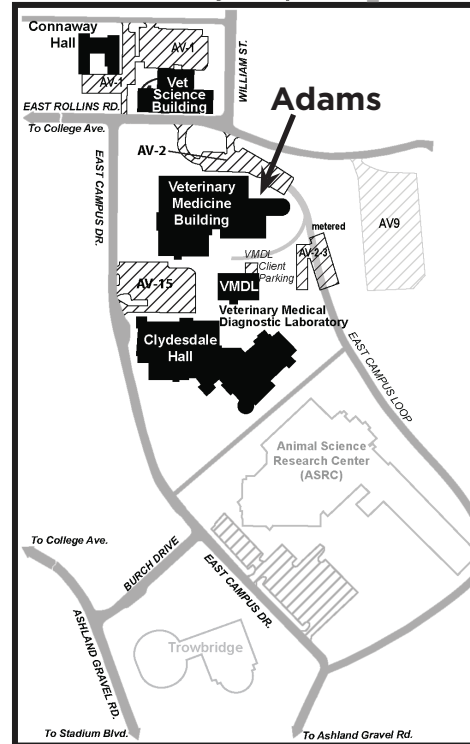
Canine and feline transfusion reactions: What to do
