



When asked what the hardest part for her was, she responded with something that I will never forget. I won't forget because her response was nowhere on my list of what I thought was best for this patient, and what I thought I could do for her. She said "losing my hair." She explained that the thing she wanted most was to be treated "normally" for the rest of her life, and not as a sick person.

-You cannot know what a patient needs most unless you ask, and more importantly listen to what they say.

On those days that you are feeling stressed or overwhelmed, write down your priorities and what is most important to you. Don't spend your time worrying about the things that aren't on that list -- life is just too short.
