



ROSCOE Leroy PULLEN


Northwestern University Medical School, Chicago, 1940; specialist certified by the American Board of Internal Medicine; fellow of the American College of Physicians; served as dean and professor of medicine at the University of Missouri School of Medicine in Columbia, professor of clinical medicine at Baylor University College of Medicine in Houston, director of graduate medicine and vice-dean at Tulane University of Louisiana School of Medicine in New Orleans, dean and professor of medicine at the University of Texas Poestgraduate School of Medicine in Houston, and associate professor of medicine and director of hospital planning at the University of Washington in Seattle; consultant to the surgeon general, U.S. Army, for 1947 to 1953; served as director of University of Hospitals in Columbia, Mo., and medical consultant and executive officer of the Missouri State Crippled Children's Program; in 1945 was chosen by Knox College, Galesburg, Ill., as recipient of the award for the alumnus who did the most for humanity during the year; died March 5, 1960, age 45.

History of the University of Missouri School of Medicine

With the graduation of twenty-one physicians on June 8, 1957 a new chapter was added to the long and rather eventful history of the University of Missouri School of Medicine. The third-year curriculum had been established in the fall of 1955 and on September 16, 1956, the new Medical Science Building and University Teaching Hospital were opened. Thus, a significant development had occurred in the 113 years since the first President of the University of Missouri, John H. Lathrop arranged an affiliation with the McDowell Medical School located in St. Louis. This affiliation was approved the following year by the Board of Curators in 1846 and the University had officially committed itself in the interest of medical education.

This affiliation with McDowell Medical College (after the Dean who founded it in 1840) was the first Medical School established west of the Mississippi River. It was a successful relationship. The diplomas from the medical department were signed by the president of the University and by professors of the medical faculty. (The professor of chemistry, for example, divided his time between the Columbia and St. Louis campuses.) One of the well recognized names among the students of that period was William Worrall Mayo, father of the famous Mayo brothers, who came to study with one of the teachers and to earn a second M.D. degree.

Following President Lathrop, the active interest he had shown in the Medical School lagged. For the first time, financial support was sought for the Medical School from the eighteenth General Assembly. The appropriation request of \$10,000 was denied and an effort to permit each county in the state to send one student to the Medical School with payment of fees was defeated.

In commenting on this action in a speech to the Missouri State Medical Association in April, 1956, President Elmer Ellis suggests that, "---it is reasonable to assume that its failure marks a missed opportunity in the best of medical education in this state." Other delays and missed opportunities were to follow over the years. On July 4, 1856, the connection between the Medical School and the University ceased. It was not until December 11, 1872, that the Department of Medicine was established in the University of Missouri by vote of Board of Curators. Following a convocation address by Dr. John H. Duncan, a curator representative, instruction was formally opened February 17, 1873. After originally requiring two years of instruction the course was increased to three years in 1890 and a fourth year added in 1899. By 1886 a relationship with McDowell Medical School, now called Missouri Medical College, was re-established and students were encouraged to take their final or third year in St. Louis in what was called "Section two of the Medical School of the University of Missouri." During this fourteen year period from 1872-1886 Dr. Joseph G. Norwood served as Dean, the first Dean of the School of Medicine.

The first graduating class of the School of Medicine at Columbia received the M.D. degree in 1874. There were five graduates in this class. (Andrew Conway, John Duncan, Woodson Moss, Wilson Ragan and Willis Smith.) Only a total of thirty-nine degrees in the entire University were granted that year. The class of 1887, 1888, 1889 and 1890 listed graduates from Division I (Columbia) and from Division II (Missouri Medical College, St. Louis.)

In 1909, after failure of the legislature to appropriate sufficient funds, the third and fourth years were dropped, "temporarily." Thus the Medical School became a school of basic medical sciences for almost forty years except for an effort in 1930 when the Board of Curators embarked on an endeavor to again teach the full four-year carriculum at the University. The announcement of 1932 lists six junior students but with the depression this effort to rebuild the Medical School was abandoned.

Dean Norwood, a chemist, was succeeded by Dr. Andrew W. McAlester, Professor of Surgery and Obstetrics, who had been active in founding the school in 1872. He served as Dean from 1890-1909. Dr. Clarence M. Jackson served as Dean from 1909-1913. It was during those years that a medical research policy was established that gave the school a degree of national recognition. From 1913-1930, Dean Guy L. Noyes served. He was followed by Dr. Edgar Allen (1930-1933) until he was called to the Chair of Anatomy of Yale University. Dr. Dudley Steele Conley assumed the deanship in 1933 and served during the war years and until his retirement in 1948. Dr. T. H. Stubbs was appointed Dean from 1948-1951. Dr. M. Pinson Neal was then appointed acting Dean until the appointment of Dr. Roscoe L. Pullen in 1953. Dr. Vernon E. Wilson has served as Dean from 1959.

Over a period of years the entrance requirements have gradually been increased. In 1899 they were raised to require a high school diploma; in 1906, one year of college premedical training was added. In 1910 this was raised to include sixty credit hours and in 1928, to three years, or ninety hours. It is now recommended that a student obtain an A.B. or B.S. degree before entering medical school.

With the expansion of the Medical School the entering Freshman class was enlarged to include seventy-

five students in 1956. In 1959 these students reached the senior year and the Medical School was at capacity. With the growth of the Medical School the departments of Anatomy, Microbiology, Physiology and Pharmacology, Biochemistry and Pathology have expanded and have developed strong graduate programs.

Likewise the clinical facilities in the teaching hospital have expanded and a wide variety of excellent clinical material is seen in the hospital. Residency programs for physicians have been fully approved in Medicine, Surgery, Pediatrics, Obstetrics and Gynecology, Anesthesiology and Pathology, Consultation service has been made available in most of the various specialties. Postgraduate teaching efforts have been ncy programs for physicians have been fully approved in Gynecology, Anesthesiology and Pathology, Consultation promoted both on the campus and in various communities about the state.

in support of research in the basic medical sciences as well as in the clinical areas, Investigative work in support of research in the basic medical sciences as well as in the clinical areas, has been increasing in quality and in intensity. A large number of grants in support of this work have been given. Considerable instruction for students enrolled in other divisions of the University is given in the Medical School. The Nursing School has been graduating an increasingly large number of students to help alleviate the acute shortage of nurses. A Preceptorship program has been established. Instruction for training of technicians has been developed.

The major portion of all teaching for medical and nursing students of the University of Missouri is centered in the new Medical Center on Stadium Road. The Medical Center consists of three connecting units—the 441 bed University Hospital, the Medical Sciences Building and the Nurses' Residence Hall.

The University Hospital, eight stories high, contains the elements for both in-patient care, the offices, classrooms and research laboratories of the various clinical departments of internal medicine, surgery, the surgical specialties, obstetrics and gynecology, pediatrics, radiology, pathology, physical medicine, psychiatry, and related fields. The four-story Medical Sciences Building houses the administrative offices of the School of Medicine and the School of Nursing, the offices, teaching and research laboratories of the School of Nursing, the Departments of Anatomy, Biochemistry, Physiology and Pharmacology, Microbiology, Pathology, the Central Animal Quarters, Central Experiment Shop, classrooms and laboratories designed to accommodate one hundred students each. It is connected to the University Hospital by a twodesigned to accommodate one hundred students each. It is connected to the University flospital by a two-story corridor containing an auditorium seating 342 persons and equipped with modern audio-visual aids, and the Medical Sciences Library. Offices and laboratories for clinical investigation are also located in this connecting corridor. The Nurses' Residence hall accommodates 107 student nurses and three housemothers. It is connected to the University Hospital by an underground tunnel. More recently a powerful underground X-ray therapy unit has been added. An \$800,000 five story research addition has recently \$50 M

In addition to these facilities, the School of Medicine maintains teaching affiliations with the Ellis Fischel State Cancer Hospital in Columbia, the Student Health Service of the University of Missouri, the State Psychopathic Hospital in Fulton, the Children's Mercy Hospital in Kansas City, the Kansas City Receiving Hospital for psychiatric patients, and the St. Louis State Hospital in St. Louis. Other teaching affiliations can be consummated by special arrangements including the preceptorships in smaller and rural communities of the state of Missouri during the senior year in medical training.

In addressing the members of the Missouri State Medical Association on April 10, 1956, President Elmer Ellis (first University President to do so) reviewed the history of the Medical School and outlined the functions, goals and services of your Medical School in an address entitled, "What the University of Missouri School of Medicine Should Mean to the State." He concluded by stating, "The most vital factor in the success of the University of Missouri's School of Medicine in the next decade will be the degree to which it is able to deserve the enthusiastic support and the full co-operation of the practicing physicians in the state. A good medical education is expensive—far more expensive than the public realizes. Probably only physicians and medical educators realize the long and difficult and expensive preparation necessary for the practice of modern medicine. It is going to require considerable work on the part of a great many people if the new school of Medicine receives the kind of support that is absolutely essential to the kind of program, the state desires and deserves. For that kind of understanding we look confidently to the Medical program the state desires and deserves. For that kind of understanding we look confidently to the Medical Association of the state as partners with us in this enterprise.

With two distinguished medical schools in the state already, and at least one in a nearby state, which supply a great many of our physicians, a new school must necessarily fit in and accommodate its program to the needs of the state that are not now being adequately met. That is the primary function of the medical school at the University of Missouri.

The message I want to leave with you tonight is the plea for your co-operation in this program. Without your help we cannot succeed; with your help we cannot fail."

On November 10, 1956, the Medical Center was formally dedicated.





The Green of Medicine

At graduation ceremonies spectators and participants alike recognize green as the color of medicine. This now a generally accepted relationship, but its origin is shrouded in mystery. Indeed, green is an ambivalent color.

To the Pleistocene Cro-Magnon man green had a religious quality and small stones of this color were often placed between the teeth of the dead. In Pre-Dynastic times (5000 B.C.) the Egyptians worked out an elaborate sequence of events that connected green with immortality. Immortality means prolonged good health and this belief may well have exerted an influence on the selection of green as the color of medicine. Some ancient peoples even used green ointments to treat sores and wounds. According to the Egyptians stars dropped tears of malachite (the source of the first green dye and paint) into the pools which fed the Nile for its annual life-giving floods. Horus, the Immortal God, was directly associated with this process. When the waters of the Nile rise each year they take on a green appearance for several days. The present green of medicine undoubtedly also has some connection with the symbolism for faith, hope, promise, and resurrection. Dante referred, in the "Paradiso", to the disappearance of green when he reached his goal because in Heaven all desires are fulfilled. However, green has sometimes been looked upon as the color of the devil, and many stories from Asian and European mythologies emphasize this. Scottish lore is rife with examples of green bringing misfortune with it.

Academic robes developed from those used by the Church. On the Continent and in Great Britain a gradual trend toward color drew the academic robes away from the early clerical black. No set pattern is apparent. Doctors of theology were wearing green at several universities in the Fifteenth century while Doctors of Medicine at Paris and Oxford wore red and those at Coimbra wore yellow, Yellow, through its connection with the sun which, according to the astrologers, exerted considerable influence on diseases still has some medical significance as the color used for warning flags in quarantined areas.

Interest in academic costume, especially in its color and form, reached a peak in this country in the late Nineteenth century. After several meetings of representatives from colleges and universities an Intercollegiate Bureau of Academic Costume was incorporated in New York in 1902. This Bureau, the recognized authority in the field, designated green as the color of medicine, and this decision was reinforced during a review of the situation in 1932.

New wearers of the green of medicine may draw (from the better side of this color "tree") several analogies with the aspirations of those who practice this profession. The color of divine assistance to the people, of hope and of promise, of prolonged good health - what better badge for a physician.


















THE BALLAD OF THE BREECH

The Medical Library, now in its 57th year, grew out of a gathering together of departmental libraries. The two major collections which combined in 1903 were that of the Department of Anatomy (from the old Medical Building) and of the Practice of Medicine and Surgery (from the Hospital). The Medical Library's first home was a room in the "New Medical Building" (McAlester Hall), with a stenographer from the Dean's office in charge. She was replaced the following

year by the first in a series of student assistants. Efforts were made in the next few years to strengthen the research collection. In 1907-08 the Library had a collection of 2200 bound volumes and about 50 journals. The Library grew slowly and the 5,000 mark was passed in 1911.

In 1921, for the first time, a full-time assistant was put in charge. Two years later the Library moved into larger quarters in the new extension to McAlester where it remained until 1956.

In 1932 the Library's collection reached 10,000 volumes. The first trained librarian was appointed in 1941. Two years later the collection reached 15,000 and in 1951 the Library had 20,000 bound volumes. The first librarian with a graduate degree in library science was appointed in 1951.

The Library moved into its present comfortable and well-planned quarters in September, 1956. The stacks have room for 100,000 volumes. The collection consists of slightly more than 32,000 bound volumes, and approximately 800 journal titles are received regularly.

The announcement of the School of Medicine in 1917-1918 states "A good medical library is also very expensive, but is necessary for the best work in instruction and absolutely essential for research." This is just as true today as it was then.

The future for each of you will hold many challenges including the opportunity to influence the future developments in nursing according to changing needs.

Faculty

The faculty of the School of Nursing believes that nursing as a profession makes a contribution of major importance to the welfare of society. It believes professional nurses are those who are capable of rendering skillful, understanding nursing care, carrying out the medical treatments delegated by the physician, and assisting with prevention of disease and promotion of health for all people. They have the responsibility of continuous direction and supervision of those who assist them in meeting the nursing needs of the patient in hospital and community; of cooperation with other health professions; of functioning as members of a democratic society; and of contributing to the improvement of the nursing profession. The faculty believes the experience of education in a university setting—which offers a variety of intellectual, social and cultural opportunities—best prepares persons to meet these responsibilities.

The faculty ascribes to the belief that education is a continuous process which develops the whole person through patterning the teaching-learning process to provide for progressive change in behavior. The ability to think critically, be self-directing and self-motivating are desired outcomes of such education.
