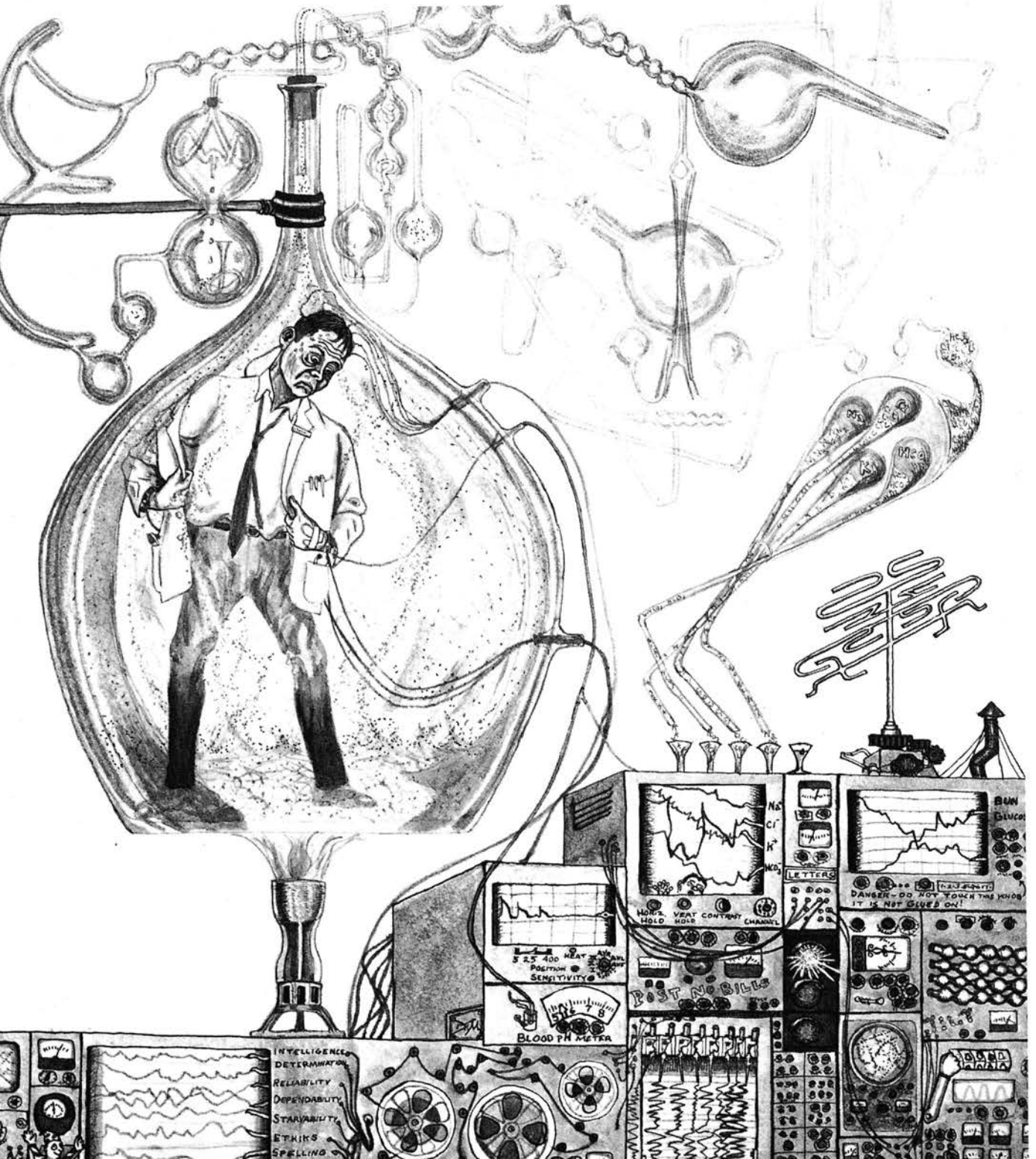

The editors of the *MU*tion, a distinguished journal of social and medical science, have long considered that research relative to the psychopathobiophysiosociological constituency of the medical student, a sometimes poorly appreciated species of Hominoid medinciensis, has been sorely lacking. 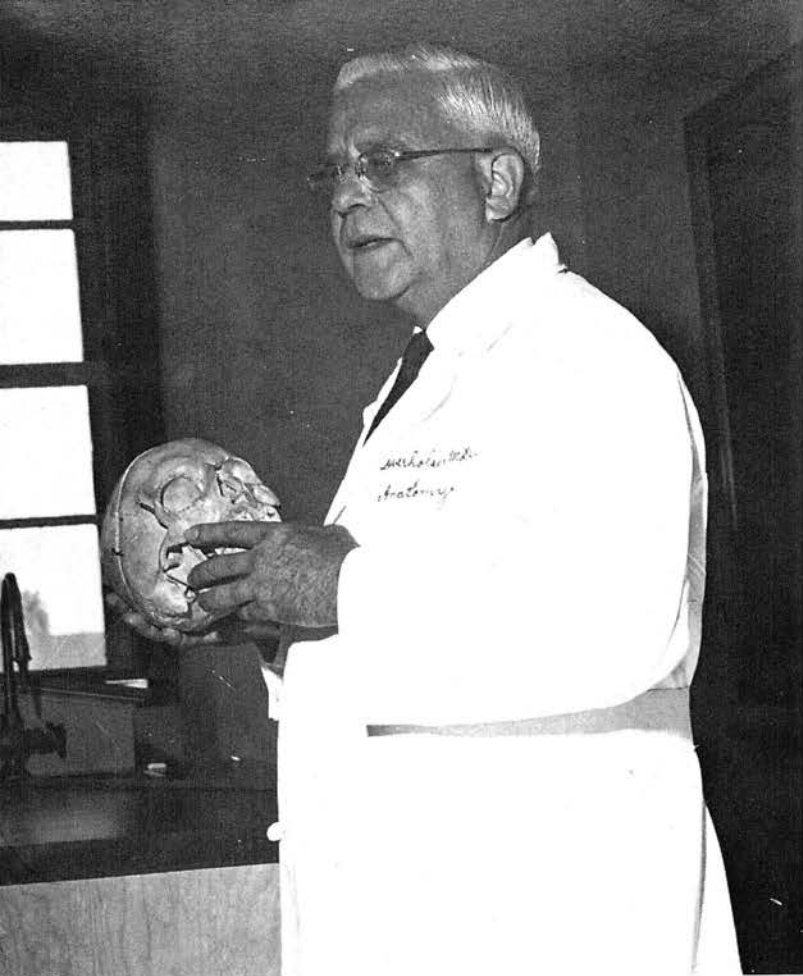

THE DEDICATION

... of this book is to Dr. Milton David Overholser, M.D., Ph.D., anatomist, teacher, scientist, administrator, magician, actor, and ham radio operator.

Associated with the University of Missouri School of Medicine since 1931, and Chairman of the Department of Anatomy since 1934, Dr. Overholser's name is one of the most prominent and respected in the ranks of the UMMC faculty. The son of a physician, Dr. Overholser was born in Harrisonville, Mo., on December 16th, 1900. He obtained his AB degree from the University of Missouri in 1923, his MA in Anatomy from New York University in 1924, followed in 1928 by his doctorate. In 1931 he obtained his MD degree from New York University and Bellevue Medical College, graduating with high honors and being named to the Alpha Omega Alpha honorary society.



Election to AOA was but the beginning of Dr. Overholser's honors and appointments. His professional affiliations include membership in the American Association of Anatomists, the American Medical Society, the Harvey Society, the Association of University Professors, the Missouri State Medical Association (vice-president 1941-42), the Boone County Medical Society, Phi Beta Kappa Missouri President in 1955, and Sigma Xi (vice president 1946-47). He is as well a member of the Board of Directors, Blosser Home for Crippled Children; on the Board of Trustees of the University of Missouri Medical School; a member of the State Anatomical Board, acting as secretary to this organization since 1933; and most recently, last year, he received the Alumni Merit Award.

In research Dr. Overholser has been active and distinguished. His bibliography includes 39 articles, the majority of which deal with endocrine physiology and the relation of sex hormones to the developing genital tract. In 1936 he published in the *Anatomical Record* a classic article on the effect of estrin on the prostate gland, contributing thereby the fundamental research that has led to the use of estrogen in the treatment of prostatic tumors. His more recent articles have explored the relationship of hydrocephalus to vitamin deficient states. These efforts, combined with his generally outstanding professional record, have led to his being listed in "Who's Who in America," "American Men of Science," and "Who's Who Among Physicians and Surgeons."

Nor has Dr. Overholser's career been solely one of single-minded professional accomplishment. Active in the theater since 1939 when he assisted in organizing the "Columbia Players," of which he was President in 1940, he has appeared in many roles as an accomplished thespian. In 1944 he took the part of General Benjamin Butler, commander of the Union forces occupying New Orleans, in the play *Little Vennie Ream*. His most recent appearance was in November, 1963 as Creon in Sophocles' *Antigone*.



Nor is his dramatic flare quite satisfied by the theater alone. Since he was ten years old he has taken an active interest in the magic arts, and was responsible in 1935 for organizing the "Mid-Missouri Mystics" and "Ring 8" of the International Brotherhood of Magicians. In the basement theater of his home he has held rapt many an audience (and many a medical student) with his ability of conjure substance out of air and, with consummate wizardry, cause its disappearance.



The wide range of his personality is perhaps best expressed not only by the breadth of his accomplishments, but also by the breadth of his acquaintance. Since 1947 ham radio has been yet another of his interests, and he counts his friends among the peoples of the farthest corners of the globe. That he should do so seems fitting, and to them and to us it is to our credit to have known and studied under him.



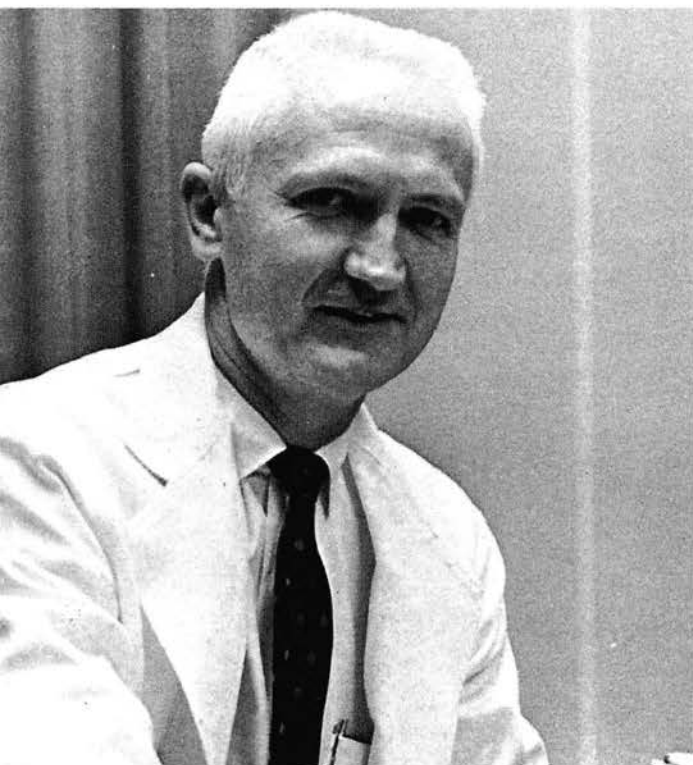
MATERIALS

The satisfactory study of the species *Hominoid medinciensis* demands a certain minimum of essential materials. The most necessary item appeared at the outset to be a large teaching hospital staffed with the best physicians available, as well as some 1200 employees acting in the necessary supporting role. By the time a roof was raised over the heads of these multitudes approximately \$15,000,000 had been spent, all of which had been donated, with the active encouragement of the state government, by residents of Missouri devoted to the progress of medical science. Nor was it forgotten that the donors deserved their just return; not only was the center dedicated to the study and instruction of the future physician, but as well to the actual cure and treatment of the ill, some 60,000 of whom are seen yearly in the out-patient departments, while an average of 7,000 receive more intensive in-patient care.

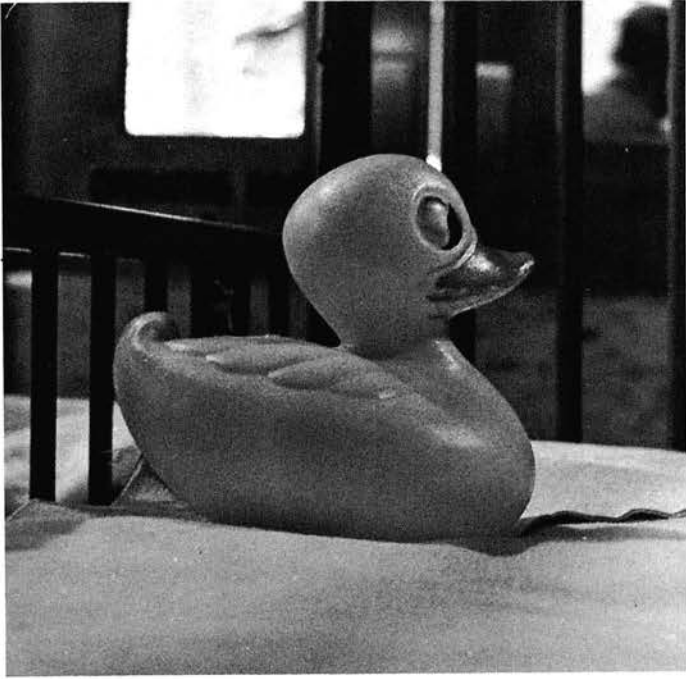
METHODS AND PROCEDURE

This group began their year with pressed trousers and crisp white jackets, a discrete idealism, a considerable savoir-faire, and a stethoscope 18 inches long or less. SUMMARY AND CONCLUSION



The development of the species *H. medinciensis* has been described. It is demonstrated that beginning from his inception the embryonic and fetal stages through which he must pass require a gestation period of some four years, at the end of which he is sprung into the world of his fellow man to fulfill his allotted function. That this gestation period is one of the most important periods in the total life of the organism is well known to even the most naive embryologist, contributing in good measure to his success or lack of it in the world of adult medicine. It is equally to be hoped that this appreciation may be manifested as an ever-developing expression, as the years pass, of the essential attitudes and ideals learned first during these four years, and that *H. medinciensis* MD may exercise his profession in the best tradition that his degree implies.

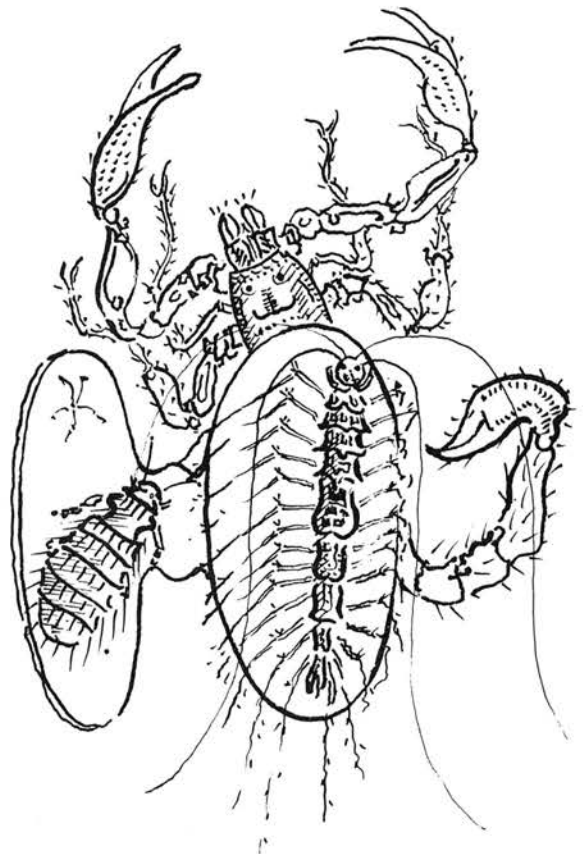
ULCERATIVE COLITIS IN THE MEDICAL
STUDENT: THE REPORT
OF A STUDY J. Ned Petard

It is well-known that most medical students are afflicted by an episodic diarrhea, dating from their admission to medical school, some in fact dating their first and worst episode from their moment of confrontation with the admission committee. That this is a progressive and relentless disease is demonstrated by the results of the following investigation: Some eighty odd students were admitted to the class of 1964, a number being forced to withdraw after

the first two years secondary to massive diarrhea, some indeed progressing to a stage of toxic colitis that precluded their ability to study effectively. During the final two years resistance had apparently been developed more successfully and only a few were forced to withdraw as a result of this condition. Treatment for this disease is empirical, the most efficacious prescription being massive doses of reasonably decent spiritus fermenti q. Saturday night.

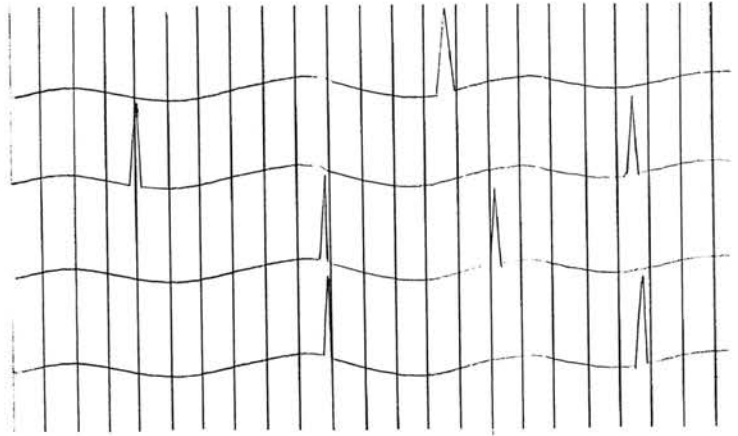
BIZARRE SEPTICEMIA RELATED TO
DOOR KNOB SAPROPHYTES, WITH CASE
REPORT S. Garp

The case is that of a 46 year old pharmacology professor who inadvertently came in contact with a door knob. Paresthesias were immediately appreciated over the palmar aspect of the right hand, followed by numbness progressing to a relentless pain, and three finger paralysis. Cultures of the door knob were taken with a "heavy growth" demonstrated of UDKS (Usual Door Knob Saprophytes) sensitive only to chloramphenicol. Heavy doses were immediately given, with the patient showing a fall in the hematocrit and a rising serum iron. Litigation ensued, and the patient's bone marrow responded favorably. The patient was finally discharged as ostensibly well, and strongly advised to avoid door knobs and to wear gloves at all times.

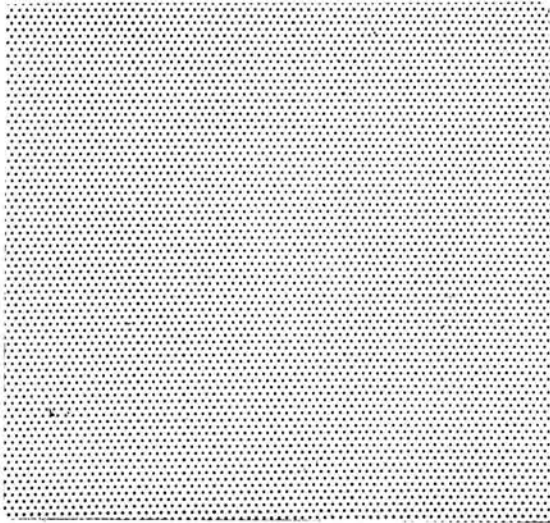


**PATHOLOGICAL NEUROLOGY: A
REPORT OF THE EEG CHANGES SEEN IN
THE NEUROSURGEON Mrs. Winer**

Previous papers have reported the presence of intracranial brain waves in the neurosurgeon, but definite proof has been lacking. In order to better clarify this difficult question a well-known neurosurgeon was carefully trapped, sedated, and an EEG performed. The rhythm was an extremely slow subvariant of the Delta pattern, consistent with but not diagnostic of the presence of brainy tissue.



EEG shows marked slowing with occasional spikes in occasional areas that are interpreted as occasional synapses.

ELECTRON MICROSCOPY STUDIES OF
ELECTRON MICROGRAPHS Neerg**

It would seem obvious that electron microscopy of electron micrography would increase the magnification of the original some 150,000 times and the magnification of the specimen some 22,500,000,000 (150,000²) times. Electron micrographs of the sub-endothelial basement membrane of the glomerulus were accordingly mounted, photographed, and the finest ultrascopic details revealed.

TREATMENT OF JAUNDICE OF THE
NEWBORN Van Leeuwenhoeck**

Jaundice in the newborn, usually noted as a physiologic phenomenon without clinical sequellae may on occasion be of concern to both physician and mother alike; the mother is horrified by the jaundiced aspect of her infant, and the physician must feel burdened by the necessity of ruling out more malignant causes of the icterus. In my private practice I there-

fore found it useful, after having initially passed a nasogastric tube, not to look at the child again during the first week of life, and to deny, as well, this privilege to the mother. By the end of this week the vast majority of icteric infants were free of jaundice, to the worry of none concerned.

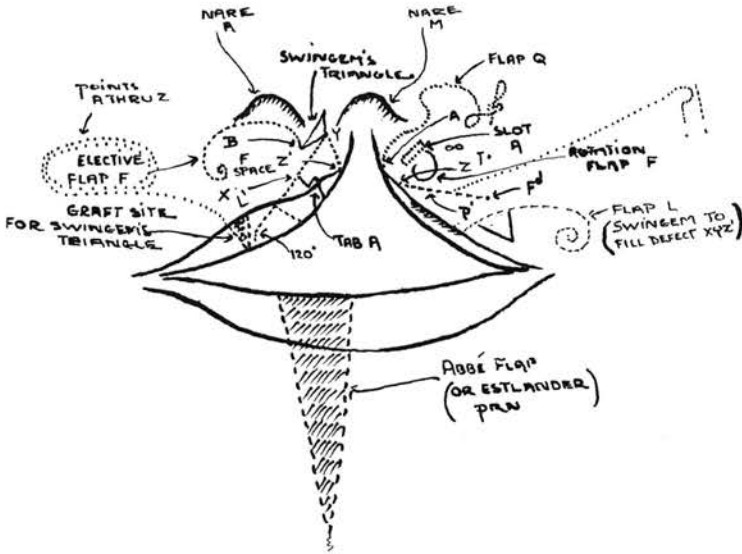
**ON THE USE OF STRING AND
COPPER WIRE IN THE TREATMENT
OF RHUMATOID
ARTHRITIS L. L. Gauntleroy**

Being impressed by the consistently excellent results observed in the treatment of rheumatoid arthritis by the wearing of string or copper wire "bracelets" the following study was performed. Copper shaving and string cuttings were forcefully injected

through a ten gauge needle into the joint spaces of 50 arthritics. Within one month moderate flexibility progressed to total ankylosis. Further research is planned.

SPECIAL ARTICLE

NEW TECHNIQUE FOR CORRECTION OF CLEFT LIP DEFORMITY H. Swingem



It is well known that there are a vast number of modifications on the basic theme of cleft lip correction. The present article describes a synthesis, long needed, combining the best of the plastic surgeon's techniques, and should render all further researches into the matter superfluous if not impossible. The method illustrated utilizes a multitude of flaps and incisions suitable to delight any plastic surgeon. The important essentials for success are careful planning, an extraordinarily cool head, and five units of blood. As shown by the diagram point "Z," "Z prime," and "X" are the critical loci. Point "Z" and "Z prime" are very accurately measured 16.7 and 19.2 micra respectively from the mucocutaneous junction. The remainder of the measurements are self-explained by the diagram.

The exciting aspect of this new modification of cleft lip repair is that it incorporates all of the maneuvers of the plastic surgeon's art, so that the surgeon may display advantageously a skill and operating finesse sufficient to astound even the most cynical OR personnel. A variety of rotation flaps

may be swung from point to point, two Z plasties are mandatory with an elective third available, and either an Abbe flap or tubed pedicle may be used, as the surgeon chooses, to fill the defects. In summary it is highly recommended to the plastic surgeon for a most enjoyable morning.

MEDICAL INTELLIGENCE

CORRECTION OF PLATELET LEVELS IN IDIOPATHIC THROMBOCYTOPENIC PURPURA Looney

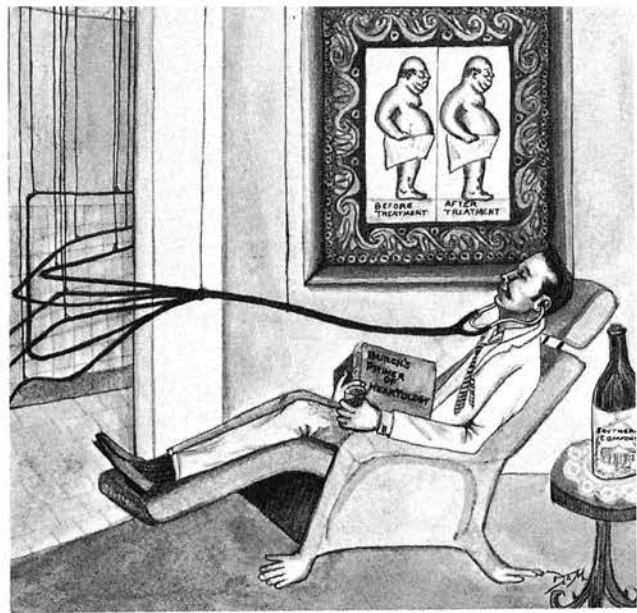
Feeling that the basic fault in idiopathic thrombocytopenic purpura is thrombocytopenia it was decided that an attempt should be made to correct this condition at its source. Ten M/3s anxious to pass their junior year were randomly selected and instructed in the techniques of microdissection. Each was subsequently assigned one unit of blood and instructed to separate the platelets therefrom.

After three weeks I had at my disposal 50 c.c. of hand-picked platelets which were administered to the patient with an excellent although transient therapeutic result.

Note: It is to be mentioned that this procedure is not yet satisfactory for the smaller hospitals, and remains only practical in the larger medical centers where skillful personnel are readily obtainable.

A NEW AUSCULTATORY INSTRUMENT OBTIATING THE FORMER EIGHTEEN INCH MODEL AND PERMITTING SIMULTANEOUS AUSCULTATION OF ALL CARDIAC PATIENTS Gnat Galloway

It has long been recognized that the physician must waste a great deal of his precious time employing the technique of individual auscultation. This new auscultatory instrument cuts auscultation time by at least one sixth. The device, as shown, is simply a series of rubber tubes ending in a listening device of either the bell or diaphragmatic type. All tubes connect with a central tube, which in turn is connected to the ear plugs in the usual manner. The physician, with a little practice, easily learns to discriminate whose heart sound is whose, which murmur which, etc. . . . and can thereby monitor or examine a number of patients at once. For better concentration it is found empirically that the physician is best placed in a totally isolated room from the various patients, preferably comfortable, most properly supine, and ideally with a fifth of a better bourbon. (Time saved by this method equals nine holes of golf.)

COMA IN A 118 YEAR OLD CIVIL WAR
VETERAN Wilson, Ray Lucas

The patient was worked up, and on the seventh day post-admission a biopsy was performed.

Differential Diagnosis:

Dr. Wilson: Unaccustomed as I am to clinical diagnoses I cannot help but feel that this patient was in severe distress. Was he?

Dr. Wilson: May we see the EKG at this time?

MUTATION'S ANSWER TO THE MERCK MANUAL

PETITE MAL



A disease with a benign onset which often causes the victim to minimize the symptoms until too late. Typically it is characterized by the delusion that two hammer heads are better than one. Tremor is an early sign and the victim may often be seen glancing anxiously over both shoulders as if pursued. Therapy is not satisfactory, but fortunately the disease is self-limiting.

GRAND MAL



This disease too is a delusional system, but a more aggressive form than petite mal, and capable of great physical and psychic trauma. Though students may contact the disease, residents are more severely affected. The victim typically will express extreme horror at the sight of blood, and may be found furtively stuffing sponges out of sight to avoid an accurate count. The poor sufferer may sometimes be seen at midnight wandering in a nearby vegetable garden.

EPIDEMIC



THIS UNAVOIDABLE DISEASE ALWAYS ATTACKS IN THE SECOND YEAR. AN INFECTION DOES NOT MEAN IMMUNITY. REPEAT ATTACKS ARE COMMON, FATALITIES ARE KNOWN. SERIOUS EFFECTS ARE LESS IF ALL PETRIE DISHES ARE INVERTED, CHEWING GUM DISDAINED, AND FINKS IN FRANK'S CLOTHING STRICTLY AVOIDED.

Also known as "administrative jitters," and "radiation hazard," it is a malignancy of the most fearsome sort, and occasions a financial drain by repeated attacks. This affliction appears with sudden and often severely devastating effect, seemingly from behind a dense cloud of noxious vapors.

GRILL'EM



ANESTHETIC MORBIDITY



This disease is prevalent in the 3rd and 4th years, particularly the latter, and is characterized by an abrupt stoppage of progress. There may be associated loss of sphincter control, and severe cases have lost large amounts of gluteal tissue.

There is no treatment and prevention is all important. Social factors need careful evaluation.

In addition, the lips must be kept tightly buttoned and a fondness for Mother's milk cultivated.

ENDOCRIN- OPATHY

Opinion varies as to whether this disease is acquired or results from a genetic predisposition, though most authorities favor the former.
