OCTOBER

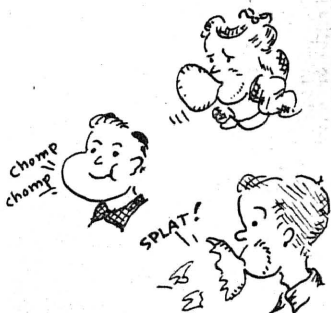
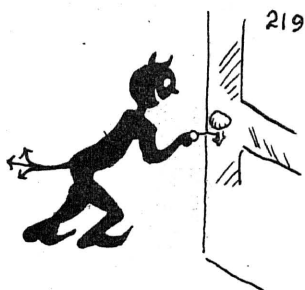
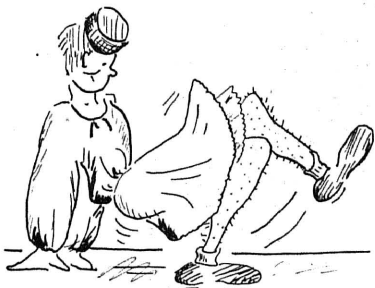
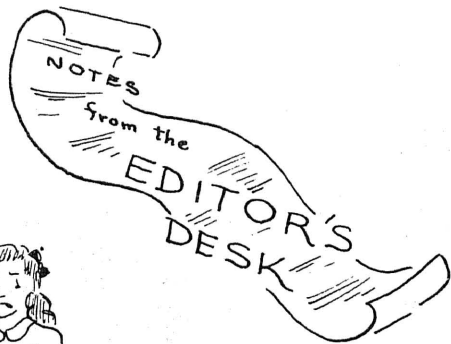
3. Everyone is back in their old groove again except a few morons who can't believe that school has started again. They are in for a surprise!!

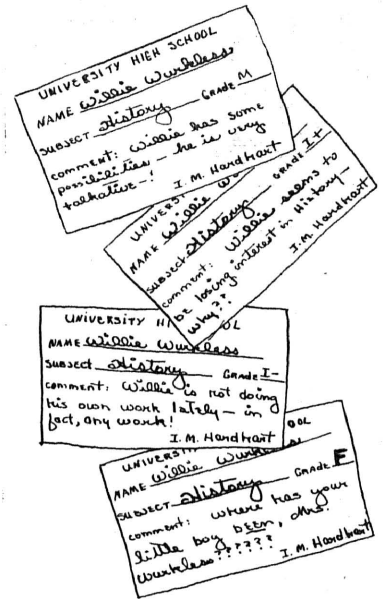
JANUARY

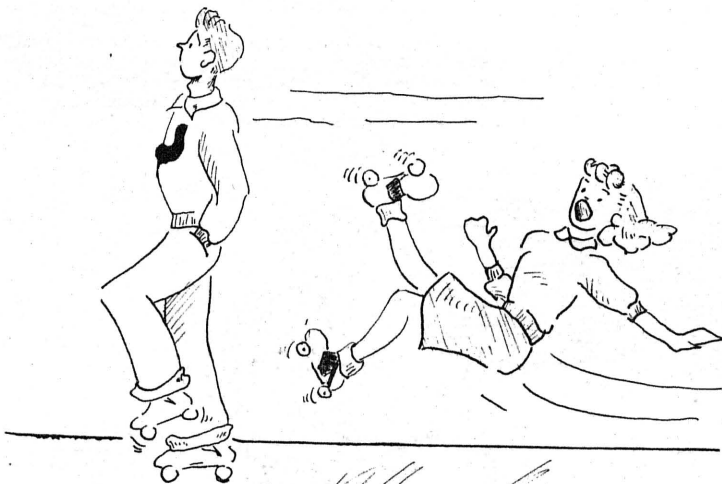
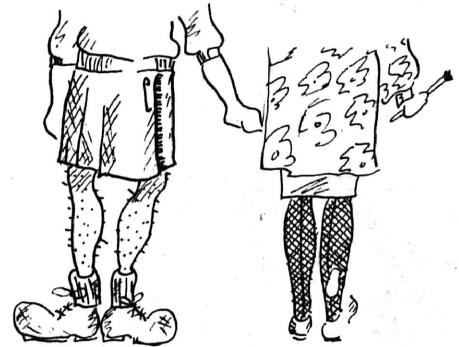
The Semester Ends---We're still trying!!
