Eighth Grade

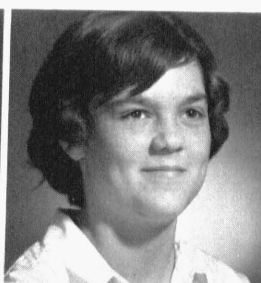

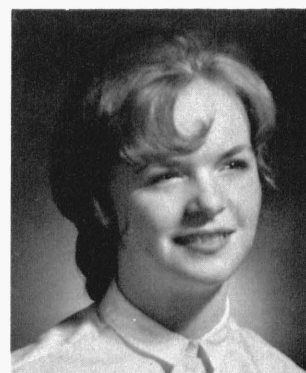
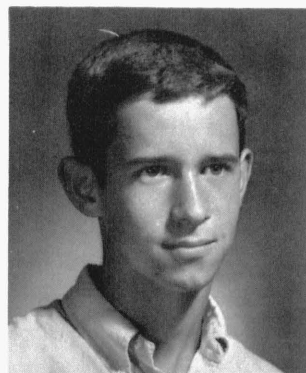
Class Officers

. . . Our Class . . . the Senior Class of '64 . . .

It was an obvious energetic spirit that marked the freshmen of 1961. They were out to get things done and imbued with an urge to do everything in a bigger and better way than ever at University High. A realization that money helps, propelled the class into a series of successful sales of bakery goods in the entrances of downtown stores. These ventures financed several lively class parties and activities. Through individual and joint effort the class gained more than its share of honors. The five Junior High cheerleaders were all freshmen, as were the Junior High Most Popular and Versatile. The Snow Queen's attendant, the Uesta Princess, and the Homecoming Queen's attendant were also freshmen. The class had members on the Junior High basketball team as well as the baseball and track squads. It was also creditably represented in the Honor Society, Student Council, Future Homemakers of America, mixed chorus, Tiger Tales, and art club, Girls' Athletic Association, and added lustly voices to the Pep Squad. There was one occasion of deep and sudden sadness for the class that year when one of its most respected members, Elizabeth Afill, was killed in an automobile accident.

As Sophomores, the Class of 1964 continued its extensive all-around participation in every area but developed a special interest and talent in athletics, speech and drama. The "B" basketball squad was flooded with eight of the boys, two of them getting status on the "A" team. One girl was a varsity cheerleader, symbolic of our active support. In speech and drama, several members bloomed quickly and brought back to their class and school, trophies and honors won at a number of major tournaments throughout the state. The class provided the female lead for the all-school play, "Ten Little Indians."

Success continued to be a class hallmark during the 1963 Junior year. The traditional Junior Class responsibility for the publication of TIGER TALES meant many busy hours reporting, editing, and typing. The class began the use of a new photographic process in printing the newspaper, which had the advantage of using one or more pictures with each issue. The honors of Uesta Queen and Homecoming Queen attendant went to the class. Its athletes shined on the varsity basketball, track and baseball teams, with two cheerleaders from the class. Its speech and drama representatives scored repeated triumphs in invitational and the State tournaments. The male lead and several major supporting roles in "Our Town" were filled by juniors. Participation was also found in the Student Council, Key Club, Future Homemakers of America, Honor Society, Girls' Athletic Association, and Pep Squad. The class gave a lift to its accustomed sponsorship of the Spring Formal by holding it for the first time ever in the Student Union.

Any Senior Class should display leadership and individuality. The Class of 1964 is abundant with examples of those two qualities. In many ways, both in and out of school, individual members and the class as a whole have worked for varied and unique aims. In sports, the two highest scoring basketball players, a manager, and four of the varsity cheerleaders are seniors. In social lines, the class takes pride in its successful cooperative effort in electing its Uesta Queen candidate and in bringing a new atmosphere to the Christmas Formal by presenting it at the Daniel Boone Hotel. Successful projects by the senior-led Key Club and Senior Girls' Organization as well as the diligent and skillful work in preparation for the Missouri Association of Student Councils Convention prove what a good and ambitious small school can accomplish. Two seniors are co-chairmen for the M.A.S.C. convention at which tiny U-High will be host to a very large and worthwhile gathering. Elsewhere, in the day-to-day participation of school projects, seniors contributed heavily in the person of the Student Body President and with members in every club and honor organization. Two of the lead roles in "Pygmalion" were taken by seniors, backed up by a number of their classmates, also in the production and crews. Team and individual entries scored in major speech and drama tournaments. The class, looking forward, will be glad for the year to end and for the more stern tasks to come. But they will all be sad at year's end, too, because it will mean parting from University High School.

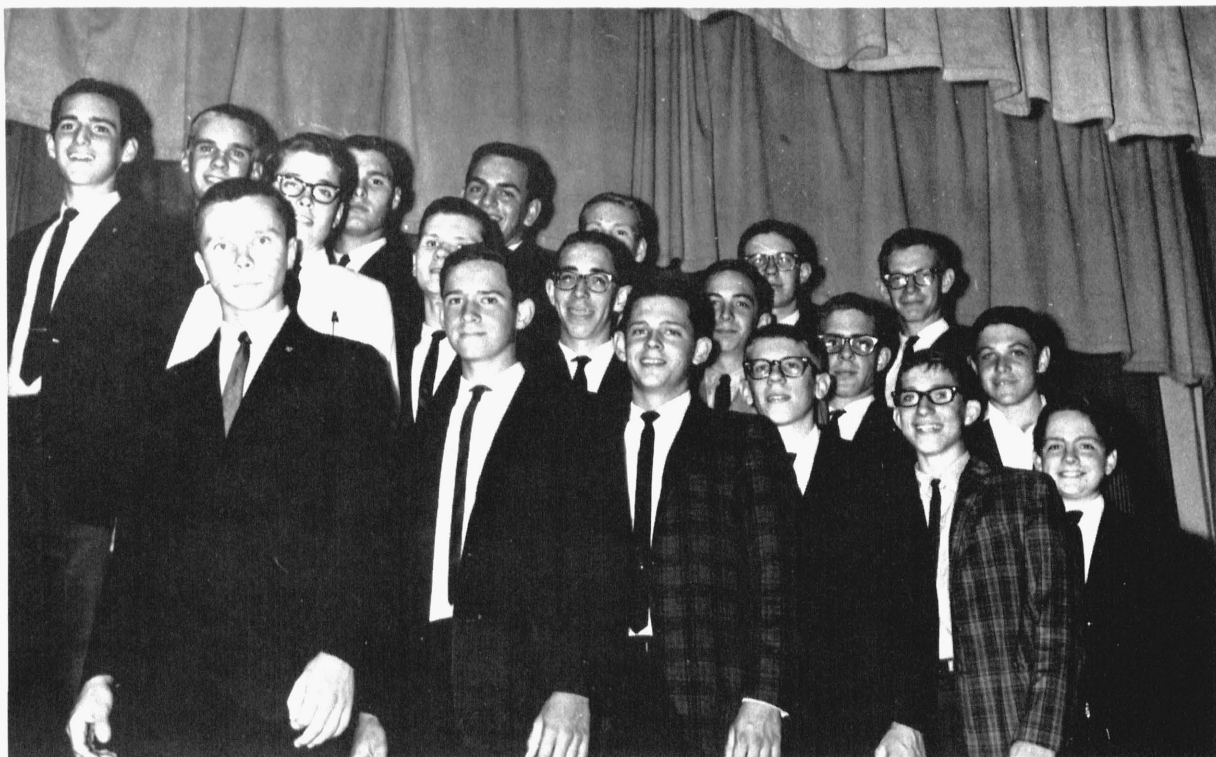
M. A. S. C.

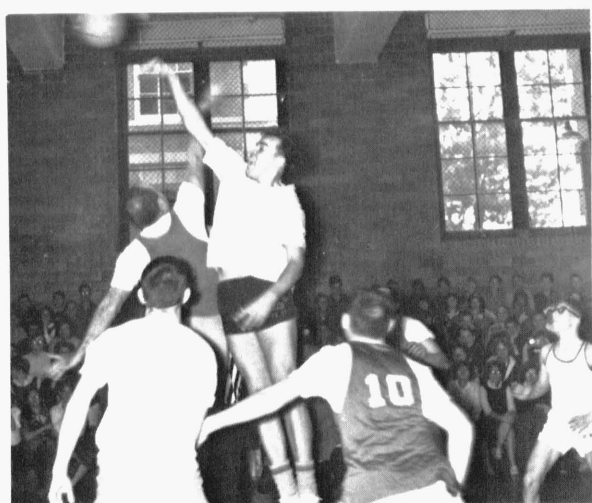
