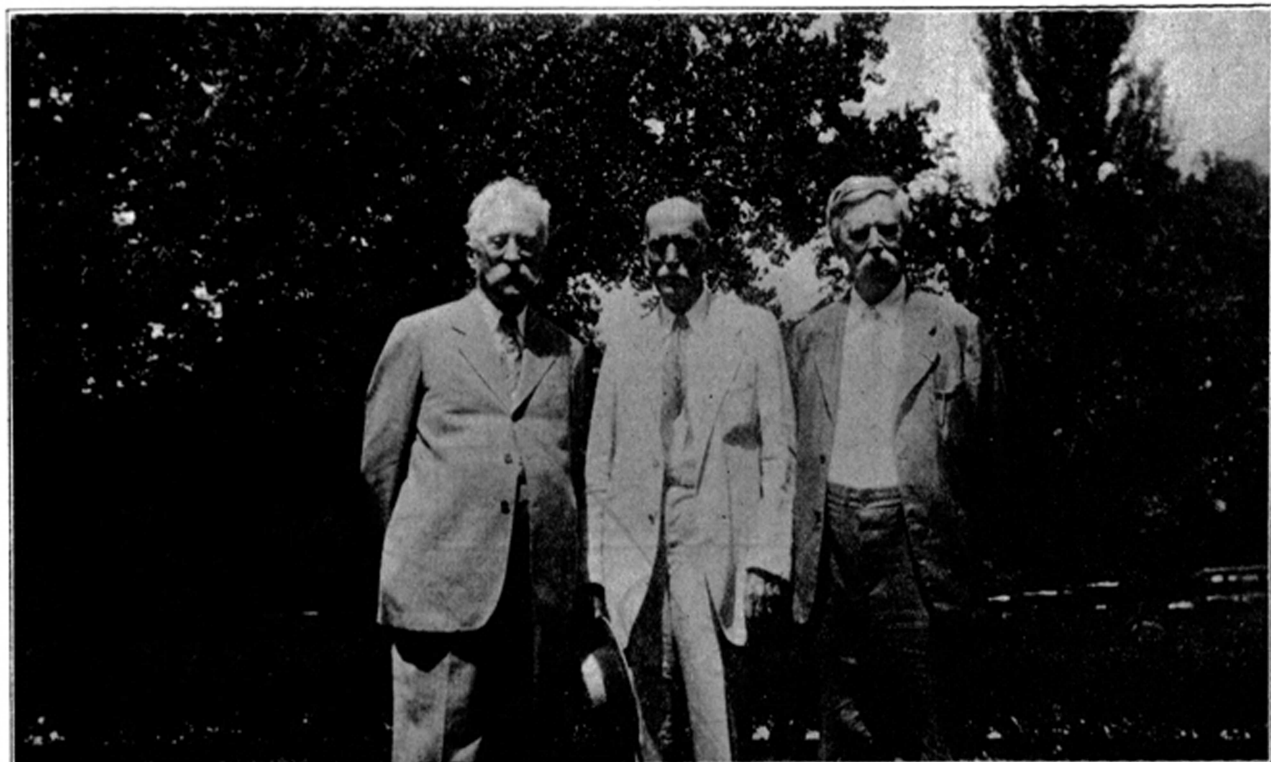

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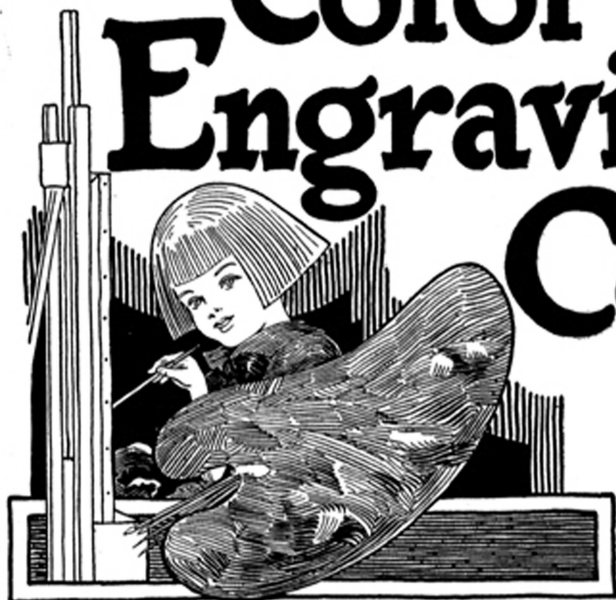

Mr. E. W. Stephens, the author of this article, directs your attention to the most constructive work before the people of Missouri. Mr. Stephens was chairman of Missouri's Capitol Building Commission!

The work of the Survey Commission which has recently entered upon its duties will be watched with sympathetic and hopeful interest not only by every alumnus and friend of the University but by all citizens of Missouri. The objects which this work is designed to accomplish and the breadth of its conception, in my judgment, render it the most constructive movement that has been launched in Missouri within my memory.

It was proposed by the Governor, supported officially by every educational, penal and eleemosynary agency of the state, and was authorized with practical unanimity by the Legislature. It has been heralded by the press without a single note of skepticism or doubt.

The law authorizing the appointment of the Commission and providing for its duties was conceived upon a basis of constructive statesmanship. It placed no restriction upon the Governor in the selection of the members of the

Commission except to provide that they should be representative citizens of the state and should serve without compensation. That, in itself, reflects breadth of vision and indicates the desire of the Governor and the Legislature that the work shall be done impartially and efficiently. The law delegates broad powers: It authorizes the Commission to examine into the management of the various agencies of the state to determine whether the money already expended through them is used with economy and proper results and for what purposes additional funds may be needed; it provides for an investigation of the revenue resources of the state to the end that if additional funds are determined to be needed a just and equitable distribution of the burden of taxation may be provided.

Governor Caulfield has appointed a commission composed of seven members whose character, ability and reputation will inspire confidence on the part of the people of Missouri in this important work. In his selection of Theodore Gary as chairman he has placed at the head of the survey a man whose public service and private accomplishments give assurance of a study of the problems involved, broadly conceived and forcefully and efficiently carried through.

The organization of the commission has been particularly well planned. It has been divided into three general groups, each in turn with a proper division of labor. In charge of the penal and eleemosynary institutions have been placed William R. Painter and Claude B. Ricketts with Mr. Painter looking after the penal institutions and Mr. Ricketts the eleemosynary institutions. The second division consists of the public schools with Mr. Fred Naeter in charge of the city schools and Mr. Langdon Jones of the rural schools. The third division is composed of the University and the five Teachers Colleges, the schools for the Deaf and Blind and Lincoln University. In this division Mr. Allan McReynolds is in charge of the University and Mr. Manuel Davis of the other institutions. Each one of these gentlemen is peculiarly fitted for the work assigned to him. The Commission, therefore, starts upon its labors under unusually auspicious and favorable circumstances.

The object of the survey is to find the facts as to the needs of these agencies, and if such needs are determined to exist to ascertain the most equitable means of meeting them. To these ends experts of national standing, of wide

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experience and of personal integrity and responsibility will be employed. Their work will be exhaustive and the facts which they ascertain will be accurate and dependable. Their investigation will extend not only to every educational, eleemosynary and penal institution of Missouri but to every school districts of the state. When, therefore, their reports are made and the Commission shall have thoroughly examined and weighed them, and a recommendation to the Legislature is presented, the people of Missouri will have the answer to the problem that has vexed them for many years. This movement is worthy of the keenest interest on the part of all Missourians and the work of the Commission of their active co-operation.

MISSOURI TO HAVE NEW FIELD HOUSE

Imagine what a thrill it was for C. L. Brewer, Director of Athletics, who dreamed about it and planned it for several years, when the Curators announced that they had voted to build the Field House!—D. Barton Robnett.

The action of the Board of Curators on June 15 in Kansas City unanimously approving the report of the Special Committee of the Board insures that the University of Missouri will have a field house as an addition to its equipment for physical education, general recreation and athletics. The proposed building, for which plans have already been completed and are now in the hands of contractors and which has been financed, will cost approximately \$225,000.00. It will be 260 feet in length and 160 feet wide and will be located directly west of Rothwell Gymnasium with a connecting foyer with the Gymnasium. The building has been planned after a very careful study of similar buildings in more than a score of middle western universities and after a careful study of the needs at Missouri. Jamieson & Spearl, University architects, have carefully worked with the plans. The building will be of native stone and similar in design to Rothwell Gymnasium and the new buildings on the white campus. The roof will be carried by steel girders so that the entire area of the inside of the building will be free of all obstructions. As planned it will furnish ample room for the entire recreational and athletic program of the University during the indoor season, and as a place to take activities and athletics during bad weather in the fall and spring.

The basketball court will occupy the east end of the building and will be surrounded by a permanent gallery and space for additional knock-down bleachers so that a crowd of 6,000 to 7,000 can be accommodated. The remarkable growth of student and public interest in basketball indicates that this ample accommodation for crowds will be appreciated by students, alumni, and

friends. For the past few seasons only half of the students were permitted to attend at a time and the public and friends of the University could scarcely secure admission at all. The main floor of the building will include a running track, two laps to the quarter with a 75 yard straight-away and ample facilities for holding dual or intercollegiate indoor track meets. The Big Six Conference has already awarded the Conference Meet to Missouri for next March with the provision that the field house shall be ready. The main floor will be of prepared clay and loam mixed to give a surface for the playing of any or all of the sports including football, baseball, track, tennis, etc. There will be ample provision also for all of the recreational sports of the Department of Physical Education. In many cases it will be the most used and the most useful building on the campus as it will undoubtedly be in use every day during all the sessions of the University and will be the home of the major part of the recreational and athletic programs of the institution. In addition to its use for physical education and athletics, it can well serve many other purposes for the University, such as an emergency auditorium for Commencement, and other large gatherings where it is estimated 9,000 people can be accommodated. It will also serve as a place for exhibitions, pageants, mass meetings, musical festivals, and other University activities which need ample space.

The building is being financed entirely outside of University and state funds.

The total cost is being provided by a bond issue extending over a period of ten years to be entirely cared for from the surplus from athletics receipts, and to aid in this financing, a field house games tax will be placed on all admissions to contests in the building until the bonds are fully retired. The building will be a distinct addition to the appearance of old Rollins Field. The 260 feet of length will be spread along Rollins Street, set back 60 feet from the street with ample entrances, parking and landscaping between the building and the street. It should be one of the attractive structures of the University, and in its appeal to others and its usefulness to boys and girls of the institution it will be one of the conspicuous buildings of the University.

The special committee appointed by the Board of Curators to arrange for financing and all other details of the building consisted of George C. Willson, St. Louis, Chairman, Milton Tootle, Jr., St. Joseph, both of whom are members of the Board of Curators; E. Sydney Stephens and Frank Rollins of Columbia, both members of the committee on Intercollegiate Athletics and active in the Alumni Association; O. M. Barnett, University Attorney, and Chester L. Brewer, Director of Athletics. This committee spent several months in working out all the details of the building and of the plan of financing.

"The board of curators let the contract for the construction of the Field House to Bethel & Son, Granite City,

Illinois, whose bid was \$164,000. Subcontracts were awarded to various Columbia contractors. Work was started immediately and the building must be completed by January 1, 1930, in time for the opening of the Missouri Track Season.

MEMORIAL COMMITTEE CONSIDERS CARILLON

The Memorial Committee is giving serious consideration to the purchase of bells for the Memorial Tower. The Committee owes a few thousand dollars to the Tower Contractor and if their appeal to Memorial subscribers this month brings about the desired and expected results the Committee will have enough money to pay the contractor in full and will proceed at once toward the purchase of the carillon. There is an insistent demand on the part of students, alumni and others here, looking to the early purchase of the bells. Everyone expresses enthusiasm for them and the Committee is eager to complete the arrangements for the purchase and installation.

The students have also been advocating the early completion of the Memorial Union, that is, the two wings adjoining the Memorial Tower.

Glen Degner, the student president-elect, has announced that the students are contemplating a final campaign for subscriptions probably during the coming football season. Subscriptions will be secured to finance construction of the wings. The decision by the students will be made when the fall semester begins.

Memorial subscribers are greatly pleased with the Memorial Tower and the Memorial Stadium. Every mail brings letters from subscribers expressing their appreciation of the work that has been done on these two Memorials. Every day there are many, many visitors among alumni and others at the Memorial Tower and at the Memorial Stadium. The Memorial Union and Stadium subscribers are proud of these two buildings and are happy that they have had a part in their construction.

Visiting alumni who desire to inspect the Memorial Tower are invited to call at the office of the Alumni Recorder for the key to the Tower. The Tower is not kept open for public inspection.

The Tigers play Washington University in St. Louis on November 8. Clyde H. Snider of the Mississippi Valley Trust Co., President of the St. Louis Alumni Association, is making arrangements for a big alumni meeting in St. Louis the night of November 8, to have the Missouri Band in St. Louis on that day and to make this one of the biggest alumni gatherings ever held there.

The New York alumni, under the leadership of their President, G. E. Huggins, and their Secretary, Oscar E. Riley, and their committees, are planning to have even a larger alumni meeting in New York City on the evening of November 15, than they had last year, when they had to turn many ways. Alumni from practically

every state will attend this party and game.

The Tigers play Kansas this year at Lawrence on November 23 and that of course, calls for a great big alumni meeting in Kansas City on the evening of November 22. The alumni and former students continue more than ever to have an enthusiastic interest in University and campus affairs.

\$459,000 HELD UP FROM UNIV.
FUNDS

President Stratton D. Brooks was notified by Governor Henry S. Caulfield that \$459,000 has been held up from University appropriations, including \$95,000 in the building bill. In addition to the above, the Governor vetoed \$50,000 from the nurses fund for the Crippled Children's Hospital as unconstitutional, held up \$22,500 more and released \$35,000 for the present.

Governor Caulfield ordered the entire building appropriation bill, carrying \$2,096,500 for new buildings at various state institutions and repairs to old buildings, held up until revenue increases. The items held up out of other bills total \$1,946,490. All of the

appropriations held up come from the general revenue fund.

The executive's blue pencil marked heaviest on the bill carrying money for support and maintenance of the state departments, taking \$1,077,540 out of the measure. The items cut were: State Fair, \$15,000; board of agriculture, \$132,500; Confederate soldiers' home, \$500; poultry experiment station, \$4,000; fruit experiment station, \$10,000; board of health \$102,940; food and drug department, \$10,000; Missouri Resources Museum, \$5,000; Federal soldiers' home, \$12,000; national guard, \$105,000; Jasper county tuberculosis hospital, \$20,000; fund commission, \$20,000; educational department, \$354,000, including \$275,000 from the teachers' training course aid; library commission, \$2,500; Missouri Valley Improvement Association, \$10,000; naval reserve, \$6,600; department of labor, \$3,600; workmen's compensation, \$75,000; Black and St. Francis river commission, \$10,000; American Royal Livestock Show, \$10,000; national dairy show, \$10,000; crippled children's work, \$22,500; and state auditor's office, \$3,600.

The bill carrying about seven million dollars for educational institutions was trimmed of items totalling \$541,300, of which \$364,000 was in the appropriation for the University of Missouri. The Northeast State Teacher's College at Kirksville lost \$15,000; the School of Mines at Rolla \$112,000; Southeast State Teachers' College, Cape Girardeau, \$5,000; Central Teachers' College, Warrensburg, \$5,000; School for Deaf at Fulton, \$12,000; and Lincoln University, Jefferson City, \$28,000.

Holdups in the eleemosynary bill totalled \$113,150; in the bill for support of penal institutions, \$211,500, and in the civil salary list, \$3,000.

The legislature appropriated, out of the general revenue, according to Senator Painter, chairman of the Senate appropriations committee, \$21,812,129, exclusive of the one-third which will go to the public schools. The holdups will cut the money available now to state agencies to about seven-tenths and a half million dollars.

All items held up by the governor were reviewed by the state tax commission, which also prepares the state budget as well as with the department heads to which the funds were appropriated.

A new University enrollment record was established with the announcement that 301 candidates will receive degrees at Summer Session Commencement on August 2nd. A further and outstanding record is established in the fact that 134 of the candidates for degrees are seeking graduate degrees, 125 the Master of Arts and 9 the Doctor of Philosophy.

This is the record Summer Session record established this year. The other record being the record enrollment of 2023; the highest Summer Session enrollment in the history of the University. There were 1861 enrolled last year. There were 874 in the graduate school this summer!

Dr. Edward C. Elliott, president of Purdue University, delivered the Commencement address. Rev. Carl Agee, of the Christian Church, Columbia delivered the baccalaureate.

The increasing enrollment in the graduate courses at the University in recent years has now brought this institution into rank as one of the largest graduate schools in America. In addition to the 301 candidates for degrees in the session here there are nine candidates

in the Rolla branch of the University Summer Session. The total enrollment here and at Rolla this summer is 2482, nearly all of whom are Missouri school teachers.

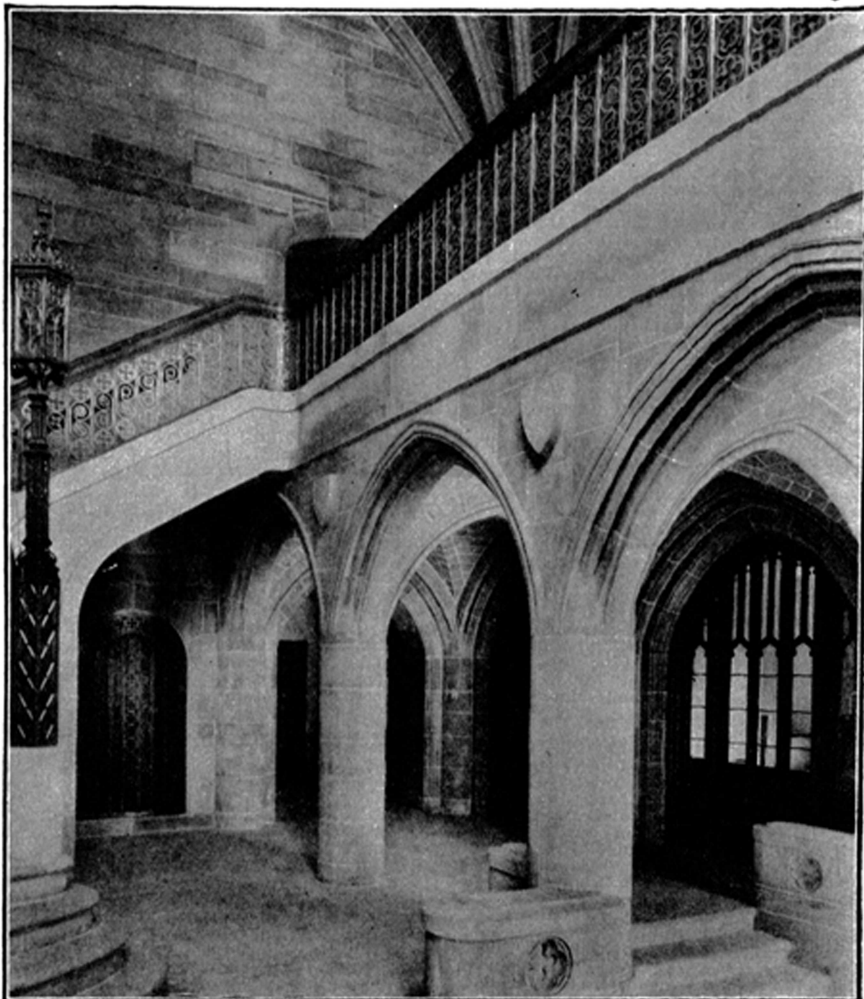
