This program continued for six and sometimes seven days in the week. Apparently he never thought of taking a vacation. For the past two or three weeks he and his men have been especially busy taking notes on over six hundred varieties of watermelons alone, and with numerous types and varieties of cantaloupes."

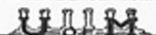

Another University Year!

The University was established by an act of the General Assembly of Missouri, approved February 11, 1839, located in Columbia June 24, the corner stone of the Main Building was laid July 4, 1840, instruction in academic courses was begun, April 14, 1841, and the first class, consisting of two members, was graduated in 1843.

Freshman conferences begin this year on September 10. New students register on the 11th, former students on the 12th and class work begins on the 13th. The first term two year winter course in Agriculture begins on October 29. The Thanksgiving holidays begin at noon on November 28 and close on Monday, December 3. The second two-year winter course in Agriculture closes on Friday, December 21. The Christmas holidays begin that day at noon and close Thursday morning, January 3 and on that day the second term two year winter course in agriculture begins. The first semester closes on Saturday afternoon, January 26.

The annual Parents Day dates have not been established. Mr. Hugh Stephens, Jefferson City, President of the Parents Association, will announce the date in the October Alumnus.

The Hope O' Tomorrow Club, composed of students in the University who are children of alumni, will hold its annual meeting and election of officers just as soon as possible. They will assist in carrying out the program of Parents Day.

Homecoming Day is November 24 when Kansas plays here. The football games at home are: Freshman, October 6; Centre, October 13; Iowa State, October 20 and Drake, November 3. The games away from home: Nebraska, October 27; Kansas Aggies, November 10; New York University, November 17; and Oklahoma, November 29. There will be alumni rally meetings at these places the night before each of the games.

Dr. Etheridge is a graduate of N. C. Agricultural College and has a Master's and a Doctor's degree from Cornell. He is a member of the Columbia City Council.

Eugene Field Foundation Supports Crippled Children.

Dr. Guy L. Noyes, Dean of the School of Medicine and Director of the University Hospital, announces an additional appropriation of \$5,000 from the Eugene Field Foundation for the support of the Crippled Children services at the University. The gift was made on July 24th, and is the second appropriation of a like amount and will enable the Hospital to carry on work for the Crippled Children until probably the latter part of September. This service is dependent for support upon aid given by the Eugene Field Foundation and other charitable donations.

The foundation has raised its funds for the relief work it is doing by a public appeal which is being continued in order to provide funds for the service by October 1. The service at the University Hospital was inaugurated by an appropriation by the state legislature of \$35,000, which has been exhausted and the hospital was faced with the alternatives of closing the service or obtaining money from other sources to carry on.

The Eugene Field Foundation for the Relief of Crippled Children was formed last winter for the purpose of relieving this situation and to aid crippled children in other institutions in the state. Its organizers and incorporators include men and women prominent throughout the state.

BEQUESTS TO UNIVERSITY

At the request of several alumni we are publishing a suggested form for alumni and former students and friends of the University to use in making bequests to the University of Missouri. In this connection you will be interested to know that not only alumni and former students but friends of education and the state University are greatly interested in making bequests to the University and these are becoming more numerous all the time. May it be said that the bequests are all welcome regardless of the amount. The suggested form follows: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Curators of the University of Missouri, as trustees, the sum of \$..... to be used by the Curators according to their best judgment for some necessary or desirable purpose in connection with the conduct of the University of Missouri at Columbia, Missouri." (Should it be desired to name some specific purpose for which the Curators are directed to use the bequest such purpose may be indicated in proper terms.)

SUE TO BREAK WHIFFIN WILL

Kansas City, Mo., August 4.—Two relatives brought suit in circuit court here today to upset the philanthropic provision of the will of James Whiffin, 83, who died September 17, 1927, leaving most of his estate in trust to aid ambitious and needy students in the University of Missouri.

The suit alleges that Mr. Whiffin, a Kansas City lawyer and real estate dealer until 1900, was not mentally capable of making a will in November, 1926, when he disposed of his estate, leaving minor bequests to friends and relatives.

The petitioners are Chas. W. Whiffin, a nephew, of Lincoln, Neb., and David Rockwell, a grandnephew, of Idaho Falls, Ida. Whiffin under the will was left \$1,500 from which was to be deducted advances made by his uncle during his lifetime. Rockwell was left \$100. The inventory filed by executors showed an estate valued at \$210,000.

It is alleged in the suit to set aside the provisions of the will that the curators of the University of Missouri and officers of the university used undue influence on Mr. Whiffin to have the trust provision included in the will, thus limiting the amount the heirs would receive.

Defendants named in the suit were Miss Janet Vanderwater of Greenwood, Mo., and Gilmer Meriwether, Kansas City lawyer, executors of the estate together with curators of the University of Missouri, the town of Greenwood, Mo., and a score of individual beneficiaries.

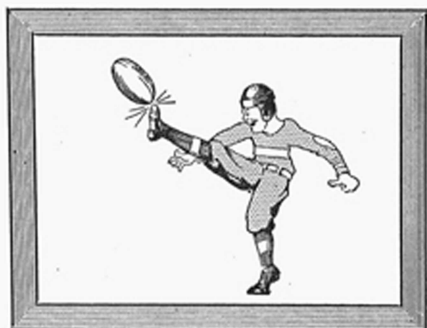

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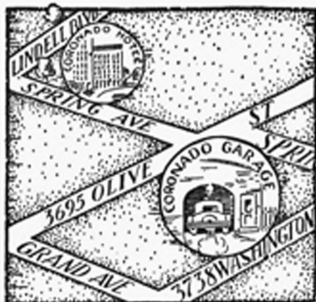

Dr. Howard wrote that the cause of the death was infantile paralysis in its most virulent form.

Samuel D. Gromer, PeP. '83, S.B. '89, Phi Beta Kappa, born at McFall, Mo., September 18, 1865, professor of rural economics, died on August 26 in a Kansas City Hospital.

Professor Gromer accompanied by his wife and four-year-old daughter, Helen Jane, spent the summer in Colorado and on their 800 acre farm in Gentry county. He has been suffering for several years from a chronic malady.

Professor Gromer studied at the University of Chicago, Chautauqua College, Harvard and Columbia University. He was at one time state institutional instructor in South Dakota; was commissioner of schools in Gentry county, Missouri; teacher of history in the College of New York City; teacher of History and Economics in the University of Missouri 1906-07 and returned here in 1913 where he has since been teacher of rural economics. He was treasurer and member of the executive council of Porto Rico and represented the United States there from 1907-12; was President of the Porto Rican senate; chairman of the finance committee, member of the franchise committee, and chairman of the Insular board of agriculture of the senate of Porto Rico. He was for a short time a member of the national tax commission.

Funeral services were conducted in the auditorium of the Agricultural building on August 29. The following, all former students of Professor Gromer, were pallbearers: Berley Winton, Elgin McLean, Preston Richards, Kenyon Harmon, Gerald Thorne, and Ide Trotter.

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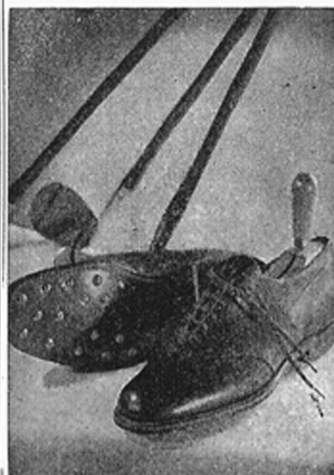

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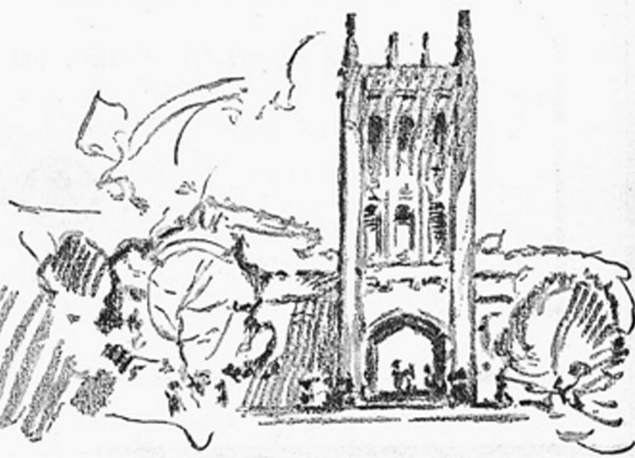
