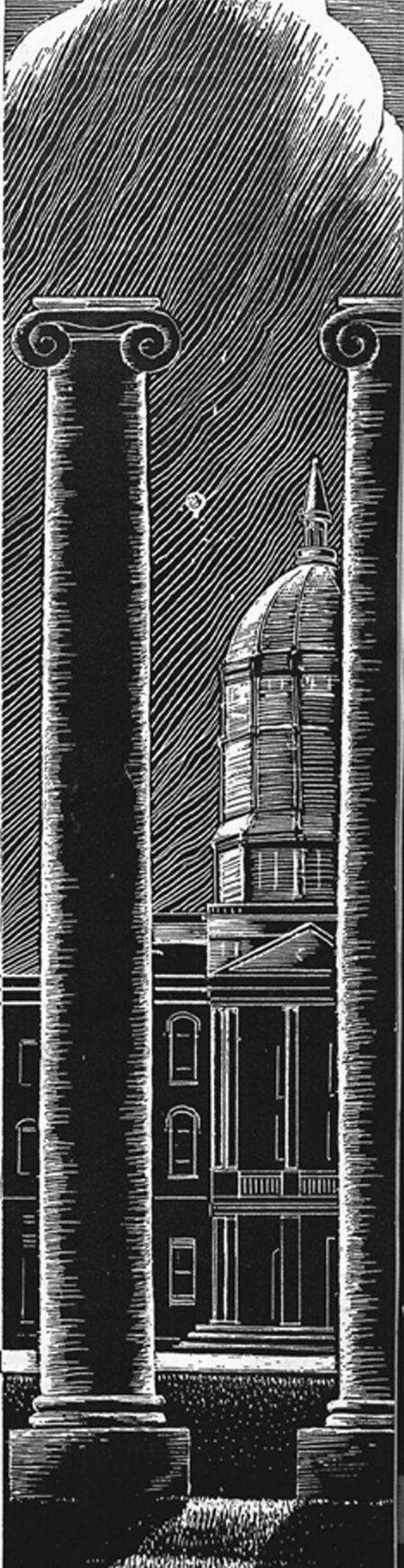

Fortunate are those who are affiliated with youth. For more than twenty years, for almost a quarter of a century, we have had that good fortune. We have been close to the students enrolled in the University. We have also been close to their parents during these years. During that time we have also had the pleasure and benefit of working with and for the members of the faculty and members of the University staff.

Then, too, we have had the thrill of working with our fellow alumni, some 60,000 of them, and we have worked and visited with them here in Missouri and in every state and territory of the Union, and in many countries of the world.

The members of the aforementioned groups are loyal, liberal and staunch friends. They are tremendously interested in the welfare and progress of the University. They will not permit anyone to attack the University. These friends would not for the world interfere with the administration of affairs of the University or try to dictate any of its policies. They simply stand ready to serve as good friends of their grand University. And they are ready and willing to be called upon in any emergency. Their support is ready when needed and called for. If the University does not get the support the University wants from these thousands of friends, it will be because the University does not call upon them.

You just can't imagine what a thrill and a pleasure it has been to work with these grand folks. They are the salt of the earth. They have been our staunch supporters and loyal friends throughout all these years. Their personal friendship is the greatest asset in the world. As greatly as we need material things, we wouldn't trade their friendship for any or everything in the world.

The University is more than one hundred years old. Due to the loyalty of her alumni, it is naturally to be expected that a great portion of those enrolled are children of alumni. These youngsters make up the membership of the "Hope O'Tomorrow," even unto members of our own family. They represent the second, the third and even the fourth generations. Early in our work we established the custom of writing congratulatory birth letters to the children of alumni and among other things we told them in the letter that we would count on their enrollment in the University sixteen or seventeen years hence. Hundreds of these youngsters come in to see us at registration time and bring with them the birth letters which they received.

We have watched them receive deserved promotions and advancements, we have watched them ascend to places of prominence and influence in local, state, national and international affairs, and we have watched them take their places of responsibility in administering the affairs of their respective businesses and professions. Never a day passed in our University affiliation that news gathering agencies have not queried us regarding the onward march of our students and our alumni friends. We have congratulated them upon the announcement of their engagements and on their marriages. There has been some sadness, too, as life-long friends among them passed on. We helped compile the Honor Roll, which lists those of our University friends who made the supreme sacrifice in World War I. And now we have been compiling, with the deepest sympathy and sadness, another Honor Roll of those who have lost their lives in another World War. Let us pray that we shall have the courage and hardihood after this war is over to see to it that we never have another.

To list the names of administrative officers and faculty members of the University, of parents and students, of our contributors, advertisers and subscribers, of our alumni and friends, and patient co-workers in the office, would take volumes. Sincerest expressions of gratitude pour out from my heart to all of them.

The decision to leave the Alumni office as a University staff member was the hardest and saddest decision that we have ever had to make or ever expect to make. Words fail us when we attempt to describe our love for the University and all that it means to us.

However, going into the new field doesn't mean that we shall drop our interest in and enthusiasm for the University. . . quite to the contrary. . . we shall be even more alert to serve Alma Mater. It will be in a different field, but in a field most friendly to the University. Our ties will be even stronger, for like every other alumnus, our loyalty and our willingness to serve never lags.

Even this may not be "30" for this page, through which we have kept in close touch during these many years with our army of alumni friends. We shall still be working for the University's interests at every turn.

So this is not hail and farewell. This is to say hail and let us all keep pulling together for a greater University of Missouri, despite the fact that all of us who have had the privilege of training in the hands of a great faculty under the shadows of the Columns and the tower and the dome of Academic Hall believe it is the greatest University in the world.

He is a graduate of the College of Agriculture; he has a Masters degree in Agriculture. I wonder how many know what tact, what patience and what perseverance his organization work involved; how many miles he has traveled, how many speeches he has made or how much

sleep he has lost in their behalf. I wonder how many know the extent and the nature of his work in increasing the enrollment of the University and in securing endowments. I wonder how many know with what painstaking care he has perfected organizations in many fields and how tediously, but cheerfully, he has established and maintained good will. Those achievements are among the immeasurables, but they are real nevertheless.

Yes, Bob Hill is one of Missouri's resources, but to the University he is as integral as one of the Columns or the keystone in the Memorial Tower Arch—except that he is a living and vital fixture. The University has been and will continue to be the beneficiary of his manifold qualities. Although he is severing his official connection with it, the benefits of his past services will go on, and those who know him and his works have no misgivings as to his continued devotion to his Alma Mater. They know also that in his newly adopted field of endeavor he will be equally helpful and successful.

Dr. Benjamin Minge Duggar, professor of Physiological and Economic Botany at the University of Wisconsin, delivered the Commencement Address on Friday morning, June 16. He spoke on "Recent Plant Science Activities in the Parade of Progress." The University of Missouri bestowed on him an honorary Doctor of Laws at the exercises in Jesse Auditorium.

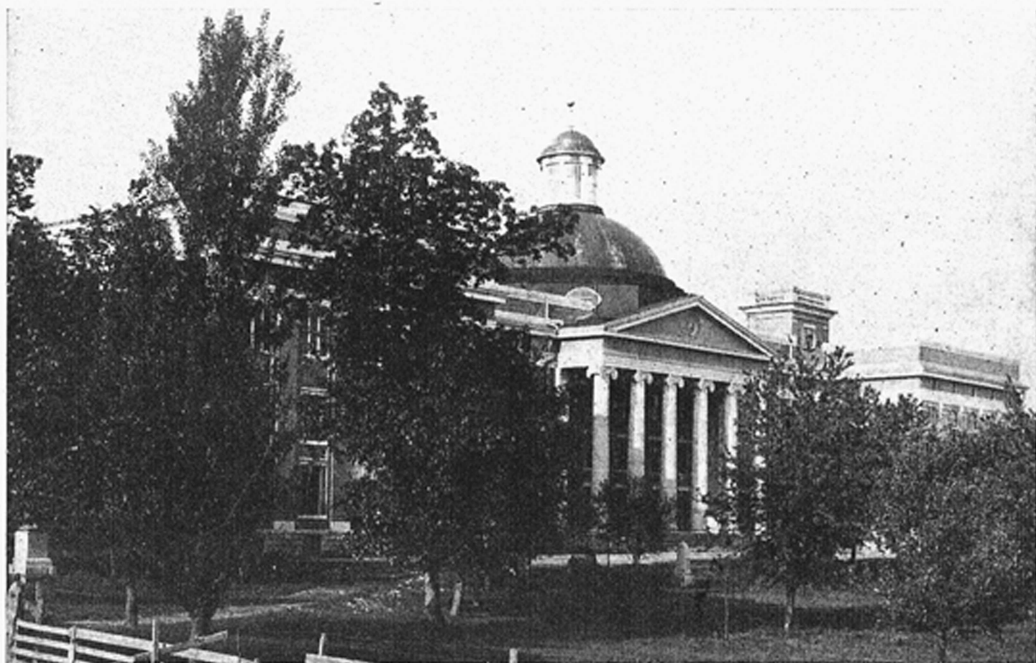
"The subject announced has been chosen in the feeling that it is well now and then to get away, as far as practicable, from our envelopment with war. To accomplish this in some measure, and yet select a topic of collateral significance, and timely import, requires some special emphasis on a particular field of endeavor." We are attuned to the cadence of war through

most media. "There can be no surcease of effort to keep before us the necessities and the totality of our undertaking. The impacts of physical science and technology on war and the impact of war on science and technology must largely dominate the unpolitical thought of the day and hour."

Dr. Duggar pointed out the "world transformed by science," not by law. The contributions of biologists to medicine and to agriculture, to industries through raw materials, such as rubber, plastics, and ammunition. "Particular and diverse aspects of plant science research that are contributing to the general parade of progress are in four fields: virus research, anti-biotics from moulds, gift of genetics and the rise of the growth substance concept."

"This parade of science effort has been passing the grandstand of your attention for the full period allotted. I hope you may agree with me that life with science—even a science that is not producing 'engines of war'—may possess some thrills and the recompense of satisfaction in any parade of progress."

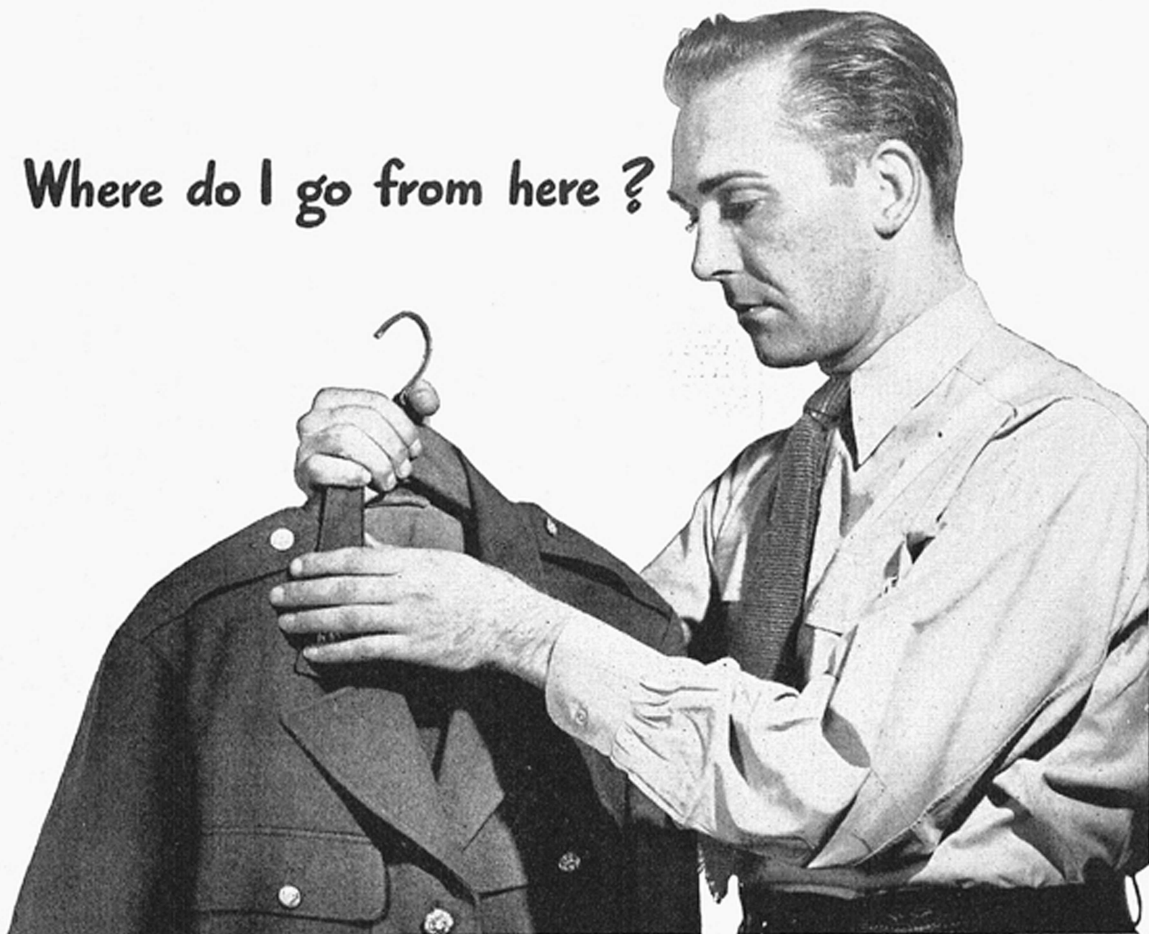
