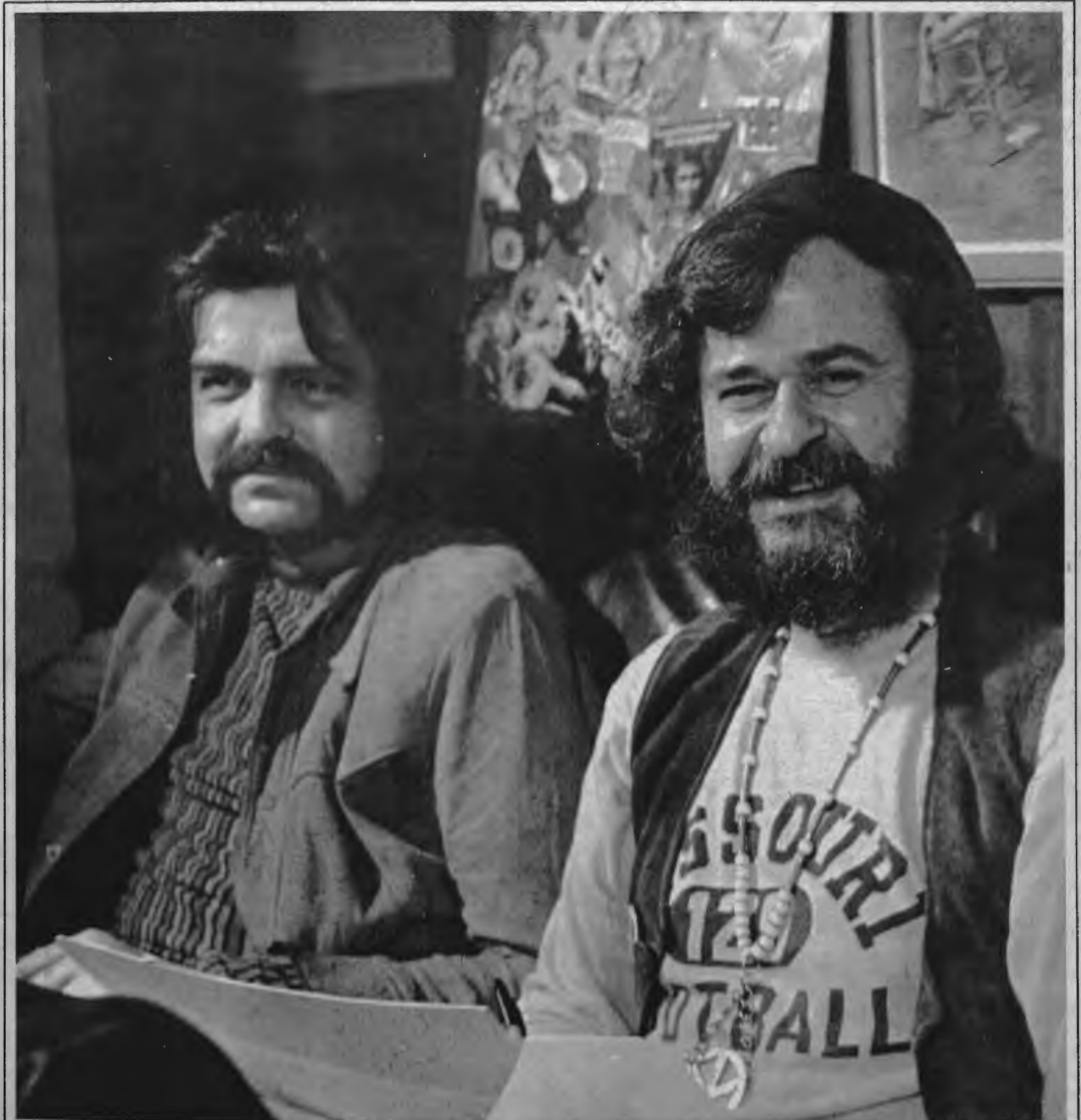

Heaven's a Big, Fat Pizza

The hamburger is in trouble. Its place may be taken over by the pizza, Larry Goldberg, BJ '57, the "Pizza King of New York," predicts.

Goldberg, 37 years old and a former Kansas City man, received his title last year from New York Magazine, which chose his pizza the best in the city.

"Pizza is the perfect food because you can do anything you want to with it," he said. "When the world ends pizza's still going to be there."

After graduation from the School of Journalism, Goldberg held 35 jobs, including a position with the Chicago Tribune and the Wall Street Journal, before opening the first Goldberg's Pizzeria three years ago in New York. The third will open this fall.

In June, "Goldberg's Pizza Book," was published. He hopes to follow it with an edible cookbook and a diet book, he said. He went from 320 pounds to 160 pounds by simply not eating fattening foods. "There's no big se-

cret to dieting," he said.

He went into the pizza business for a "giggle." He had been an advertising salesman for the Tribune and he knew nothing about cooking.

"I didn't like peddling ads, and I thought New York had lousy pizza. The pizza there is like wallpaper with red paint. I wanted a big fat pizza—something you can sink your teeth into. I'm like a Jewish mother—I want people to get full."

So Goldberg went to work trying to make a pizza he liked. For three months he toiled away with a tiny old range in his apartment. On Valentine's Day, 1968, the "perfect pizza" popped out of the oven. To help develop the perfect pizza eight airline stewardesses who lived in his apartment building and an actress, Reva Rose, patiently tasted and rejected the various concoctions.

Goldberg makes his pizzas upside down. He puts the cheese on the crust and the tomatoes on top. The butterfat from the cheese soaks into the crust to flavor it, and the tomatoes soak through everything, he explained.

One item on his menus is the heart-shaped pizza, a popular item for wedding receptions. Some couples even have their initials put on top in green peppers.

Goldberg has found it's hard to go wrong when making a pizza. He even recommends using leftovers if they're leftovers you like. But he has made a few mistakes, which he lists in his book. Among the goofs are peanut butter and jelly pizza, ham and cheese pizza and cottage cheese and catsup pizza.

One of his favorites is the Goldielox pizza, which he suggests customers take home for Sunday brunch. It has lox and onions. □

Family Doctor for a Drug Culture

Interesting looking," one coed remarked in what may have been the understatement of the day as Dr. George R. Gay prepared to speak to her undergraduate education class.

Dressed in dark orange pants, colorful print shirt, leather jacket and cap, the 1961 bearded honors graduate in medicine was indeed "interesting looking" as he avoided a didactic approach and held a rap session with students on the pros and cons of marijuana use.

This was one of a series of talks and discussions in which Dr. Gay participated on a return to Columbia last spring. The audiences were large and attentive, a fact for which his subject matter was more responsible than his appearance. For George (better known as "Skip") Gay talked about drugs, particularly the drug culture scene in San Francisco where he practices medicine at The Haight-Ashbury Free Medical Clinic in the Haight-Ashbury district, an area notorious for drug abuse.

The clinic, of which he is medical director and

chief of the heroin clinic and drug detoxification unit, serves a motley group of dropouts from the "straight" society who have usually shunned and been shunned by traditional avenues of medical care. The medical problems of this predominantly young population are compounded by the overwhelming number on hard drugs, chiefly heroin. Operating out of three buildings that were former homes or stores in the area, the clinic offers a comprehensive approach to their problems by providing medical and dental care, drug detoxification, and psychological counseling. Presently, all treatment is on an outpatient basis. For acute illnesses, Dr. Gay arranges for care in a state institution or sometimes enlists the aid of sympathetic private physicians.

His involvement with the clinic began with volunteer work shortly after the clinic was founded in 1967 and grew to a full-time commitment. In what sometimes stretches to a 12-hour day or longer, Dr. Gay sees drug patients in the afternoon

and in the evening covers the medical clinic. Last year, more than 25,000 patients were treated and of these more than 2,000 were seen for heroin addiction.

Most of the clinic staff are volunteers; Dr. Gay is paid a small salary as a public health doctor by the city of San Francisco. For operating costs, the clinic depends on public donations and various benefits, some organized by rock musical groups. ("Big Brother," "Creedence Clearwater Revival," etc.)

All this seems a long way from the medical career on which Skip Gay originally embarked. In addition to scholastic achievement, he was known during his medical school days for his work on "MUTation," the School of Medicine yearbook which he helped start in 1960 and for which he drew numerous hilarious cartoons. He was yearbook editor his senior year and these first editions set the style for subsequent "MUTations."

After completing a residency in anesthesiology at the Medical Center and at Boston Children's Hospital (Harvard), he went into private practice and later returned to academic medicine as an assistant professor at the University of Chicago. During another stint at private practice in California, he began volunteering at the clinic.

"I found myself going more and more often to the clinic," he says. "Haight-Ashbury offered the better part of two worlds—an opportunity to practice good clinical medicine and to express freedom in my own personal life and dress."

A change in personal philosophy was expressed outwardly as long hair and beard replaced the sheared and shaved look. His dress went from Brooks Brothers conservative to what might be called "clean hippie." His appearance, he notes, is a way of establishing rapport with his patients as well as a personal statement of what he rejects in the so-called straight society.

At the same time he rid himself of such affluent trappings as a Corvette and an expensive Sausalito apartment and moved into what he describes as a "funky apartment over a hamburger joint."

Perhaps, most important, his clinic practice provides personal fulfillment. The rapport with his co-workers, he says, is particularly satisfying as are

his efforts to help others understand the drug problem. In this regard, he has served on various local and national committees concerned with drug abuse; and lectures extensively on the toxicology, psychology, and sociology of the drug culture in the Bay area and throughout the country.

Then there are the patients themselves. Although drug addicts rarely express gratitude for care, he points out "there is a feeling among the Haight people that I am their doctor, so it is a kind of family practice. Also, I perform many acute resuscitations and it is very satisfying to bring these patients back from the edge."

The patient-doctor relationship at the clinic is one of the keys to its success. "Skip has fantastic rapport with the kids," Charles Sheppard, a 1971 graduate of the School of Medicine who spent several months of his free time working at the clinic, says, "Part of what he does is a non-judgmental approach: 'you want to get off drugs, I'll help you.' Not 'I think you should get off drugs.' Skip is very accepting of them as people and they're a culture used to being rejected."

Honesty is what is desperately needed in drug education today, according to Gay. "Drug education carried out early and honestly is the only way to get through. We need a concerted community effort involving concerned and honest education at all levels, with health and law officials working together. We've got to quit throwing drug offenders in jails. This can only compound the problem by causing criminal indoctrination."

The emergence of a new type of drug patient, which he labels the "middle-class junkie," necessitates new approaches to treatment.

It is this middle-class junkie—white and suburban-bred as opposed to the black, ghetto-born addict—that he treats in large numbers in Haight-Ashbury.

Through a government grant, he plans to expand the clinic into what he hopes will become a prototype treatment center for new forms of drug therapy in the country. Facilities for inpatient care will soon be available as well as a 40-acre commune outside the city for retraining-rehabilitation programs.

Homecoming Gets a Face Lift By Ken Stark

Sentiment, at least among representatives of the students, is clear: Homecoming—a 60-year tradition at the University of Missouri-Columbia—will change.

That bittersweet time of fall leaves and football games is about to have its face lifted. Students, who once tramped around the Columns with a cheer for Ol' Miz-zou, want a change of emphasis, including time to meet and rap with alumni.

Homecoming 1971—"Spirit of '71—Purple Pride Falls in Tiger Revolution" is the slogan—won't seem too different to alumni who visited the campus during the festivities last year or the year before.

In 1969 four Greek houses contributed the money they would have spent on house decorations to charity. And Romp, Stomp and Chomp, the traditional picnic-rally that preceded the football Saturday, was eliminated. For Homecoming 1970, several campus groups performed service projects. Some set up coffee and donut stands and gave the proceeds of their sales to charity. Others donated their time to service and charitable organizations. And the members of one, rather than build and operate the traditional huge decorations, took a number of underprivileged children on a tour of the sights.

The trend thus established was given impetus this Spring when the Missouri Students Association (MSA) Senate cut the Homecoming appropriation from an asked \$1,200 to \$250.

"There's no need for the same old flowers and pageantry," MSA President Chip Casteel says. "The students want to reach out to the alumni."

And a reaching out there will be for Homecoming 1971, Oct. 29-30 on the Columbia Campus. The Homecoming Committee, headed by general chairman Walt Koppenbrink, has scheduled a variety of activities to reacquaint alumni

with their alma mater and provide opportunities for discussion among students, alumni and others concerned about the University.

Probably the most significant change will be open houses at fraternities, sororities and dormitories after the football game. It is hoped these meetings will generate communication and understanding of the different groups' views about the campus.

A Homecoming reception, sponsored by the committee and the Association of Women Students, again will be set up in the Memorial Union. Each participating school, college and student group will have a specific station. For those who haven't seen the campus for a while, tours will be provided on Friday afternoon. To make it easy for alumni, buses will make pickups at motels and hotels throughout the city.

So much for the face-lifting, but what of the color and excitement that have been Homecoming at Missouri since 1911? The Student Senate made it clear that no student funds were to be spent for this purpose. And many living groups, in recent years, have switched to the service approach

for Homecoming. But Koppenbrink says the traditional event "should be a time for fun—for looking back, raising spirit and remembering, as well as for serious communications."

Without overlooking the value of service projects, he says, "Homecoming shouldn't be an excuse to perform them. They should be done year round." He sees house decorations as a kind of service to the University, the Tiger team and to alumni.

Since money for house decorations comes from living units that erect them, Koppenbrink is hoping many of the dormitories and Greek houses will elect to build them again this year. He feels students, townspeople and alums want the decorations.

But the lack of money could cause cutbacks in some areas. The frills traditionally associated with a Missouri Homecoming—flowers and the pictures of the Homecoming queen, trophies for house and downtown decorations and parade contest winners—fall in this category.

Nevertheless, Koppenbrink says, "We have been attracting some support both inside and outside of the University. We will put on the best Homecoming ever to show that people are interested and do care." □

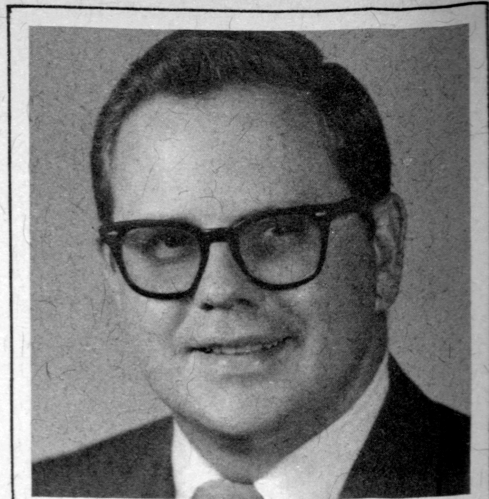
