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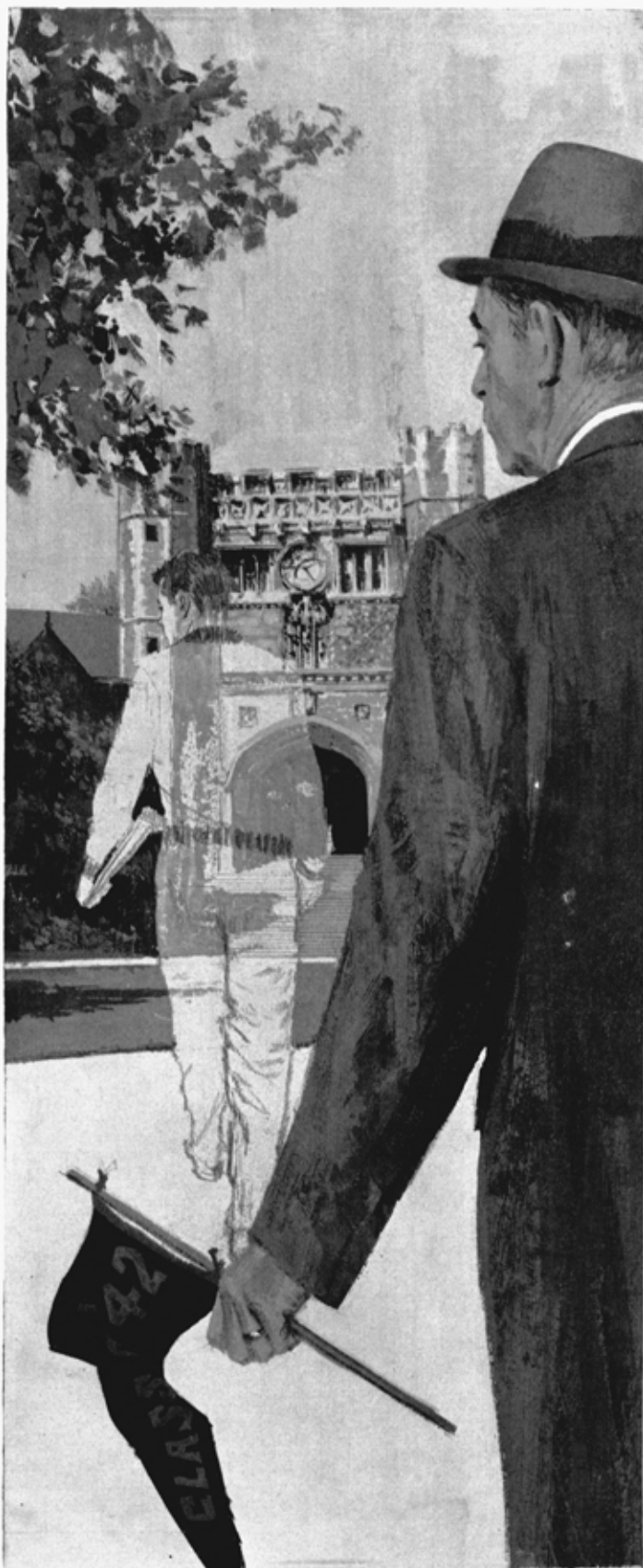

1963 Engineering Honor Awards

Missouri Honor Awards for Distinguished Service in Engineering were presented by the University on March 22 to three outstanding American engineers and a Missouri corporation that designed and built the spacecraft to carry America's first astronaut into orbit. The presentations took place at the annual Engineering Convocation in Jesse Auditorium during the 60th annual Engineers Week at the University.

The awards went to Dr. Harry A. Curtis of Knoxville, Tenn., retired director of the Tennessee Valley Authority and former dean of the University's College of Engineering; Dr. Ralph A. Galbraith, native Missourian who holds an engineering degree from the University and is now dean of the College of Engineering at Syracuse University; Dr. Curtis L. Wilson, dean of the University's School of Mines and Metallurgy at Rolla; and the McDonnell Aircraft Corporation of St. Louis, one of the world's leading aeronautical firms and makers of the Mercury Spacecraft in which Col. John Glenn made his historic flight.

Dr. Joseph C. Hogan, dean of the College of Engineering, presented the Missouri Awards and the citations; he also read the Convocation address of Dr. Galbraith, who was unable to be present because of illness.

DR. HARRY A. CURTIS retired as Director of the Tennessee Valley Authority in 1957. Internationally recognized as chemical engineer, educator and administrator, he had previously served the TVA as Chief Chemical Engineer from 1933 to 1938, resigning that position to accept appointment as dean of the College of Engineering at the University of Missouri. He was

dean here for 11 years, returning to TVA when appointed director by President Harry S. Truman in 1949.

Born in Sedalia, Colo., Feb. 16, 1884, he received his B.S. in Chem. Engineering degree from the University of Colorado in 1908, and his A.M. degree in 1910. He received the Ph.D. degree from the Univer-

sity of Wisconsin in 1914. He holds honorary degrees of D.Sc. from both Colorado and Wisconsin universities and an honorary D.Eng. degree from the University of Louisville.

He has served on the faculties of the University of Colorado, Northwestern University, and Yale University as well as the University of Missouri. Dr. Curtis also served as chemist with several industrial firms during his career, was chairman of the Division of Chemistry and Chemical Technology of the National Research Council in 1930-31, and was at one time director of research for the Vacuum Oil Company. He is a member of the board of directors of Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies.

Near the close of his deanship at the University in March, 1949, the students in the College of Engineering made Dean Curtis "editor" of the St. Pat's issue of *The Missouri Shamrock*, official student publication of the College, and the dean wrote and published a 44-page issue which he titled: "Saint Patrick Was An Engineer."

DR. RALPH GALBRAITH was born at Ash Grove, Mo., in 1911. He attended Wentworth Military Academy in Lexington and Drury College in Springfield, and then entered the University of Missouri in 1930. He received a B.S. in Electrical Engineering degree in 1933 and received his Ph.D. degree from Yale University in 1937.

Dr. Galbraith returned to Missouri as an instructor in electrical engineering for a year and then went to the University of Texas as assistant professor. In 1944 he joined the staff of Massachusetts Institute of

Technology Radar School, and in 1946 was named professor of electrical engineering at Georgia Institute of Technology. That same year he was named chairman of the department of electrical engineering at Syracuse University. He was made dean of the College of Engineering at Syracuse in 1951, and in 1958 received the added responsibilities of executive vice-president of the Syracuse University Research Corporation.

Dean Galbraith built up graduate engineering work at Syracuse to a high rank. The full-time faculty rose from 20 to 91, with 70 per cent of the faculty devoted to graduate instruction and its concomitant research. Syracuse also opened three resident graduate degree programs in engineering at off-campus centers in Rome, Endicott, and Poughkeepsie, N. Y., and over 800 engineers were enrolled for graduate work in these centers in 1962.

Dr. Galbraith has also served brief intervals in industry, and has served on a number of classified research projects for the U. S. armed services.

DR. CURTIS L. WILSON has been dean of the University of Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy at Rolla since 1941. He will retire this spring. Recognized as one of the nation's leading engineering educators, he is equally renowned in the profession as a metallurgical engineer, as well as an author and an exceptional speaker.

On Feb. 24 he was awarded the 1963 Mineral Industry Education Award of the American Institute of Mining, Metallurgical, and Petroleum Engineers,

Friends of the Library Annual Dinner

The vital role of books in modern life was stressed by the two featured speakers at the Friends of the University of Missouri Library annual dinner held on April 6. Irving Dilliard told the audience in Memorial Student Union that "libraries have the foremost responsibility for preserving those freedoms of individual American citizens designated in the constitutional Bill of Rights." Dr. Eugene Holt Wilson, relating the general alarm of book-minded people over the decline of reading, said that "books may be the one free medium left through which modern man can escape the pressure of contemporary living."

Mr. Dilliard, author and lecturer, for 33 years was on the staff of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch where he was editorial page director when he retired in 1960; he now lives in Collinsville, Ill., where he serves as president of the Memorial Library. Dr. Wilson is vice-president of the University of Colorado where he formerly was Director of Libraries and professor of library science. The speakers were introduced by University President Elmer Ellis. Presiding at the dinner was T. Hartley Pollock of St. Louis, president of the Friends of the Library. Other program participants included Dr. William H. Peden, professor of English, and Dr. Richard S. Brownlee, director, State Historical Society of Missouri.

The dinner climaxed a day of activities for the Friends: their annual meeting, a tour of libraries, and a reception at the President's House. Numerous Missouri notables were among the guests.

FACULTY FROLIC

In the spring a pleasant touch of madness comes over a segment of the University faculty membership. Professors esteemed for their scholarly attainments cavort upon the stage in song and dance. Their wives, some of them faculty colleagues, join in the frivolous antics. About 100 performers, a delightful streak of ham showing in their makeup, put on this almost annual production in which they spoof themselves and everything about them. The show climaxes a Faculty Fun Frolic (which begins with a dinner), and is sponsored by the Fortnightly Club, an organization of faculty women and wives of University faculty men. The audience that goes to Jesse Auditorium for this free extravaganza is regaled with songs, skits, solo numbers, and take-offs on such University topics as fallout shelters, nuclear research, campus personalities, elevators, the Library and other facilities. Anything worth lampooning gets lampooned, if it can be made to fit onto the rhyme of a parody.

What takes place on the Jesse stage has been calculated in advance; a script has been prepared, although it may undergo sudden changes, depending largely on the reliability of the performer's memory. The wonder is that the show comes off at all. Only two or three rehearsals are held, and on each occasion there are cases of absenteeism due to schedule conflicts.

Largely responsible for the lines of the presentation, both spoken and sung, was Mrs. Loren Reid, who is known to her friends as Gus or Gussie (for Augusta). Similarly, she was responsible for the production of two years ago. This time she had able assistance from Mrs. Amy Westveld, who was chairman of the Frolic committee, and Dee Ferguson; together they found humor in a wide range of campus situations. Gus Reid was also producer and director.

"Show-Me Showboat" was the background for the Frolic, which provided the setting for a minstrel show and allowed for a variety of specialties to be presented. Fred McKinney was interlocutor, with Charles Hudson and Bill Taft as end men. Ted Keats and Bob Brooks scored with their solos. Jack Matthews gave an energetic account of himself as one of the Cakewalk Caperers. Flo Waidelich (we're using the names that were printed on the playbill) did "St. Louis Blues." Perhaps the highlight musical number of the evening was the song about Ralph Parker being lost in the enlarged Library building; the audience joined in the lament. Robin Humphrey, Sandy Nash and Jack Jackson did a soft shoe number. There were numerous other feature numbers that were well received.

Running through the show was the plight of the Fortnightly Club searching for a regular meeting place. The quest was led by Fanny Fortnightly (Amy Westveld) accompanied by Newcomer (Lou Henry) and Interest Group Member (Nola Daniel). They were finally forced to wash their chinaware in the technicolor fountains on the Mall, having been cast out from various places by heartless department heads.

The Interest Group girls sang of foods, bridge and art. One song went: "Our cakes are gateaux, our pancakes are crepes, our tuna we cook with sour cream; And if brandy ain't handy to flambé hot dogs, we douse 'em with kerosene."

To the tune of Nelly Gray, Ted Keats got the show off to a solid start when he sang:

There's a woolly M. U. blanket on the nearby Hinkson shore
Where I've spent many hours I've not forgot.
Just a-sittin' and a-neckin' until progress took us o'er
And a Research Center stands upon that spot.
Oh, my grassy Hinkson spot, you have changed an awful lot,
And the 'dozers turn you over more and more,
Neither stadium nor golf course have the memories you've got
Of those banks of that grassy Hinkson shore.

And Bob Brooks pitied the professor to the melody of the Man on the Flying Trapeze:

He goes cross the campus with shuffling pace,
The pre-occupied man with the attache case,
He talks to himself with the gestures he makes
To emphasize points or mistakes.
This professor whose desk is unsightly
And who sits on committees for days
Is wed to a gal in Fortnightly,
So together they go separate ways . . . oh
Once he was carefree, but now he is not,
Like any professor, he's just about shot,
To try to spread knowledge and keep what he's got
Turns in to a circular phase.

Columbia's transportation systems came in for a bit of spoofing to the tune of Rosie O'Grady:

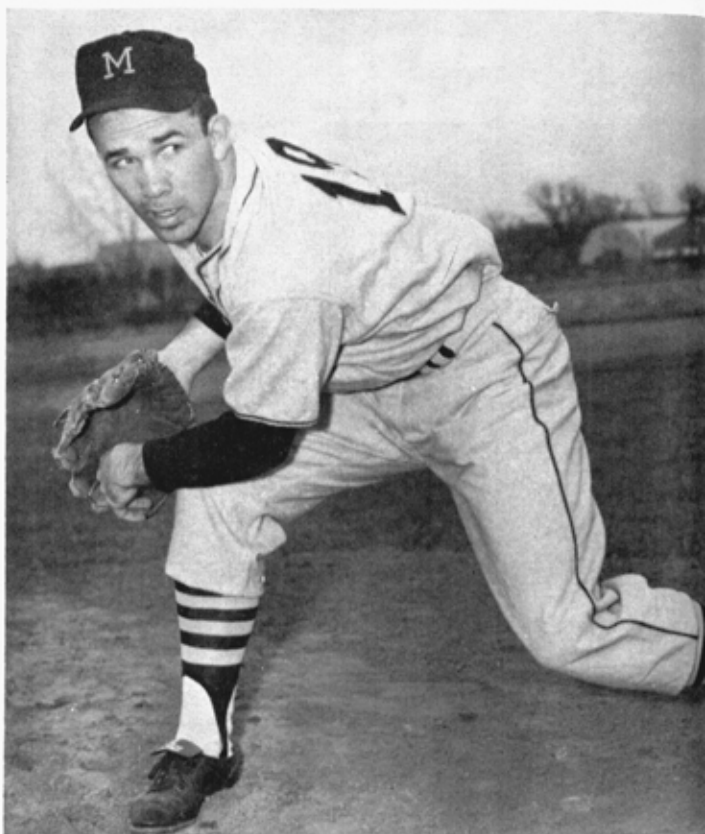
Sweet Cannonball Special

Promising New Stars Of Diamond and Track

Speed in a young sophomore's pitching arm, and speed in a transfer miler's wiry legs provided the banner news on Missouri's sports front during April.

The hot item in baseball was Jack Stroud, a rookie smokeballer from Albuquerque, N. M. Midway through the 1963 Big Eight race, the nifty lefty had bagged 61 strikeouts in 34 innings—and a 3-0 record. He had his bumper game against Colorado, fanning 20 Buffalo batters for a school record.

On the track, Robin Lingle—unheralded in a fast field at the Kansas Relays—won the Glenn Cunningham mile, kicking home in 4:04.8 to defeat John Camien, the Texas Relays champion from Emporia State.

These, indeed, were thrilling blue-chip performances by a pair of new heroes on the M. U. athletic scene.

Stroud's brilliant start, of course, kindled Mizzou's hopes for a repeat conference title—and return to the College World Series at Omaha in June. Trailing Oklahoma (9-0) in the league race, Mizzou had an 8-1 record—with the lone setback a 1-0 loss to Oklahoma State.

The Tigers and Sooners play their showdown series in Columbia on May 3-4.

Overall, Coach John "Hi" Simmons' club jumped off to a 12-3 start behind the strong pitching of veterans Larry Bohannon, Rich Peterson and reliever Jim Card—along with sophomores Stroud and Keith Weber.

At the plate, outfielder Gary Woods led M. U.'s hitters with a .469 mark—followed by the Sevcik twins. Catcher John owned a hefty .442 average, while outfielder Jim was third at .345.

Some posers in football

Who'll quarterback Missouri's football team this fall? What do the line replacements look like? How do the Tigers compare offensively with last year's Bluebonnet bowl champions?

On May 4 in Memorial Stadium, the quizzical M. U. fan ought to come away with a few definite answers or impressions about the Bengals' prospects for 1963. So, too, for that matter will Coach Dan Devine and his staff who'll be eyewitnesses to the final spring intra-squad game.

As in recent years, M. U.'s No. 1 and No. 4 units will be the nucleus of one squad—opposing the No. 2 and No. 3 outfits.

Newcomer Gary Lane, who quarterbacked for the scouting team last year, appears set to lead a first-string backfield that will have Vince Turner and Gerald Stevenson, halfbacks, and Paul Underhill, fullback.

Lane and Mike Jones, a junior-to-be, were regarded as leading contenders for Jim Johnson's vacated job until Jones damaged a knee this spring, necessitating surgery. Another seasoned quarterback, Daryl Krug-

Approximately ten big league scouts watched Missouri sweep three games from previously-unbeaten Colorado in Columbia—21-7, 7-1 and 9-0. Many of them, on hand obviously to watch Stroud—after the rookie's successive two-hit and three-hit wins over Oklahoma State and Iowa State—came away convinced the Mizzou's youthful pitcher possessed "a major-league arm."

As for Lingle, he's competing unattached this season as a transfer student from West Point. But the slender Philadelphian, off his dazzling indoor accomplishments last winter and his mile victory at Lawrence, should give Coach Tom Botts' Black and Gold squads a terrific lift in the next two years.

The 20-year-old runner won the 1000-yard race in London's Wembley Stadium on March 30 as a member of a hand-picked U. S. squad.

The following week Robin was fifth in an open mile at the Texas Relays with a 4:07.9 clocking. He was scheduled to complete the Relays triple by running in another fine mile field, headed by Dyrrol Burleson, at Drake on April 27.

Pointing toward the conference meet at Manhattan on May 17-18, Bengal trackmen took a triangular meet from Kirksville and Lincoln U., and then downed Oklahoma and Iowa in another three-way meet at Norman, and Oklahoma State at Stillwater just ahead of the KU and Drake Relays.

Pole-vaulter Bill Younger twice cleared 15-0 this spring, a first in Tiger track annals, while Greg Pelster and Jim Streeby checked in with top performances. Pelster dipped to 1:50.4 in the half at Stillwater. Streeby was second in the 400-meter hurdles at the Kansas Relays, and third in the highs.

man, could bid for more offensive duty, but the chunky veteran—also bedeviled by knee troubles—may be restricted to a defensive and punting role. Currently with the baseball team are two other quarterback candidates, Keith Weber and Dave Harvey, who'll be available in September.

Turner takes over at left half for Johnny Roland, who'll miss the '63 season because of suspension by the University's disciplinary committee on a charge of malicious mischief. At right half, Stevenson holds an edge over Ken Hinkley—after sitting out the '62 season. Underhill, the team's No. 2 ground-gainer, claims the fullback post, ably back-stopped by big Gus Otto.

Line losses, heaviest in Devine's five-year tenure, included such three-year mainstays as Hitchler, Hertz, Wallach, Siekierski, Phillips and Vermillion. Only holdover regulars are tackle Dave Gill and end John Sevcik, a baseball catcher this spring. Fortunately, though, the bulk of 1962's second-unit line is back to assure a reasonably solid crew up front.

The two-deep structure has Bob Ritter, sophomore Tom Lynn, George Seals and Sevcik, manning the ends; Gill, Bobby Brown, sophomore Butch Allison and Gary Matthews, tackles; Gene Oliver—switched from end—Ralph Kubinski, Ron Lurie and Tom Wyrostek, guards; Mack Gilchrist and Joe Buerkle, centers.

Graduation of defensive backfield standouts like Andy Russell and Carl Crawford has put a premium on training of replacements this spring. Among the top prospects are rookies Jim Hall, Jim Valentik, Ken Boston and Monroe Phelps—with the rangy Hall showing the best knack. A year ago, Mizzou's defensive secondary intercepted 21 passes in 11 games—ranking fourth nationally in this category.

Rebuilding that deep defense has been a priority task this spring because Northwestern, opening '63 opponent, features Tom Myers—the brilliant quarterback who passed for 1537 yards and 13 touchdowns in an all-American sophomore debut last year.

Miss Mabel Major

To be visiting professor

Miss Mabel Major, A.B. '14, B.S. in Education '16, A.M. '17, professor of English at Texas Christian University, Fort Worth, will retire from its faculty next August.

Having served on the TCU faculty since 1919, Miss Major will continue her teaching activity as visiting professor at Baylor University, where she will introduce a course in Southwest literature.

Author of several books, Miss Major is a recognized authority on literature of the Southwest, and is so listed in "Who Knows—and What," a compilation of top specialists issued by the publishers of "Who's Who."

Miss Major, who has done advanced study at Chicago, California and Columbia universities is past president of the Texas Folklore Society and Texas Conference of College Teachers of English. She also is a life member of the Texas and Fort Worth Poetry Societies and a member of the Modern Language Association, American Studies Association and the South Central Modern Language Association.

An editorial in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram said in part: "Her greatest influence, however, has been exerted as a person and a teacher. She is tucked away in the memory of thousands of TCU students who have attended classes of hers in the last 44 years. They, and the university itself, are her debtors, for she has helped to create the meaning of a university."

District honors for teachers

At the recent meeting of the Southeast Missouri District Teachers Association, held in Cape Girardeau, Mo., four of the five teachers honored for their achievements and service in the field of education are alumni of the University.

Miss Esther Huber, B.S. Ed. '22, who served as principal for Perryville (Mo.) High School from 1922 to 1953, began her teaching career at Ste. Genevieve, Mo. She taught for four years at a Perryville grade school before becoming high school principal. Miss Huber lives at 315 East St. Marie St., Perryville.

John H. Marshall, Sr., B.S. Agr. '20, M.Ed. '41, 901 E. Commercial, Charleston, Mo., has been super-

intendent of Charleston schools for the past 16 years. His teaching career began in Lufkin, Tex. Returning to his home town of Charleston after two years in Texas, he was teacher and coach for one year. For the following 19 years he served as high school principal. While a student at M.U., Mr. Marshall earned membership in Q.E.B.H. and Tomb and Key, both honor societies, and lettered in sports becoming a member of the "M" Club. He and his wife have three sons and a daughter, all college graduates. Two received degrees from the University: John H. Marshall, Jr., A.B. '49, A.M. '50, of Oklahoma City, and Jesse M. Mrs. Irene Hall Hazel, A.M. '53, 608 Beckwith Ave., Caruthersville, Mo., has taught art in the Caruthersville schools for 33 years. She plans to retire from teaching at the end of the present year. Citations to two B. & P.A. graduates

Two University graduates who are highly successful in their fields received Citation of Merit awards from the University Alumni Association and the University's School of Business and Public Administration at a Business Week luncheon on April 5.

Honored were Richard C. Green, president of the Missouri Public Service Company, Kansas City, and Frederick L. Schuster, business consultant and agriculturist, New York City. The presentations were made in Memorial Student Union by G. H. (Bus) Entsminger, director of Development and Alumni Activities.

Mr. Green, who was born in Kansas City, was educated in the public school system there and at the University where he was graduated in 1950 with a degree of B.S. in Business Administration (in finance and accounting). After graduation he began service with the utility firm as purchasing agent. He advanced to vice-president and purchasing agent, then executive vice-president. When he was made president of the Missouri Public Service Company in 1958, he became one of the youngest men in the country to assume presidential responsibilities with a utility firm. He is also an officer in various other companies.

Mr. Green received the "Outstanding Boss" award from the Missouri Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1954. Four years later he was presented the Distinguished Service Award of the Kansas City Junior Chamber of Commerce. He was one of two Missourians recommended by the late Governor James T. Blair to the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce as candidates for the ten outstanding young men selections of 1959.

Mr. Schuster was born near Kansas City, Mo. and attended the Gower (Mo.) public schools. He received a B.S. in Business Administration (in banking and finance) degree from the University in 1927. That year he was awarded the Delta Sigma Pi scholarship key as the outstanding student in the school from the graduating class.

After leaving the University, Mr. Schuster went to New York and became research assistant to Dr. B. M. Anderson, who was then the economist of the Chase National Bank. In 1929 he became associated with Lehman Corporation; he withdrew from the firm in 1948 to set up his own office at 80 Broad Street, New York City. Mr. Schuster was chairman of the board of Automatic Canteen Company from 1960 until June, 1962. He is chairman of the board of Cavitron Ultrasonics, Inc.; director of Kaneb Pipe Line Company; and owner of Schuster Bros. Farm, Gower, Mo.

A contribution honoring Dr. M. G. Mehl, University professor emeritus of geology, has been made to the heritage fund of the Museum of the Great Plains, Lawton, Oklahoma. Dr. Mehl had taught 39 years in the University geology department when he retired in 1958. He also has taught at the Universities of Chicago, Wisconsin and Oklahoma, and at Denison University. He received his B.S. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Chicago, the latter in 1914. Dr. Mehl is known for his work in micropaleontology, the study of small fossils, and vertebrate paleontology, the study of fossil remains of back-boned animals. He is the author of "Missouri's Ice Age Animals."

They love a parade—doesn't everybody?

For six weeks each spring, Francis Quadrangle becomes a parade grounds. Marching by and around the Columns are the University's ROTC units, putting themselves on review while the M. U. Marching Band provides the proper accompaniment. It happens every Wednesday afternoon, beginning in mid-April. The first five parades are for practice, but the big one is the sixth and final parade, capped by numerous award presentations to outstanding cadets. and in 1962 he was recipient of the Tasker H. Bliss Medal of 1961 presented by the Society of American Military Engineers for his outstanding contributions to military engineering education.

A native of Baltimore, Md., Dean Wilson graduated from the Montana School of Mines in 1920 with the degree of Engineer of Mines. He served a year as assistant research engineer for the Anaconda Copper Company, and then became instructor in metallurgy at the Montana School of Mines.

He did graduate work at Columbia University in summers of 1923-24, and in 1926 went to Europe where he received his Ph.D. degree from the University of Goettingen, Germany, in 1928. He returned to Montana as professor of metallurgical engineering, and remained there until appointed dean by the University of Missouri in 1941.

Dean Wilson received the honorary degree of D.Eng from Washington University in St. Louis in 1954, and another from the Montana School of Mines the following year. He is author of numerous technical articles on metallurgy research, and co-author of the book, "The Metallurgy of Copper," published in 1942.

He has been a member of the American Institute of Mining Engineers since 1920, and has served on its board of directors, and as chairman of the St. Louis and Montana sections, and for 1962-65 is vice-president of the Society of Mining Engineers of AIME. He is a member of many other professional societies including the American Society for Engineering Education, of which he is vice-president.

He is also a member of the Missouri Governor's Council on Higher Education, and is chairman of the Governor's Science Advisory Committee for Missouri.

THE McDONNELL AIRCRAFT CORPORATION of St. Louis was cited by the University for its "exceptional ability in the planning and direction of significant and important projects in technical engineering."

More specifically, the company was honored "for its successful concepts and implementation of the engineering needed for Project Mercury. Under the overall supervision of the National Aeronautical and Space Administration and the cooperation of the Air Force and the Navy, McDonnell Aircraft was instrumental in fulfilling initial objectives of the project within thirty-six months of the signing of the Mercury Spacecraft contract.

McDonnell Aircraft, the largest employer in Missouri, has been selected by NASA to develop the two-man Gemini Spacecraft. McDonnell is also known for its FH-1 Phantom, the F2H Banshee, the F3H Demon, the F4H Phantom II, and the F-101 Voodoo aircraft. The Phantom II established eleven new world records for speed, altitude and time-to-climb during the last year.

The company's president, David S. Lewis, who accepted the award for his firm, is closely identified

with the successful development of these craft by McDonnell.

The 46-year-old executive was born in North Augusta, S. C., and received a B.S. in Aeronautical Engineering degree from the Georgia Institute of Technology. He served seven years with the Glenn L. Martin Co., of Baltimore, Md., starting as draftsman and advancing to project aerodynamicist. He joined the staff of McDonnell in 1946 as Chief of Aerodynamics, and served in numerous management positions. In July, 1962, he became President and Chief Operating Officer of the company.

Wilbur Hutsell to retire

Missouri's gift to Auburn, Wilbur Hutsell, '14, is retiring as track coach after 42 years at Auburn, where he has had a remarkable record of Southeastern Conference championships. A long-time friend of the former M. U. track man, Dr. Herb Bunker, chairman of the Department of Physical Education at the University, had a letter from Mr. Hutsell, who wrote: "Come July, I will have severance pains—but only from the treasurer's office. I will retain my office, make any and all trips just as in the past, have secretarial help, etc. Looking back on 1924-26, I'm surprised that my office seat isn't a rail." Herb says Hutsell's status at Auburn parallels that of the Columns on our campus. Sports editor Benny Marshall of the Birmingham News devoted his regular daily column to a salute to "Hutsell of Auburn" recently. Excerpts:

"Because time is the enemy of us all, and because laws must be followed, good and gentle Wilbur Hutsell is coming to the end of his coaching time. He came like the day before yesterday, and that was 42 years ago. Now he has reached retirement age. Wilbur Hutsell has come to symbolize Auburn. He looks like Auburn. He sounds like Auburn. For 42 years, he has been Auburn.

"When you get to be 90 years old (he's 70), it's time to drop out and let somebody else run the boat,' Hutsell said. 'It was not a question of my deciding to. It's mandatory. I'm not anticipating retirement with any great deal of pleasure.

"There have been unpleasant times. You just don't go through this vale of tears without some bitter with the sweet. But the pleasant things have far outnumbered the others for me.'

"Tell me about Wilbur Hutsell, I asked Jeff Beard, the athletic director who once was one of Coach Wilbur's boys. 'The greatest single asset he has had in his coaching is patience,' Beard said. 'He takes a boy who has no training or experience and with genuine patience and understanding brings him along. He believes in practicing nine months out of a year, and he never called a practice off because of weather.'

"He can point a young man in the direction he should go. The decency of Wilbur Hutsell is reflected in those he has taught for Auburn."
