The Missouri Medal

The University of Missouri School of Journalism has awarded its Journalism Honor Medal "for distinguished service in journalism" continuously since 1930.

The awards are presented each year during the School's annual Journalism Week. Medalists, who are always invited to address the alumni, faculty, and students of the School, receive their awards from the President of the University at the annual awards banquet. The medalists' photographs are then hung in the Neff Auditorium Hall of Honor, alongside those of previous winners.

A total of 308 distinguished newsmen and newswomen, editors, broadcasters, advertising persons, or institutions have now been recognized with this highest honor from the world's oldest school of journalism.

Nominations for the medals (*) are received each year by the Awards Committee of the School. Final selection is made by the faculty, which thereupon advises the Chancellor, President and Board of Curators of the choices.

*Nominations may be addressed to the Dean of the Faculty, School of Journalism, prior to November 1 annually.

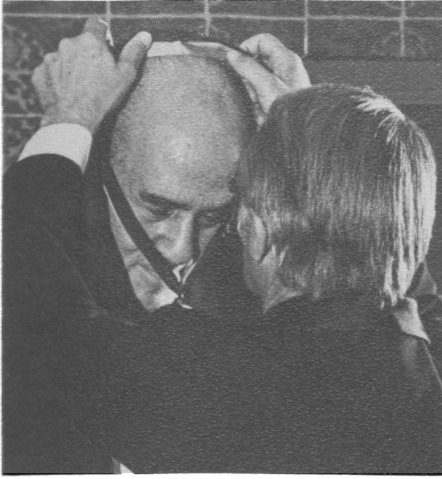

The Honor Medalists

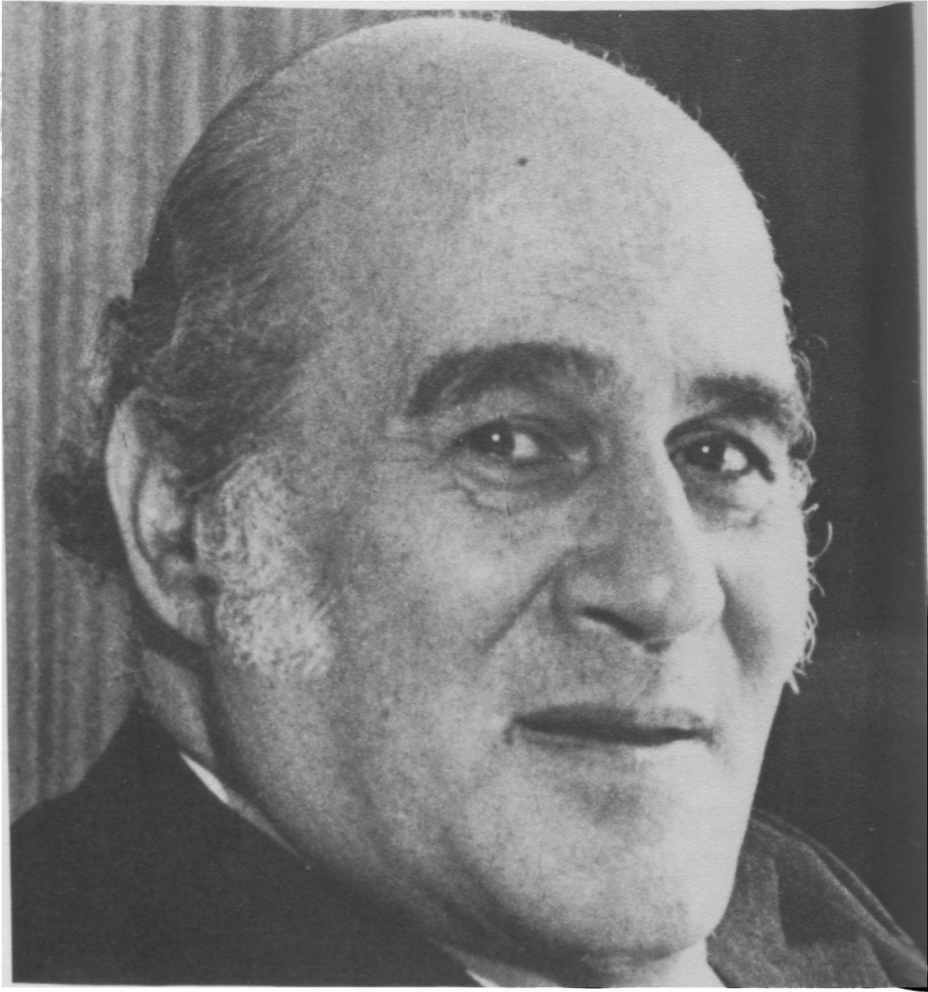
Mustafa Amin, founder of *Akhbar Al Yom* and *Al Akhbar* of Cairo, Egypt, has been a journalism pioneer in the Arab world for the past 50 years. The consequences of his innovations, however, were a half-century of political persecution and nine years imprisonment.

Amin, who introduced into Egypt Western-style journalism, began his

career in 1928 at the age of 14 by publishing several magazines which the government closed down.

Now regarded as the most influential columnist in Egypt, Amin established *Akhbar Al Yom* in 1944 as the first Sunday newspaper in the Middle East. He began publication of *Al Akhbar*, a daily newspaper, in 1952.

Government "inspections" of Amin's newspapers occurred often



in the 1950s; Amin was arrested 26 times in one year alone. Following the nationalization of the Egyptian press in 1960, he was jailed for six months of interrogation on 186 charges. In 1965, Amin was arrested and sentenced to life imprisonment with hard labor for allegedly communicating with the CIA. President Anwar Sadat reprieved Amin of all

charges in 1974 and reappointed him as editor-in-chief of *Akhbar Al Yom*.

He currently supervises several charity programs that assist Egypt's needy in addition to his editing duties on *Akhbar Al Yom* and is an active journalism teacher at Cairo University and at American University in Cairo.

In recognition of his founding of *Al Akhbar* and *Akhbar Al Yom* as modern newspapers dedicated to the service of their readers;

His devotion to high journalistic standards, as evident in his teaching of young people for careers in journalism;

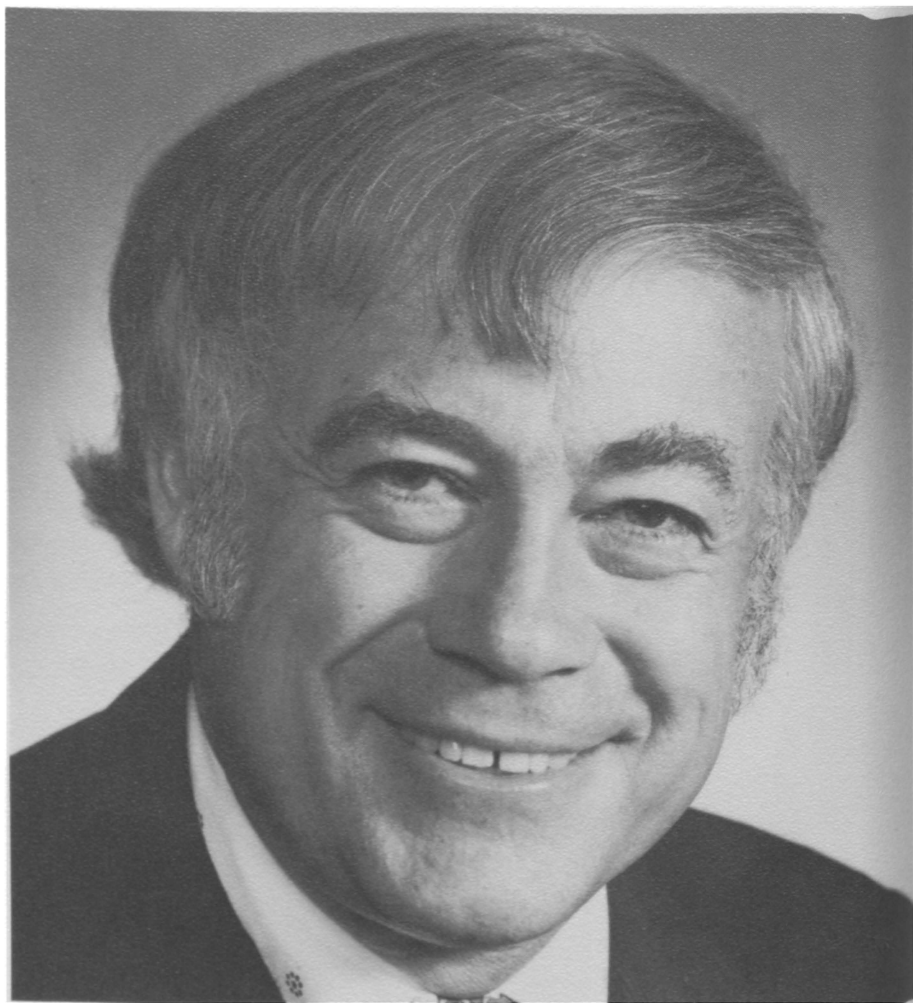
His physical and moral courage in the face of political persecution and long years of imprisonment; and

His loyalty throughout all travail to his belief in independence of the mind and freedom of the press.

Traveling from Alaska to Vietnam and from Guatemala to Quemoy, W. E. (Bill) Garrett has written and/or photographed 23 articles for *National Geographic* magazine during the past two decades. Garrett, who received his B.J. degree from Missouri in 1954, has been instrumental in *National Geographic's* emergence as the

most prominent photojournalism publication in the United States.

As associate editor of the magazine, he is responsible for all of its graphic material. Garrett has also written chapters of the National Geographic Society's book publications and co-produced the award-winning National Geographic television special, "Alaska!"



Garrett has lectured at seminars on college campuses across the nation and is a faculty member for the University's annual Missouri Photo Workshop. As an advisor to the Pictures of the Year competition, he has been a force behind the books "Photojournalism I" and "Photojournalism II."

A Newhouse Citation for "signif-

icant contributions to the field of visual communication" from Syracuse University and the title "Magazine Photographer of the Year" from the University of Missouri and the National Press Photographers Association are among the numerous awards he has received in recent years.

W. E. Garrett

In recognition of his career as a photojournalist whose words and pictures from Vietnam and Laos, from Quemoy and Guantanamo, from Alaska and Guatemala have graced the pages of the *National Geographic* for more than two decades;

His service to journalism education as a staff member of the annual Missouri Photo Workshop, as an adviser to the Pictures of the Year competition and through his encouragement of university students on campuses throughout the nation; and

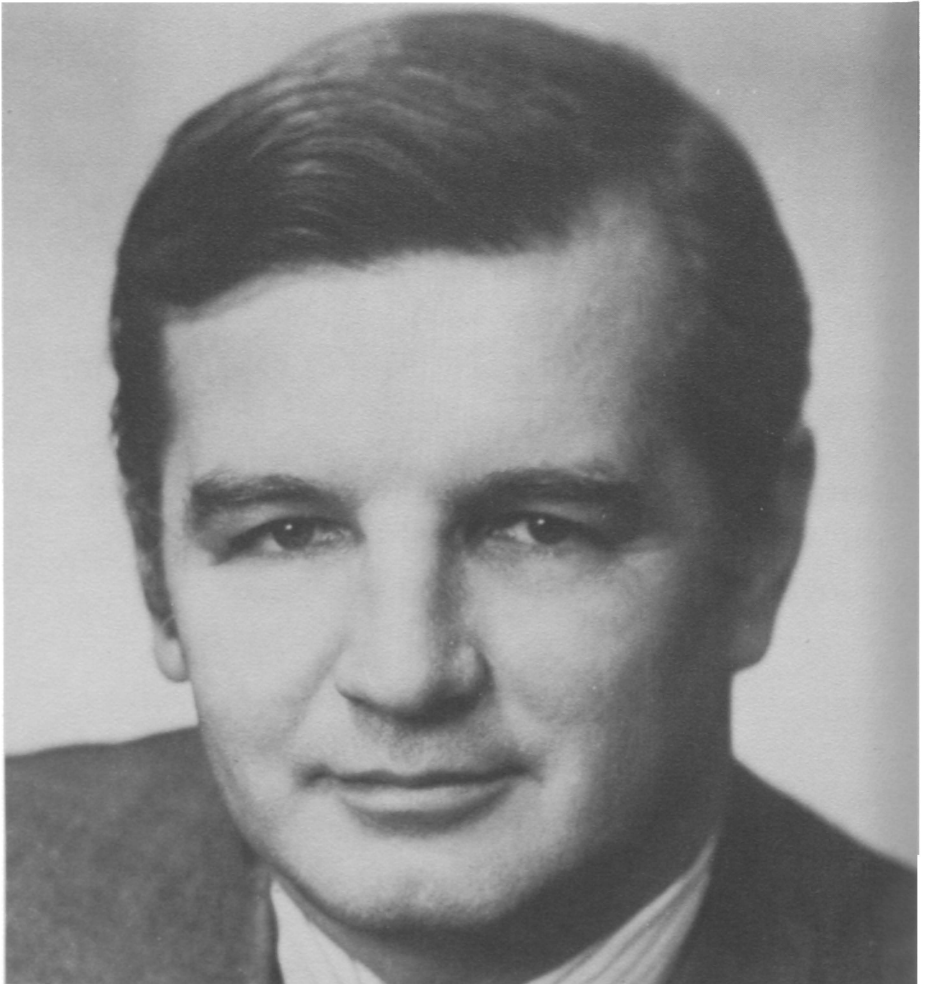
His loyalty to the University of Missouri.

Ray Karpowicz has been a leader in St. Louis' television news since becoming general manager of KSD/KSD-TV in 1969. Karpowicz, who also serves as vice president of KSD/KSD-TV Inc., pioneered the two-hour television news concept by programming nightly news broadcasts on KSD-TV from 5. p.m. to 7 p.m. He launched the city's first feature noontime newscast in

1969, a program which recently has increased from 30 minutes to an hour.

Insisting on complete, thorough and in-depth coverage, Karpowicz oversees 18 hours of locally-produced news each week, more than any other St. Louis station broadcasts.

Civic causes in St. Louis have also benefited from the station's coopera-



tion and Karpowicz's personal efforts. Karpowicz was a prominent force behind the "A to Z" advertising campaign that promoted St. Louis as a good place to live.

Since 1974, KSD-TV has been the St. Louis outlet for the Muscular Dystrophy Association's annual Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon. The St. Louis Variety Club has also broadcast its telethon from the sta-

tion's facilities, raising close to \$1 million in the last two years for emotionally and physically handicapped children.

Karpowicz, a University of Missouri business graduate, is also president of the Advertising Club of St. Louis.

In recognition of his leadership as vice president of KSD and KSD-TV, and as general manager of KSD-TV;

His insistence on thorough coverage of the news, as evident in the 18-hour weekly schedule of locally produced news;

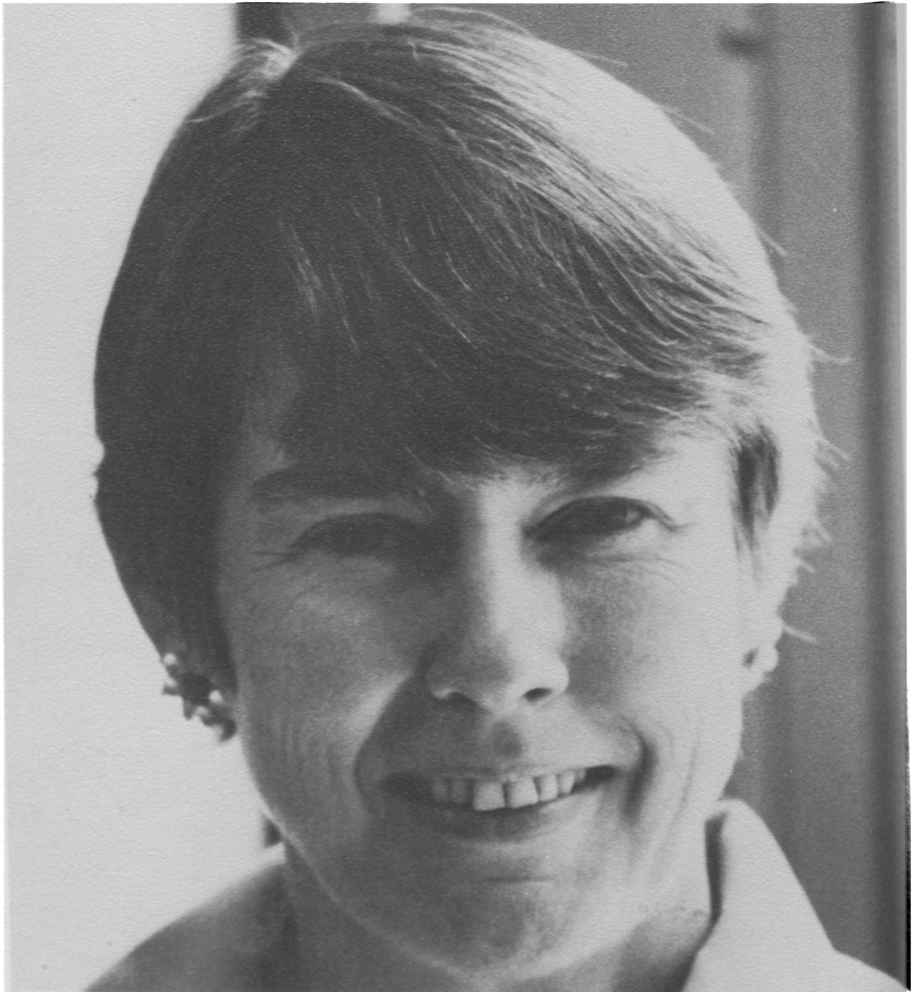
His deft direction of his stations' fortunes during a period of rapid technological change and programming development; and

His personal standards which have led him deeply into the civic life of his community and to the leadership of causes which have enriched the lives of the city's underprivileged.

Carol Loomis, a 1951 University of Missouri journalism graduate, is a senior editor of *Fortune* magazine and only the second woman to be named to that publication's board of editors. A native of Cole Camp, Mo., Mrs. Loomis began her career with *Fortune* in 1954 as a research associate. She was appointed associate editor four

years later and became a member of the magazine's board of editors in 1968.

Mrs. Loomis, selected by *More* magazine as one of the nation's top five business writers in 1977, has reported on a wide range of financial and stock market subjects. In her 24 years with *Fortune*, she has achieved many business and financial writing



awards as well.

A three-time winner of the G.M. Loeb Achievement Award for distinguished writing on investment, finance and business, Mrs. Loomis also won the Hentz Award for financial journalism in 1968. The *Fortune* editor received the John Hancock Award for excellence in business and financial journalism

in 1968 and 1975. She was a University of Missouri Alumni Award recipient in 1976.

In recognition of her penetrating reporting and rare understanding of the great business and economic issues;

Her masterful writing;

Her exploration of new and exciting avenues as a business and financial editor; and

The enlightenment she has provided readers of *Fortune* magazine for more than 20 years.

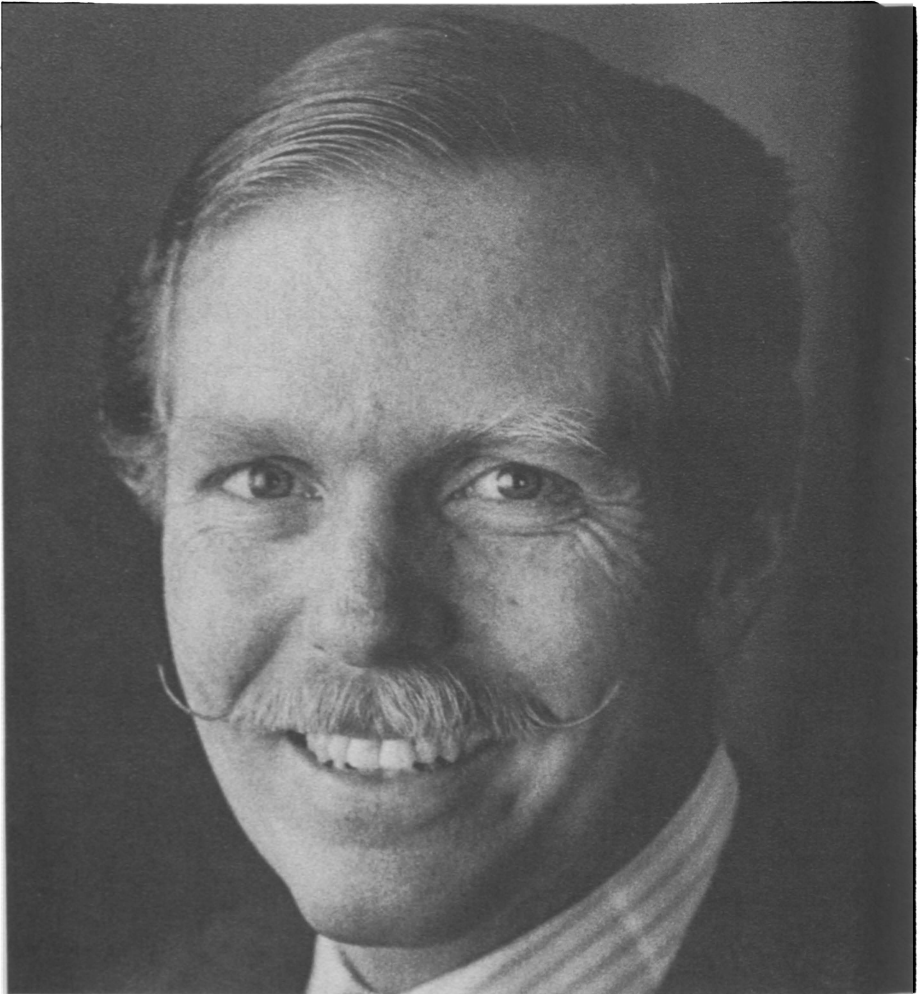
Creative approaches to newspaper content, design and marketing have made the Louisville *Courier-Journal* and *Times* among the most influential and respected newspapers in U.S. journalism history.

The *Courier-Journal* is only the fourth newspaper to be awarded a Missouri Medal twice. It was one of

the first papers ever to receive a medal when it won one in the early 1930s.

Established by Henry Watterson in 1826, the *Courier-Journal* has a history of meeting new technological problems and fluctuating economic and demographic environments with innovation.

The Louisville *Times*, the after-



noon paper, met declining Saturday interest with a lively magazine format which restored the readership and advertising lineage. Other innovations pioneered by the newspapers include the six-column format and the "tailored newspaper," which gives readers the option of including with their subscriptions one or more special sections.

In yet another experiment, the newspapers combine their own delivery systems with delivery of national news magazines.

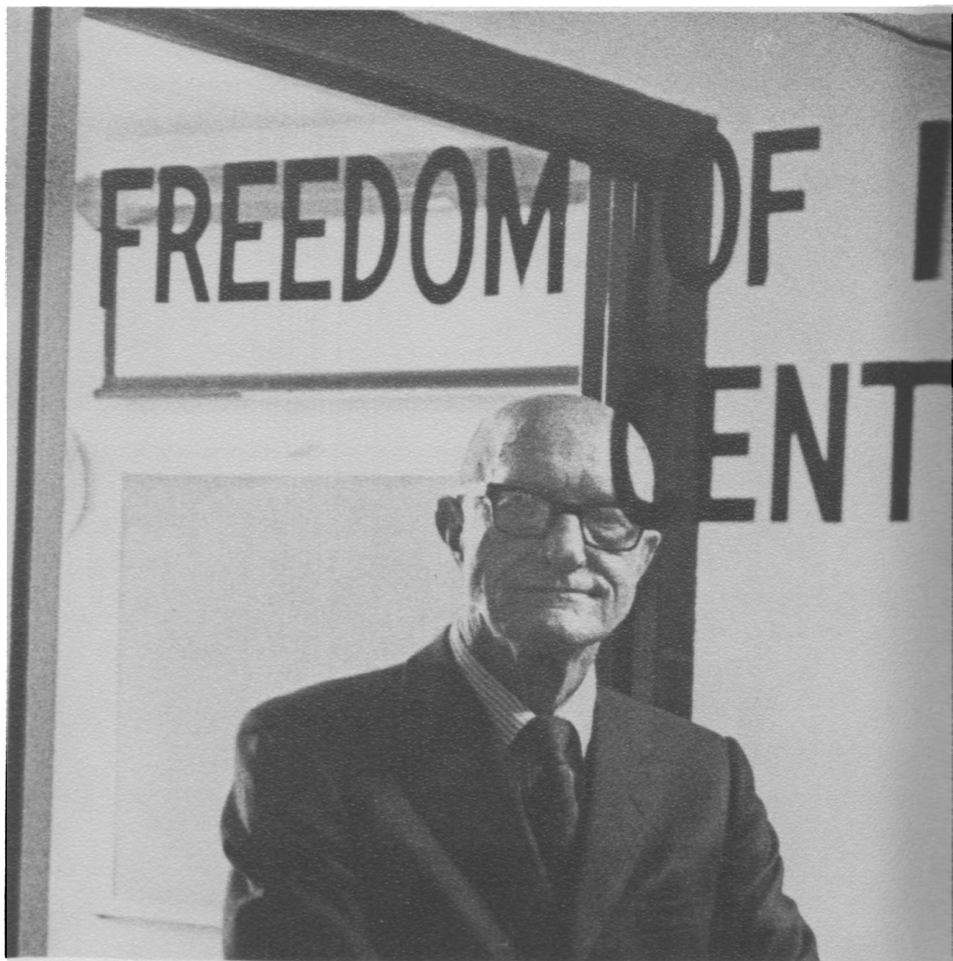
Barry B. Bingham, Jr., editor and publisher of the newspapers, accepted the award.

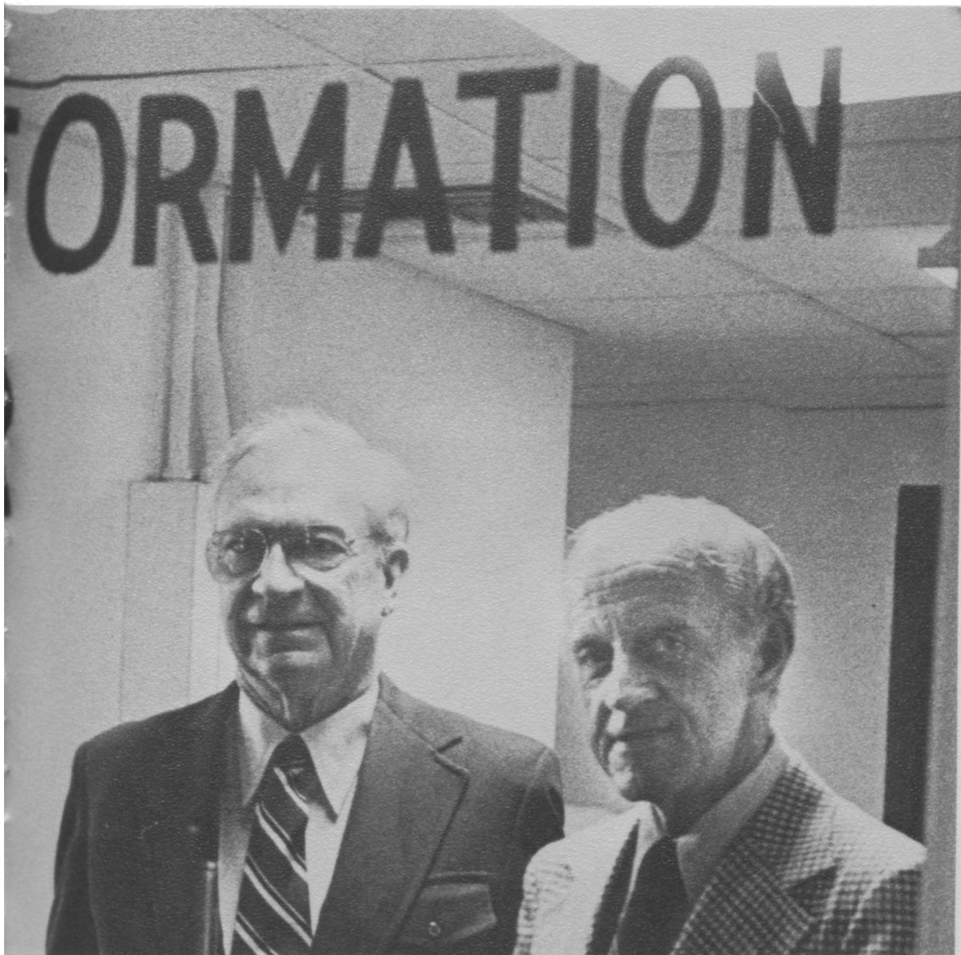

The Freedom of Information Center celebrated its 20th anniversary during the 1978 Journalism Week at the University of Missouri School of Journalism. A separate, national-service institution, the Center was founded in 1958 during the 50th anniversary of the school and occupies three rooms in Walter Williams hall.

One of the Center's founding

fathers, Mr. James Pope, editor emeritus of the *Louisville Courier-Journal*, returned to the campus to open the week with his keynote address, "The Roots of Freedom." Throughout the following days, other leaders in the Freedom of Information movement spoke at workshop sessions. These included Hugh Boyd, president of the Freedom of Information Foundation and publisher of the Brunswick (N.J.) *Home News*; Sam



the celebration of the School's fiftieth anniversary, 1958-59, and Professor Paul Fisher, executive secretary of the Center, 1959-64, and director since that time.

Archibald, former staff director, House Subcommittee on Government Information and now associate professor of journalism at the University of Colorado; and Mustafa Amin, outspoken Egyptian editor and publisher.

Others who rounded out the subject were Robert Greene, Pulitzer prize-winning investigative editor of *Newsday*; Carol Loomis, B.J. '51,

senior editor of *Fortune* magazine; and Richard S. Salant, president of CBS News, who delivered the Harold L. Cross Memorial Lecture at the Awards banquet.

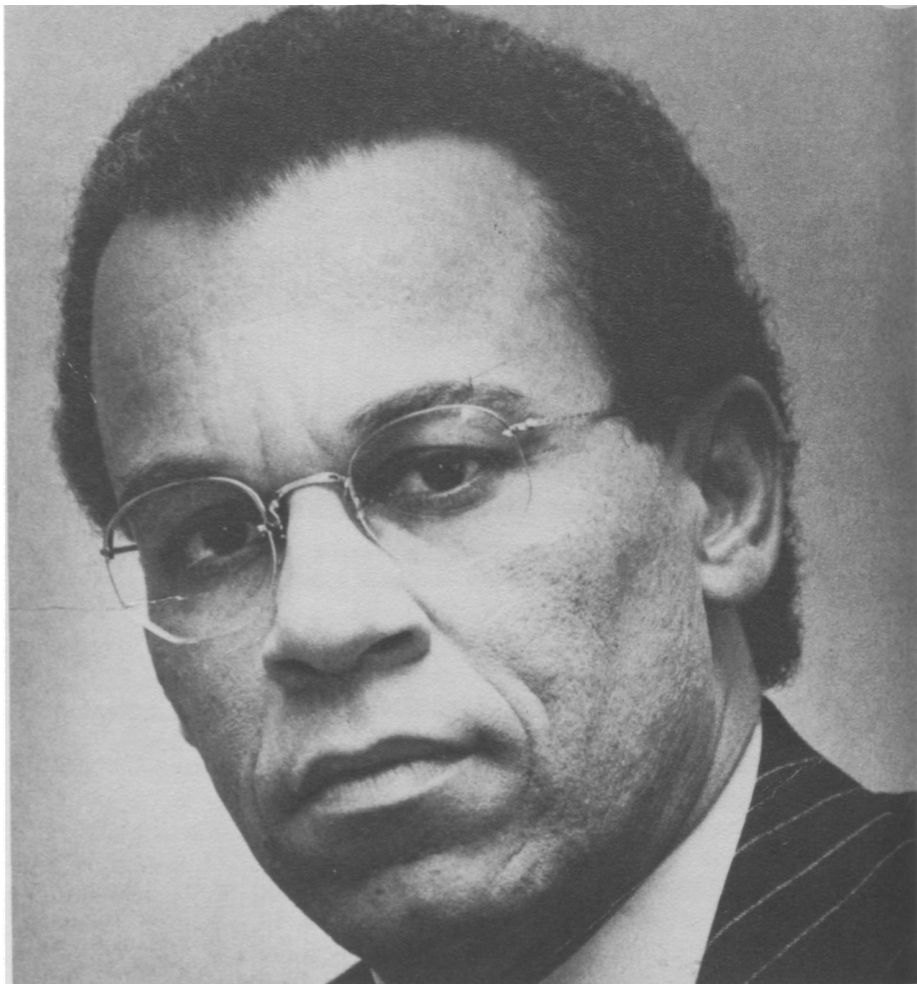
The Freedom of Information Center maintains the nation's most complete reference files on information freedom. Several thousand individuals annually write or call the Center on information access problems.

The St. Louis *Argus* is the oldest black newspaper and black-owned business in Missouri. Since its inception in 1912 by the Mitchell family, the *Argus* has been active in civil rights crusades to improve the quality of life for blacks in the areas of housing, employment and education.

At the same time, however, the

newspaper has remained committed to straight news reporting. It consistently upgrades its format and typography and strives to employ highly trained personnel. The *Argus* seeks, in its faith in the Black Press Creed, for "every man, regardless of race, color or creed, his human and legal rights."

Dr. Eugene N. Mitchell, *Argus*



publisher and a graduate of the University of Missouri School of Medicine, accepted the Missouri Medal for the newspaper.

Dr. Mitchell is the recipient of the Black Leader Against Crime Award and is a consultant to the Mathews-Dickey Boys Club in St. Louis.

In 1977 he served on the execu-

tive committee of the St. Louis Branch of the NAACP and is a member this year of the United Way board of directors.

St. Louis *Argus*

In recognition of its standing as the oldest black-owned business in Missouri, operated since its inception in 1912 by the Mitchell family;

Its active civil rights crusades to improve the quality of life for blacks in housing, employment, and education;

Its commitment to straight news reporting, to improved format and typography, and its employment of highly trained personnel; and

Its belief in the Black Press Creed that seeks for "every man, regardless of race, color or creed, his human and legal rights."

CBS News has been "on the team of getting at the truth" during the thirteen years that Richard S. Salant has been its president. Salant led the CBS network news operations between 1961 and 1964 and from February 1966 to the present.

A member of the National News Council, Salant has remained

dedicated to the maintenance of a free and independent press despite pressures from government and special interest groups.

Under Salant's guidance, CBS has both expanded and improved its daily news offerings. His first tenure as president saw the creation of the first Monday through Friday, half-hour evening network



television news program, "The CBS Evening News with Walter Cronkite," and the beginning of regular analyses during news broadcasts.

Since Salant returned 12 years ago, CBS News has grown to include "60 Minutes," a highly popular news magazine, and the "The CBS Morning News," network TV's first

hour-long, hard news program. "In the News," the first network news broadcast for children, and "What's It All About," a continuing series of special programs for youth focused on current issues, were also added to the CBS lineup due to Salant's efforts.

Salant, a Harvard graduate, joined CBS in 1952 as vice president.

In recognition of 15 years of leadership in broadcast news;

His pioneering of a half-hour nightly news program, television news magazines, and network television's first hour-long, hard news broadcast;

His unassailable integrity which serves as an inspiration to all the men and women of CBS News;

His steadfast dedication to the maintenance of a free press, despite intense pressures from government and special interest groups; and

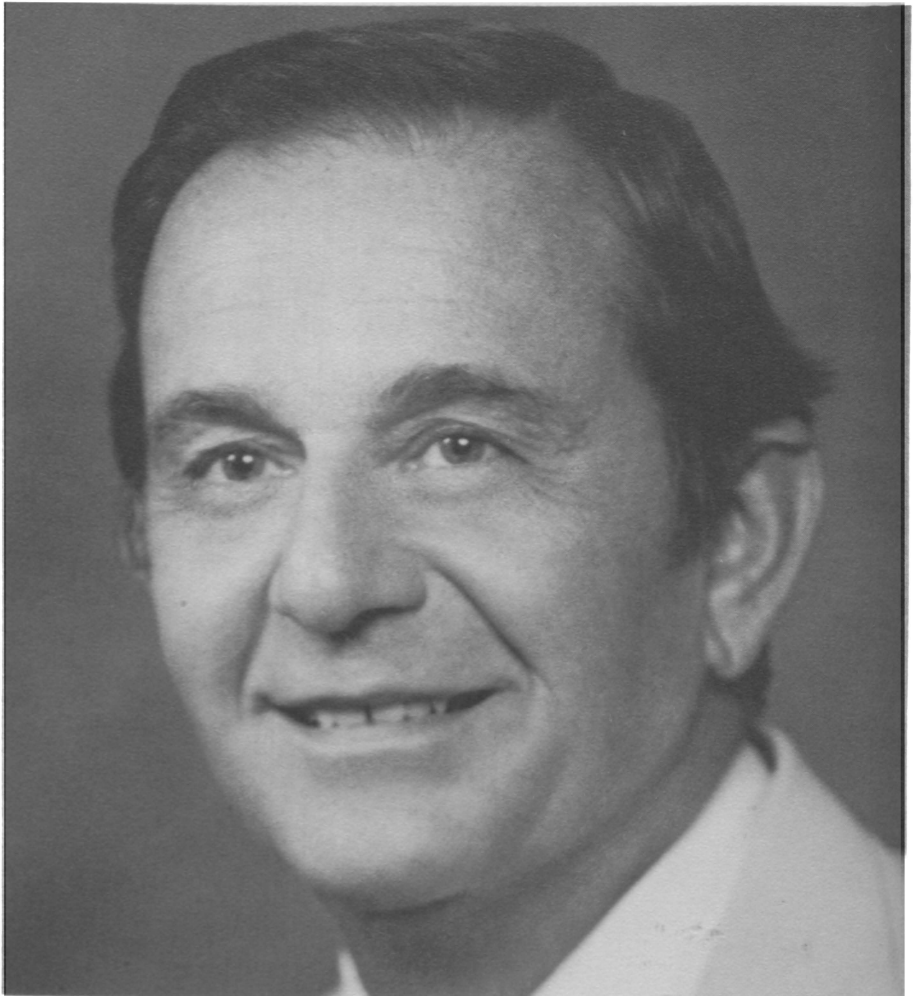
His role in the continued excellence of CBS News.

Imagination and resourcefulness are two words which characterize Jac W. Zimmerman's career as a community press publisher and editor. Zimmerman's newspapers, including the Bolivar (Mo.) *Herald-Free Press*, have won a total of 75 national and state awards for excellence in the past 31 years.

One resourceful product of Zim-

merman's inventive mind is Van Press, the first operational, group-owned, central offset printing plant for weekly newspapers in the nation. The web-offset process Zimmerman helped organize at Van Press plant in Willow Springs, Mo. has revolutionized small newspaper printing since the late 1950s.

Zimmerman began his career in



journalism at age 14 by working as a “printer’s devil” for the Cabool (Mo.) *Enterprise*. He purchased his first paper, the *Miller County Autogram* of Tuscumbia, Mo. in 1947. After serving for nine years as a member of the board of directors of the Missouri Press Association (MPA), Zimmerman was elected president in 1964. He is the first and

only MPA president to visit every newspaper in the state during his term of office.

Zimmerman is also a former director of the National Newspaper Association and president of the Ozark Press Association.

In recognition of his notable career as a community newspaper editor and publisher;

His leadership as president of the Missouri Press Association and as director of the National Newspaper Association;

And of his imagination and resourcefulness in co-organizing and establishing Van Press, the first operational, group-owned central offset printing plant for weekly newspapers in the nation—an idea that has revolutionized the printing of small newspapers.
