Speakers at the commemoration of the marker talked about the importance of remembering the city's history and recognized that racial equality has not been achieved yet.

Kappa Alpha suspended over hazing incident.

[The fraternity](#) is temporarily suspended following an alleged hazing incident, in which the police say an 18-year-old subject was transported from the fraternity house to a local hospital by ambulance for alcohol poisoning. The suspension prevents Kappa Alpha from using university facilities and participating in university-run social events like Homecoming.

MU School of Medicine students report more incidents of sexist treatment from faculty.

The school [has twice the number of incidents](#) reported than the national average. The Liaison Committee on Medical Education deemed the School of Medicine unsatisfactory in the area of student treatment. The school could face probation if it does not fix these issues within the year, and possible loss of accreditation in two years.

Ajay Vinzé named dean for Trulaske College of Business.

He [was named by Provost Garnett Stokes](#) on Sept. 30. Vinzé is the former Arizona State University associate dean for international programs. "Trulaske's capabilities coupled with broader academic strengths at Mizzou, and with the support of alumni

Mizzou women's golf wins while raising money for pediatric cancer research

The women's [golf team took first](#) place at the Johnie Imes Invitational on Oct. 3-4, hosted at the Old Hawthorne Club in Columbia. The Tigers partnered with the Rally for Rhyan campaign, an effort by men's basketball coach Brad Loos and his family to raise money for pediatric cancer research. Rally for Rhyan is inspired by 6-year-old Rhyan Loos, Brad Loos' daughter, who has battled cancer and is currently in remission. Mizzou, along with other schools, has agreed to sponsor 16 children fighting cancer.

New Middle East Studies minor is now offered at Mizzou

Nathan Hofer is the director of the new [Middle East Studies](#) minor. The new program came to campus this fall, and students are able to choose from courses in 11 disciplines. Victor McFarland, an assistant professor of history, will also be teaching courses in the minor. McFarland said he hopes the minor

can increase students' knowledge of the region.

"The picture of the Middle East that students get from the news is sometimes limited to coverage of terrorists and refugees," McFarland said.

Safety Walk reveals broken emergency phones on campus

Blue lights are spread around campus, and when the button is pressed, the MU Police Department is alerted of the location. Mizzou women's basketball loses Jordan Frericks to ACL injury

According to a statement by women's basketball coach Robin Pingeton, senior Jordan Frericks has [torn her right ACL](#). Frericks was injured in preseason workout, and won't play for the entire 2016-17 season due to the injury.

"Jordan is an incredible leader and a fierce competitor and as she begins her rehab and recovery, our program will persevere together as a family and support her along the way," Pingeton said in the statement.

Reported hate crimes increase on campus

Eleven [hate crimes](#) were reported in 2015, according to a report from MU

police on Sept. 28. That's an increase from one hate crime reported in 2014 and three reported in 2013. Eight of the crimes in 2015 were reported on campus and five occurred in student housing. The Office of Civil Rights and Title IX is planning outreach efforts targeted toward specific audiences to raise awareness of discrimination on campus.

Inside Out Grilled Cheese like the one you might find at Ingredient

Ingredients: 2 tablespoons butter, 2 slices white bread, 1/2 cup shredded extra sharp Cheddar cheese

Melt the butter in a skillet over medium heat and place the bread in the skillet with the butter. Put roughly 1/4 of the cheddar cheese on one slice and then place the other (butter-side up) on top of the cheese. Put 2 tablespoons of cheese on top of the sandwich. Repeat on the other side and flip until both of the cheesy sides are golden, crispy and caramelized. It should take about 3 - 4 minutes on each side.

The week in Mizzou sports

The swimming team started its season this week

And they [looked pretty good](#). Their opening meet, the Show Me Showdown against schools from around the state, was Friday. Both Missouri teams won the meet, with the women posting 717 points, more than 300 points more than their nearest competitor. One especially bright spot for the team were the freshmen, who made their Mizzou debuts at the meet.

The team didn't have any rest going into the meet. The swimmers had practice the morning of and had even attended classes before the meet.

"We all swam extremely well, especially at this point in the season," freshman Daniel Hein said. "We were all really broken down."

Women's basketball loses one of its best

The [big news of the week](#) was that Jordan Frericks, one of the team's brightest stars, will have to sit out the season because of a torn ACL. She was the team's leading rebounder last year, averaging 7.7 per game. The ACL tear occurred during a preseason workout. Frericks will redshirt this year.

It's a bye week in football, and thank goodness for that

Missouri football's bye week could not have come at a better time. Last week's 42-7 loss still stings for most fans. Our Nick Kelly and Tyler Kraft [sat down and discussed](#) how much fans should panic and what the team needs to improve on in coming weeks.

Report card

Soccer writer Langston Newsome [broke down](#) the team's performance so far this year. They're 8-4-1 overall and 3-2-1 in SEC play so far. Here's how he grades them in key categories:

Offense: B

With an average of just over 20 shots per game, Mizzou is first in the Southeastern Conference in total shots. Mizzou can't be denied from creating scoring opportunities; 42.5 percent of these shots were on goal, leaving the Tigers at eighth in the nation for shots on goal per game (12). But actually putting the ball in the net is where the Tigers tend to struggle.

Defense: B-

Defensively, Mizzou makes its mark early in each match; the Tigers press and are very aggressive. When locked in, Mizzou defensively is a force to be reckoned with. However, statistically Mizzou is in the middle of the pack of the SEC. Mizzou is sixth in goals allowed (14).

Off-the-field issues: D

Starters Sarah Luebbert, Kaitlyn Clark and Bethany Coons were suspended and missed an important SEC game against Tennessee. Although Mizzou went 1-1 in their absence, you can't help but think there would be a different outcome against UT. Also, Luebbert's suspension puts an asterisk on what has been a remarkable freshman year; she is a two-time SEC Freshman of the Week, and leads the

team in goals (6) and shots (34). It would be interesting to see her offensive numbers with two more games, especially against a low-tier team like Weber State.

MLB playoff watch

Red Sox vs. Indians: The Boston Red Sox might have been the favorites to come out of the American League this year, but they face elimination this afternoon at the hands of the Cleveland Indians. (3 p.m. on TBS)

Rangers vs. Blue Jays: The winners of the AL's regular season aren't looking so hot these days. They go back to Toronto down 0-2 in the series against the Blue Jays. (6:30 p.m. on TBS)

Nationals vs. Dodgers: Game two of their series was postponed last night because of rain on the East Coast. Los Angeles is up 1-0.
