### **Yale renames college after computer scientist Grace Murray Hopper**

The residential college was originally named after John C. Calhoun, a white supremacist who promoted slavery as a “positive good.” The

University trustees, known as the Yale Corporation, voted in favor of the renaming Friday, and the change will take effect at the beginning of the 2017-18 school year. The college's new namesake, Grace Murray Hopper, graduated from Yale with a Ph.D. in mathematics and mathematical physics in 1934 and was given the Presidential Medal of Freedom posthumously by President Obama.

### **Demonstrators face off at the Planned Parenthood clinic in Columbia**

An anti-Planned Parenthood rally [took place Saturday](#) and drew both protesters and counter-protesters. The event was planned by 40 Days for Life and Team Play, in solidarity with 225 other protests nationwide. According to the #ProtestPP website, the intention of the protest was to call on legislators to defund Planned Parenthood and reallocate the funds to other health centers. The pro-Planned Parenthood counter-protest was almost double the size of the originally planned anti-Planned Parenthood demonstrations.

**Kinder Institute professors and a Tribune editor discussed free speech in the digital era**

The event [was held at Columbia Public Library](#) on Monday. Two Kinder Institute professors, Adam Seagrave and Nicholas Drummond, and the

managing editor of the Columbia Daily Tribune, Jim Robertson, all agreed that the media is peculiar because it is particularly divisive at this time, especially with the many new technologies available. Robertson said that the divisiveness of politics hasn't gotten more extreme, but the tools have. Seagrave touched on the philosophy of founding father James Madison, who believed in free speech.

“Our ability to understand the truth is imperfect, and we are usually wrong, probably, some way in our understanding of the truth,” Seagrave said. “But there is hope — hope that we can understand part of it. We can make progress in that understanding through dialogue with others.”

### **Social Justice Symposium focused on advocacy, awareness and activism**

At the event last Saturday, keynote speaker Marcia Chatelain [spoke about how to take action](#), and she encouraged people to take part in activism in anyway they can, through social media or consumer boycotts. 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

## Women in STEM at MU continue to break down barriers

When Kate Peiffer sits in class and looks around, she senses something missing. As a junior civil engineering major, she's mastered substituting numbers for words in lecture notes, but she has yet to get over the intimidation she feels from being one of the few women in the room.

According to the U.S. Economics and Statistics Administration, women hold less than 25 percent of jobs in the fields of science, technology, engineering and mathematics. While being part of a minority group within a major can be daunting, Peiffer also finds it empowering.

"I have found that sometimes people have responded to me with hesitation when they hear that I am majoring in engineering," Peiffer said. "I feel like they're almost waiting for me to say what back-up plan I have when I change my mind. STEM fields are challenging, but I truly believe women should have the same opportunities as guys when it comes to excelling in the field."

Women's basketball rebounds with win over Florida

Missouri women's basketball beat the Florida Gators 74-67 on Thursday, giving the Tigers their eighth Southeastern Conference victory this season, the most they have had since joining the SEC.

Stats-wise, Florida seemed like a tough opponent.

Florida has on its team the SEC's leading scorer, senior Ronni Williams, who helped the Gators shoot 45.2 percent Thursday night. Florida also leads the conference in rebounds, with an average of 42 per game. Not surprisingly, the Gators outrebounded the Tigers in the game, bringing in twice as many offensive rebounds.

The single stat that the Tigers excelled in, which ultimately secured them the win, was in the 3-point column. Mizzou made 13 of them and held Florida to just five treys.

SEC champion Kamari Montgomery looks to prove freshman campaign was no fluke

Entering the last lap of the 400-meter dash final of last year's SEC Championship, Kahmari Montgomery was in last place. By the end of the lap, he was an SEC champion.

Proving his legitimacy as a successful athlete, Montgomery, now a sophomore, became an SEC champion with a school-record 45.13 seconds during the SEC Outdoor Track and Field Championships. He ended his freshman season as a second-team All-American and finished with school records in the indoor 200-meter dash (21.03 seconds) and 400-meter dash (45.78 seconds).

"It was something that we had kind of talked about during his recruiting process out of high school," assistant and sprints coach Carjay Lyles said. "[Winning the SEC title] was a realistic expectation during fall training. I was more relieved that he met the expectations that we had set."

This year, Montgomery has his eyes set on repeating as champion and proving to everyone that his freshman campaign was no fluke. So this year, he said he feels more pressure.

"It is not a pressure that I should be nervous or scared about, but it's like a 'I am ready, I am back,'" Montgomery said. "I think this year is going to be something even more special than last year."
