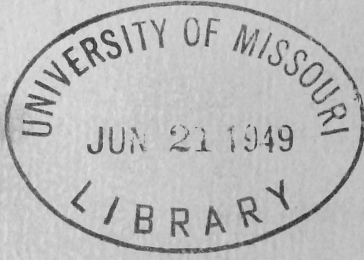

## GENERAL INFORMATION

In this section of the Catalog are listed and described the fellowships, scholarships, prizes, and grants-in-aid available to students in those divisions of the University at Columbia. A brief description of the student loan funds and a list of available funds is also included.

Except where noted additional information about any undergraduate scholarship or prize may be had by writing to the Secretary, University of Missouri, Columbia, Missouri, and information about graduate fellowships and scholarships by writing the Dean, Graduate School, University of Missouri, Columbia, Missouri. Other inquiries should be directed to the Secretary of the Board of Curators of the University.

Scholarships awarded through the University of Missouri are paid in accordance with the desires of the donors, but payment usually follows one of three arrangements. The payment may be made in full at the time of commencement or on some other special occasion, when the donor giving the award may desire to honor the recipient. If the scholarship is announced at the end of the school year and the recipient is to receive payment the following year, payment is either made in full at the fall registration; or in two equal payments at the fall and winter registrations; or in ten monthly installments throughout the school year.

## UNDERGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS AND PRIZES

### Beginning Freshmen

#### ALPHA TAU ALPHA FRESHMAN AWARD

Stipend \$40, or library, hospital, and incidental fee for the fall semester, whichever is greater. Awarded to a high school graduate who plans to enter the College of Agriculture. Awarded to a student ranking highest on these three factors:

1. High School leadership.
2. Examination on technical agriculture and F.F.A. information.
3. Personal interview.

#### SCHOLARSHIP IN AMERICAN CITIZENSHIP

Annual stipend \$250. Awarded for four years to the high school senior in Missouri making the highest grade in competitive examinations held in the local high schools throughout the State. The subjects for the examination and the amount of high school training assumed are—English, 3 units; American History, 1 unit; Medieval and Modern, or World History, 1 unit; American Problems, or Civics and Economics, 1 unit.

The applicant may be of either sex, must be a native of and resident of Missouri and must be satisfying in the term in which the examination is given, all entrance requirements for admission to the University. The applicant should have some real need of financial assistance. The scholar will be required to select his courses at the University subject to the approval of a special committee, must select one course in history each year and his total courses in history must include at least two courses in American history and one course in American government. The scholar may be required each semester to present a paper prepared in connection with the prescribed course in history. Next regular award 1950.

**DEBATING SCHOLARSHIPS**

Debaters qualify for the contest at the University through the contests held among the various high schools composing the Missouri High School Debating League. The Scholarships must be completely used within one year (beginning in October and ending the following September) immediately following the graduation of the student from high school.

## FRANCIS SCHOLARSHIP IN CREATIVE LITERATURE FOR WOMEN

An award of the annual value of one-half the annual income on \$10,000, will be made to a woman student who has successfully completed three years of college work, and who is primarily interested in creative literature. She must have shown special ability in the languages, the social sciences, or journalism. The award will be for two years and is at present a loan. During the first year of the award, the recipient must be enrolled in her senior year of the undergraduate course in the University of Missouri, and during the second year of the award, she must be enrolled for graduate study in the Graduate Faculty of the University of Missouri.

## FRANCIS SCHOLARSHIP IN PUBLIC AFFAIRS FOR MEN

An award of the annual value of one-half the annual income on \$10,000 will be made to a student who has successfully completed three years of college work, and who has had fundamental training in those subjects which, in the opinion of the committee, best qualify him for service through business and public affairs. The award will be for two years, and is at present a loan. During the first year of the award, the recipient must be enrolled in his senior year of the undergraduate course in the University of Missouri, and during the second year of the award he must be enrolled for graduate study in the Graduate School, or in the School of Law of the University of Missouri. The intent of the scholarship is to encourage the student to pursue graduate study in government, politics, or international relations or diplomacy. But it is hoped that after having secured this training he will apply the knowledge and experience thus gained through a successful career in business. It is the desire of his sons, the executors of his will, to create in Governor Francis' memory the opportunity for others for a career which will enable them, as he did, to add to the material success of a business life, public service through leadership in public affairs. It is preferred that the recipient not take up diplomacy or politics as his life work but that in addition to his business activities, he will also take an active part in public affairs. This award is made on the basis of ability, scholastic attainment, merit, and actual need.

**PHI BETA KAPPA HIGH SCHOOL TROPHIES**

Two trophy cups awarded to Missouri high schools whose graduates show the highest scholastic averages as freshmen at the University of Missouri. One cup is limited to schools with enrollment of less than 250 having three or more representatives and the other to schools with enrollment of 250 or more having at least five representatives.

Awards are made at the close of each summer session on the basis of records for the preceding year. Each winning school is permitted to hold the cup for one year, except that any school winning twice within a six-year period is given permanent possession of the cup then in competition in its group. No annual award will be considered twice, however, in making a permanent award.

## GRANTS-IN-AID AND LOANS

### Grants-in-Aid to Athletes

The National Collegiate Athletic Association and the Missouri Valley Intercollegiate Athletic Association have approved grants in aid to students who are candidates for Intercollegiate Athletic teams. The University of Missouri is a member of both of these organizations.

These grants in aid are limited to tuition and fees and may be awarded upon the basis of need only. The University of Missouri has a number of such grants in aid available. Application for one of these grants should be made by applying to the Student Financial Aid Committee for a special form for this purpose.

### Loans and Loan Funds

There are several trust funds, administered for or by the Board of Curators, the income from which is available for loans to students enrolled in the University of Missouri who need financial assistance. Financial aid is not usually extended to students during the first semester of their first year, except from two funds which have been designated for that purpose by the donors. Only in exceptional cases are loans made during the first year. Real financial need, economy of expenditures, and good scholarship and conduct are necessary to secure consideration for a loan. Applications from students whose expenses exceed the average minimum will not be considered. Applications for loans must be filed with the Secretary of the University at least two weeks in advance of the time the assistance is desired. Inquiries for further information should be addressed to the Secretary of the University.

## GIFTS AND BEQUESTS

The University welcomes from its friends the endowment of prizes, scholarships, and fellowships, and the establishment of loan funds and professorships. It accepts bequests for the University libraries, for the erection of buildings, and for purchasing equipment and conducting research.

Prizes afford an opportunity to give suitable recognition to outstanding achievement in some educational activity. In addition to their monetary value, they are esteemed for the honor they bestow on the recipients. Scholarships provide many worthy students the opportunity to continue with their education when lack of adequate personal finances would seriously interrupt or terminate their educational plans.

Fellowships and graduate scholarships frequently are established to serve the twofold purpose of assisting students of unusual promise and of promoting investigation in special fields. Loan funds enable worthy students, by supplementing their own resources, to continue their studies without unnecessary financial worries. A scholarship, fellowship, prize, or loan fund may serve as a distinguished memorial to one whose memory should be perpetuated.

Anyone who makes gifts to the University for the purposes indicated may be assured that the bequests will be carried forward permanently and will be administered with the utmost diligence and with careful attention to his desires and intentions. It is the experience of the University that all gifts redound to the credit of the donors, encourage and benefit worthy students, and facilitate the advancement of knowledge. The University is empowered by the laws of the State of Missouri to act as Trustee in cases where property is left by will or bequest for the benefit of the University or the students.

At present there is a pressing need for additional scholarships for new students preparing to enter the University. These scholarships should be available to students entering the undergraduate divisions as freshmen and to students ready to begin their graduate studies in the Graduate School. The purpose is to encourage students of high promise.

Prospective donors are invited to consider the establishment of such scholarships to the University by will or by immediate bequest. The University cannot prepare wills for donors but stands ready to consult with either the donors or their attorneys for the purpose of giving information necessary to the preparation of wills or instruments of gift. The Curators of the University of Missouri shall collect the income from said fund and shall pay out of the income all charges of every kind and nature against or in connection with said fund.*

*After making all the payments hereinbefore mentioned, the Curators of the University of Missouri shall annually disburse the balance of said income for the purpose of carrying on and fostering research in the Department (or School) of..... at the University of Missouri, at Columbia, in such manner as the Curators of the University of Missouri, in its sole discretion, shall deem proper.*

#### 2. Scholarship

##### a. Gift

*I give, devise and bequeath to the Curators, of the University of Missouri, the sum of.....dollars, in trust, to be held, managed, controlled, invested and reinvested by the Curators of the University of Missouri. The fund hereby established shall be known as "The.....Scholarship Fund." The Curators of the University of Missouri shall collect the income from said fund and shall pay out of the income all charges of every kind and nature against or in connection with said fund.*

*After making all of the payments hereinbefore mentioned, the Curators of the University of Missouri shall use the balance of said income for the establishment, support, and maintenance of scholarships in aid of education in the University of Missouri, at Columbia, in such numbers and amounts thereof as shall be determined by the Curators of the University of Missouri in its*

sole discretion. Each scholarship so established shall be filled, from time to time, by a student in the Department of..... at the University of Missouri, at Columbia, who shall be selected by the Curators of the University of Missouri and who shall hold and fill said scholarship under and upon such terms and conditions and for such times as the Curators of the University of Missouri in its sole discretion, may prescribe; provided, however, that the sum or sums so paid to the student or students so selected shall be by way of a gift to the student or students so selected.

b. Loan

I give, devise and bequeath to the Curators of the University of Missouri, the sum of.....dollars, in trust, to be held, managed, controlled, invested and reinvested by the Curators of the University of Missouri. The fund hereby established shall be known as "The..... Loan Fund." The Curators of the University of Missouri shall collect the income from said fund and shall pay out of the income all charges of every kind and nature against or in connection with said fund.

After making all of the payments hereinbefore mentioned, the Curators of the University of Missouri shall use the balance of said income, or such portion thereof as it, in its sole discretion, shall deem necessary, in making loans to such needy and deserving students enrolled in and seeking an education at the University of Missouri, at Columbia, as shall be selected by the Curators of the University of Missouri, in such numbers and amounts, and upon such terms and conditions as the Curators of the University of Missouri, in its sole discretion, may prescribe. All loans so made are to be repaid to the Curators of the University of Missouri upon such terms, at such rates of interest and upon such security as the Curators of the University of Missouri may prescribe; provided, however, that the Curators of the University of Missouri need not, if it does not so desire, require security of any student to whom money may be loaned hereunder. The moneys repaid to the Curators of the University of Missouri by the recipients of loans made as above provided, shall be by the Curators of the University of Missouri, in its sole discretion, either again loaned as herein provided, or added to, and become a part of the principal sum of the scholarship endowment hereby established.

3. For Erection of Building

*I give, devise and bequeath to the Curators of the University of Missouri the sum of.....dollars, in trust, which shall be used by the Curators of the University of Missouri for the establishment, erection, and equipment of a building on the campus of the University of Missouri, at Columbia, to be known as.....Hall and to be used as..... The Curators of the University of Missouri shall expend the entire sum hereby given, or such portion thereof as in its uncontrolled discretion it shall deem proper, in accomplishing the purpose hereinbefore set forth. Any portion of the sum hereinbefore granted, which remains unexpended after the establishment, erection, and equipment of said building, may be used or, in the sole discretion of the Curators of the University of Missouri may be invested and re-invested and the income thereof used by the Curators of the University of Missouri, in its uncontrolled discretion, either for the maintenance of said building or for such educational purposes in the field of.....at the University of Missouri as the Curators of the University of Missouri in its uncontrolled discretion deems proper.*
