

UNIVERSITY OF MISSOURI SPEAKERS

This bulletin contains a list of University of Missouri speakers available for programs given by schools and other organizations throughout the State. It is hoped that this list, which was prepared in response to numerous requests for speakers, will prove both convenient and useful.

Program chairmen may find the placing of subjects in related groups helpful. Under the heading, "Classified Topics," thirty-nine subheadings are given, such as American Education, American Ideals, Farm and Rural Problems, and Guidance and Vocations, with more than 170 titles of addresses together with the speakers who deliver them.

Following the grouping of titles is an alphabetical list of fifty-seven speakers with biographical material about each. In the middle of the bulletin you will find the names of twenty-seven faculty members who regularly give Commencement addresses.

The University is pleased to have an opportunity to share its instructional facilities with all citizens of Missouri. It should be remembered, however, that because of the time taken in performance of regular duties, each of the speakers listed herein is available for only a limited number of engagements outside of Columbia.

UNIVERSITY SPEAKERS

Winston Allard

Associate Professor of Journalism; educated at the University of Oregon (B.S. 1937) and State University of Iowa (M.A. 1940); formerly instructor in Journalism, State University of Iowa; newspaper reporter and free-lance writer; has given radio lectures on writing and selling nonfiction; Major, Air Corps, World War II, Public Relations Officer, Ladd Field, Alaska; Chief Information Branch Training Aids Division, Hq. AAF; extensive travel in Alaska by air and dog team; guest article editor Colliers Magazine, summer, 1947.

Bower Aly

Professor of Speech; educated at Southeast Missouri State Teachers College (B.S. 1925), University of Missouri (A.M. 1926), University of California, Columbia University (Ph.D. 1941); lectured or taught at the following institutions: Columbia University, University of Wisconsin, the College of the City of New York. Syracuse University, University of Michigan, Northwestern University, Louisiana State University, University of Hawaii; editor since 1934 of the Debate Handbook of the National University Extension Association; author, *The Rhetoric of Alexander Hamilton* and of articles on speech-making and public address.

A. Sterl Artley

Associate Professor of Education and Director of the Child Study Clinic; educated at the University of Pittsburgh (A.B. 1931, M.Ed. 1934) and the Pennsylvania State College (Ph.D. 1942); teaching experience in the elementary and secondary schools of Pennsylvania from 1928 to 1940; supervisor of the Reading Clinic at the Pennsylvania State College (1940-1942); member of the American Psychological Association, National Society for the Study of Education, National Council for Exceptional Children, and Phi Delta Kappa; co-author of Reading for Independence Series, Books, I, II, III.

A. Cornelius Benjamin

Professor of Philosophy; educated at the University of Michigan (A.B. 1920, A.M. 1921, Ph.D. 1924); formerly at the University of Chicago; active in development of the Chicago Plan of General Education; Guggenheim Fellow in 1930-31; European and around-the-world travel; author Introduction to the Philosophy of Science and Logical Structure of Science.

William L. Bradshaw

Dean, School of Business and Public Administration and Professor of Political Science; educated at Central Missouri State Teachers College, University of Missouri (B.S. in education 1917; A. M. 1924), State University of Iowa (Ph.D. 1930); teaching experience in Missouri high schools, at the Central Missouri State Teachers' College, and the University of Puerto Rico; member 128th Field Artillery in World War I; member Columbia City Council 1934-38, Executive Secretary, Missouri Municipal League 1934-35, delegate at large in Missouri Constitutional Convention, 1943-44; author The Missouri Constitution Convention, 1922-23 and Education; The Missouri County Court; Township Organization in Missouri.

Thomas A. Brady

Vice-President in Charge of Extra Divisional Educational Activities, Professor of History; educated at University of Missouri (A.B. 1924) and Harvard University (A.M. 1926, Ph.D. 1931); member of Department of History staff, University of Missouri from 1926; John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Fellow for European study 1936-37; Director, Veterans Service Committee, University of Missouri 1944-46; State Coordinator for Adult Education, NEA Departent of Adult Education 1946; author of books and articles on Ancient History and The ASTP Foreign Area and Language Study.

J. S. Brushwood

Instructor in Spanish; educated at Randolph-Macon College (B.A. 1940), University of Virginia (M.A. 1942), University of Mexico (summer 1943); student at Columbia University (1944-46), currently candidate for Ph.D. in Spanish from Columbia University; teaching experience at Virginia Polytechnic Institute; dissertation on the *Mexican Romantic Novel* in preparation.

Herbert Bunker

Director of Alumni Activities and Associate Professor of Physical Education; educated at the University of Missouri (A.B. 1923, A.M. 1938, Ed.D. 1943); teaching and coaching experience at Alabama Polytechnic Institute, University of Florida, Culver-Stockton College (Canton, Missouri), and the University of Missouri; member of Phi Beta Kappa, Phi Delta Kappa, American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation, the College Physical Education Association and the American Alumni Council.

Carl H. Chapman

Director of American Archaeology and Instructor in Sociology and Anthropology; educated at University of Missouri (A.B. 1939) and University of Nebraska (M.A. 1946); 2nd Lieutenant Army Air Force (1942-45) serving as bombardier-navigator on B-24 in Italy; author A Preliminary Survey of Missouri Archaeology; fellow of American Anthropological Association; secretary-treasurer Missouri Archaeological Society; editor of The Missouri Archaeologist; Director of the museum of Anthropology, University of Missouri.

William E. Drake

Professor of Education; educated at University of North Carolina (A.B. 1924, M.A. 1928, Ph.D. 1930); Principal Murphy School, University of North Carolina; Superintendent of Schools, Columbia, N. C.; Teaching Fellow University of North Carolina; Ass't. Prof. Pennsylvania State College; Professor Shrivenham American University, England; attached to U.S. Army for European Theater of Operations; member of numerous honorary and professional organizations; co-author, Sociological Foundations of Education and of Significant Aspects of American Life and Post-war Education.

S. Morris Eames

Instructor in Philosophy; educated at Culver-Stockton College (A.B. 1939), University of Missouri (A.M. 1941) and University of Chicago; instructor in Philosophy and Religion, Culver-Stockton College (1942-44);

commissioner in Boy Scout organization; past-secretary of Central Missouri Philosophy Club; instructor in Philosophy at Roosevelt College, Chicago, Illinois (summer 1948); author of many poems and articles in popular and scholarly magazines.

Elmer Ellis

Dean, College of Arts and Science, Professor of History; educated at North Dakota (A.B. 1924, M.A. 1925) and Iowa (Ph.D. 1930), University of North Dakota (LL.D. 1946); President, National Council for the Social Studies 1937; Historical Branch, Military Intelligence Division of the War Department General Staff, 1943-45; author, Henry Moore Teller, Defender of the West; Mr. Dooley's America; A Life of Finley Peter Dunne, editor, Education Against Propaganda; Mr. Dooley at His Best.

W. Francis English

Assistant Dean College of Arts and Science, Professor of History, and Director of Western Historical Manuscripts Collection; educated at Northeast Missouri State Teachers College (B.S. 1927) and University of Missouri (A.M. 1931, Ph.D. 1943); formerly principal of high schools at Fayette and Carrollton, Missouri and superintendent of schools at Fulton, Missouri; Visiting Professor University of Minnesota (summer 1947); consultant in Social Studies, State Department of Education (1939-40); editor of "The Social Studies" Bulletin 4a of the State Department of Education; author "The Pioneer Lawyer and Jurist in Missouri"; member of Phi Delta Kappa, Alpha Pi Zeta, and Blue Key; First Vice-President National Council for Social Studies 1948, President of same 1949 --.

Louis A. Eubank

Associate Professor of Education and Director of Teacher Placement; educated at Central Missouri State College (B.S. 1922), University of Missouri (A.M. 1925, Ph.D. 1931) and additional graduate work in the University of Chicago; teacher in rural schools, high schools, and superintendent of schools in Missouri; Dean of the Faculty at Christian College (Columbia, Missouri) and Dean of the Faculty and Head of the Division of Education in the Northeast Missouri State Teachers College; member of Executive Committee Missouri State Teachers Association, Kappa Delta Pi, Phi Delta Kappa and other professional organizations.

Merna Irene Fletcher

Assistant Professor of Geography; educated at Colorado School of Education (B.A), Columbia University (M.A.) and advanced graduate courses (one year); teaching experience at Arizona State Teachers College, Oregon State Teachers College and Iowa State Teachers College; extensive travel in U.S.A.; member of National Council Geography Teachers, A.S.P.G., and fellow of AGS; author of articles on economic, urban and political geography.

William Franklin Fratcher

Associate Professor of Law; educated at Wayne University (A.B. 1933, A.M. 1938), the University of Michigan (J.D. 1936), The Command and General Staff School (Graduate 1944) and the University of Paris; engaged in general practice of law at Detroit, Michigan, 1936-41; Captain, Major and

Lieutenant Colonel, Judge Advocate General's Department, United States Army, 1941-47; editor Bulletin of the Judge Advocate General of the Army, editor 1943 Reprint, Manual for Courts-Martial, U. S. Army, and Historical Officer, Office of the Judge Advocate General, 1942-43; Executive to the Assistant Judge Advocate General in charge of Civil Matters, 1943-44; Chief, Miscellaneous Branch, Military Justice Division, Branch Office of the Judge Advocate General with the European Theater of Operations, Paris, France, 1945; Chief, War Crimes Branch, Legal Division, Office of Military Government for Germany (U.S.), 1945-46; Staff Judge Advocate, Berlin District, U.S. Army, and Headquarters Command, United States Forces, European Theater, 1946; member of Editorial Board, 1949 Edition, Manual for Courts-Martial, U. S. Army; member, Legion of Merit and Order of Coif.

Newell S. Gingrich

Professor of Physics; educated at North Central College (B.A. 1926), Lafayette (M.A. 1927), and University of Chicago (Ph.D. 1930); teacher at Mt. Allison University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology; Naval Ordnance Laboratory and Office of Scientific Research and Development during the war; research in x-rays, detection of radioactive poisons, and the structure of liquids.

Noel P. Gist

Professor of Sociology; educated at Kansas State Teachers College (B.S. 1923), University of Kansas (A.M. 1929), and Northwestern University (Ph.D. 1935); teacher at University of Kansas, Michigan State College, Washington University, and University of Wisconsin; Past President Mid-West Sociological Society; member executive committee American Sociological Society; author, Secret Societies; co-author Urban Society; Selective Factors in Migration and Occupation.

William E. Gwatkin, Jr.

Professor of Classical Languages and Archaeology; educated at William Jewell College (A.B. 1921), Indiana University (A.M. 1923), Princeton University (Ph.D 1930), teaching experience at Indiana University, Princeton University, McMaster University, University of Missouri; travel in Western Europe, Italy and Greece; member of professional and honorary societies, including Phi Beta Kappa (sometime President and Secretary, Alpha of Missouri chapter); Chairman of Production Committee for Missouri course of study in high school Latin.

Lewis E. Hahn

Associate Professor of Philosophy; educated at University of Texas (B.A., M.A. 1929) and University of California (Ph.D 1939); teaching experience at University of California, Princeton University and University of Missouri; author, A Contextualistic Theory of Perception.

Mark Hale

Professor of Social Work and Chairman Department of Social Work; educated at Hiram College (A.B. 1932), University of Missouri (M.A. 1933) and University of Chicago; experience in Missouri Relief Commission, National

Youth Administration, State Children's Bureau, State Social Security Commission; teaching experience at School of Social Work at Vanderbilt University, University of Chicago and Tulane University.

John G. Heinberg

Professor of Political Science; educated at Washington University (A.B. 1923, M.A. 1924), Brookings Graduate School of Economics and Government (Ph.D. 1927); in France 1929-30 as Social Science Research Council Fellow; author, Comparative Major European Governments, "French Government Under Petain," and (with A. C. Breckenridge) Law Enforcement in Missouri.

Lawrence M. Hepple

Assistant Professor Rural Sociology; educated at Central College (A.B. 1932) and University of Missouri (A.M. 1940, Ph.D. 1946); author, Veterans and Rejectees in Randolph County, Missouri, 1940-46.

O. R. Johnson

Professor of Agricultural Economics and Chairman Department of Agricultural Economics; educated at University of Missouri (B.S. 1910, A.M. 1912) and Cornell University; teaching, research and administrative experience University of Missouri since 1910; veteran World War I; economic consultant Missouri Farm Bureau Federation; member Columbia City Council 6 years; chairman Columbia City Council.

Louis G. Kahle

Instructor, Department of Political Science; educated at San Antonio Junior College, Rice Institute, the University of Texas (B.A. and B.S. in Education, 1935; M.A. 1937); teaching experience at Wentworth Military Academy; research assistant in the field of Latin-American Studies at the University of Texas; research analyst in the Office of Strategic Services (Latin-American Division) and the Department of State, 1942-1945; many years residence in Mexico; U. S. Army, World War II.

Robert F. Karsch
