## *The New Building*

Our college is to have an additional building to meet the growing needs. The building is to be erected upon the lot directly across the street from the building now occupied at the corner of Tenth Street and Troost Avenue. The building will cover the entire lot 83 x 150 feet. The exterior of the building will be terra cotta and mat faced brick, a very beautiful combination.

The first floor frontage on Tenth Street will be sublet for shops, but the north half of the first floor will be used for rest room and locker space. The entrance for students will be on the Troost Avenue side of the building, and a separate entrance for the clinic patients will be on the Tenth Street side.

The entire second floor will be for the clinic and will accommodate one hundred and fifty chairs, a reception room for adults, a separate reception room for children, and a third reception room for colored patients; the dispensing, sterilizing and X-ray room will be in the center of the infirmary. Separate rooms or offices will be provided for extracting under local anaesthetic and gas, also hospital room, two examination rooms, orthodontia department, prosthetic department and soldering.

On the third floor will be two lecture rooms with a capacity for one hundred seventy five students each, microscopic laboratory to accommodate the classes in sections of sixty, a similar room for chemistry; also technique laboratory accommodating three hundred seniors and juniors.

The picture of the building will give a fair idea of the immense amount of light that will be afforded. Notice that the second floor windows are in groups of four with a transom above; the ceiling being high this gives excellent light and ventilation, adequate electric lighting will also be provided. Concrete floors will add considerable for sanitation.

Plans and specifications are being drawn for the equipment for the new building.

The building now occupied at the Northwest corner of Tenth Street and Troost Avenue will be remodeled for the executive offices, library, museum, freshmen and sophomore laboratories and one lecture room.

One bright morning in the summer of 1855, four United States ships of the Orient Expeditionary Squadron under the command of Admiral Perry anchored in the bay of Hakodate City. The ships were painted black and they had large round wheels at the middle of the ships. Huge clouds of black smoke emitted from the stacks of the ships and they appeared like monsters that had come from the sky.

According to a notice by the government, children and old people took refuge in the nearest villages. No people were seen on the streets and it appeared as if it were a dead town. The representatives of the United States and Japan held a conference. Admiral Perry kindly advised the ignorant Governor of Hakodate to open the port soon and trade with the United States.

In the past half century Japan has developed to such an extent that the nation is now recognized as a world power. The reason that it has progressed so rapidly is due to the fact that trade with the United States was started by Admiral Perry. The latest civilization of Japan depends very greatly on the United States. I cannot help recalling the historical conference of the Japanese Army in 1906. The Russian Army possessed twice the strength of the Japanese Army. The Russian forces were superior in every respect and there was no doubt that the next battle of Mukden would determine the rise or fall of Japan. D. was president. The name of Theodore Roosevelt shall be remembered and revered as long as Japan shall exist.

No modern society in Japan is more dependent upon the United States than Dentistry. One hundred years ago the dentists in our nation were only medicine sellers who stood on the corner of the street and made sport with a long sword or by spinning a top.

Modern American Dentistry is the bright professional beacon of the world. American Dentists have a great responsibility to lead the dentists of the world.

We were very very happy during our year of study at the Kansas City-Western Dental College. We were treated with the kindness and respect, which we have never experienced in our past life. We especially desire to thank Dr. C. C. Allen and Dr. R. J. Rinehart. Everybody in the college may God bless them forever.

God bless the President of the United States and his Nation. The intimacies between Japan and the United States of America will be continued forever. We pray that her kindness to Japan shall continue as in the past.

Bro. G. E. Bobo: We'll let the phone go—it's stopped ringing anyway.

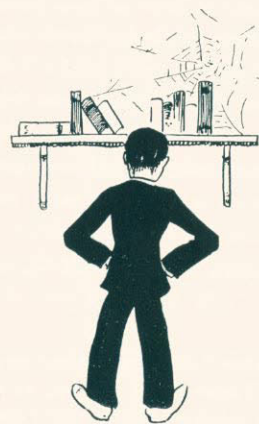
