








- View of the Clinic Floor

YOUR IMPORTANCE IN OUR NATIONAL WELFARE


Students in Dentistry are always important to the welfare of our country. Now, with our Nation at war, they are indispensable to our national security and welfare.

Already more than 12,000 dentists are serving as Dental officers in our Army and Navy of four and a half million men. If this enlisted personnel, as predicted, increases in 1943 to seven and a half million, it may be that another 7,000 dentists will be called into service. This year there are 8,878 dental students in the United States and virtually all of them hold Reserve Commissions as Second Lieutenants in the Medical Administrative Corps, or as Ensigns in the Navy. The combined dental schools are graduating 1,946 seniors this year and all of them will go into the Army, Navy and Public Health Service, or will become internes in hospitals and clinics.

These statistics emphasize the tremendous responsibility of dental students everywhere. As students of one of the outstanding schools of Dentistry in the country, you have special obligations and special opportunities. The older dentists of the nation have generously assumed responsibility for looking after the civilian population and workers in war industry. To you has been assigned the task of protecting the health of our fighting forces. In this task, I know you will reflect honor upon yourselves, your University, and your country.

Our best wishes go with you wherever you are. For whatever problems you face, we want you to remember that the University is your Alma Mater and that you will always find her deeply interested and concerned in your welfare. We want you to keep in touch with Her in the years ahead.








LOWRY CLINIC

Dr. Howard S. Lowry was a prominent dentist in Kansas City and in his will he provided that a certain amount of his estate should be placed in trust to provide dental service for indigent children. In 1930, Dr. Rinehart, the dean of our school, appealed to the trustees of the estate and the Kansas City District Dental Society to allow the proceeds from this fund to be paid to the Kansas City-Western Dental College to assist in maintaining the free clinic for indigent children of the Kansas City Public Schools. The clinic was established in 1919. Since 1930 the free clinic has been called the Lowry Clinic.

In previous years an intern was assigned for a period of one year, but for the past two years the Lowry Clinic has been directed by the clinical instructors assisted by two student appointees selected from the senior class.

OUR CREED


"We will fight for the ideals and aims of our profession whether alone or with many.

The junior has a lot of new equipment—a mustache, a little confidence, and a pocket full of new instruments—but he begins to wonder whether he's learning anything about dentistry.


The senior knows definitely that he doesn't know any dentistry, but he's still the ideal and the envy of first, second, and third year students, decreasing quantitatively in that order.
