


It seems just a short time ago now that the Chancellor of the University of Kansas City talked with me on the telephone. He told me of a very cogent plan to better the University. By now, the "Friend Raising" campaign carried on by Dr. Richard M. Drake is a proven success.

Mere statistics do not tell the full story. Nor could a lengthy essay say all that is necessary. Only the spirit of friendship gained for this University by the untiring efforts of Dr. Drake and his staff can show just how successful "Friend Raising" has become.

Dr. Drake told me of his speech-making campaigns in which he carried the story of the University to some 5,000 people by giving an average of 2 speeches per week to civic and social clubs in the Kansas City area.

But "Friend Raising" doesn't pay the bills. The quiet campaign conducted by the University has raised some \$220,000 to help pay the difference between tuition and the actual cost of running such an institution.

A true portrait of a university would be incomplete without mention of the efforts of Dr. Drake. For this is the picture that will make or break the University of Kansas City as a truly great university.

Therefore, the Kangaroo staff dedicates this yearbook to Dr. Richard M. Drake, Chancellor, and to the spirit of "Friend Raising".





PROLOGUE


Events are the milestones of the passing year. The coming of the first earth satellite, the consequent race for bigger and better Sputniks, civil disturbances in Little Rock, the beginning of what is currently known as The Recession-all have arisen, marked their place, and have been passed by in the course of the year. Closer to home, at the University of Kansas City there have been milestones also as we have reached our twenty-fifth year. At the homecoming festivities in February the first graduating class-1936-celebrated its twentieth anniversary and ten professors-Drs. Adams, Buschman, Cappon, Crain, Eisenbrandt, Ekblaw, Mannheim, Misbach, and Stone-were honored for their twenty years of great teaching at The University of Kansas City. The expanding Development Office reported more than \$350,000 received in gifts in the Great Teaching program. The expansion of the Evening Division serves as a mark of progress, as the University has become more a part of the community. The many aspects of the Continuing Education division have brought the University and the community into closer contact. We now have our own FM radio station, KCUR-FM, bringing good music and informative programs to its ever-growing audience; and the scope of our music program has been further widened by the addition of the modern jazz concerts, which were indeed well received. There has been the raise in tuition which has been met with mixed feelings, depending on whether or not one will have to pay it; feelings toward the increase have been smoothed somewhat by the fact that a part will go to help build the new student union, which is scheduled for construction beginning in September, 1958. Another national professional fraternity joins the ranks as Apotheke became Kappa Epsilon. Many things, large and small, have marked the passing year; the appointment of Dr. Drake as Chancellor, and the untimely death of Dr. Misbach being two of the greater.










ARTS and SCIENCES

DEAN JOHN E. BARNETT

The College of Arts and Sciences was founded in 1933 and since that time it has grown rapidly, paving the way for the six other schools which, along with it, make up the University of Kansas City. Under the leadership of Dean John Barnett, the college provides a balanced, all-round education for its students, trains them for the specific fields which they desire. Last year, a department in engineering was added to the college and already has proved itself a popular attraction. The addition of this new department is an indication of the growth, past and future, of the College of Arts and Sciences. Several degrees are offered in the college. They are the B.A., B.S., M.A., and the M.S. (in biology, chemistry, and mathematics).

Dean Barnett, head of the college, has done an especially excellent job of performing his many and varied duties. His untiring devotion to his work accounts for much of the progress of the college. Well-known and well-liked by all students, Dean Barnett is an efficient, personable man who accomplishes all that he sets out to do.

ARTS and SCIENCES

ASSOCIATE DEAN LORENZ MISBACH

May 3rd marked the passing of Dr. Lorenz Misbach, Associate Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. The educator had been in critical condition in Menorah Hospital as a result of an auto accident two days earlier. Dr. Misbach joined the University faculty in 1935 and served as chairman of the Psychology Department from 1941 to 1954; he became Associate Dean two years later in 1956. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Baker University in 1929, and his Master's degree in 1931 and his doctorate in 1933 from Northwestern University. Listed in "Who's Who in America" and a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Dr. Misbach was chairman of the Foundations Program at the University, and fellow of the American Psychological Association, and a director of Greater Kansas City Mental Health Foundation. A capable and efficient administrator, he was appointed in 1957 Acting Vice-Chancellor of the University. In his twenty-three years of devoted service he influenced the development not only of his own department but of this University as a whole. He has earned an enduring place in the annals of the University of Kansas City and in the hearts and minds of students and alumni.



IN MEMORIAM



BUSINESS

DEAN CHARLES E. GILLILAND, JR.

Dean Charles E. Gilliland of the School of Business Administration resigned his post in February to accept a job with the State Department. He became Dean of the Business School in 1954 when that school became a separate division of the University. In its second year the Business School showed a tremendous increase in enrollment; now in its fourth year, it shows promise of becoming one of the biggest schools of the University. Situated in this large metropolitan area, the school offers unlimited advantages and opportunities to students training for positions in commerce and industry. By gradually introducing new programs, the Business School intends to keep pace in growth with the rest of the University. The latest program initiated by Dean Gilliland before he left the University is a course in retailing, already very popular.

Liked and admired by all who knew him, Dean Gilliland led the Business School through its difficult formative years. Filling the position he left is of paramount importance in the University's future. Don Carlyon, Business Manager of the University, served as Executive Officer for the remainder of the year, in addition to carrying out his many regular duties.

EDUCATION

DEAN HUGH W. SPEER

Lord of Epperson Manor, Dr. Hugh W. Speer has been Dean of the School of Education since its organization as a separate school in 1954. The fine old mansion at Fiftysecond and Cherry housed for the second year a veritable hive of activity, which is, under the leadership of Dean Speer, one of the strong attractions of the University, in both winter and summer. Dr. Speer came to The University of Kansas City in 1945, and became chairman of the department of Education in 1948. Under his sure and expert guidance the department grew into a separate school which offers the Bachelor's, Master's, and Doctor's degree. Dean Speer's experience in the field of education has been quite varied, having been a public school administrator for ten years prior to World War II, directed the Veterans Advisement Center at U.K.C., served as principal of high schools in Fredonia and Hays, Kansas and as lecturer in the University of Tehran and advisor to the Minister of Education on curriculum as a Fulbright Scholar in Iran. The author of numerous articles in educational journals, he is listed in Who's Who In America, Leaders in Education, and Who's Who in American Education. Dr. Speer is married and the father of two daughters. He received his Bachelor's degree in 1928 from American University, his Master's in 1932 from George Washington University, and his Doctor's in 1950 from the University of Chicago.



PHARMACY

DEAN LESLIE L. EISENBRANDT

Dean of the School of Pharmacy since 1953, Dr. Leslie L. Eisenbrandt has been on the faculty of the University since 1936, when he started his career here as an instructor in biology. Serving for a time as director of research and associate professor of physiology in the School of Dentistry, in 1947 he began working full time in pharmacology. Specializing in the fields of physiology and biochemistry, Dean Eisenbrandt received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Emporia in 1932, his Master of Sciences degree from Kansas State College in 1934, and his doctorate from Rutgers University in 1936. A member of Sigma Xi, the honorary science society, the American Society of Pharmacology, and the Society for Experimental Biology and Medicine, Dr. Eisenbrandt is married and has four sons. Though quiet and unpretentious, he has capably assumed the myriad administrative duties of his position, and has ably led the University of Kansas City School of Pharmacy to greater heights of achievement and respect in the annals of the profession.



EVENING DIVISION

DEAN CJ STEVENS

A man of many talents and titles, Dr. Cj Stevens serves the University as Acting Dean of the Evening Division, Director of Radio and Television Department, and Assistant Professor of Speech. Since these three jobs could not satisfy him completely, he found time this year to use his ability as a poet to do a new and very fine translation of the libretto of Strauss' opera, Der Rosenkavalier, which was a highlight of the Kansas City theatre season, presented by the University in March. In addition to poetry, Dr. Stevens has published several articles on speech in learned journals. A popular and very active member of the faculty, he is a man with lots of ideas, and has been responsible for promoting the Evening Division program of non-credit courses to a doubled enrollment over last year. His untiring efforts are a vital asset to our University, as we strive to become more and more an integral part of this metropolitan area. Both former undergraduates of The University of Kansas City, Dr. Stevens and his wife have a son 19 and a daughter 13. One of the most important fruits of these efforts, the first, and very successful year of operation of KCUR-FM stands as a milestone of achievement for Dr. Stevens, the Radio-TV Department, the University, and the Kansas City area as a whole.



LAW

DEAN MARLIN M. VOLZ


It was with deep regret that the University heard the news of Dean Volz' appointment as Dean of the School of Law at the University of Louisville. One of the most prominent and well-liked members of the faculty, Dr. Marlin M. Volz has served the University of Kansas City in that capacity for eight years. With the new building dedicated in 1950, an assortment of prominent alumni, a long and outstanding record of high achievement, and the fine leadership of Dean Volz, the University of Kansas City has had good reason to be proud of its School of Law. Holding all three degrees from the University of Wisconsin, Dean Volz developed at UKC a continuing legal education program, inaugurated the Legal Aid Clinic, established the annual Law Day, and developed a Master's degree program in Law. Much respected by students, faculty, and alumni, Dr. Volz held the responsibility of being chairman of the faculty committee for the selection of the chancellor. The Law School being another vital link with the community, Dean Volz was very active in civic organizations; he was President of South Kansas City's Business Club, Commander of the Bland American Legion Post, member of the Mayor's committee on human relations, and chairman of the Kansas City Citizens' committee on juvenile delinquency.


DENTISTRY

DEAN JOSEPH F. JACOBS










IN MEMORIAM

LEGAL AID CLINIC

The Legal Aid Clinic was established in April 1951 as a charitable institution with the three-fold purpose of (1) aiding with advice those people who are unable to afford the services of an attorney, (2) assisting the local bar, by handling unremunerative legal matters, (3) enabling students of law to prepare themselves better for practice of law after graduation. It is operated by second and third year UKC law students who must be in good academic standing. They are selected for the group on the basis of interest and ability. The staff is headed by a Chairman and Secretary-Treasurer under the supervision of a Faculty Advisor. Professional Lawyers from Kansas City operate as Attorneys of Record and assist the staff members in preparing the necessary legal documents. The group considers qualified cases brought by residents of Kansas City, Missouri, and handles cases referred to the Clinic by public welfare agencies, which usually concern some phase of domestic relations, and also accepts the cases of servicemen, of the kind which the Bar Committee would assist without charge, such as the drafting of a power of attorney, or of drafting a will for a serviceman. The Clinic also aids in cases referred to it by lawyers, as well as in small collections, and in small claims cases, again, for persons unable to afford the services of a lawyer.

The Clinic does not consider bankruptcy cases, personal injuries cases, criminal cases, except insofar as the Clinic may be able to assist an attorney appointed by the court to defend a person accused of having committed a felony, or in any other case in which it appears that an attorney could earn a fee.





With more people taking part in more tournaments, the debate team had a successful year winning an overall total of 38 debates. Members of the team took part in 9 tournaments. 
Perhaps no newspaper has ever had such a stormy history as has the University News this year. Three editors attempted to publish a decent newspaper that would be read by the students for which it was published.


ORIENTATION DANCES






The Olympic Tray-Sliding team is a group devoted to the pursuit of healthful winter sport and testing the resilience of human bones. The first meeting occurred late one night this year when a member reasoned that there would be a low coefficient of friction between trays liberated from the cafeteria and the ice on the hill just north of the student union building. (Later it was found that fiberglass "flying saucers" served the purpose as well as cafeteria trays without arousing the antagonism of the administration.) The procedure for proper tray-sliding is simple if somewhat bruising: one places the vehicle on the hill's crest, steps back about twenty feet, executes a running broad-jump onto the tray, and then goes whizzing down the hill. (The ride is equally as thrilling if one misses the tray.) The steering of the trays ranges from erratic to impossible, so spectators are occasionally run down by mistake. Stopping the tray is accomplished by crashing into a cheap tree. Activities of the group have been temporarily halted by a lack of snow and the slowness with which certain bones knit, but the Tray-Sliding Team hopes to overcome these minor setbacks soon and be back into operation.

Whether by leading the grandstand in yells or just by smiling to the boys, this octet was elemental in creating the excitement and good feeling at our games. Much outside time was contributed by these girls to perfect their work in representing our school spirit.



The successful Playhouse year of 1957-58 was begun with John Patrick's Teahouse of the August Moon. Playing October 15 to 19, the play was light, happy, and brought crowds to the theatre. Standing room only was the rule on both Friday and Saturday nights. For five beautiful autumn nights, Jess La Puma as Sakini, the philosophical Okinawan interpreter, and Jim Lawless, misfit Captain Fisby, led an unsuccessful battle against the charms of Lotus Blossom, Pat Nicholson. The production had the novelty of set changes being made by the cast during the action of the play. The play was directed by Dr. Alban Varnado. After the opening night performance, refreshments were served under Japanese lanterns in the Patio, to celebrate the opening of the new Playhouse season.

The year's second production gave Kansas City children a new version of an old tale, November 5 to 16, when sixteen performances of Hans Christian Andersen's The Emperor's New Clothes were given in an oriental, rather than European setting. The emperor in this instance was Chinese. His foils were two mythological creatures, Zar and Zan. The greedy Han, an enemy to the city's weavers, desired not only to pocket their profits for himself, but to gain control of the vain emperor, as well. However, through the shrewd manipulating of the two good sprites the evil Han was brought to task and the emperor's silly vanity revealed for all its foolishness. J. Morton Walker directed the play, the first of two staged for the Community Children's Theatre Inc.

Early December saw modern French drama on the Playhouse stage in the form of Jean Anoiulh's The Lark. An adventure in stylization, the production had no realistic set, rather, was played on a series of stairs, levels, and cubes. Bits of scenery hinted at changes of place, and much "painting with light" was done. Norma Langer, in the tremendous role of Joan of Arc, brought a star performance to the part; Don Sollars was a dashing, yet suave Warwick; and Alex Santoro's Dauphin brought much favorable comment. The climax of the play featured an amazing stage effect—Joan was burned at the stake right before the eyes of the audience. Dr. Patricia McIlrath directed the play, which had a happy ending after all, when Joan popped back to witness the success of her career—the crowning of her "Charlie" as the king of France.

In February, Dr. McIlrath again was the director, the play this time being Anton Chekov's poignant and powerful The Cherry Orchard. The wistful air of a Russia which died fifty years ago drew overflow crowds and extra chairs were required to seat them all. The director experimented with the Stanislavski "method" in aiding the cast to faithfully reproduce the sensitive, introspective Russians of the Ranevskaya estate—one of the few times it has been used by the Playhouse staff. To stage this masterpiece, three sets were required, and the slip stage was put into use. Lawana Walters, Tom Buckley, John Nelson, and a generally fine cast created a successful run for this, Chekov's pastel giant.

Bravo! A bright red-orange curtain went up, revealing two figures in a bright red-orange bed—thus began the first act of a rollicking, boisterous, and uninhibitedly funny production of Richard Strauss' Der Rosenkavalier. The opera was done up in truly grand opera style, with three colorful sets and gay, elaborate Rococo costumes. Chester O'Bannon triumphed as clumsy Baron Ochs, and both sopranos (the show was double-cast) were regal Marschallins. The clever dialogue was a new translation from the German by Dr. Cj Stevens, Dean of the Evening Division. Indeed, many people took many hours to put together this Playhouse "spectacular." J. Morton Walker was the proud father of this success, a combination of the talents of both speech and music departments. The opera, presented in March, ran for six performances instead of the regular five, playing an extra matinee on Sunday.

The second production for Community Children's Theatre Inc., also presented in March, was based on Washintgon Irving's tale of Rip Van Winkle. The play was a cut made and modified from the original book by the play's director, Durward Redd. Through the magic of make-up, Tom Buckley as Rip aged twenty years to become a stranger in his own home town. Buddy Zimmer, who had starred earlier in the first children's production, returned to share the lead with Buckley in this one. Special effects, complete with falling leaves and falling snow, were put into use to create the passage of twenty years, and Rip's rendezvous in the mountains with Henry Hudson and his ghostly crew included thunder and lightning.


Generally receiving bad reviews, William Gibson's new play, Joseph and Herod, had its world premiere on the Playhouse stage in April. The play was even directed by its author, but despite the fact, did not attain the high standards of the overall season. Biblical in theme, the drama recounted the struggle of Joseph, father of Christ, as he was torn between materialism and spiritualness—a struggle resulting in his death. Although the production was lacking, it did point the way towards more original writing in the Kansas City area. The work was presented by Mr. Gibson as his Master's degree project.

William Shakespeare's comedy, Much Ado About Nothing, brought the season to an end in May. Like the season's opener, this play, too, was directed by Dr. Alban Varnado. The production sparkled. Mila Jean Ehrlich and Jim Lawless as the famous Beatrice and Benedict fired at each other with smiling glee, and veteran actor Art Ellison brought the house down every evening with his uproarious Dogberry. The show was very light and witty. The cast played it very vigorously. The set was of the unit variety, with only the raising and lowering of curtains indicating a change in scene, and the colorful, stylized-Renaissance costumes helped along the bright comedy atmosphere.

Douglas Russell designed the costumes for this year's season, and J. Morton Walker did all of the sets, except Der Rosenkavalier and Rip Van Winkle, which were created by Durward Redd. This year demonstrated the fine cooperation between student and community players; many fine actors were found to exist on campus as well as in the city itself. In May, at the annual Playhouse Awards Banquet, the many people who worked on this year's plays were recognized, and plans were already under way for the new season.

MUSIC DEPARTMENT









The Music Department began its year with the appointment of two new members to its faculty: Maurice Cater, band director, and Hugo Vianello, orchestra conductor. Under Mo Cater's direction, the University Band made several appearances in the community. Despite many difficulties and hardships, Mr. Vianello built the University orchestra into a fine performing group and their annual concert at the Playhouse was very well received. Many members of the department participated in "Der Rosenkavalier", this year's opera offering, which the Music Department produced in co-operation with the Theater and Art departments. The vocal ensemble appeared on several programs, and throughout the year, the many soloists in the department also appeared often in the community. Faculty members also made many appearances in the vicinity as guest soloists, conductors, etc. Under the direction of Dr. Everett Hendricks, the choir began its year with an appearance with the Kansas City Philharmonic Orchestra performing Stravinsky's "Symphony of Psalms", a television appearance, and several convention programs. Then came the annual Christmas concerts, which included a repeat performance of Respighi's "Lauala per la Nativita del Signore". With four successful concerts out of the way the choir began preparing for the approaching twenty-four spring appearances, ten of which would be during their tour through Minnesota and Iowa. Upon their return from the tour, the choir cut a record on the RCA Victor Artists' label. With anticipation of more appearances and a longer tour in 1958-59, the choir closed the year by singing at the Commencement Exercises.






Under the auspices of the Radio Department and the drection of Dr. Cj Stevens, Gary McCoy, and Ron Christison, the third annual Hi-Fi Festival was held in Haag Hall in October. A large part of the community, as well as many students, turned out to look over this varied display of Hi-Fi sets, records, tape recorders, and other electrical equipment. The Festival gave the University a chance to serve the City, and the City, in turn, became more familiar with the school. A big feature of this year's Festival was the announcement of the University's own contribution to radio and fine music—Station KCUR-FM.











After spending a year locating, installing and testing equipment, and ironing out technical and production problems, KCUR-FM began broadcasting October 21, at 7 P. M., on 89.3 megacycles as Kansas City's second FM station. It is Missouri's second such educational station. The seemingly impossible technical problems were solved by the hard work and technical knowledge of Bill Hunacutt, KCMO-FM engineer, Sam Scott, managing director of KCUR-FM, Cyril Feldstein, Gary McCoy and Bob Musburger. KCUR-FM provides radio service not otherwise offered in this area. It features twenty-one hours of broadcasting daily, fifteen of which are music ranging from opera to jazz and from symphonies to children's music. Six hours of discussion with speakers on subjects ranging from world trade to juvenile delinquency rounds out the schedule. The loyal audience,

built up by this programming, is growing steadily, with requests for advanced program schedules numbering over 1000 each month. KCUR-FM is looking forward to an increased programming schedule and a boost in transmitter power to be accomplished as soon as funds are made available. The part KCUR-FM has played in bringing the University closer to Kansas City is explained by the fact that it reaches many people of the community who had never been reached by any other means. This should make it obvious that the plans for the future need to be carried out immediately.






