STUDENT RECRUITMENT

The Challenge: To interest students in attending our university. *The Problem:* To find the method and then successfully carry out the details. Mr. Leo J. Sweeney, Director of Admissions and Registrar, and Mr. Ralph Henderson, Assistant Director of Admissions, formulated the initial plans and laid the groundwork. Funds were allocated to the project by the Student Council. Four students, Jim Fulbright, Tom Talbott, Richard Replogle, and Pam Patrick, were appointed to act as co-ordinators, and to organize the over one hundred student volunteers. These student recruiters called over five thousand high school seniors and gave them information about the university and other institutions. Campus tours were organized and counseling was conducted on a student to student level. The summer was successful in introducing U.K.C. to prospective students and in adding many of them to the student body.

DR. CARLETON F. SCOFIELD

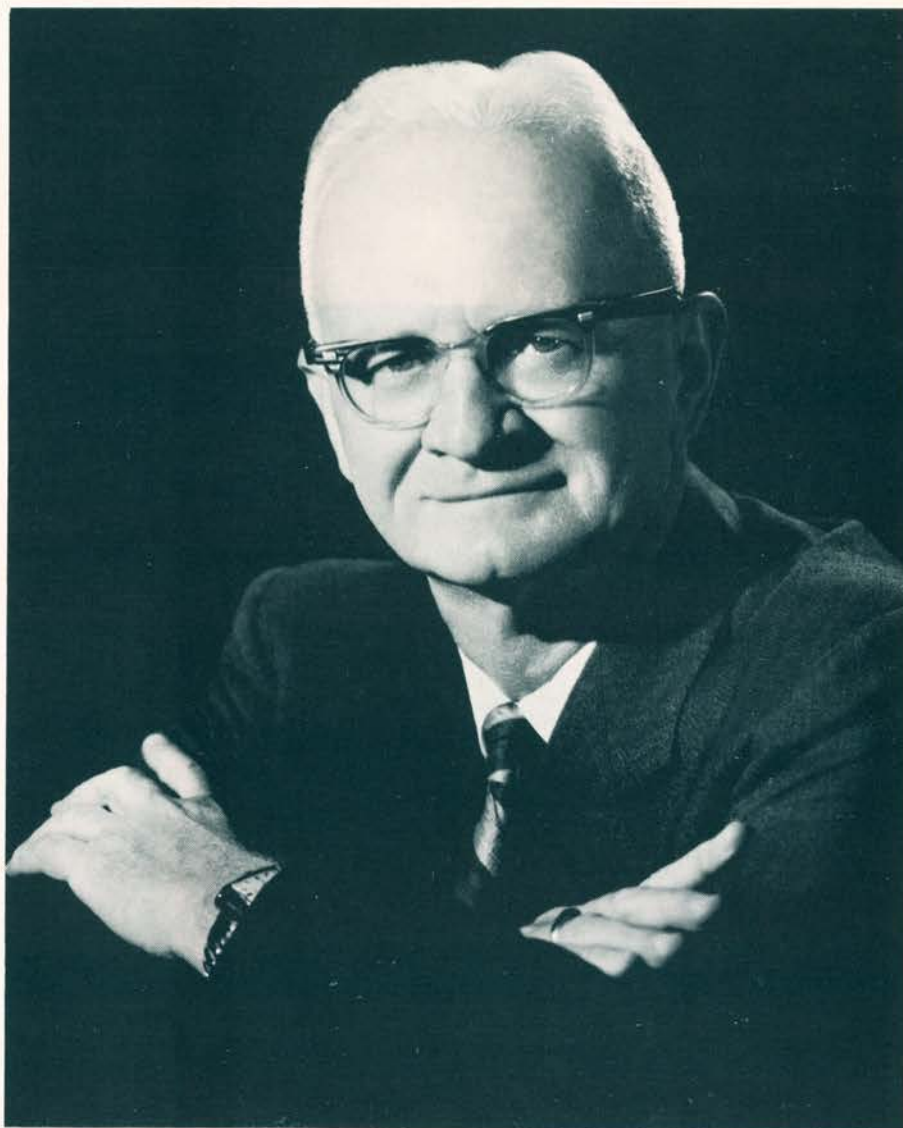
For the past two years, the University of Kansas City has been under the guidance of Dr. Carleton F. Scofield, acting president. Dr. Scofield has been with the school since July 1960 when he was Vice-Chancellor of Academic Affairs. He was made acting president in June 1961.

Dr. Scofield received his A.B. degree in psychology at Wesleyan University, Middletown, Connecticut, and his Ph. D. in psychology at Yale University. He has been assistant in psychology at Wesleyan University and research assistant in psychology at Yale. He was assistant professor of psychology at the University of Buffalo where he taught general, experimental, and physiological psychology, and he expanded the training of the department

there to provide for doctoral training and clinical training programs.

Dr. Scofield has held many government positions. He is especially proud of a War Department citation which he received in connection with his work in the Office of Strategic Services. He has done extensive traveling in Europe and Asia for research projects in connection with the government.

Dr. Scofield has had four books on psychology published. They are: *The American Journal of Psychology*, *The Journal of General Psychology*, *The Psychological Monographs*, and *Psychology for the Fighting Man*. He has also had book reviews and numerous miscellaneous articles published in leading educational magazines.

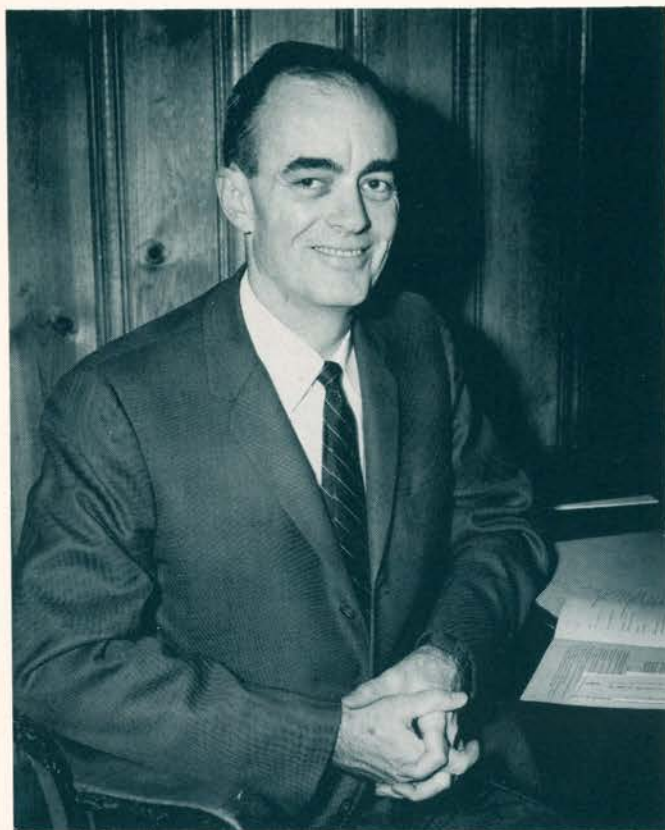


DEAN LESLIE EISENBRANDT
School of Pharmacy

Dr. Leslie Eisenbrandt is at the helm of the School of Pharmacy. Dr. Eisenbrandt has been at the University of Kansas City for twenty-six years. Part of that time he was professor of pharmacology and the last ten years he has been Dean of the Pharmacy School.

Dean Eisenbrandt received his A.B. degree in Zoology, his M.A. degree in parasitology, and his Ph. D. in immunology. He has graduated with degrees from the College of Emporia, Kansas State, and Rutgers.

Dean Eisenbrandt is listed in *Who's Who in America*. He is a member of the Society of Pharmacy and Therapeutics, the Society of Experimental Biology and Medicine, the American Pharmaceutical Society, and the American Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene. DEAN WHEADON BLOCH
Dean of Students

Wheadon Bloch, Dean of Students, received his B.S. and M.S. degrees from Louisiana State University and he received his M.S. and Ph. D. from the University of Wisconsin. Dean Bloch is one of the prominent figures on campus. He is involved in many aspects of student life, works with the All Student Association and takes a personal interest in the student body of the University of Kansas City. He is invaluable in this capacity, and is an integral part of the University.

DEAN WILLIAM C. FREDERICK
School of Business

Dean William C. Frederick, of the School of Business Administration, attended the University of Arkansas where he received his B.A. His Ph. D. was obtained at the University of Texas. He has been visiting lecturer at Columbia University. Dean Frederick has been a consultant on public utility regulation in Austin, Texas, and currently is a consultant on management education and training programs for business firms in Kansas City.

Dean Frederick is a member of the American Economic Association, the Southwestern Social Science Association, the American Association of University Professors, and the Society for the Advancement of Management. He is Vice-President of the Kansas City chapter of the Society for the Advancement of Management, a member of the Board of Directors of the Junior Achievement program in Kansas City, and belongs to the Kansas City Association for Mental Health.

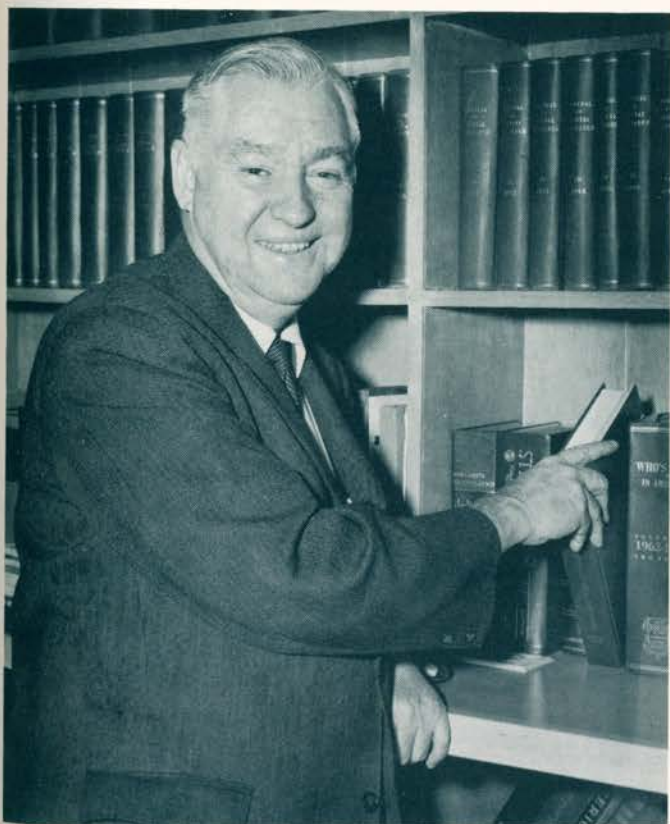

DEAN HAMILTON B. G. ROBINSON
School of Dentistry

Dr. Hamilton B. G. Robinson received his D.D.S. degree from the University of Pennsylvania in 1934 and was then awarded a Rockefeller Fellowship at the University of Rochester where he earned his M.S. in Pathology. After teaching at Washington University in St. Louis for seven years he moved to Ohio State where he acted as Professor for the dental and medical schools and Associate Dean of Dentistry. He came to U.K.C. in 1958 as Dean of the School of Dentistry and Professor of Oral Pathology and Diagnosis.

Dr. Robinson serves as a Consultant to the Surgeon Generals of the U.S. Army, the Navy and Public Health Service, and is on the board of Scientific Counsellors of the National Institute of Dental Research. He is on the staff of four Kansas City hospitals. Dr. Robinson received the Fauchard Medal (1950), the Professional Interfraternity Award (1949), the Tufts University Award (1948), the University of Pennsylvania Dental Alumni Award of Merit (1959), and was Webb-Johnson Lecturer at the Royal College of Surgeons in London in 1961. Dean Robinson is the author or co-author of over one hundred articles in scientific or professional journals, has edited many dental journals and is the author of several books.





DEAN FREDERICK D. LEWIS
School of Law

Dean Frederick Lewis of the School of Law received his A.B. and J.D. from the University of Illinois. In addition to published articles in several legal periodicals, Dean Lewis was editor of the "Federation of Insurance Counsel Quarterly" from 1954-1957 and since 1953 has edited the "Blashfield Cyclopedia of Automobile Law and Practice."

Dean Lewis is a member of the American Bar Association, the Iowa State Bar Association, past president of the Iowa State Bar Foundation, chairman of the Committee of Continuing Legal Education of the Iowa State Bar Association from 1954-1959 and is currently chairman of the Tort Law Committee of the Missouri Bar.

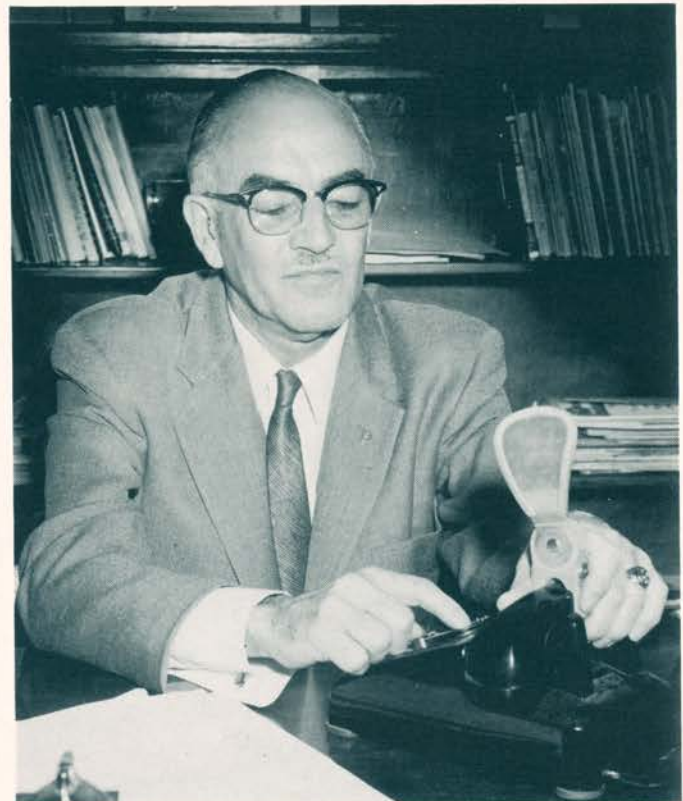
He received the first annual Achievement Award as "Man of the Year" from the Kansas City Bar Association in 1961 in recognition of his outstanding achievements in the field of legal education and contributions to the legal profession. DEAN ARCHIE N. JONES
Conservatory of Music

Dean Archie Jones, of the Conservatory of Music of the University of Kansas City, is a graduate of the University of Nebraska and the MacPhail College of Music. He has held teaching and administrative positions in the universities of Minnesota, Idaho, Southern California, and Texas. He was guest professor at nine universities in the United States.

Dr. Jones is national first Vice-President of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, national honorary musical fraternity, president of the National Music Council Department of the Defense Overseas Tours Committee. He is past president of the Southwestern Division of the Music Educators National Conference, a member of the Minnesota, Idaho, and Texas Music Teachers' Associations, and of the American Choral Director's Association.

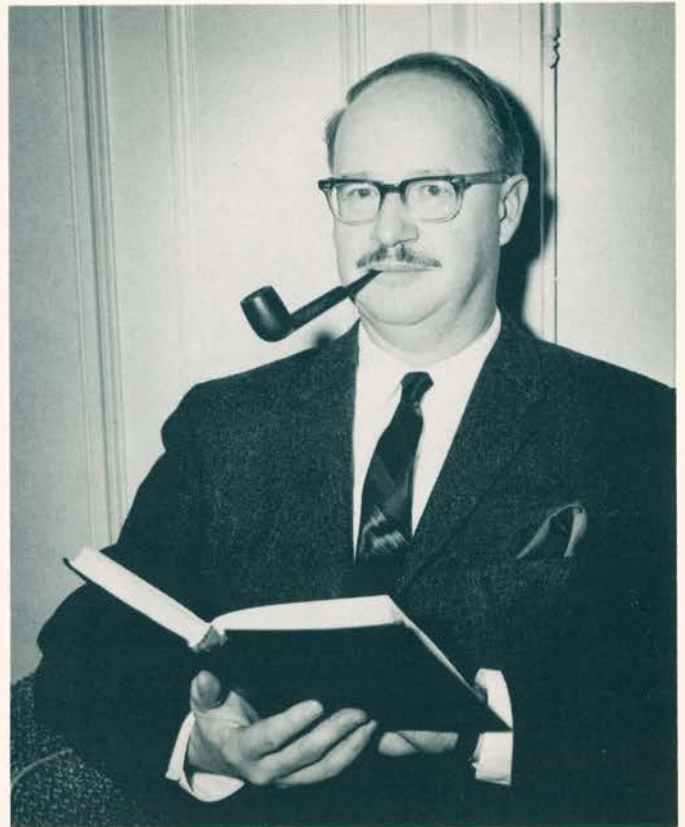
Dr. Jones has directed eleven all-state choruses, composed numerous choral compositions and has written over a hundred magazine articles and six text books.



DEAN EDWIN J. WESTERMANN
School of Arts and Sciences

Dean Westermann, head of the College of Arts and Sciences, maintains a close contact with students through his course in Foundations of World History, which is required for the majority of degrees. An authority on the social and intellectual history of the Middle Ages and English History, Dean Westermann incites a degree of awe in students who take his foundations class.

Before coming to the University in 1946, Dean Westermann received his degree from the University of Colorado, where he taught for a year. During the war, Dr. Westermann taught in an Army-Air Force College Training detachment. A sabbatical leave-of-absence in 1953 and 1954 gave Dr. Westermann a chance to travel with his family abroad. In addition to his position as Dean of Arts and Sciences, Dr. Westermann is also Acting Chairman of the History Department.



DEAN HUGH W. SPEER
School of Education

Dean Speer, of the School of Education, received his A.B. degree from the American University in Washington, D.C., and his M.A. from George Washington University in Washington, D.C. He received his Ph. D. from the University of Chicago. He majored in English, Political Science, and Education.

Dean Speer was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship in 1951 and traveled to Iran where he was visiting professor at the University of Teheran and Advisor to the Ministry of Education. In 1961 Dean Speer was again granted an award to Iran where he served as advisor to the chancellor and deans at the University of Teheran. Dean Speer served as State President of the Missouri Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development from 1961 to 1962. He is a member of the National Screening Committee for the Conference Board on International Exchange of Persons. Dean Speer has been a visiting professor at Miami University in Ohio and at Syracuse University. Aside from his many administrative duties, the Dean lists woodworking as a major interest.



DR. HAZEL B. WILLIAMS, associate professor of English Education for the past four years, received her A.B. in English from K.U., her first M.A. in English from K.U., her second M.A. in guidance and counseling from Columbia University, and her Ph. D. in Education from the University of New York. She has also studied at the University of Berlin. Dr. Williams was elected to Phi Beta Kappa at K.U., Pi Lambda Theta at Columbia and Kappa Delta Phi at the University of New York. She belongs to many organizations, has had numerous articles published, and was a speaker at the International Conference on General Semantics held in Hawaii in 1960. She is greatly interested in the Carver Neighborhood Center and serves on the Board of Directors. Her favorite pastimes are gardening and playing the piano.

DR. MORTON GOLDMAN, chairman of the Psychology Department, received his B.S. degree in physical science from Temple University, his M.S. in Math from Illinois University, and his Ph. D. in Psychology from Illinois where he was a research associate. Dr. Goldman was president of the Greater Kansas City Psychology Association. He has had many articles published and has received research and study grants. Dr. Goldman's favorite pastimes are music and photography and he reports that he was captain of his chess team in college.



DR. NORMAN ROYALL, professor of Mathematics and Physical Sciences, entered John B. Stetson University at the age of fifteen before completing high school and subsequently received his B.S. and M.S. degrees there. Dr. Royall also received an M.A. degree in Mathematics-Physics from Emory and a doctorate in Mathematics at Brown. He was a post-doctoral student at Harvard. Dr. Royall has published articles in the field of integral-transform theory and in the field of General Education. He is presently working on a modern college algebra text for the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics. In 1961 Dr. Royall completed a series of forty-nine films in the field of mathematics which were released by the United States Armed Forces Institute for use on military bases throughout the world. Dr. Royall was a founder and the first director of the Great Books program in Kansas City. Charles Hammer, of *The Kansas City Star*, aptly stated in his recent profile on Dr. Royall, "Since coming to the University of Kansas City in 1947, Dr. Royall has been one of the intellectually moving forces in Kansas City."

DR. JOHN G. L. DOWGRAY, JR., Acting Chairman of the Department of History and Government and Co-ordinator of Graduate Studies, received his B.A. from U.K.C. in 1947, his M.S. from Wisconsin University in 1948 and his Ph. D. from Wisconsin in 1956. Dr. Dowgray served on U.K.C.'s "Self Study Committee" which functioned from 1955 to 1960. He is a member of the Missouri Valley Historical Association and the American Association of University Professors. He is a "deputy sheriff" in The Westerners (the Kansas City Posse), an association composed of men who are interested in the history of the Old West. Dr. Dowgray enjoys bicycling and he lists his greatest achievement as "not having been lynched by my students."



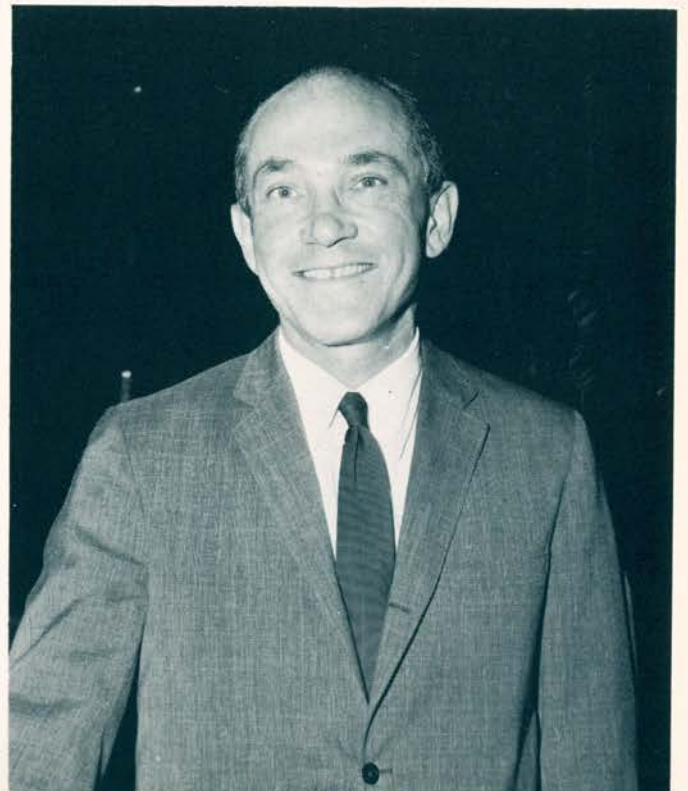


Mr. STANLEY DEACON is professor Emeritus at the Conservatory of Music of Kansas City and chairman of the voice department at U.K.C. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the National Association of Teachers of Singing, is a fellow of the American Institute of Vocal Pedagogy, a member of the American Musicological Society, Phi Lambda Kappa, and Phi Mu Alpha fraternities. Mr. Deacon is a graduate of the Chicago Musical College and the Edoardo Sacerdotte and Adolph Muhlmann schools. For many years he was a leading baritone with the Boston and Century Operas and has been soloist with many symphonies and in oratorio productions. He is the author of *Music Scaled for You*, has written numerous articles on singing and voice pedagogy and is a frequent lecturer.



DR. WAYNE L. HARVEY of the School of Dentistry holds an A.B. degree from Kansas University and a D.D.S. degree from the University of Kansas City. He was named outstanding clinical instructor at the U.K.C. Dental School for the 1962 school year. He has received research grants and is presently working under a grant from the United States Public Health Service. He is active in various dental organizations and has had many articles published. He is interested in sports cars and mechanics.

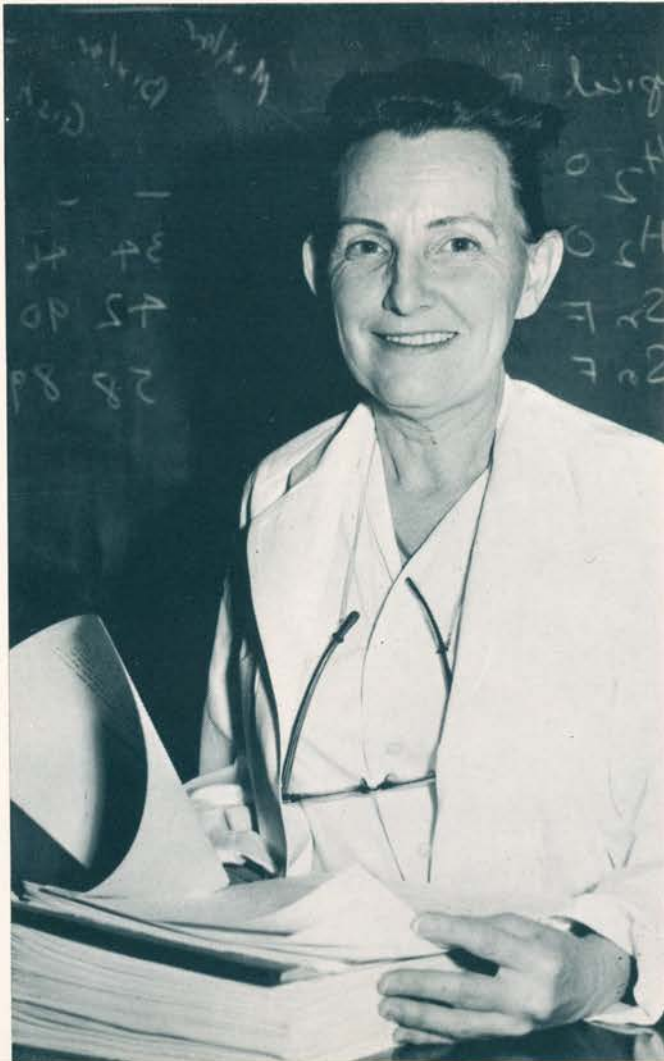
DR. MARTIN LEVIT, of the School of Education, has taught philosophy of education for thirteen years. He is a graduate of the University of Chicago, holding an A.B. in psychology, an M.A. in history, and a Ph. D. in philosophy of education. He taught in Europe from 1956 and 1957 on a Fulbright grant and was also awarded a Ford Faculty Fellowship. Dr. Levit is acting chairman of the Philosophy of Education Society. He is a lieutenant-colonel in the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve. Dr. Levit enjoys reading, world literature, walking and music.





MRS. FRIEDA ESTES BRIDGEMAN is so well known for her Foundations of Theatre classes that when one student says "Theatre" another will answer "Mrs. Bridgeman." This instant association is justified for she stimulates the interests of her students and has made possible the plays for which the University Playhouse is famous. Mrs. Bridgeman earned a B.S. in Education "magna cum laude" at the Southeast Missouri State College. She then went on to receive an M.S. in Speech from the University of Wisconsin, where she will begin work on her Doctorate this summer. Mrs. Bridgeman is an accomplished portrait artist and painter.

DR. GENEVIEVE ROTH, the only woman dentist on the faculty, began her career at U.K.C. in 1943 when she acted as Chairman of the Department of Preventive Dentistry. She graduated from U.K.C. with a Bachelor of Arts and a dentistry degree. Dr. Roth has received many research grants and is presently working under a grant from the United States Public Health Service.



DR. LEO McMAHON has an A.B. and an LL.B. from the University of Nebraska. He is often found at the School of Pharmacy where he teaches Pharmacy and Drug Management and Pharmaceutical Law. Dr. McMahon is the Men's Division chairman for the United Fund Campaign and he has devoted much time to this worthy cause. When time allows, Dr. McMahon enjoys bowling and golf.

WALTER COOK, Pianist and Associate Professor at the Conservatory of Music, attained his Bachelor and Master of Music degrees at the Conservatory and studied in New York at Juilliard. A well-known and a respected performer around Kansas City, Mr. Cook has appeared as piano soloist with the Philharmonic on several occasions, is in great demand as an accompanist, is a member of the Resident Trio of the University and is choir director and organist at the Christ Episcopal Church. He is a member of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, national honorary music fraternity.





MR. DAN JAFFE of the English Department is a well-known and widely published author in the field of poetry. He has had articles published in *Ladies' Home Journal*, *Saturday Review*, and many other national magazines. He is presently concerned with the *Fine Arts Calendar* and the poetry series at the Jewish Community Center. He was awarded the Avery Hopwood Award, the major award for poetry at the University of Michigan, where he earned his M.A. in English. Mr. Jaffe has received many fellowships and is presently working under a grant to study Danial Freeman, an original settler in this part of the country.



DR. ALLEN O. GRUEBBEL, Assistant to the Dean of the School of Dentistry, received pre-dentistry training at Warrensburg College and at Central Missouri State. He obtained his D.D.S. degree from U.K.C. He practiced dentistry from 1923 to 1936, attended John Hopkins University doing graduate work and obtained a masters degree in public health in 1938. Dr. Gruebbel was director of dental development for the Missouri State Health Department and in 1944 joined the staff of the American Dental Association in Chicago and during this time testified before Congressional committees in Washington regarding health legislation. He has had over seventy articles published in state, national, and foreign journals and has written chapters in three public health books. In his spare time, Dr. Gruebbel enjoys painting, woodcrafts, gardening, and fishing.

DR. GEORGE EHRLICH, Associate Professor of Art, has taught at U.K.C. for nine years. He holds three degrees in art history, sculpture, and architecture, from the University of Illinois. Dr. Ehrlich contributes articles and reviews to many publications, enjoys doing research, and still finds time for spare-time photography.





FREDERICK R. McLEOD, Assistant Professor of English and Director of Freshman English at U.K.C., received his B.A. degree from Bowling Green State University and obtained an M.A. and some doctorate credit at Michigan University. He is co-author of two textbooks, *Modern American Writer* and *A Reader for Composition*. Mr. McLeod is President of the Missouri Association of Teachers of English.

JAMES P. REID, Chairman of the Health and Physical Education Department, and Athletic Director, received his Bachelor's and Master's degrees at Michigan State and did advanced graduate work at Stanford University and Indiana University. Mr. Reid coached in public schools in Michigan and was a coach at California City College at San Jose before coming to U.K.C. He enjoys playing golf and squash and likes travel photography.



MARTHA LONGMIRE, Voice Instructor at the Conservatory of Music, made her Town Hall debut in 1952. She attended Southern Methodist University and took graduate courses at Denver University. Mrs. Longmire has been soloist with many of the leading symphonies in the United States, including those of Denver, Dallas, and Kansas City. She sang a lead role with the Denver Opera in 1950 and has sung with such distinguished conductors as Bruno Walter and Antal Dorati.





DR. WILLIAM LEFKOWITZ, Director of Graduate Studies in the U.K.C. Dental School, received his D.D.S. from Columbia University in 1924. During his thirty-five years of research experience he has received many grants and made contributions to diversified research fields. His time is occupied with his work, but he also enjoys gardening and travelling. He considers his work with graduates to be his most rewarding endeavor, and as a research advisor he has encouraged many potential candidates to follow research and academic careers.

DR. BENJAMIN W. WARNER, Chairman of the Diagnosis and X-Ray Department at the School of Dentistry, received his A.B., D.D.S., and M.S.D. from U.K.C. He has been the recipient of research grants from the National Institute of Health and the United States Army. His hobbies are ballistics and collecting guns.



LEE ROY BROWN, JR., of the Microbiology Department in the School of Dentistry, received his B.S. degree from the University of Alabama in 1950 and his M.S. from George Washington University in Washington, D.C., in 1956. He was a bacteriologist at the Naval Medical Field Research Laboratory, worked at the Navy Dental School, and began teaching at U.K.C. in 1961. Dr. Brown has written for publication and has lectured before scientific assemblies throughout the country. He likes sports and is "an observer" of football and basketball.

MRS. LORENE NELSON ROE, Director of Courses for Dental Hygenics, received her A.B. degree from William Jewell, and a B.S. and an R.D.H. from Columbia University. She was president of the Missouri Dental Hygenist's Association in 1956. Mrs. Roe is the mother of a three-year-old son and her homemaking duties occupy her out-of-school hours.

MR. Mr. Van Deursen is Minister of Music at the Country Club Congregational Church, Baritone Soloist at Temple B'nai Jehudah, and is the father of three children.



DR. MYRON L. WAGNER, Chairman of the Chemistry Department, received his A.B. degree from Carthage College, and his M.S. and Ph. D. from Iowa State. Dr. Wagner engaged in post doctoral research at Cornell, and taught chemistry at Iowa State before coming to U.K.C. He is chairman-elect of the Kansas City Section of the American Chemical Society for 1963. Dr. Wagner is married and the father of three children. He enjoys camping and likes to listen to classical and semi-classical music.



DR. WIKTOR LABUNSKI, Professor Emeritus and Pianist in Residence at the Conservatory of Music, was born in St. Petersburg, Russia. He received his Music Doctorate at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia. He taught at the Krakow Conservatory of Music in Poland, was Co-founder and Director of the Memphis College of Music, and Director of the Kansas City Conservatory of Music from 1931-1937. Dr. Labunski made his American Debut at Carnegie Hall in 1928. He has appeared as soloist with many symphony orchestras, and is celebrated for his lectures, his articles, and his many compositions which are published both in the United States and abroad. When the paper was transferred to Paris, Dr. Soloveitchik moved there but left Paris two days before its occupation by the Germans. He arrived in the United States in 1940. Dr. Soloveitchik has been an instructor at City College of New York, the University of Colorado, and also taught in U.K.C.'s Law School as Professor of International Law.



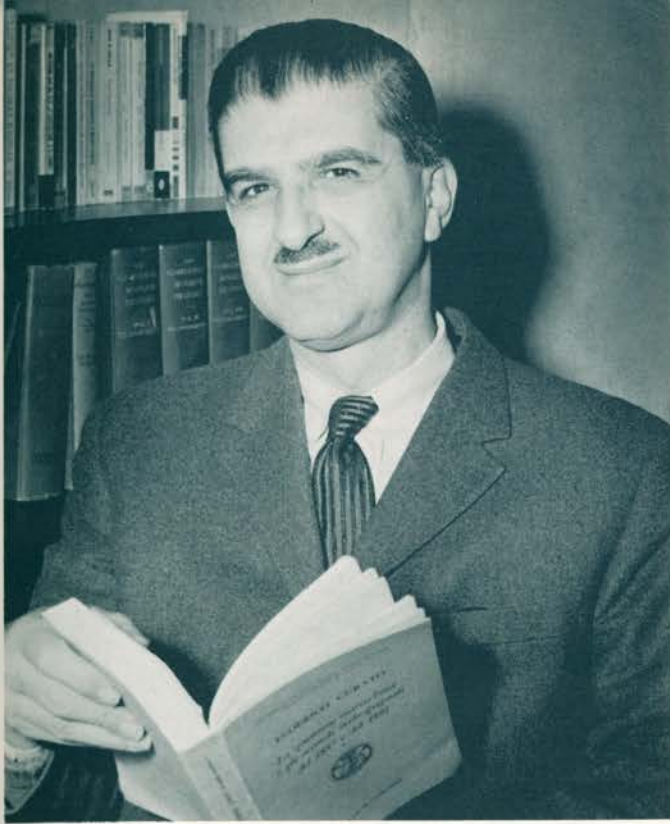

DR. ROBERT D. W. ADAMS

Dr. Robert D. W. Adams, a member of the faculty since 1935, knew a world filled with musical activity. He was a respected authority on any category of music and he taught a wide variety of courses to both under-graduates and post-graduates. His out-of-school hours were filled with directing church choirs, participating in many organizations, research projects, and annotating the program notes for the Kansas City Philharmonic. He attended Oberlin University and U.C.L.A. and was a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, and was listed in *Who's Who in America* and *Who's Who in American Education*.

His accomplishments were many, but Dr. Adams was revered on campus for much more. He was respected by both students and fellow-faculty members for his unassuming, quiet manner and his willingness to help or to devote time to explaining or discussing musical questions. His many contributions enriched the cultural history of Kansas City and of the University.

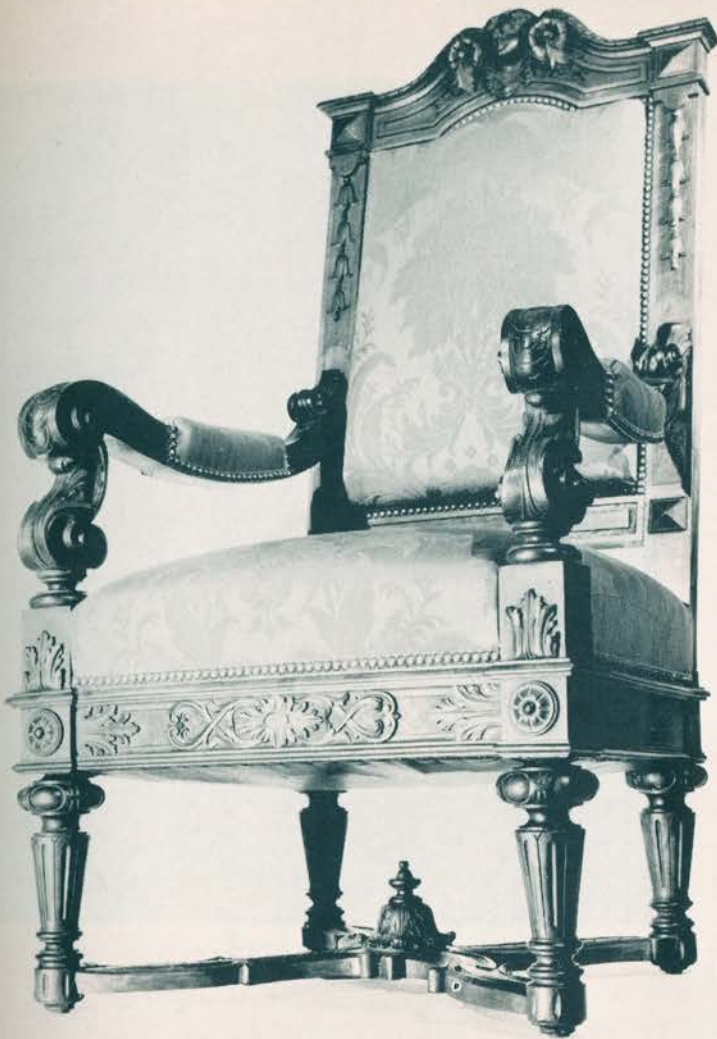


A Tribute . . .

The Carolyn Benton Cockefair Chair in Continuing Education stands alone. This chair is never vacant. It is filled by all those who believe in it and support it and by those who benefit from its projects. This chair is unique in purpose and in being. Its creation was a tribute to Carolyn Benton Cockefair, Professor Emeritus of English, who has led so many on adventures of the mind.

The aim of the Cockefair Chair in Continuing Education is to advance the cultural and educational opportunities of Kansas City through the University of Kansas City. The Chair sponsored Miss Ria Mooney, director of the Abbey Theatre in Dublin, Ireland, when Miss Mooney came to Kansas City to direct the U.K.C. Playhouse production of "Diedre of the Sorrows" in 1962. Norman Cousins, editor of "The Saturday Review," author James Michener, and Moses Hadas, head of Columbia University's Classical Literature Department, have been guest speakers at annual Cockefair Chair Banquets. This spring, one of the leading contemporary translators of Greek drama, David Grene, gave lectures and taught a six-week credit course at U.K.C. under Chair sponsorship. A performance of Richard Strauss' "Elektra" by Hans Schwieger, the Kansas City Philharmonic and solo artists was another project for 1963. In 1964, Shakespeare year, the Chair will co-sponsor the Kansas City Lyric Opera Theatre's productions of "Othello" and "The Merry Wives of Windsor."

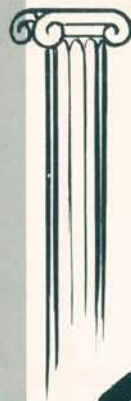


A message from the President...

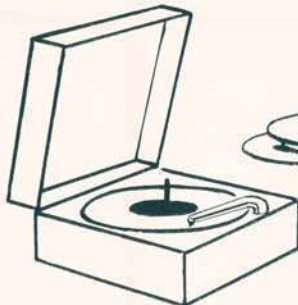
The current school year has been a period of great uncertainty for all. I am sure we would agree it has been the most exciting year in the history of the University. In January, the Board of Trustees came to a tentative agreement with the Curators of the University of Missouri whereby this University might become a part of the State system of higher education. Fulfillment of the agreement was dependent upon the State's appropriating \$6,100,000 for the operation of the University of Missouri at Kansas City and \$1,000,000 for capital funds. In March, the legislature voted a sales tax increase which will provide the revenue and, in April, the Appropriations Committee of the House allocated the funds necessary to effect the merger. We can now be certain that when our doors open in September this institution will be the University of Missouri at Kansas City.

Most of us will feel some nostalgia, but I hope it will quickly vanish as we enter upon an exciting new era of dramatic growth and dynamic change. We can take great pride in our past as the University of Kansas City; we may look forward to a future as one of the Nation's truly great universities. A year ago I made a statement in The Kangaroo that was also a prophecy and is even more meaningful today: ". . . in our Deans and Directors, our Faculties, our Students, and in the quality of our education program lie all the ingredients of greatness. This potential must be realized; I am convinced it will be."

Mr. Webb's service to this nation began in 1946 when he became Director of the Federal Bureau of the Budget, one of the most difficult and exacting jobs in Washington. Three years later he was appointed Undersecretary of State and Deputy Governor of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development and the International Monetary Fund.

In addition to assuming many different public responsibilities, Mr. Webb has served with distinction in private industry. Mr. Webb also has found time to devote himself to numerous important civic tasks. He is an active trustee of George Washington University, a member of the Committee for Economic Development and a member of the Municipal Manpower Commission.

It was in recognition of these and many other distinguished achievements that on December 6, 1962, the University of Kansas City conferred upon James Edwin Webb the degree of Doctor of Science, honoris causa.

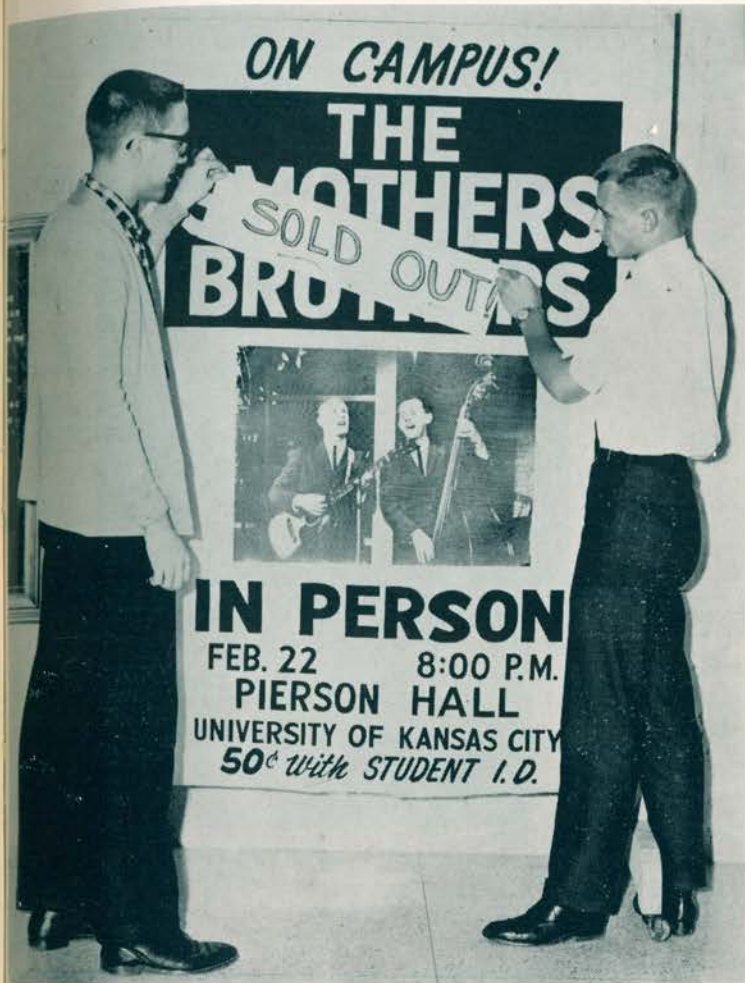

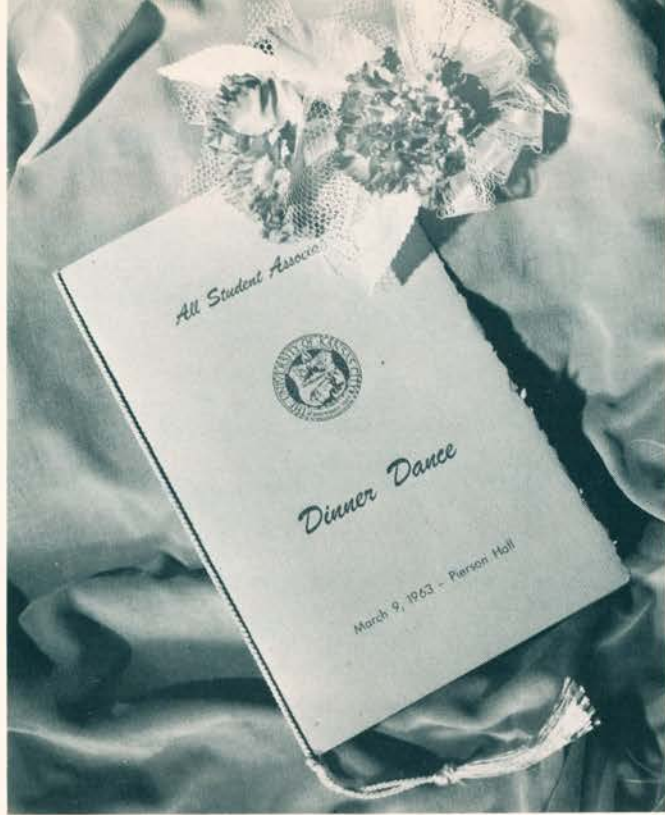

"All good journalism is a mixture of discovery tempered by experience," *Time* magazine wrote in 1961 on the death of Ernest Hemingway.

The *University News*, like most of today's college newspapers, falls into that category. Its staff, from editor to typist, recognized that they are involved in a learning process, and ended the year on the note that they had learned from their experience.

Editor William Isenhour, a junior in public address and radio-television, set two goals at the outset. "We wanted to give the student body a paper that was financially solid and one that would be read by as many students as possible," Isenhour commented at year's end.

The former goal was well within reach as early as the end of the first semester, when the *U-News* reported a substantial financial surplus. Lower operating costs for second semester gave every indication of the most successful financial operation in the annals of the publication: Business Manager, Rick Nash, deserved most of the credit for that.

The eagerness of students any Wednesday morning, amazed campus "old-timers". "Sure, the paper's read by most of the students, and maybe they like it. But we know about our mistakes and would like to eliminate them. We did, though, make great progress this year," managing editor James Eisenbrandt summed it up.

Athletics

Since dropping intercollegiate athletics in the Spring of 1961, the University of Kansas City has depended upon an intramural program, with the addition of some athletic clubs, to supply students with an outlet for his physical needs. Intramurals and clubs, designed for the unspecialized, non-scholarship athlete, provided him the competition, the motivation and the caliber that was on an attainable level.

The intramurals offered this academic year ranged from basketball to volleyball. On the average individual participation in the intramural program doubled with team participation seeing an average of one and a half increase over the previous year. To maintain the motivation and enjoyment of games the play-off series was continued with the addition of an all-star team in the area of touch football.

An innovation at U.K.C. in '63 was the addition of a club program. These clubs included soccer, basketball, tennis, track, golf and baseball. They were open to any desiring participants and provided for them a level of competition similar to that found in the larger intercollegiate circuits.

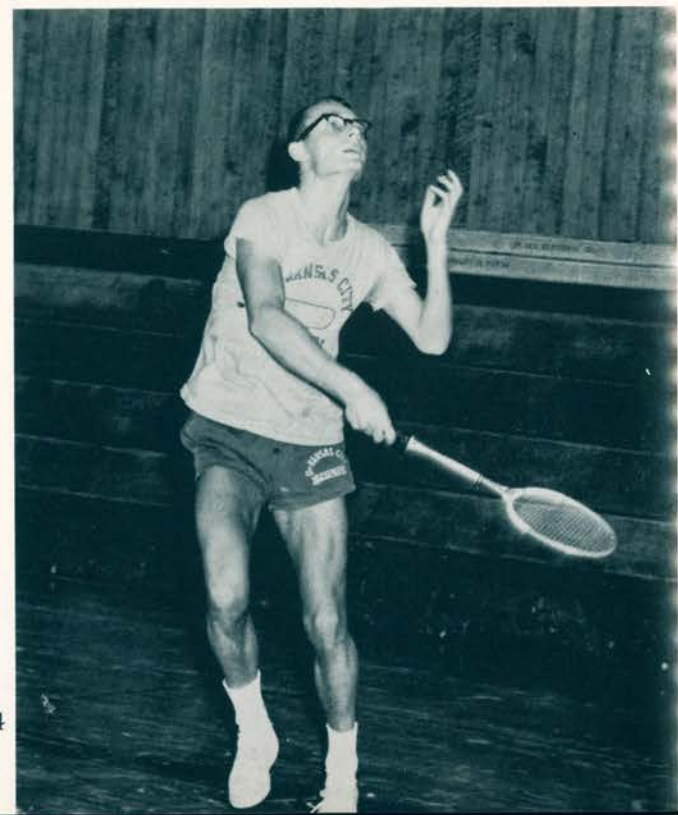

University Merger Announced

At an all-school convocation on April 30, President Scofield announced that by July 1, 1963, the University of Kansas City would no longer exist. It will become the University of Missouri at Kansas City. Although students had various views of this affiliation, there was an overwhelming opinion to the effect that this was the wisest move for the University to make.

Dr. Scofield stated that last July he realized that a merger was necessary. Fund drives, no matter how successful they might be, could never be substantial enough to allow the University to continue operating without mortgaging all of its facilities. By 1964 the budget would have carried a deficit of \$2,100,000 and this deficit would amount to \$4,900,000 by 1969.

"Instructors will lose no academic freedom," President Scofield said. "An expanded building program will go into effect, more scholarships will be available, and I feel that future University standards will go up." President Scofield stated that there would be no tuition changes next year, but that tuition fees would decrease in the following two years.

The University of Kansas City does not need to lose its independence or its status. The new structure of the University is analogous to that of the University of California and U.C.L.A. U.K.C. has everything to gain by this merger. There will be new growth, and with growth comes change, but any changes that occur will lead to future progress and accomplishments that could not otherwise have been expected.

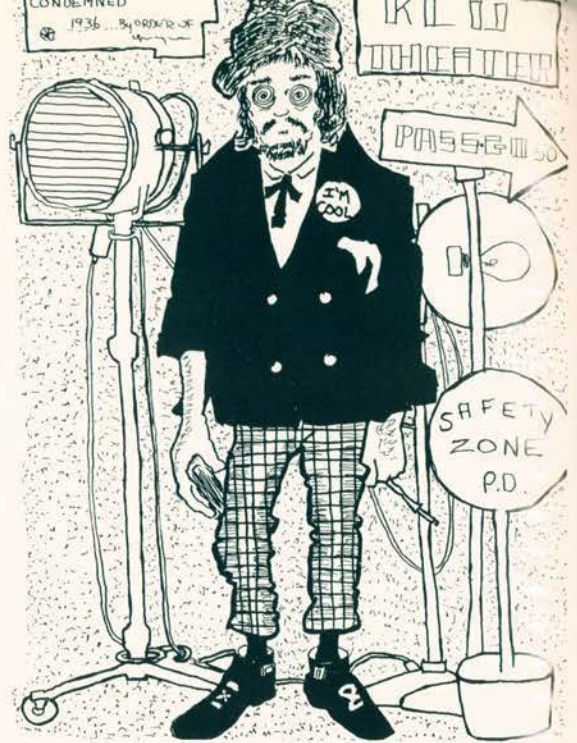

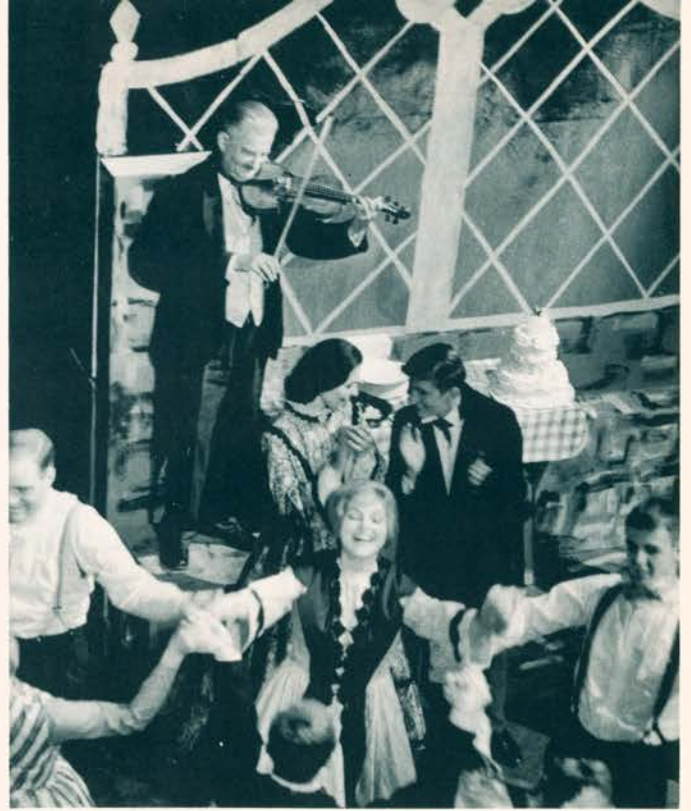

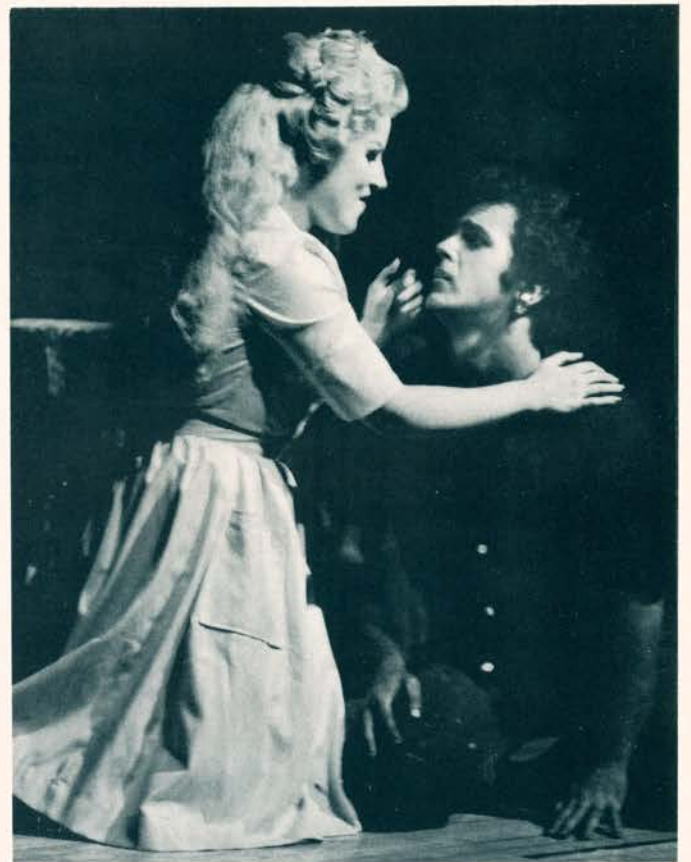

UKC's College Bowl Team

The shrill blast of a whistle is heard. Then a voice inquires, "Are you ready Kansas City?" "Are you ready Norwich?" Another exciting battle of brains was initiated. Four University of Kansas City scholars had flown to New York to match their knowledge with that of the four cadets from Norwich University.

Since their selection at the U.K.C. auditions on January 13, the energetic quartet had been preparing for their television debut on the General Electric College Bowl. Emerging as winners in the local competition were Elbert Hayes, team captain and specialist in science, Phil Marcus in literature, Alvin Easter in history, and Bill Williams in Art. The intensive "boning" required for their scheduled appearance on the nationally televised show required additional specializations for the four competitors. Hayes concentrated on music, Marcus volunteered to do research in the area of sports, Easter turned to his avocation of cinema history, Williams become the team expert in geography as well as nursery rhymes—a recurring area of questioning on the College Bowl.

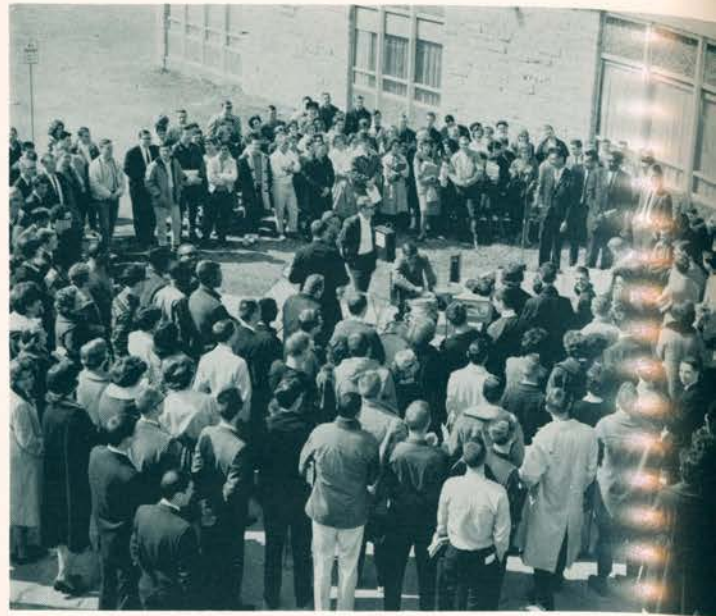
Fortified with diligent research and frequent rehearsals the team delighted fellow-students and Kansas City fans as they turned back the Norwich team by a final score of 190-135.

President Scofield announced to the student body that the College Bowl triumph had added \$1,500 to the University's scholarship fund.

Returning to New York to defend their title, the "champs" faced a formidable team of challengers from Wake Forest College. The second game saw the U.K.C.'s team trailing badly at half-time. However, the team made a spirited revival in the second period as they displayed the mental acuity and fast recall which had won them acclaim a week earlier. The studio audience excitedly watched the scoreboard as the battle tightened. With less than five minutes to go Kansas City assumed the lead 160-155. Then the tide changed. The next toss-up question was answered by the North Carolina students. This entitled them to try for a thirty-point bonus question. When the closing whistle sounded the score was Wake Forest 265, Kansas City 215.

Even in defeat Marcus, Hayes, Easter and Williams had attained one of the highest scores ever recorded on the College Bowl. The spirited though futile come-back efforts had exemplified a fine competitive drive.

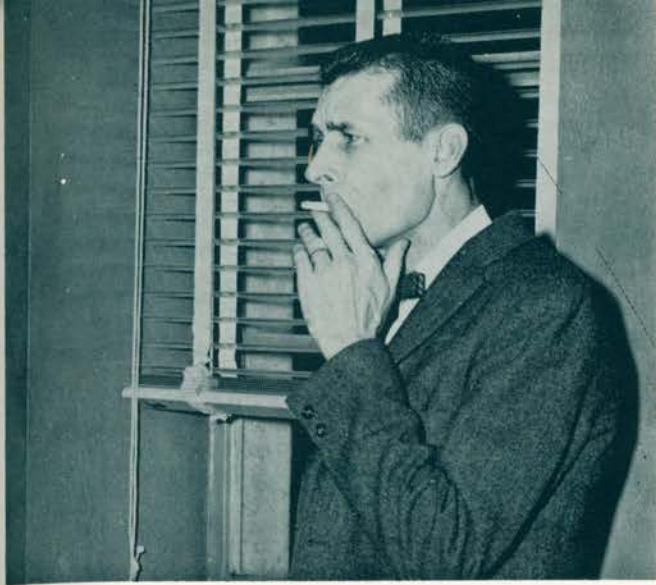

Women's Recreational Association

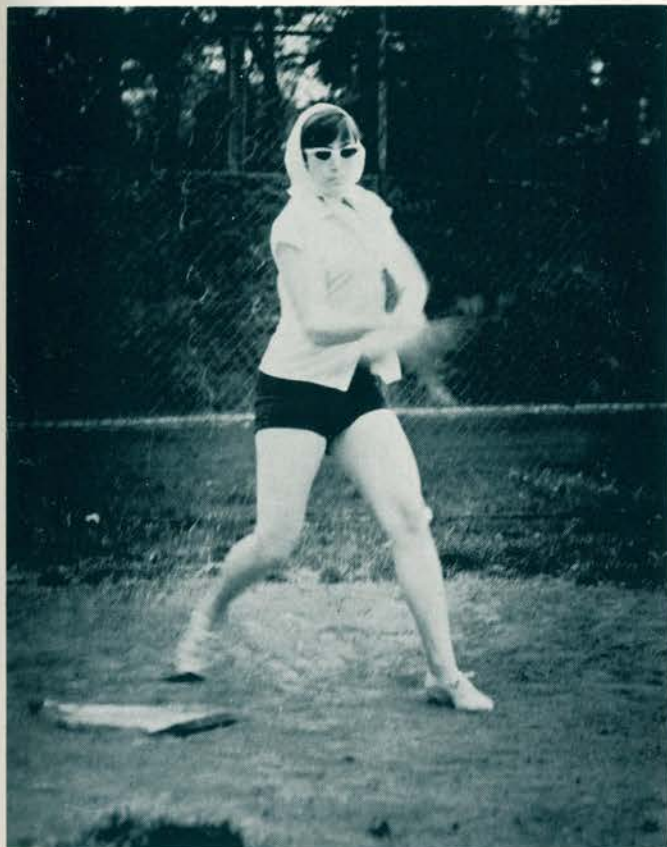

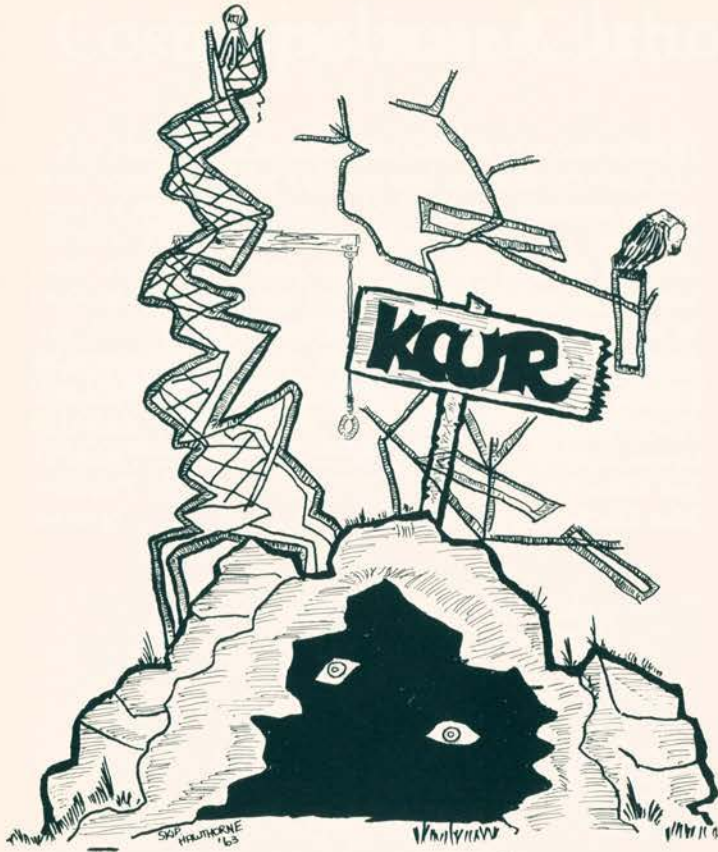

In his fourth year at the University, Dr. Walter H. Murrish, Director of Forensics, fielded a team that lacked the glamorous successes of previous campaigns. With only two varsity debaters, Bill Cohen and Ed Kriss, Murrish fashioned a solid record as the University firmly entrenched its national reputation in forensic circles.

Included in the squad's seventeen tournament schedule were trips to the United States Air Force Academy, Redlands, California; the United States Naval Academy, and Carbondale, Illinois. 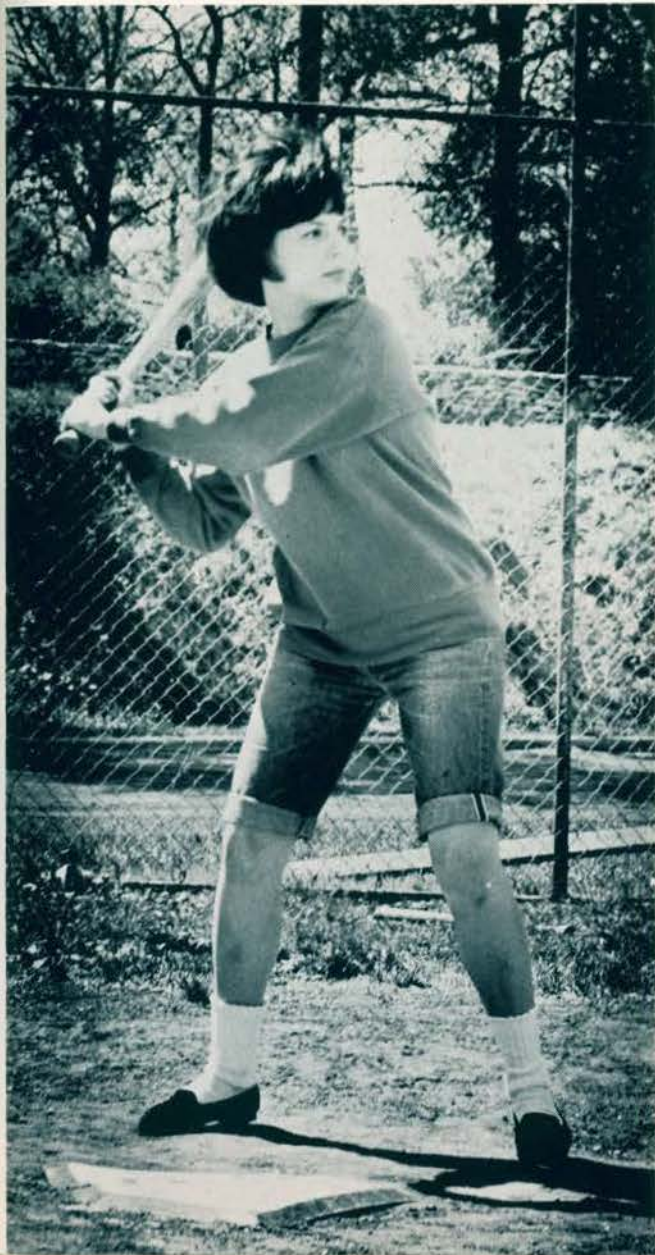
