

Research alone couldn't have done it. Neither manufacturing nor operations separately could have





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Greek marble head to Missouri


Just two years ago we introduced to readers of the *Alumnus* "a new laboratory at Missouri," the Study Collections for Art History and Archaeology, which had just been started as a teaching device. The Collections have flourished, in considerable measure thanks to Alumni interest, and as they have grown in size and variety they have increased in effectiveness. The most recent addition, the gift of an alumnus—the late H. W. Prentis of Lancaster, Pennsylvania, Class of 1903—is much the finest single object in the Collections and its presence raises their stature considerably. Just before his death in October, Mr. Prentis arranged to give the University a piece of exquisite Greek sculpture, the marble head of a girl, and the head arrived in the first days of December.

The sculptured head, about seven inches high, is a fragment from a large grave monument, such as is shown in the photograph of one of the few well preserved examples. This type of monument, called a "stele," was current in Greece, especially in Athens, during the fourth century B.C.; family scenes were usually portrayed on them. The stele from which our head came was very likely of the same type as that

shown, and portrayed a servant girl ministering to her mistress, over whose grave the monument was placed. It is the head of the servant girl, identified by the cap she wears, that has come to Missouri. She stood gazing adoringly at her mistress and most probably offered her a jewel box. The exquisite workmanship of the head, in island marble and in very high relief, shows the stele from which it came to have been among the finest in the Attic production and to have dated from about 360 B.C.

The quality is well illustrated by the fact that the left side of the face, which would never have been seen, is as finely modelled as is the visible right side. The relief is so high that even the left ear is shown. In fact, since a moulding over the top protected the side close to the background, but sent water running down over the more exposed right side, that side is somewhat eroded and has a browner color owing to the iron oxides that have been washed to the surface; the left side is almost perfectly preserved.

The rather soft modelling of the face and the deep, soulful eyes, appropriately sad, are typical of Athenian sculpture of the early fourth century B.C., probably

reflecting the influence of the master sculptor Scopas. Grave monuments, to be sure, were usually the work of craftsmen rather than artists, but they followed the lines of development set down by the masters. That even some craftsmen of this period could produce sculpture of such high quality as this head not only indicates the high level of their craft but also serves to point out the height of artistic creativity achieved by the great sculptors.


The rarity of original Greek sculpture of high quality makes this head one of the most prized possessions of the University of Missouri Art Collections; it is one of only a few such pieces to be seen in Missouri. It is exhibited in Jesse Hall against a brilliant blue background, the color of which is a close approximation to that often used by the Greeks to paint the background of such stelae in order to make the figures stand out, rather than having the modelling obliterated by the brilliant Greek sun. It serves now, as well, as a memorial to the interest of the late Mr. Prentis in his alma mater, and to the encouragement which he gave to the building of its Art Collections.

Dean Thomas Allan Brady


By now there probably is no administrative problem that Dr. Thomas A. Brady hasn't heard before. Since 1946 he has been in charge of University extra-divisional activities, and more than a dozen of its educational services come under the administration of his office. His title since 1954 has been Dean of Extra-Divisional Administration.

The scope of these services puts him in touch with a variety of interests on the campus, and it is not uncommon to see Dean Brady chatting with faculty and staff members in the corridors or on the walks. He has his share of office conferences, but the dean likes to get out and stretch his legs, although he usually doesn't walk far until he meets someone with a question, a problem, or a light-hearted comment. These encounters he handles as easily as more formal conferences in his office. Dean Brady gets into matters quickly, cutting across obscure or confusing language; through his practical approach he makes his opinion

clear and leaves no doubt on where he stands.

The availability of Dean Brady and his easy way of mingling with colleagues make him a familiar figure on the campus. He would be easily recognizable for one trademark—his cigar. He doesn't smoke many cigars during the day, and his brand is an inexpensive one, but he is seldom without a stogie because of his reluctance to discard it until the last possible puff.

The composure and affability that are associated with Tom Brady would surely desert him if many things ever went wrong at one time among the multiple offices under his administration. He is the first to say, however, that efficient key personnel is the secret of smooth operation. The diversity of his administrative responsibilities is indicated by listing the educational services: The Library, Student Health Center, Admissions Office, Counseling Service, the Division of Continuing Education. The list goes on: Office of Aids and Awards, the University of Missouri

Press, the Office of Publications with its University bulletins and catalogs; Dean of Students office, Traffic Safety, closed circuit TV, as well as four instructional programs: physical education and three ROTC programs. This winter Dr. Brady will have the services of an assistant for the first time.

Dean Brady, a member of the faculty since 1926, retains his Professor of History title and still teaches Greek History in the fall semester and Roman History in the winter. Many alumni will recall him when he taught Ancient History and sections in Prof. Jesse Wrench's Introduction to History. In addition to Ancient History, he formerly taught beginning courses in Ancient and Medieval History.

Dean Brady, a native of Richmond, Mo., where he was born in 1902, was graduated from the University with an A.B. in 1924 and two years later received his A.M. from Harvard. He returned to Harvard in 1931 to get his Ph.D., and in 1936-37 was given a leave to study in Europe and North Africa for a year under a Guggenheim Fellowship awarded him for outstanding work in history.


He is the author of books and articles on ancient history, including "The Reception of the Egyptian Cults by the Greeks," and "Foreign Areas and Lan-

guage Study." He wrote the chapter on ancient history in the recent 20th Yearbook of the National Council for Social Studies.

Under Dr. Brady's guidance, the University's Division of Continuing Education (formerly the Adult Education and Extension Service) has had rapid growth since the recent war. That division is now taking many forms of professional and vocational instruction direct to thousands of people of Missouri through classes held in their own communities; many others receive instruction through correspondence.

Studies by Dr. Brady helped make it possible for the University to accomplish remarkable achievements in its educational program for veterans without lowering any of its academic standards. As director of the University's Veterans Service Committee, he was one of those largely responsible for setting up non-collegiate vocational training courses enabling many veterans to take courses of training without college entrance requirements.

Dr. Brady is a member of the American Historical Association, the American Classical Association of the Middle West and South, and the American Catholic Historical Association. He and Mrs. Brady and their seven children live at 711 West Rollins Road.



Quite some people, quite some book

The Wild Mammals of Missouri is a big (342 pages, 8 x 11 in.) book that is copiously illustrated (38 full-page plates and hundreds of sketches) and that concerns itself with Missouri. It was written and illustrated by two famous Missouri biologists, Charles and Elizabeth Schwartz, published as a joint venture of the University of Missouri and the Missouri Conservation Commission—and was, of course, printed for Missourians.

In case this sounds like provincial pride, which is scientifically known as *Bumptia egomania texana*, it should be added that the publishers are quite willing to sell this fascinating wildlife tome to any other residents of the world also—for \$5.95 a copy, which makes *Wild Mammals of Missouri* one of the best ever available. A book of this size, on this subject and so extremely well done would have to retail at

twice that amount under strictly commercial circumstances. And it would be well worth it.

The wild creatures covered here, ranging from 1/10 ounce shrews to 600-pound bears, are found in a much wider range than this state, of course, but if you want to learn something about the breeding habits of elephants, this isn't your book. Every creature in these pages now lives in Missouri or once did occur here. The variety of that wildlife is quite likely to startle you.

Charlie and Libby Schwartz—who, incidentally, get no royalties out of this; no cash of any kind—poured the results of years of research, education and high skill into the book. A husband-wife team with an international reputation for both art and accuracy, the Schwartzes are so ideally equipped for just such a book that it would be hard to visualize them getting

together originally except by design. Maybe there was one.


Elizabeth Reeder did happen to get born in Ohio and study at Ohio State and Columbia universities before she got to the University of Missouri, but in this state she stayed. She has a Ph.D. in zoology and taught at the University of Missouri, where she met St. Louis-born Charles W. Schwartz, another University of Missouri degree-holder (M.A. in zoology). They married in 1938.

What Charles may have lacked in degrees he made

up by his ability to sketch, paint and photograph (His skill as an artist has tended to overshadow the solid quality of his biology: the Territory of Hawaii hired him to make a game survey of the Islands; his judgments are valued greatly by wildlife managers everywhere; like da Vinci, his artistry won more fame than his scientific abilities.)

The team has produced a couple of lesser books on their own; this one was an assignment from the Conservation Commission by which both are employed. *Mammals* grew from a series of articles ap-




RIGHT FRONT FOOT




Auditory bulla greatly inflated and elongated




SKULL—side view

Molar dumbbell-shaped




Hard palate extending beyond molars

LOWER JAW—top view left half



pearing in the *Missouri Conservationist*, the wildlife-forestry department's magazine, over a four year period, but even this amount of material was greatly expanded to produce the book.

People with a degree in zoology or other scientific disciplines will not consider *Mammals* a technical publication, though if your degree is in Journalism, you might refer to it that way; if your degree is in Education you'll rate this as one of the best reference books you ever saw on any subject. A layman in the field certainly can read it with interest and for knowledge.

Incidentally, the Schwartz team also has produced some of the finest wildlife motion pictures ever filmed: *Bobwhite Through the Year*, *Cottontail*, *A Way of Life* and other movies won both national and international awards. These are quite some people, the Schwartzes, and they've delivered themselves of quite some book.



Citations For Three

Three prominent graduates of the University's College of Arts and Science were honored on December 3 at the annual banquet highlighting Arts and Science Week. Citations of Merit awarded by the University of Missouri Alumni Association and the College of Arts and Science were presented to:

Dr. Minnie M. Brashear of Kirksville, Mo., former professor of English at the University and an authority on Mark Twain; Dr. Eldon H. Newcomb, professor of botany at the University of Wisconsin, who is noted as an authority on plant biochemistry; and Leland W. Hazard of Pittsburgh, Pa., lawyer and business executive and professor of industrial administration and law in the Graduate School of Industrial Administration at Carnegie Institute of Technology.

The Citations were presented by Dean W. Francis English and William R. Toler, alumni president.

Miss Brashear, who retired from the faculty in 1944 after serving for twenty-five years, earned her A.B. and A.M. degrees from the University in 1908 and 1922 and took her Ph.D. degree from the University of North Carolina in 1930. She has published numerous magazine articles on Missouri and "Twainiana." She is the author of *Mark Twain, Son of Missouri*, published in 1934 and still considered a standard book in the field. She is also co-author, with

Dr. Robert Rodney of the University of Northern Illinois, of a new book, *The Art, Humor and Humanity of Mark Twain*.

Dr. Newcomb received his A.B. degree with distinction in botany in 1940 from the University after he attended the University of Kansas City for two years. He was also elected to Phi Beta Kappa. Dr. Newcomb received his A.M. degree here in 1942 and won election to Sigma Xi. After war service he was awarded a National Research Council Pre-doctorial Fellowship in botany at the University of Wisconsin where he won his Ph.D. degree in 1949 and the Phi Sigma Award for excellence in graduate studies in biology. He spent the year 1951-52 as a Guggenheim Fellow in plant biochemistry at the University of California. He was cited for notable attainments in the field of botany, chiefly in basic research.

Mr. Hazard is a director and legal consultant of the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company. After receiving his A.B. degree here in 1916, he served in World War I, then won a law degree from Harvard. He practiced law in his native Kansas City for eighteen years before joining Pittsburgh Plate Glass as counsel. He became General Counsel, vice-president, and a director of the firm in 1947. He partially retired to director and legal consultant early this year, and also joined the staff of Carnegie Institute.

'Marching Mizzou'

The University of Missouri Band, "Marching Mizzou," will be making its fourth television appearance in two years when it performs in the Orange Bowl on January 1. The Band, which has won wide acclaim for its performances under the direction of Charles L. Emmons, this month has worked on production of the big show it will present in Miami on New Year's Day.

Precision drills are charted for the dimensions of the Orange Bowl. Special musical arrangements, timed to the second, have been worked out in sectional and mass rehearsals. Instruments were to be polished and uniforms cleaned for the December 27 departure date for the trip by special train.

The Marching Band, 165 strong in its black-and-gold uniforms, takes to the Orange Bowl field for both the pre-game show and five minutes of the half-time show. In addition, it will be in the New Year's Eve parade.

Under the baton of Prof. Emmons, who is director of University bands and orchestra, "Marching Mizzou" will give its interpretation of several compositions by Miami's famous band composer, the late Henry Fillmore. In the pre-game show, "Marching Mizzou" and the University of Georgia band, with selected high school bands, will perform Fillmore's "Orange Bowl March" and his arrangement of the National Anthem. Then each university band will play its school song.

Theme for Missouri's part of the half-time show will be "A Little Southland Music." The fast-stepping Band has scheduled "Basin Street Blues" by Spencer Williams; "Waiting for the Robert E. Lee," by Lewis F. Muir, in a steamboat formation complete with smoking stack; and Fillmore's "Lasses Trombone."

Black uniforms with gold citation cords and trim were re-designed for "Marching Mizzou" in 1958. Cross belts, gloves, and spats are white, and the hats sport white plumes. Shoulder patches carry in white outline the six famous Columns of the University.

Pacing the group in white shakos and uniforms, with gold trim, will be two students from Jefferson City, Mo.: the head drum major, James H. Gardner, and his assistant, Carey E. Cole. Heading the fifteen baton twirlers—one boy in gold blouse and black trousers, and fourteen girls in black-and-gold-flecked jackets and shorts—will be Carlynn A. Ross, Kennett, Mo.

Richard L. Hills, instructor in woodwind music, and assistant director, will accompany the Band to Miami. Also assisting will be John M. Christie, instructor in brass music. Carolyn Clithero, band member from RFD 1, Vandalia, Mo., and Prof. Emmons' secretary, will assist with arrangements in Miami.

Instruments will travel with the Band in a special baggage car. This will allow directors to hold rehearsals of the various sections of the band during the two-day trip.

Last year, "Marching Mizzou" was commended by

Missouri's Gov. James T. Blair, Jr., for the favorable attention drawn to the State by the Band's excellent performances at the two Missouri football games which were nationally televised. These performances brought complimentary letters from band directors across the Nation, as well as from former University teachers and alumni.

Even before he came to the University, Prof. Emmons' success as a bandsman had been credited by observers to "meticulous training in musicianship, and strict discipline tempered with friendly understanding." In its shows, the Band combines intricate dance steps and colorful formations with blues, rock 'n roll, popular, folk, and classical music. Because of the exact timing necessary, all music must be specially arranged. Prof. Emmons is assisted in this

by Don V. Joseph, staff arranger, who is band director for Jefferson City (Mo.) High School.

To chart a show, synchronizing the music and routines of the large group, an average of 30 to 40 hours is required. Behind the fine musicianship and complicated footwork on the field lie hours of practice. Each week during the fall, band members march approximately six to seven hours and attend a one-hour rehearsal.

Prof. Emmons came to the University in 1957 after a spectacular success with the Amarillo (Tex.) High School Band. In 1956, Amarillo, competing against 101 bands from 15 states, was sweepstakes winner, accumulating more prizes than any school in the history of the Tri-State Musical Festival, held that year in Enid, Okla.

He conducted the Amarillo Band in performances in the Cotton Bowl, the Rose Bowl parade, and the New Orleans Mardi Gras. Two of his former Amarillo students, are in "Marching Mizzou"; Gerald S. Middleton, trombonist, and Gary L. Van Doren, oboist and business manager.

What a difference . . .

Last year saw the low ebb in the thirteen year career of Tiger basketball coach Sparky Stalcup. A green, sophomore-dominated team lost a lot of close ones and finished with a dismal 6 won 13 lost record. This year the same team with only one added starter, sophomore Jack Gilbert, and one first line sophomore reserve, Ron Cox, boasted a 5 won 0 lost record for the young season.

Victims include Indiana (79-76) and Wisconsin (78-66) of the Big Ten, Arkansas (75-71) and Rice (77-48) of the Southwest Conference, and Washington University of St. Louis (70-62) in a rather ragged opener.

With essentially the same squad and essentially the same coaching, what accounts for obvious change in results? The answer seems to lie in the realm of intangibles—the easily-used but difficulty-measured quantities of spirit, poise and confidence. The quantities that make a hot and cold sophomore like Joe Scott into a mature, steady veteran who has averaged slightly over 25 points per game with phenomenal shooting of over 50% from the field in the first five games. This is the same boy who quit shooting when he couldn't hit early last year. In addition to better consistency in shooting, he also shows better drive, defense, rebounding and ball handling. Henke and Lockett, the other junior starters, show the same kind of improved ability, poise and confidence.

It would be a mistake, however, to completely minimize the contributions of rookie Jackie Gilbert. Particularly, in the absence of Al Abram, who has been sidelined much of the time and who will be lost for the last half of the season on a conference eligibility ruling, Gilbert has filled a big hole. The 240-pound sophomore gives the Tigers the same ruggedness under the basket formerly displayed by All American Bill Stauffer and more recently by Chuck Denny:

Five games do not a season make, and it would be unfair to expect the Tiger team to remain unbeaten. Highly regarded Minnesota and Loyola of Chicago round out the intersectional schedule. Then it's the tough Big Eight Holiday Tournament, last year's stumbling block. These games should provide a better standard of measurement for the next issue, but in the meantime—*vive la difference*.

Happy New Year?

We left off last time with two to go against our neighbors to the west. As you probably know by now, we won them both and picked up the bundle. K State fell 26-0; but, as predicted, the K.U. game was a great one with Missouri just squeezing out a 13-9 win. As a result, the University of Missouri represents the Big Eight Conference at the Orange Bowl in Miami January 1.

It's true that the Tigers face a more highly-ranked team and that they will be definite underdogs to the Georgia team that compiled a 9-1 season record in

the rugged Southeast Conference for the number 5 spot in the national press polls. Missouri with a 6-4 year came on strong to make the top twenty—18.

The Miami papers are decrying the weakness of the Big Eight entry, but all this talk about an embarrassingly weak entry from this conference may do a lot to fire the Tigers up for a fine effort.

We feel safe in predicting that the Devine Tigers will represent their University well. A team that has fought as this one has to reach Miami, can be counted on to give a good accounting of itself under pressure.

Young man goes west

Missouri's 29-year-old line coach, Doug Weaver, has been named head football coach at Kansas State University and if we may coin a phrase, Missouri's loss is K State's gain.

Part of the loss will be the technical excellence with which Doug taught the often subtle methods of what is popularly called "hard nosed" interior line play. More than that, though, will be the loss of the brilliant spirit of the guy. His was an infectious enthusiasm and an apparently indomitable optimism. He'd hate to have his value measured this way, but he's been a great morale factor for our dirty shirts up front.

Weaver played his intercollegiate football at Michigan State. After a stint in the Air Force he returned to Michigan State as a member of the Spartan staff. When Dan Devine, one of Weaver's coaches at State, took the Missouri job he hired Weaver as his top assistant.

Doug Weaver is a fine young coach and everyone hereabouts wishes him well (for nine games a year) at Kansas State. He will be a loss to Head Coach Devine, but at the same time he is a credit to him. One of the best tributes that can be paid to a coach by the people in his profession is to hire his assistant as head coach. Few are the men of Devine's age and experience who have had three assistants hired away as head men at major schools.
