


As Winter grudgingly takes its leave and Spring shows signs of arriving, a scene such as this in front of the University Library is fairly typical of the transition.





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


GEOLOGY'S NEW HOME

The two views on the opposite page are of the new home of the University's Department of Geology. In the foreground of the top view is the lecture hall which, as may be noted in the lower photo, is separated by a glassed-in lobby from the main building, which has four floors. The construction was completed in September at a cost of \$1,319,000, made possible by an appropriation of \$1,000,000 from the Missouri Legislature and a grant of \$319,000 from the National Science Foundation for research facilities.


The new home for geology is located at the northwest corner of Francis Quadrangle just west of the circular drive which runs by the Journalism buildings. Swallow Hall, built in 1893, home of the Department of Geology until last fall, quickly acquired new tenants.

The move to the University Geology Building was in three stages: first, the desks, furniture and equipment; next, the library of 12,000 volumes; then the collections totaling more than 30,000 mineral and rock specimens and 15,000 fossils. Dr. A. G. Unklesbay, chairman of the Department of Geology, listed these as among the benefits provided by the new building: Adequate teaching facilities, including satisfactory laboratories and lecture halls; space for research and research collections; rooms for microscopic research; special rooms in which graduate students can do their research and studying; display cases for collections that may be viewed by the public; and offices for faculty and staff.


Occupying 50,000 square feet of land, the structure contains 22 teaching and research laboratories.




Mastodon leg bone collected in Perche Creek is displayed in the lobby. The department's adopted mascot, Ralph, finds this particular spot ideal for relaxing.

Remember "Duke" Paddock? Before he received his A.B. degree in '26 he had established himself as a top campus actor and was prominent in various activities—in Missouri Workshop, as a member of the Student Council, the Missouri Razzers and R.O.T.C. Harry is public relations director for Missouri Pacific Lines. Before joining Bell in 1952, Mike worked on the Dunklin Democrat at Kennett, Missouri, also in Texas, and in DeSoto, Missouri. Harry went East, where he became public relations director of Johns Hopkins Hospital and School of Medicine, then shifted to the Association of American Railroads, Washington, D. C. 

Fred Shane Drawings is a big handsome book published by the University of Missouri Press and containing 116 pages of drawings selected from over a period of 40 years of work by the chairman of the University's art department.

Thomas Hart Benton, in an introductory essay, contrasts Shane's work with that of some other contemporary artists. He concludes his essay:


"These drawings of Fred Shane's are *of something*. Like a few others in our contemporary world, including the writer, Shane has not burnt his bridges to the past, he has not been so overwhelmed by the notion of progress that he has forgot how to refer, to draw things, that is, so that they retain ascertainable relations with what he draws from.

"I like these drawings. I hope other people will.


I am quite confident they will be more modern tomorrow than most of the 'modernities' of today. . . . they will mean something because their references mean something."

Sidney Larson, who contributed a biographical sketch to the volume, writes: "More than an indication of Shane's skill, these drawings reflect his poetic capacity to reveal the bone and pulse of the object and to give something of himself to the expression of it."

Larson says Shane is unconcerned with sterile pedagogical techniques or sophisticated tools, using pencil, brush, or rubbed ink to produce drawings which "are without cleverness, honest and sometimes noble drawings which reveal a search for solid, simple, expressive form."

Peden on the short story

THE AMERICAN SHORT STORY, Front Line in the National Defense of Literature, William Peden, Houghton Mifflin Company, Boston, 1964. 202 pp.

It is such a surprising thing to find a book of criticism, and sound critical writing too, that does not gabble esoterically as much criticism does, that we can recommend this book on the short story to anyone interested in the short story from high school on up. College students used to the gobbledy gook and dullness of texts in English courses will be amazed that they can actually enjoy this book. It is written in a way that does not require the frequent use of a dictionary in order to understand what the author is trying to say.

It may well be suspect to all teachers of American literature who believe that the study should end with Edgar Allan Poe. Peden's book will certainly become the definitive study of the period of the short story which it covers.

He is perhaps the first writer to go as far as to state, that more and more American fiction writers of the last twenty-five years have found the short story to be "the most exciting, challenging, and congenial of all contemporary literary forms." He says further that the short story in America has been a thing of individuality, freedom and variety, and that the "short story writer is creating the dominant and characteristic literary form of post-War I years." The *slick* story, of course, which he discusses at some length, he does not include in this but consigns it to the pot boilers where it belongs.

Of "so-called 'Writers' Conferences'" he says: "Today some universities sponsor so-called 'Writers' Conferences', which have little more to do with writing than a homecoming football weekend has to do with higher education." We found this to be true after hopefully attending one.

Of the current trends he writes, "In brief, American short fiction around 1949 has tended to come of age emotionally and intellectually, as well as artistically and technically. If he could not believe that tomorrow would be better, the writer was able, in many cases reluctantly, to find a kind of solace in the hope that perhaps tomorrow might not be much worse."

His classification of the short stories of this period

is: (1) The Jane Austens of Metropolis and Suburbia; (2) Sick in Body and Mind Both; (3) Of War and Peace and Other Matters." The Jane Austens include John Cheever, with a shrewd analysis of his "sad modern comedies;" Hortense Calisher with her "excursions into the past, warmhearted without being sentimentalized, simple without ever lapsing into the trivial;" John O' Hara, "whose skeptical analysis of contemporary life is Thackerayan in its delineation of individual, group and society stupidity;" and many other well known writers.

In the Sick group he discusses writers who deal in mental and physical illness, including the abnormal. Here he takes up stories of James Purdy, Jean Stafford, John Cheever, Daniel Fusch, Tennessee Williams, and others, whose stories he believes are the expression of their time. He relates them, also, back to Poe, Hawthorne, and Bierce.

In his discussion of War stories, he says the best of them are among the best fiction of the last two decades; here he includes Robert Lowry, James Michener, Irving Shaw, and others.

This book, of course, will be widely used as a text in narration and creative writing classes; it will stand on the shelves of most public libraries; and all those who are interested in studying and writing short stories ought to buy and study it, if nothing else for its complete list of good stories of this period. Then for the writer of good short stories who is discouraged (as which of them is not), he explains the scarcity of markets, but offers hope for eventual acceptance if the stories are good enough, though he speaks without undue optimism.

William Peden is a professor of English at the University of Missouri, where he teaches courses in short story writing. His own distinguished short stories have been published, and his other writings are extensive, including book reviews for the *Saturday Review*. The book that we have reviewed was started when he was a Guggenheim Fellow in 1961-62.



Professorship honors Heinkel

The Missouri Farmers Association Foundation has established an endowment trust fund to provide support for a distinguished professorship in agriculture at the University for at least a ten-year period.

Chancellor John W. Schwada said the professorship is established to honor Fred V. Heinkel, president of the MFA and a former member of the Board of Curators of the University, for "his unique contribution to Missouri progress and education."

The University has received an initial contribution of \$3,750 from the MFA Foundation with an agreement the Foundation will continue to provide at least \$3,500 annually through 1975. The fund will be open to additional contributions from the Foundation from time to time and to contributions from other sources.

Gov. Hearnes names three new Curators

Three new members of the University's Board of Curators have been appointed by Governor Warren E. Hearnes, who also reappointed J. Doyle Patterson of Kansas City.

The new members are Pleasant R. Smith of Mexico, William C. Myers, Jr. of Webb City, and William H. Billings of Kennett. Patterson, Smith and Myers are Republicans; Billings is a Democrat.

Smith is a farmer and implement dealer. He received a B.S. B.A. degree in 1949 and was co-captain of the M.U. basketball team. He is married and has two children. Smith succeeds Henry Andrae of Jefferson City, who was not eligible for reappointment because Cole County now is in the Eighth Congressional District.

Billings, LL.B. '52, son of a former circuit judge, James V. Billings, who holds two degrees from the University, is an attorney. As a student he was a member of the Law Review board of editors, the Order of the Coif, Phi Delta Phi, and winner of the John Lawson Prize and the Judge Shephard Barclay Award. He received numerous decorations as a Marine officer in the Pacific. Billings succeeds James A. Finch, Jr., who resigned to become a Missouri Supreme Court Justice. Billings is married and has three children.

Myers, LL.B. '49, is an attorney and a former member of the Missouri House of Representatives. As a pilot with the Eighth Air Force in World War II he completed 29 combat missions. Mrs. Myers is the former Juanita Merryman, A.B. '49.

Patterson is vice-president and director of the Vendo Company and a director of the Unitog Company and Research Hospital. He is also a graduate of Harvard Business School and a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He is married and has three daughters.

Dean of floating university

Dr. Thomas L. Gillette, A.B. '52, of San Diego State College, recently completed a tour as administrative dean of the University of the Seven Seas. He was on a semester's leave from his teaching duties at San Diego State and U.C.L.A. He taught sociology on board the M.S. Seven Seas, which visited fourteen countries. Stephanie Price, B.J. '60, served as director of public relations of the University of the Seven Seas on its around the world tour.






Frank Stonner, L. E. Casida and C. W. Sheppard display Citation of Merit awards presented by the University of Missouri Alumni Association.

AG ALUMNI HONORED

The University Alumni Association's Citation of Merit recognized the achievements of four University graduates at the second annual Ag Day Barbecue held on February 5. The four distinguished themselves in agriculture. Three of the recipients were present for the ceremonies:

Dr. Lester Earl Casida, professor of genetics at the University of Wisconsin since 1946; C. W. Sheppard, Warrensburg, Missouri; and Frank Stonner, Chamois, Missouri.

The Citation was awarded posthumously to the late Joseph C. Stephens, internationally known plant scientist. Accepting was his uncle, Dr. F. F. Stephens.

Approximately 600 persons attended the barbecue, sponsored by the Association of Agricultural Alumni, in the Livestock Judging Pavilion. Cordell Tindall, editor of *Missouri Ruralist*, was master of ceremonies. The main speaker was Chancellor John W. Schwada, who sketched the University's problems and needs, and emphasized the importance of agriculture and agricultural research to the state and nation.

Hartley Banks, Sr., of Columbia, vice-president and treasurer of the University Alumni Association, presented the Citations, which were for "outstanding achievement and meritorious service in agriculture."

Mr. Stephens, considered the father of hybrid sorghum, received his B.S. in Agriculture degree in 1924 and his A.M. in 1925. He began his outstanding career in the U. S. Department of Agriculture at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in 1925. He was responsible for working out the problems in producing hybrid seed of sorghum, a species with perfect flowers. He spent his life working on the genetics of sorghum and with male-sterile characters in the same species. He was a recognized world authority on the linkage relations and genetics of sorghum. Mr. Stephens shared with a colleague the Hoblitzelle National Award in 1955 for his research, and was named "Man of the Year in Agriculture" in 1955 by *Progressive Farmer*. He was elected a Fellow in the American Society of Agronomy in 1956, and received the Superior Service Award of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Dr. Casida holds two degrees from the University, an A.M. in 1927 and the Ph.D. in 1932. In the latter year he began his long association with the University of Wisconsin. He was president of the American Society of Animal Science in 1956 and received the Morrison Award in 1959. Dr. Casida was editor of the Society's *Journal of Animal Science* from 1949 to 1954. It was in 1954 that he received the Borden Award from the American Dairy Science Association. In 1964 he became corresponding editor, *Journal of Reproduction and Fertility*. Dr. Casida is a native of Livingston County, Missouri. Mrs. Casida is the former Ruth Barnes, A.B. 1927. They have two sons and a daughter.

Mr. Sheppard started farming in 1919 and has been prominent in agriculture since then. For more than three decades he has carried a heavy schedule of leadership in varied activities. In his general farming operation he has specialized in Duroc Jersey

hogs and Angus cattle. He is a former president of the Missouri Livestock Association. From 1936 to 1948, Mr. Sheppard was a member of the State Farm Program Committee, and for ten years of that period he was State Director of the Federal Farm Program in Missouri. A native of Barton County, Missouri, he received his B.S. in Agriculture in 1916, the year he was manager of Farmers Fair. In 1915 he was a member of the Livestock Judging Team which won the judging contest at the American Royal. Mrs. Sheppard, the former Helen Redford, was Barnwarmin' Queen in 1918.

Mr. Stonner never has lost his ties with agriculture although he has had a highly successful career in the business world. He now lives in his native Chamois, his home surrounded by nearly 6,000 acres of Stonner land, after retiring from 33 years in the insurance field. He was a member of the University Board of Curators for six years, 1947-1953.

Mr. Stonner was graduated in 1922 with a B.S. in Agriculture degree. On the campus he was prominent in agricultural activities, and was made permanent secretary of the all-University class of 1922. He was in county agent work for eight years before joining the State Farm Insurance Companies as Missouri State Director in 1930. He advanced to Deputy Regional Vice-President. Mr. Stonner married the former Miss Genevieve Miller in 1951; they have a daughter, Anne, twelve years old.

Big plans for B&PA Week


An expanded program, with new features added and old ones continued, marks the 1965 B&PA Week, formerly known as Business Week, which begins on the campus April 5 and ends April 9.

A recent feature story in the Honolulu Star-Bulletin & Advertiser begins: "Punahou is a Hawaiian name that has come to mean Quality Education. John Fenton Fox is a Missouri name that has come to mean Punahou."

Punahou is the largest private college preparatory school in the United States, according to the article. It was in its 103rd year when Dr. Fox—B.S. Ed. '29—became its president in 1944. Since then enrollment has nearly tripled, to 3,350 students.

"We don't want so many," he told his interviewer,

"but we have five applying for every vacancy. We have corporations insisting that children of their executives be admitted. We have found that we can be very selective. Punahou is a family school, and we take in children of alumni first. About 80 per cent of all alumni children who apply are accepted. About 20 per cent are rejected because we feel they cannot do the minimum work required."

He said the median IQ at Punahou is 122, and the national average in public schools is 100. He added: "This year the 55 Island schools produced 60 national merit scholar semi-finalists; 31 of them were from this school. We have 2 per cent of the high school seniors and more than 50 per cent of the most talented high school seniors."

In discussing some of the most significant developments during the two decades of his administration, Dr. Fox spoke first of religious education, which he described as the original purpose in the minds of Punahou's missionary founders.

"I made chapel once a week a required activity for every student," he said. "We have all religious faiths here at the school. We are not interested in proselyting, but we are interested in reinforcing the work done in the various churches and at home in teaching loyalty to God. Nothing in our program would cause a person to doubt his own religion. In addition to that, we have a required course in the Bible."

Dr. Fox was born in Sikeston, Missouri, and grew up there. After attending Westminster College he enrolled in the University with the hope of studying journalism. He switched to education after the journalism dean told him: "If you're willing to work 24 hours a day for \$25 a week and never rise above the rank of cub reporter, journalism might be the field for you."

His first school job was as principal at Diehlstadt, where he also coached football and basketball at an annual salary of \$1,240. He went back to the University for summer courses that qualified him for a teaching certificate, and taught for three years at Morehouse for \$1,600 a year.

Dr. Fox thought he wanted to be a college professor, and after graduate work in sociology at New York University, while nearing graduation with his doctor's degree, he learned that the starting salary at the instructor level at that time was \$1,800. He took a job as district superintendent in Bridgewater Township, N. J., in 1936, and remained there for six years, then became superintendent at East Hartford, Conn. Two years later he heard that Punahou was looking for a president; he applied for the position and was accepted.

When Dr. Fox arrived at Punahou one of the problems, in his view, was an insufficient number of men teachers. There were 20 men on the staff at that time; today there are 74. He also has seen the beginning salary rise from \$1,500 to \$5,150; today's maximum is \$10,453.

"I look for men who are scholar-athletes," Dr. Fox said. "We have some 35 men who teach five academic classes during the day and supervise sports afterward.

All boys in grades 7 through 12 take part in a required after-school sports program."

The school offers college-level courses in algebra, calculus, physics, English and history. In language courses, offerings include six years of French, four years each of Spanish and German, two each of Russian, Chinese, Japanese and Latin. A youngster takes history in his last six years at the school.

The tuition at Punahou ranges from \$425 in kindergarten to \$650 in grades 7 and up. "It costs about \$850 per child to operate Punahou," the educator said. "The difference comes from endowments and gifts."

All his life Dr. Fox has believed in physical fitness. Normally he plays tennis about three times a week. On weekends he swims. Every morning he does push-ups, situps, toe-touching, and other calisthenics. In the afternoon he walks two brisk miles. While doing graduate work in New York he was employed as director of boys' clubs in the Lower East Side and later was community recreation director in Milburn-Short Hills, N. J.

Dr. Fox believes that parents and environment have more influence on the child than school and church. "While the school tries to teach values, we know we are fighting a losing battle if the home has not done its job."

Discussing some of the major problems at Punahou, Dr. Fox said:

"First is pressure from home on a child to make him succeed. If he makes a low college board score, many parents regard it as a disaster. Many parents are not satisfied with a child who produces at his own level if it is not in the A or B-plus category. Some parents are unwilling to recognize that children differ in their intellectual abilities.

"Many parents think only in terms of a prestige college, as though they were displaying a Rolls Royce or a Cadillac. Yet the top colleges accept less than one-half of one per cent of the brightest youngsters today. And only 25 per cent of Punahou's students can make the honor roll.

"As parents we should share our children's ambition and dreams instead of imposing our own. I have seen children with below-average IQs qualify for college and become doctors and lawyers. There is no relation between the ability to earn high grades in school and financial success. Parents of children not in the A or B category should not let the children think of themselves as failures. All children who try deserve the approval of their parents."

As a graduate student at New York University—Dr. Fox also did post-graduate study at Columbia, Rutgers and Northwestern—he married a Kansas girl, Helen Filkin, who was attending the School of Social Work. Their three daughters were little girls when the family reached Hawaii, but they have grown up and moved away. One is the wife of a pediatrician in California and mother of four children. Another is married to a doctor and they are in the Peace Corps in Africa. The third is the wife of a mathematics teacher in California, and they have two children.

Syracuse honors Denton

Ralph J. Denton, president of the R. J. Denton Company and Denton Refractory Service Corporation, Syracuse, New York, has been named that city's Outstanding Man in Business of 1964.

Denton exudes enthusiasm and love for the business which had taken him from Missouri to Syracuse in 1946. His enterprises deal in high temperature cement, fire brick, and commercial insulation. Denton also feels his being at the head of the growing industry is a result of events evolving from his college experience.

"I wouldn't be in the sales business today if I hadn't worked my way through the University of Missouri," Denton admitted. "I washed windows and baby sat, spaded gardens—anything to make a dollar. In my second year I got a job running a mimeograph machine and mailing out catalogs to prospective students. The next year I sold wholesale groceries to my fraternity. This communication, this getting along with people is the secret of life."

After he was graduated in 1933 with a B.S. degree in Engineering, Denton was faced with finding work in the Depression. He finally secured employment with the A. P. Green Fire Brick Company in Mexico, Missouri. "It was the greatest sales job of my life getting that job," Denton remembers, and he was hired at \$50 a month.

In the next few years, Denton became eastern sales manager for A. P. Green. He had also married a Missouri school teacher, Dorothy White, who attended M.U. in the 1930's. Traveling for the firm wore thin, so at age 38 he borrowed \$4,000 and started a one-man operation in a small basement office. His claybrick business flourished and his line expanded to 444 items of brick. He accumulated engineering experts, and ultimately formed the Denton Refractory Service Corporation.

One of the reasons for Denton's selection as Business Man of the Year was his extensive civic affiliations. He is president of the Syracuse Kiwanis Club, and serves on the boards of the Citizens Foundation, Y.M.C.A., Better Business Bureau, Red Cross, Syracuse Governmental Research Bureau, and others. He once had the largest Cub Scout pack in the city.

His sons have outgrown the Cubs. Son Donald, 25, was graduated from West Point in 1962; John, 23, graduated in January from Alfred University; Doris, 21, is a senior at Syracuse University, and his youngest, Thomas Andrew, 16, attends Pebble Hill School. The Dentons live at 102 DeWitt Road, Syracuse.

Research related to probability and statistics conducted at the University under the direction of Dr. H. D. Brunk, professor of statistics and chairman of the department, is being supported by the U.S. Air Force Office of Scientific Research through a three-year grant of \$62,515. Dr. David L. Hanson, associate professor of statistics and mathematics, is working with Dr. Brunk on the project.

Tiger track team again wins Big Eight indoor title

Not quite the shoo-ins they figured to be after the preliminaries, Missouri's track team still claimed a repeat indoor title in the Big Eight meet last month—a triumph sparked by old pro Robin Lingle and a pair of hungry sophomores.

The Tigers made 52 points on the boards at Kansas City, scoring in 11 of 14 events to fight off surging Kansas, the runnerup with 47. None of the other six teams made it close. Nebraska was third with 25, followed by Oklahoma State 24, Kansas State 18, Oklahoma 17, Colorado 16 and Iowa State 9.

Mizzou's gold-jersied titlists won six individual crowns as Lingle again swung the mile and 1000-yard double, the latter in record time—and Gene Crews picked up his second indoor triumph in the shot at 59-5¼, his career best.

Other M.U. champions were: Cal Groff, high hurdles in :07.3; Steve Herndon, high jump in 6-8½; and Earl Denny, broad jump in 24-ft.

Lingle proved his class to a sell-out crowd of 9,700 by winning as he pleased, shattering the 1000-yard record by almost three seconds. His 2:08.8 clocking on the heels of a 4:08.9 mile was the night's most spectacular performance.

Still, it was a couple of rookies—Herndon and Denny—who probably hoisted the Bengals over the hump. They took top medals where the K.U. challengers were strong. Kansas entries still finished 2-3-4 behind Denny in the broad jump as the strapping Mizzou halfback unwound the best leap of his young career.

Tiger cagers finish third

To the casual observer, Mizzou's final 13-11 basketball record and third-place finish in the Big Eight standings might be viewed as a so-so season. To the halfway-knowlegeable fan, it was a remarkable achievement.

Winning five of their last six contests, the Tigers gave Coach Bob Vanatta one of his most gratifying campaigns. Little was expected of a team that had lost its 1-2 scorers from last year, had no regular taller than 6-5, and lacked bench strength.

But with hustle and heart supplying the impetus, Missouri's crowd-pleasers sprung at least five upsets during the year, including a shocker over St. Louis U.—later to win a National Invitation Tournament berth—and two victories (in three tries) over Oklahoma State, the ultimate conference champion.

In addition, the Tigers ended a few embarrassing strings. They beat K-State in Columbia after 23 straight losses to the Wildcats, and then rocked them again at Manhattan to snap a nine-year hex on that court. Six years of frustration at Boulder were terminated with a victory.

All five Mizzou regulars wound up with double-figure averages, indicative of the team balance that helped M.U. post an 8-6 conference mark, tying

Colorado for third-place. Scoring leader was Gary Garner with a 15-point average followed by Ned Monsees (14.1), George Flamank (12.8), Ron Coleman (11.3) and Charlie Rudd (10.4).

Garner, Monsees and Flamank—the top three point-makers—are seniors, along with Don Early, lost at mid-season with a knee injury. Once again, Vanatta's remodeling job will be extensive—but the penalty for this year's success may come back to haunt him. Mizzou fans will be convinced their amiable skipper can come up with another winner.

Intra-squad grid game May 1

Coach Dan Devine and his aides begin piecing together another football team this month—with 18 lettermen as the rebuilding nucleus. The Tigers will conclude their allotted 20 days of spring workouts with a final intra-squad game on May 1.

Most apparent need is the development of new offensive linemen to replace such seasoned graduates as Tom Wprostek, Bobby Brown, Joe Buerkle, Dave Holsinger and Jerry Crumpler. The defensive line, except for end Bud Abell, returns intact.

Backfield problems should be minimal. Back again will be 1964's top foursome of Gary Lane, quarterback; Charlie Brown and Earl Denny, halfbacks; and Carl Reese, fullback. As defensive insurance, the Tigers will have Johnny Roland, Ken Boston and Gary Grossnickle on call in a secondary which lost Vince Tobin and Gus Otto, sturdy two-way fullback.

Promising newcomers include a pair of hefty linemen, Russell Washington—a 6-6 and 265-pound end; and Mike Wempe, a 6-3 and 235-pound tackle. Best of the rookie backs should be Barry Lischner, fullback.

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


