COLLEGE PRESIDENTS

Not long ago I was reflecting on the fact that within the last year or two several University of Missouri alumni had become college presidents. I thought it would be interesting to make a list of all the alumni I could think of who are presidents, or comparable officials, of colleges, universities, and junior colleges. Within a short time I had eighteen names on the list. All of these were men with whom I am personally acquainted. I was sure there were

BURKE W. BRADLEY is President of San Joaquin Delta College, Stockton, California. Dr. Bradley received the M.A. from the University of Missouri in 1932 and the Ph.D. in 1942. He went to Stockton College in 1946 and became President in 1956. In 1963 the name of the institution was changed to San Joaquin Delta College. Burke's last position before going to Stockton was that of Dean of Moberly (Mo.) Junior College.

HARLAN BRYANT is President of Western State College of Colorado, at Gunnison. He received the M.A. from the University of Missouri in 1938 and the Ed.D. in 1946. Before going to Western State as President in 1962 he was Dean of the College of Education, University of Wyoming.

Since 1960 **DEAN COLVARD** has been President of Mississippi State University. Before going to this po-

sition he was Dean of Agriculture at North Carolina State College. He received the M.A. at the University of Missouri in 1938. His Ph.D. is from Purdue, 1950.

WALTER L. COOPER holds the title of Superintendent of the J. Sterling Morton High School and President of the Junior College, Cicero, Illinois. Before going to Cicero in 1953 he was Principal of Wichita High School East, Wichita, Kansas. Walt got the M.A. at Missouri in 1935 and the Ed.D. in 1954.

M. C. CUNNINGHAM has been President of Ft. Hays Kansas State College since 1949. Before going to this position he was Dean at Northwest Mo. State College. "Pete," as he is known by his countless friends, received the M.Ed. at Missouri in 1937 and the Ed.D. in 1944.

JACK M. FLINT is President of Highland Community Junior College, Highland, Kansas. He received all three degrees from Missouri: the B.S. in Ed. in 1948, M.Ed. in 1951, and the Ed.D. in 1957. He has been at Highland since 1957, and President since 1959. Before going to Kansas he was Superintendent of Schools at Cainsville, Mo.

BOB FOSTER is the new President at Northwest Missouri State College, Maryville. He joined the staff at Northwest as Registrar in 1948 and became Dean of Administration in 1959. Bob got the M.Ed. at Missouri in 1951 and the Ed.D. in 1960.

KENNETH FREEMAN has been President of Christian College, Columbia, since 1956, but he will become President of Metropolitan Junior College, Kansas City, at the end of this

school year. He obtained the M.Ed. at Missouri in 1940 and the Ed.D. in 1947. Before going to Christian he was Dean at State University Teachers College, Geneseo, N. Y.

LEWIS A. FROMAN is President of Russell Sage College, Troy, New York. Before going to this position in 1948 he was Dean at the University of Buffalo. He received the A.B. from the University of Missouri in 1927. His Ph.D. was obtained at Cornell in 1931.

ROBERT E. HICKS is Superintendent of Schools and President of the Junior College at Ft. Scott, Kansas. Before going to this position in 1960 he was Executive Dean at the School of the Ozarks, Point Lookout, Mo. Bob received two degrees from Missouri: the M.Ed. in 1948 and Ed.D. in 1958.

JOSEPH HOWARD is President of Central Philippine University at Iloilo City. He has been with that institution since 1947 and President since 1961. Dr. Howard is a Texan, and he received his A.B. and M.A. from Baylor. His Ph.D. is from Missouri, 1960.

HARRY E. JENKINS is President of Tyler Junior College, Tyler, Texas. He received the M.A. at Missouri in 1930. His Ph.D. is from the University of Texas. He went to Tyler in 1934 and has been President since 1946. Prior to 1934 he was Superintendent of Schools at Girard, Kansas.

JAMES P. KELLY joined the staff of Kemper Military School and College, Boonville, Mo., in 1963 and was made President in 1964. He received the B.S. in Ed. degree from the University of Missouri in 1937. In 1954 he was elected to the Missouri State Senate, from the 12th District, and was re-elected in 1958 and 1962.

In November 1964 ARTHUR L. MALLORY became President of Southwest Missouri State College at Springfield. He went to this position from the deanship of the evening division of the University of Missouri at St. Louis. Art has two degrees from Missouri: M.Ed. in 1957 and the Ed.D. in 1959.

On July 1 TED McCARREL will become President of Cottey College, Nevada, Missouri. He received the M.A. at the University of Missouri in 1936. Since 1946 he has been at the University of Iowa and his title has been Executive Dean of Student Services.

CHARLES J. McCLAIN got his M.Ed. at Missouri in 1957 and his Ed.D. at Missouri in 1957 and his Ed.D. in 1961, after which he became Assistant Dean of the University's

College of Education on the Columbia campus. In 1963 he became the first President of the new Junior College District of Jefferson County, Missouri.

F. JOSEPH MULLIN graduated from M.U. in 1929 with an A.B. degree. His Ph.D. was received from the University of Chicago in 1936. He has been President of Shimer College, Mt. Carroll, Ill., since 1954, and prior to that date was Dean and Professor of Physiology at Chicago Medical School.

LEONARD CARL NELSON is President of West Virginia Institute of Technology at Montgomery. He has been with that institution since 1956 and President since 1961. Prior to going with W. V. I. T. he was an associate professor at North Carolina State College. His M.U. degree is an M.S. in M.E., 1949, School of Mines and Metallurgy, at Rolla.

MAYNARD M. PETTIGREW is Superintendent of Schools at Moberly, Mo. The school district operates Moberly Junior College in addition to its elementary and secondary schools. Maynard has been in his present position since 1956, and prior to that was Superintendent of Schools at Boonville, Mo. He received his M.A. at Missouri in 1936.

JAMES NEAL PRIMM is the new President of Hiram College, Hiram, Ohio. He went to Hiram as Dean in 1958, became Acting President in 1964 and President in 1965. Previously he had been at the University of Missouri as Professor of History and Director of the Western Historical Manuscripts Collection. He received the M.A. at Missouri in 1949 and the Ph.D. in 1951.

CARL R. RENG is President of Arkansas State College. He received the Ed.D. at Missouri in 1948, after which he became Head of the School Administration Division of the Graduate School, University of Arkansas. He became President of Arkansas State College in 1951.

JOHN W. SCHWADA in 1964 became the first Chancellor of the University of Missouri, Columbia. He has been on the University staff since 1951, was Acting Dean of B & PA 1961-62, and was Dean of Faculties 1961-64. His Missouri degree is an M.A. 1947. His Ph.D. is from the University of Texas.

DONALD D. SHOOK received both graduate degrees from the University of Missouri: the M.S. in Ed., in 1960 and the Ed.D. in 1962. He is now in his first year as President of Crowder College, one of Missouri's new public junior colleges. The institution, also in its first year, is at Neosho. From

1962 to 1964, Don was Dean at Flat River (Mo.) Junior College.

LELAND E. TRAYWICK became President of the Municipal University of Omaha on February 1, 1965. Before going to Omaha he was at Northern Illinois University for a short time, and prior to that was President of Southwest Missouri State College at Springfield. Lee received the A.B. at Missouri in 1936 and the A.M. in 1939. His Ph.D. is from the University of Illinois.

ROBERT E. TURNER is President of Macomb County Community College, Warren, Michigan. He has been in this position since July 1963, going there from Arizona State College at Flagstaff, where he was Director of the Division of Technical Education and Applied Arts. He received the Ed.D. at Missouri in 1957.

JERRY VINEYARD, since 1947 Superintendent of Schools and President of the Junior College, Arkansas City, Kansas, has just recently retired from that position. Before going to Kansas in 1947 he was Superintendent of Schools at Nevada, Mo. He obtained his A.M. at Missouri in 1927 and his Ed.D. in 1946.

J. LAWRENCE WALKUP, President of Arizona State College, Flagstaff, holds two degrees from the University of Missouri. He received the A.M. in 1941 and the Ed.D. in 1948. He has been at Arizona State since 1948 and has been President since 1957.

H. TUDOR WESTOVER took three degrees from the University of Missouri: B.S. in 1941, M.Ed. in 1942, and Ed.D. in 1947. Since 1957 he has been Superintendent of the Flat River (Mo.) Public School System, and as such is the chief executive officer of Flat River Junior College. Before taking this position he was Dean at Albright College, Reading, Pa.

LLOYD E. WORNER is President of Colorado College, Colorado Springs. He received the A.M. at Missouri in 1944 and the Ph.D. in 1946. After obtaining the doctorate he joined the staff of Colorado College, became Dean in 1955, and in 1963 was appointed to the office of President.

After serving about two months as Acting President, CHARLES W. BANTA has just been named President of Milton College, Milton, Wisconsin. Previous to going to Milton in 1964 he was on the faculty of the University of Wisconsin, as Supervisor, Finance Management Program and Management Institute. Pres. Banta received the A.B. at Drury College in 1949 and the M.S. at the University of Missouri in 1952.

The Glass Menagerie



In April the University Theatre presented, with marked success, "The Glass Menagerie," a time honored play by Tennessee Williams, a student at the University from 1931 to 1933. This production, which was presented on five evenings in the Fine Arts Theater, preceded by a short time another major dramatic event on the campus, the one-act play contest. Ironically, when he was a student here, Thomas Lanier Williams entered this contest but he failed to win.

About a decade later, Tennessee Williams was advancing to foremost rank among American playwrights. "The Glass Menagerie," first performed in Chicago, served to alert the public to a new talent. After four months, the play was moved to New York where it captured the 1945 Critics' Circle Award for the best play of that season.

In New York the production ran for 563 performances with Laurette Taylor in the star role. The play starred Helen Hayes in the London production and was revived several times by Miss Hayes, once

for an international tour under the auspices of the State Department.


Williams frankly admits that the characters of Amanda Wingfield, his fading Southern mother who dreams of her more genteel past, and her shy daughter, Laura, who plays all day with her collection of glass animals, derive from his own mother and sister. Amanda's efforts to make a match between the gentleman caller and her daughter provide some of the play's most touching and humorous scenes. The play takes place in St. Louis about 1937.

Gerardine Obermark of Jefferson City played the role of Amanda; Michael Cochran of West Plains was Tom, her son; Araminta Hash of Kansas City had the role of the daughter, Laura; and James Zvanut of St. Charles was the gentleman caller.

The play was directed by Donovan Rhynsburger, professor of speech and dramatic art and director of dramatics. Lewis Stoerker, assistant professor of speech and dramatic art, was technical director.

missouri memo

Two of the 1965 Pulitzer Prize Winners attended the University—LOUIS M. KOHLMEIER, of the Wall Street Journal, and GENE GOLTZ, of the Houston (Tex.) Post. Kohlmeier, winner of the national reporting award, was born in St. Louis, Mo., attended Washington University there, and was graduated from M.U. in 1950 with a B.J. degree. After two years in the Army, he joined the Wall Street Journal's St. Louis Bureau, and transferred three years later to the Chicago office. In 1957, he went with the St. Louis Globe-Democrat, but in 1960 returned to the Wall Street Journal and was assigned to its bureau in Washington, D. C. He and his wife and two children live in Bethesda, Md. Goltz, winner of the special local reporting award, spent three years as a musician in the Air Force, attended the University of Kansas, and was enrolled in the School of Journalism at M.U. in the winter of 1958. That June he became a reporter for the weekly Tama (Iowa) News-Herald. Later, he worked on the Decorah (Iowa) Journal, the Douglas (Ariz.) Dispatch, and the Phoenix Republic. A native of Marquette, Iowa, Goltz joined the Houston Post in 1962. He lives in La Marque, Tex.

J. P. (Jake) HAMEL recently retired as managing editor of the Columbia (Mo.) Tribune. City Editor LARRY A. GRAEBNER succeeded him. Hamel will continue his duties as editor of the editorial page and will contribute to the sports and other departments. He joined the Tribune's staff while a student at M.U. in 1918. He continued with the paper following his graduation from M.U. in 1920 with a B.J. degree, and became its managing editor in 1938. During much of this time, Hamel also served as Columbia correspondent for the Associated Press, St. Louis Globe-Democrat, Kansas City Star, Des Moines Register, Omaha World-Herald, Christian Science Monitor, New York Times and other media. He is also considered

dean of sports writers in the Big Eight Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. Hamel and his wife reside at 102 College Ave., Columbia. Graebner joined the Tribune in 1949 as a photographer while attending the University School of Journalism, and served as chief photographer and picture editor until his appointment as city editor eight years ago. He had previously worked on newspapers at Carrollton and Kansas City, Mo., and Marshalltown, Iowa. He and his wife, the former Jean Wilson, B.J. '49, and two daughters live at 202 E. Parkway Dr., Columbia. She is on the faculty of West Junior High School.

Five University graduates are associated with the advertising department of Cook Paint & Varnish Company, Kansas City, Missouri: C. O. BRATTEN, B.J. '32, advertising manager; MAURICE BARNES, B.J. '47; DONALD W. HENDERSON, B.J. '50; THOMAS L. HOUSH, B.J. '59; and THOMAS F. HOUSTON, A.B. '57, B.J. '58.

Lieut. Col. LLOYD E. JONES, JR., (Ret.), of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, was the Spacemobile lecturer and demonstrator at the Space Symposium held on the campus during May. Col. Jones, A.B. '42, is a grandson of John Carleton Jones, former University president.

GUY G. RICE, a Kansas City lawyer, has been elected president of the newly formed Estate Planning Association. Membership in the organization, which functions in estate planning and probate, consists of lawyers, accountants, life underwriters and personnel of bank trust departments. Mr. Rice, who lives at 1430 W. 50th, Kansas City, Mo., received his A.B. degree at M.U. in 1953. Other officers include CARL F. KRAUSS, LL.B. '61, first vice-president; DON E. WILLIAMS, B.S. in Mechanical Engineering '53, second vice-president; and DONALD B. SCHAUMBURG, B.S. in Business Administration '43, treasurer.

COURTS REDFORD, A.M. '21, retired a few months ago after 21 years' service with the Home Mission Board, Southern Baptist Convention, the last eleven years as executive secretary. A most unusual tribute was paid to Dr. Redford when the entire 32-page magazine, *Home Missions*, was devoted to his life and career. The magazine, published monthly by the Southern Baptist Convention, Atlanta, Ga., includes an autobiographical article by Dr. Redford in which he makes several references to his experience on the Missouri campus. There are also intimate glimpses into the life and work of Courts Redford as student, teacher, college president, and preacher—the glimpses being provided by his contemporaries. For thirteen years Dr. Redford was president of Southwest Baptist College, Bolivar, Mo. Many pictures are reproduced in the publication showing Dr. Redford at various stages of his career; one photo shows him and Mrs. Redford with their nine children and their families. While attending the University, Dr. Redford was student pastor at Stephens College and Christian College.

DR. PINKNEY C. WALKER, Dean of the School of Business and Public Administration, will visit for four weeks at the American National Insurance Company's home office in Galveston, Tex. Two other professors, from Wisconsin and Texas, will join him as part of a national fellowship program. They will study operations of the company under the auspices of the Life Insurance Management Association program.

Veteran newsman JAMES K. HUTSELL, associate editor of the Huntsville (Ala.) Times, recently went to the campus of the University of the South at Sewanee, Tenn., for a special interview with Arnold J. Toynbee, Britain's world-renowned philosopher of history. Hutsell is a 1929 J-School graduate.

ALUMNI INSTITUTE

It had not been attempted before on the University campus—a two-day meeting of the Alumni Association Board of Directors topped by informational addresses from high administrative and faculty persons. The innovation had other features: spouses were invited to a luncheon and two dinner meetings, and various entertainment programs were provided. Starting off the proceedings of a busy weekend in Columbia, May 7 and 8, was a four-hour board meeting on the first afternoon. Because of the instructional nature of the four talks, the two-day affair could best be called an Alumni Institute, a type of meeting long planned by the Board of Directors. Judging by the success of the initial effort, it is safe to predict that similar institutes will be held in the future.

The speakers were Chancellor John W. Schwada; Dean of Students Jack Matthews; Extension Dean Brice Ratchford; and Dr. Ardath Emmons, director

of the Research Reactor. All discussed the University's problems, progress and objectives. The consensus of the 35 persons present was that the sessions were most informative and interesting.

William C. Tucker of Warrensburg, national president of the University Alumni Association, presided at the five sessions, all at the Tiger Hotel. He and other national officers were re-elected to serve another year, beginning July 1. The others are: Marvin D. McQueen of St. Louis, B. W. Robinson of Jefferson City, and John P. Miller of Kansas City, vice-presidents; Hartley Banks, Sr., of Columbia, vice-president and treasurer.

Chancellor Schwada, speaking informally at Saturday's luncheon, touched on a number of subjects. He stressed the need of all groups cooperating in order to assure progress of the University and make it a great institution. Rather than admitting only

"the elite few," he would like to see the University give all deserving students a chance to make good. He also believes the freshman student should be exposed to the best teachers, but too often, he said, fine teachers become involved in research.

Dr. Emmons, in his illustrated lecture on the Research Reactor Facility now nearing completion, literally held his audience spellbound. He was able to reduce scientific terms to layman's language and bring alive the vast potentialities of the facility, which is the most powerful of any on a college campus. As one board member told Dr. Emmons, "I just wish 15,000 people could have heard this talk."

Dean Matthews, the Friday night speaker, looked back into campus history and found similarities in some student actions of today and those of yesterday. He said the vast majority of University students are of a high type and that those who are involved in problems are in a tiny minority. He fielded a number of questions from the alumni after completing his talk.

The final speaker, at the Saturday night dinner

meeting, was Dean Ratchford. He pictured the far-reaching services of the University Extension Division. Dean Ratchford emphasized the importance of volunteer efforts on the part of alumni in furthering the University's expanded programs.

Three new district directors were elected: Garth Landis, St. Joseph; Karl Wickstrom, Marshfield; and Herbert Harvey, Eldon. Robert Dallmeyer of Jefferson City and Mark Swearengen of Monroe City were reelected directors.

Five new regional directors were elected: John Politt, Santa Barbara, Calif.; Clif Blackmon, Dallas, Tex.; Eugene Trumble, Minneapolis, Minn.; Joseph Carpenter, Louisville, Ky.; and Walter John, Washington, D. C. The Association now has two directors from each of its five regions in the United States.

At the close of the board meeting, G. H. (Bus) Entsminger, Assistant to the President for Development and Alumni Activities, traced the organizational and operational aspects of the offices he directs.

Jean J. Madden, field secretary of the Association, reported membership at a new high, 14,994.

Journalists elect McQueen

Marvin D. McQueen of St. Louis, as the new president of the Journalism Alumni Association, currently holds three titles of the presidential category. He is vice-president of D'Arcy Advertising Company and member of the board of directors, and he is also a vice-president of the University of Missouri Alumni Association. He was recently re-elected to the latter position to serve another year.

As president of the Journalism Alumni, he succeeds Henry Bodendieck. Other officers of that organization are Homer Thieman, Chicago, vice-president; Miss Jane White, Kansas City, secretary; and John Stapel, Columbia, recording secretary. The election was held at a meeting during Journalism Week.

Mr. McQueen received a B.J. degree in 1936. Through the years he has given valuable assistance to the University in its publications programs.

Writes of pioneer editor

The trials of establishing and maintaining newspapers on the Missouri frontier of the early 1800s are recounted in a new book, *The Pioneer Editor in Missouri, 1808-1860*, published last month by the University of Missouri Press.

The author is William H. Lyon, professor of history and academic chairman of social science, Arizona State College. He holds a B.S. degree in education from Central Missouri State College, an A.M. degree from the University of Chicago, and a Ph.D. from the University of Missouri.

The 202-page clothbound volume is available from book sellers and the University of Missouri Press, Swallow Hall, Columbia, at \$5.95 per copy.

Mr. Lyon's book deals both with the influence of the frontier upon journalism and the impact of the editor upon the frontier. The author discusses the lack of professional discipline and the lax business methods which frequently brought newspaper enterprises to an end; the methods of newsgathering and concepts of what was newsworthy; writing style; newspaper format and printing; and the personalities of the editors themselves.

New training program

The University of Missouri has entered into an agreement with the National University Extension Association to establish an orientation and training program for professional directors and teachers who will staff local Child Development Centers being set up in local communities under grants from the U.S. Office of Economic Opportunity. The Association

will provide financial support for the new project.

The University will develop a program providing six-day intensive orientation and training periods in each of three consecutive weeks starting June 14. Each period will enroll a different group of trainees.

Trainees will be assigned to the University program by the Office of Economic Opportunity and the National University Extension Association. It is anticipated that most of the trainees will be from Missouri.

The training program will be conducted as a state-wide activity of the University, centering at the Columbia campus, and the project will be under the direction of Dr. Charles H. Koelling, assistant director of the University Extension Division. Dr. James L. Craigmile, associate professor of education at Columbia, will be curriculum director.

The local Child Development Centers are being set up with the support of the Office of Economic Opportunity for children of limited opportunity who will start kindergarten or first grade next fall. They will be designed to help such children in adjusting to the challenges of school experiences and in succeeding in the regular school program.

The training sessions at the University will draw upon the academic resources of the College of Education, the School of Medicine, the School of Social Work, the School of Home Economics, the College of Arts and Science, and other disciplines that may be needed for the instructional program.

Tigers win Big Eight title


For the fourth straight year, Missouri's baseball Tigers are champions of the Big Eight Conference. This time they backed into the title. Rain washed out their last two games with Iowa State, and the race could have ended with a tie between Nebraska and Missouri had the Cornhuskers won their double-header from Kansas; but the Jayhawks won a split, and the conference crown went to Missouri.

Coach John (Hi) Simmons said, "Of course we would have preferred to win the championship with our own players instead of depending upon another team."

Standing in the way of the Tigers' trip to Omaha and another appearance in the College World Series was St. Louis University, holder of the Missouri Valley Conference title. In each of the last two seasons Missouri has eliminated St. Louis in the NCAA District 5 playoffs, but this year the Billikens with a veteran team strong on defense and pitching were favored to win. The teams scheduled a three-game playoff series in Busch Stadium, St. Louis.

Missouri had a 15-6 record in all games, and St. Louis was 21-5.

The Tigers' invasion of Busch Stadium proved disastrous to Missouri hopes. The Billikens took both games of a doubleheader by the same score, 5-4, and moved on to the Omaha series as representatives of District 5. It was the first time since 1956 that a Big Eight team was not the district representative in the College World Series.




A Tradition Changes

The weekly drills of ROTC units on Francis Quad-rangle this spring may be the last of the really big ones, but if the marchers are reduced in number they may be even better in skill. Compulsory military training requirements on the campus will be abolished, and enrollment in ROTC placed on a voluntary basis, effective next September. The changes are in compliance with the ROTC Vitalization Act of 1964. All of the ROTC's are now in the process of revising


and upgrading their course of study with the view to increasing the quality of commissioned officers. One of the major changes provided by the new legislation is the offer of Army and Air Force ROTC's of financial aid similar to that now provided by the Navy ROTC. The Army and Air Force now provide a four-year scholarship program as well as non-scholarship programs of four and two years. Officials expect better performances from volunteer units in the future.

The presentations were made during Journalism Week by Dr. Earl F. English, dean of the University's School of Journalism, in Jay H. Neff Hall Auditorium. The awards also went to two newspapers noted for, among other things, their record years of continuous publication.

One of the journalists honored is an alumnus. He is Stewart Hensley, B.J. '34, chief diplomatic correspondent for United Press International. The others: Edward P. Morgan, news commentator for the American Broadcasting Company; David Lawrence, Washington correspondent and founder of the *U. S. News and World Report*; Walter E. Botthof, chairman of the board of Standard Rate and Data

Service in Chicago; and C. W. Johnson, managing editor of the Springfield, Mo., *News and Leader-Press*.



Mr. Morgan and Mr. Lawrence were speakers at the Journalism Banquet, attended by approximately 700 persons in Rothwell Gymnasium. Mr. Morgan spoke on "Where Does the Individual Fit in the Great Society?" and Mr. Lawrence's topic was "The News Behind the News." Among several alumni on the week's program was noted author Homer Croy.



Around the University

University President Elmer Ellis has been appointed to a 15-man Citizens Advisory Committee on Civil Rights. The committee will consult with U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman on efforts of the USDA to comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

Dr. Kenneth P. Buchert, associate professor of civil engineering, is winding up an academic year as acting consultant for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston, Tex. He assisted

in designing a dome for one of the Center's missile testing chambers. The chamber, now in the test stage of construction, is designed to provide a facility in which can be simulated the extremes of high and low pressures and temperatures which missiles and spacecraft are expected to encounter on the moon. For four years Dr. Buchert has been studying the design and construction of steel domes that would have the greatest resistance to stress while requiring the least increase in weight and materials. He foresees, within the next sixty years, downtown urban areas and possibly

entire cities housed under self-supporting rib-reinforced steel domes to control the climate.

The first Negro-organized bank in Missouri is being studied in depth by bank management researchers in the University's School of Business and Public Administration. The institution is the recently chartered Gateway National Bank of St. Louis. University researchers are currently preparing a detailed case study of the new bank, under the direction of Dr. Lewis E. Davids, who is the Robert E. Lee Hill Professor of Bank Management. Dr. Davids emphasizes the case method in teaching bank management, and the study of the new bank is part of the instructional program. He is president of the Midwest Case Research Association, which was organized in 1964.

The Dean of Students office in Read Hall has 15 copies of the 1946 Savitar on hand and will be glad to mail a copy to anyone upon receipt of \$1 to cover mailing and handling costs.

Formal ceremonies dedicating new student residence halls and dining facilities were held April 11 as Chancellor John W. Schwada presided. The buildings dedicated were George Caleb Bingham Hall, the dining facility, and its two flanking eight-story residence buildings, William Henry Hatch Hall and Carl Schurz Hall—all at College Avenue and Ashland Gravel Road; and John H. Wolpers Hall at Rollins and Hitt streets. The ceremonies were held in the dining room of Bingham Hall and the dedicatory address was given by Governor Warren E. Hearnes, who spoke on "A Spirit of Progress." The response was given by Oliver B. Ferguson of Fredericktown, vice-president of the University Board of Curators. The three residence halls house a total of 1,515 students—Hatch, 582 men; Schurz, 582 women; Wolpers, 351 women.

Broad environmental health program approved

A long-range, University-wide program to study the effect of environmental trace amount substances upon human health has been approved by the Bureau of State Services of the U.S. Public Health Services. Senators Edward V. Long and Stuart Symington of Missouri notified the University to this effect. They added that financial support for the program is assured for at least three years, with \$215,849 allocated for the first year's activities.

The program essentially will be a major broadening into a more comprehensive, closely-integrated project of the University's present program of research and training in environmental health, President Elmer Ellis said. This program is now carried on at Columbia, Rolla, and Kansas City, and is planned also at St. Louis.

The specific aims of the expanded, long-term and broad coverage project supported by the Public Health Service will be:

To identify and to follow the course of trace amounts of natural and synthetic substances which may affect human health by their presence in the soil, water, air and food.

To identify and determine the extent of biological changes resulting from long-term exposure to or lack of natural and synthetic substances.

To study and develop techniques for the control of trace amounts of health-related substances in the environment.

To study and develop techniques for the implementation of public acceptance of recommendations concerning such substances in man's environment.

The program, in its long-range, over-all aspects, will be a multi-discipline study investigating pesticides, detergents, fertilizers, industrial wastes and other pollutants and contaminants of organic and inorganic nature that occur in the human environment.

Dr. Raymond E. Peck, Dean of Research Administration of the entire University, said the program will be under the direction of Dr. Carl J.

Marienfeld, Director of Inter-divisional Health Related Research. It will utilize all available related University facilities and interested investigators on the campuses at Columbia, Rolla, and Kansas City. As soon as laboratory facilities are completed on the campus at St. Louis, that campus will be included. A University Environmental Health Advisory Committee of faculty members from the four campuses is already working with Director Marienfeld, and an advisory council of citizens is to be established.

Pops concert scores again

Another memorable evening of music was provided at the annual Pops Concert of the University of Missouri Band, with the University Singers, on April 24 at Kiel Auditorium in St. Louis.

Approximately 8,000 alumni and friends of the University were most enthusiastic as a wide variety of talent was presented. The free program was sponsored by the St. Louis Chapter of the University of Missouri Alumni Association and the Carondelet Savings and Loan Association. Once again a total of \$4,000 in music scholarships at the University was made available.




Somewhere beyond those smokestacks lies our quarry.




Here a white sign directs us to turn left at this driveway.
