FIRST PARENTS' DAY OUTSTANDING SUCCESS

Dr. Brooks Tells Parents of University's Needs.

The first Parents' Day in the history of the University was held on November 5, with more than 2000 in attendance. President Stratton D. Brooks sent a personal invitation to the parents of the students in the University inviting them to participate in the first Parents' Day. He appointed the following committee to prepare the program for the day: R. L. Hill, Chairman; Dean Albert K. Heckel and Dean Bessie L. Priddy, Student Participation; John F. Williams, Publicity; Leslie Cowan, Invitations; S. W. Canada, Registration; Col. M. C. Kerth, Military and Band; C. L. Brewer, Football game activities; Prof. Herbert Wall, Music; Prof. A. C. Lanier, Reception, group photographs and other public exercises.

The program started with the outdoor mass meeting on the north steps of Jesse Hall on the evening of November 4, when the parents were honor guests and were welcomed by the student president, Hartley Pollock. Larry Brill, cheer leader, taught the parents a Ma and Pa yell. William Buchholz, LL.B. '96, Attorney of Kansas City, member of the famous football team of '95, whose son, George, is a member of this year's varsity squad, represented the parents on the mass meeting program. Following the mass meeting a reception was given by President Brooks, members of the Board of Curators, and members of the faculty, in Rothwell Gymnasium. Prof. Lanier had so arranged the reception that the visiting parents had ample facilities for meeting the Deans and members of the faculty of the schools in which their children are enrolled.

The Men's Glee Club, under the leadership of Prof. Herbert Wall, and the Women's Glee Club, under the leadership of Miss Geneva Youngs, gave a short program during the reception. The parents were also guests at the Cambridge-Missouri debate that evening in the auditorium. Honors were divided before an audience of approximately 1500. The question was, "Resolved, that the power of the press has increased, is increasing and ought to be diminished."

The affirmative, maintained by the English, won the audience's decision for being the best speakers. The Missourians presented, from the viewpoint of the listeners, the best arguments. England was represented in the debate by High M. Foote, M. A. B. King-Hamilton, and Herbert Elvin. Missouri was represented by Marion Dry, Ralph Graves, and W. Wimmell. Dr. A. H. Fairchild was chairman of the debate.

On the morning of the 5th the par-

ents were taken on a trip and inspection of all University buildings. At ten o'clock they assembled in the Auditorium to hear the following address by President Brooks:

"The greatest item of cost in a university education is not the amount the state expends, nor the amount the parents expend, but the time that the student spends," Dr. Stratton D. Brooks, president of the University of Missouri, declared in his address before the parents of university students who were here for the Parents' Day exercises.

"This item—not from the point of view of what the student might earn during this particular time—is the highest because that is the time for the development of opportunity and if the university does not supply proper facilities, the student not only loses his time but a life opportunity which is vastly more valuable," Dr. Brooks said.

"The University of Missouri, in common with the other state educational institutions of this state and of other states, is confronted with a very serious situation, due to the fact that on the one hand attendance has increased very rapidly, and on the other hand the possibility of securing adequate funds is becoming increasingly difficult.

"The citizens of the state have probably failed to appreciate how rapid has been the growth in high school and college attendance. In 1925 there were more than eight times as many children enrolled in the high schools of the state than there were in 1900, nearly twenty times as many were graduated from high school in 1925 than in 1900. The result of this has been an enormous increase in college attendance.

"In 1900, 4553 regular students were enrolled in all the colleges in Missouri. In 1927 this enrollment had reached 28,123. As a result of these conditions, many private and endowed institutions have been compelled to limit attendance, either by the process of raising entrance requirements, increasing the tuition, or arbitrarily refusing admission.

"Since the purpose of the state university is to maintain equality of opportunity for all the citizens of the state, it cannot adopt any method of limitation which tends to limit university education to the well-to-do."

Following the President's address Hartley Pollock, student president, and Miss Mary Louise Ramsey, president of W. S. G. A., and the Deans were presented to the parents.

One of the purposes of the gatherings of parents was to organize the Parents Association of the University of Missouri. Since this was the first

Parents Day there was a feeling that perhaps the parents would not give much thought to this organization. Much to the surprise of those in charge, however, the parents took the matter of organization seriously. Motion was made by Judge Stone, seconded and carried unanimously, that the chairman of the meeting appoint Mr. Buchholz as chairman of the committee to give considerable time to their study to perfect an organization of the parents in order that it might be statewide in its representation, to be of vital force in assisting the University and the state's educational system in their activities. Mr. Buchholz is studying the items carefully and will soon hold a meeting of his committee and they will outline a plan for organization which will be submitted to all of the parents for their approval. The parents also voted to establish Parents Day as an annual affair, extended thanks to President Brooks, members of the Board of Curators, the Deans, and members of the Faculty and extended their hope that the University would never hesitate to call on them for any support that the University needs.

Before the meeting adjourned the Auditorium was filled and the meeting could have been held for an hour longer on organization plans and to hear talks by enthusiastic parents. It was necessary, however, to adjourn promptly at eleven when the parents gathered at the Columns for a group photograph. Another photograph was also taken of the parents who are alumni and who have sons and daughters in the University now. The sons and daughters in school whose parents or grandparents were enrolled in the University number 412 and they were recently organized into the "Hope O' Tomorrow Club" with the following officers: Betty Lou Stone, Kansas City, President; Benjamin Boyer, St. Joseph, Vice-President; George Buchholz, Kansas City, Secretary; Ralph C. Richards, St. Louis, Treasurer. (Miss Stone's Father and Mother, Judge and Mrs. Kimbrough Stone, were here for Parents Day. Judge Stone is an alumnus of the University and Miss Stone's grandfather, the late Senator W. J. Stone, was an alumnus.

Talks relative to the organization were made by Lee B. Ewing, Nevada; L. D. Kniffin, Kansas City; Henry L. Weidenmueller, St. Louis; E. F. Beasley, St. Joseph; F. L. Goetz, St. Joseph; Rev. R. M. Wimmell, Bowling Green; William Buchholz, Kansas City, and Judge Kimbrough Stone, Kansas City.

Col. M. C. Kerth was in charge of the dress parade of the R. O. T. C., which was held on Francis Quadrangle. The parade was one of the

most interesting features of Parents Day.

Most of the newspapers of the state sent special correspondents and photographers to cover Parents Day and much publicity was given to the University as a result of this activity. One of the newspaper features was the method followed by the Kansas City Journal-Post in reporting the meeting. They sent one of their staff men, D. M. Carr, Sr., to report Parents Day from a Father's viewpoint and they asked Mr. Carr's son, D. M. Carr, Jr., a student in the University, to report Parents Day from a student's viewpoint.

The Memorial Tower was open to all visitors and flood lights were thrown on the Tower during the weekend and will be left there until after Homecoming. There was no end of praise on the part of the parents regarding the beauty of the Tower, especially when lighted at night.

The parents attended the West Virginia game. Mr. Brewer had the Dads of the football players seated directly behind the players bench with numbers on their backs corresponding to the numbers worn by their sons. The football Dads had luncheon together that day. Between halves at the game a group of girls and boys formed the words Pa and Ma on Memorial Field and the University Band, under the direction of Mr. George Venable, played Home Sweet Home. That evening the parents were guests of fraternities, sororities and Cubs, and the following Sunday morning they were guests at the many Bible Classes and churches in Columbia. That afternoon they were guests at a Band Concert in the Auditorium, given by Mr. Venable and the University Band.

All in all it was a most successful week-end and will result in closer relations between the University and the parents of the students.

\$250,000 TRUST FUND WILLED TO MISSOURI U. FOR NEEDY STUDENTS

James Warren Whiffen, Long Prominent Kansas City Lawyer, Is Donor.

A bequest of a trust fund of \$250,000, the income from which is to be used to aid needy students in obtaining an education at the University of Missouri, is included in the will of the late James Warren Whiffen of Kansas City and Greenwood, Mo., who died September 17, it was announced at the university on Sept. 27.

Whiffen, a pioneer lawyer and real estate man of Kansas City, died a little more than a week ago at the age of 83 at his country home near Greenwood. Most of the estate, which is estimated at from \$300,000 to \$350,000, is in Kansas City real estate, and the bulk of it is to go to the university trust fund. Gilmer Merriwether, a Kansas City lawyer, and Miss Janet Wandewater of Greenwood are named as executors of the estate.

Whiffen was a prominent lawyer in Kansas City from 1885 to 1900. About twenty-five years ago he retired to a country home he had built near Greenwood, and where he remained until his death. He had planned the university trust fund for some time, it is said, and as a part of the plan three years ago he erected a large factory on land which he owned in Kansas City.

Brown failed on the kick and just a few minutes later Mehrle intercepted Glenn's long pass, carried it to the West Virginia two-yard line, racing through the entire West Virginia team and then Rosenheim carried it over. Brown's kick was good, making the score 13-0.

The field was heavy. A hard snow-storm preceded the game.

Tigers Enter New Conference.

The University of Missouri cooperating with the Universities of Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, and Kansas State Agricultural College and the Iowa State Agricultural College, announced on September 23 at the end of the present academic year next June they would withdraw from the Missouri Valley Conference. coming Committee, Mt. Vernon, placed seventh in Guernseys.

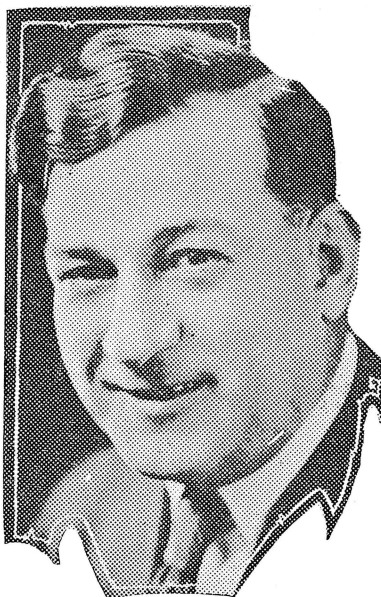

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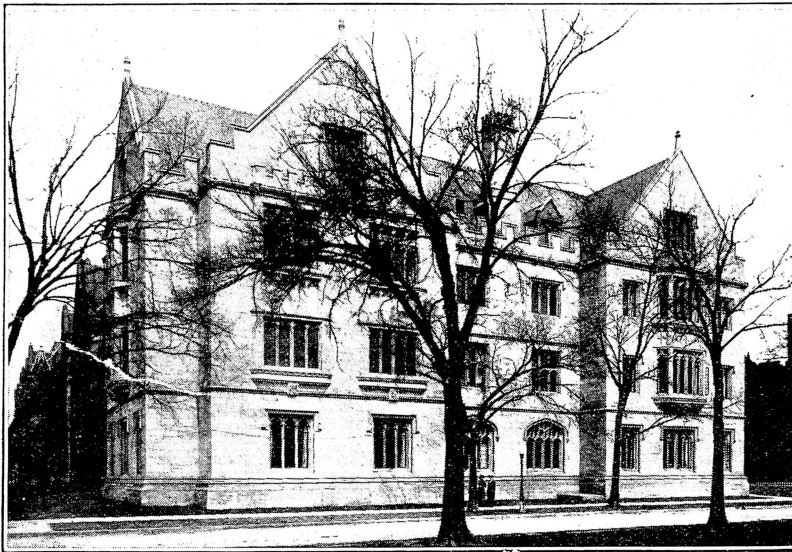

Dr. Walter E. Dandy, Arts & Medicine '07, Phi Beta Kappa, Sigma Xi, QEBH, graduate of the Sedalia (Mo.) High School, M.D. '10, A.M. '11, Johns Hopkins University, now an instructor in the medical department of Johns Hopkins, Baltimore, was one of the principal speakers at the international medical assembly, held in Kansas City during the latter part of October. The following from the Kansas City Star will convey to you the record made by Dr. Dandy in his field:

"The world's leading authority on brain surgery is a "Missouri boy," born forty-two years ago at Sedalia, Mo. Dr. Walter E. Dandy, now instructor in the medical department of the Johns Hopkins university, Baltimore, has made many revolutionary contributions to the science of brain surgery, among them ventriculography, or the injection of air into the brain cavities and the surgical cure for tic douloureux, or facial neuralgia, by division of a nerve at the base of the brain behind the ear.

"It was only seventeen years ago that Dr. Dandy received his degree of medicine at the Johns Hopkins university, having first been graduated from the University of Missouri. Among his classmates were Dr. Thomas G. Orr, Dr. Ralph H. Major and Dr. H. F. Vanorden, all now widely known Kansas City physicians. It was these friends who today expressed the opinion of the medical world, in placing Dr. Dandy at the top rank of brain surgeons.

"Dr. Dandy, scheduled for an address at tonight's meeting of the international medical assembly, was transferred at his own request to the morning program, which he addressed on "The Treatment of Tic Douloureux," illustrating his lecture with lantern slides of several stages of the brain operation. In the last three years, Dr. Dandy has performed more than fifty of these extremely delicate operations, opening the skull behind the ear and going into the base of the brain to cut the nerve root. There has been no mortality in these cases and each cure has been permanent. Dr. Dandy characterized tic douloureux as the most painful disease known. Its origin is unknown and it frequently attacks the most healthy appearing persons, he said. An earlier treatment, of injection of alcohol relieved the terrible pain, but had to be continued through-



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out the patient's lifetime, Dr. Dandy said. The operation affords permanent relief.

"Dr. Dandy is credited by his colleagues, with the "invention" of ventriculography, which has been of immeasurable value in permitting the visualization of the brain cavities for determining the causes of brain diseases. This visualization is brought about by the injection of air in the brain cavities so that tumors are distorted and may readily be seen. Ventriculography now is used generally in diagnosis of brain diseases."
