## Alumni Tour Planned For Tiger-Army Game

Ol' Mizzou's alumni will invade West Point by air this fall.

A package deal for grid fans wishing to accompany the Tigers to the Army football game at West Point on Oct. 2 has been scheduled by the Alumni Association.

Don Faurot, assistant director of alumni activities, has arranged jet flights on regular scheduled air lines from St. Louis and Kansas City to converge on the Americana Hotel in New York on Friday afternoon (Oct. 1). Chartered buses will transport fans up the Hudson River to West Point in time for a brunch before the Saturday afternoon game. Return flights to Missouri are scheduled to begin at noon Sunday.

Arrangements to get reservations for Broadway shows on Friday and Saturday nights will be made.

The cost — with meals and Broadway shows excluded — will be \$180 from St. Louis and \$200 from Kansas City.

Interested fans should make reservations and a deposit (\$50) as soon as possible with the Alumni office at 314 Jesse Hall. To those inquiring, Faurot will send lists to check for show preferences so reservations can be made well in advance.

Jean J. Madden, director of alumni activities for the Columbia campus since 1968 and assistant director for 13 prior years, left the University June 1 to become vice president-communications for the MFA Insurance Companies, headquartered in Columbia.

His new position encompasses public relations, advertising, publications and all other external and internal communications for the companies.

Widely known and respected among alumni as well as in the University community, Madden promised to maintain the same concerned interest and support for his alma mater as a volunteer as he had
