

Campus has latch string out for alumni

Members of the classes of 1939 and 1940 who return for the Homecoming weekend on October 29-30 will find plenty of activities to occupy their time. On their own agenda is a brunch Saturday morning at the Daniel Boone Hotel. They will have a special reviewing stand for the parade as well as a special section at Saturday's 1:30 p.m. game between Nebraska's Cornhuskers and Missouri's Tigers. Special buses will take the visitors to Memorial Stadium, and after the game the reunioners will gather again at the hotel.

A new addition to Homecoming festivities is a jazz concert at 7:30 p. m. October 30 in Jesse Auditorium which features the Errol Garner Trio. Garner, a jazz and concert pianist and composer, is known for his composition, "Misty." Tickets are \$2.00.

Since the Homecoming theme is "'Corny' County Fair," student house decorations and floats are being designed with the "midway" of a county fair in mind.

In addition to the football game, the class reunions and the concert, other events will be the traditional pep rally and reunions of various campus schools and organizations. A special Homecoming coffee will be held from 9 a. m. to 11 a. m. Saturday at the Student Union by such honoraries as Omicron Delta Kappa, Mortar Board, QEBH, and Mystical Seven.

An all-alumni coffee hour will be held in the Alumni-Faculty Lounge, Student Union, 9:30-11:30 a.m. Many similar events are scheduled—B & P A, Agriculture, Journalism; nursing alumni will meet with Mrs. Elinor Gaunt at her home. "M" Women will have a coffee hour at the Women's Gym. The School of Home Economics will have Stanley Hall open for visitors. Friends of the Library coffee, Room 109, University Library; Law Open House, Tate Hall; "M" Men's Alumni luncheon and meeting, Room 201, Student Union; Miller House coffee, Defoe Hall.

Homecoming events start on the evening of October 29 with the rally and entertainment—to be called "Country Cornastrophe"—in Brewer Field House.

The Homecoming Queen and her attendants will view the game from a special platform. The half-time show will be given by the Nebraska Band and Marching Mizzou. A dance, sponsored by the Men's Residence Halls Association and open to all attending Homecoming, will begin at 9 p. m. Saturday in Rothwell Gymnasium, with music by Bob Kuban's Band from St. Louis.

The Queen and her entourage will make a trip to Kansas City, St. Louis and Jefferson City on October 27 and 28.


She started winning early

When Marching Mizzou performs for Memorial Stadium crowds this football season, one of the attractions it will present is Patty Gramm, featured baton twirler. She has already won a wide following among Tiger fans through her performances last year when she was a freshman in the University's College of Education.

Patricia Rose Gramm, whose parents live in Columbia, has been winning twirling competitions since she was a five-year-old in Pierre, South Dakota. Last May she was chosen as one of the "Top Ten Twirlers" for the 1965 "500" Festival Parade and the 500-Mile Memorial Day Auto Race in Indianapolis, Ind. Each of the ten twirlers led a division in the Parade, Miss Gramm heading the division titled "Famous Marching Music and Bands."

Last winter Pat performed in the St. Paul (Minn.) Winter Carnival and in the Parade of Pirates at Tampa, Fla. Many in the St. Louis area will remember her twirling when the University Band scholarship concert was presented in Kiel Auditorium April 24.

Before moving to Columbia five years ago, Pat had won juvenile and junior honors in National Baton Twirling Association events in three states. She was a majorette in the Hickman High School band of Columbia for three years. In 1964 she was Missouri senior state girl's champion at Monett. Pat plays the piano, accordion, and bassoon. She is a member of Sigma Alpha Iota, professional music honorary for women.
