

The Bach Aria Group

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THE BACH ARIA GROUP

The Bach Aria Group has the distinction of being one of the very few musical ensembles in the world--and certainly the most venerated--to concentrate exclusively on the performance and study of the music of Johann Sebastian Bach. From the time of its founding in 1946 until 1980, the Bach Aria Group was sponsored and directed by musicologist and philanthropist William Scheide. Motivated by an encyclopedic knowledge of Bach's music and an intense commitment to its universality and relevance, he assembled nine vocalists and instrumentalists and charged them with bringing to twentieth-century listeners a body of Bach's compositions that was relatively unknown and infrequently performed: the chamber music for vocal soloists found in his cantatas, oratorios, and Masses.

In the ensuing years, the Bach Aria Group has enjoyed great success in fulfilling its mission. By touring, broadcasting, and recording, the ensemble has amassed impressive credentials. Because of the superb musicianship of its members, both as soloists and as ensemble players, and because of its specialized repertory, it has been a major force in the constantly growing appreciation of Bach's music throughout the world.

When Scheide retired in 1980, the group was reorganized under the musical direction of flutist Samuel Baron, and a new performance policy was adopted. Recital programs have now been broadened to include works from the master's instrumental literature, both chamber music and solo pieces, along with cantatas in complete form and selected arias. In addition, its members serve as the faculty of the Bach Aria Festival and Institute, held each summer at the State University of New York at Stony Brook. A special contribution of the Bach Aria Group to contemporary musical culture is a series of master classes and "mini-festivals" conducted at music centers around the country. Tonight's concert, with the participation of students from the University of Missouri-Columbia, is the climax of such a visit to UMC's Department of Music.

MEMBERS OF THE BACH ARIA GROUP

Flutist SAMUEL BARON, a member of the Bach Aria Group since 1965 and its music director since 1980, is active as a solo recitalist, a chamber player, and a recording artist. He was a charter member of the New York Woodwind Quintet and is the founder and director of the Bach Aria Festival and Institute at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, where he has been professor of music since 1972. He is also a teacher of flute at Juilliard and the principal flutist and assistant conductor of the Musica Aeterna series at New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art. His recordings include Bach's complete flute sonatas, his own transcription of The Art of Fugue, and contemporary pieces written for him.

Presently a member of the faculties of Juilliard, Yale, the State University of New York, and Queens College, RONALD ROSEMAN has been co-principal oboist of the New York Philharmonic as well as soloist with Musica Sacra. He is also known for his work with the New York Pro Musica between 1957 and 1971 and the New York Woodwind Quintet since 1961. He has released over thirty recordings of solo and chamber literature. A member of the Bach Aria Group since 1981, Roseman is also an active composer whose works have recently enjoyed performances in New York City.

Cellist TIMOTHY EDDY has earned distinction as a concert soloist, chamber musician, and recording artist. The winner of awards at the Gaspar Cassado International Violoncello Competition (Italy), the New York Violoncello Society Competition, the Dealey Contest in Dallas, and the Denver Symphony Contest, he performs regularly with the Galimir Quartet and has toured with "Music from Marlboro" throughout America. He teaches at the State University of New York at Stony Brook and at the Mannes College of Music. He has been a member of the Bach Aria Group since 1981.

Keyboard artist, composer, and conductor YEHUDI WYNER is Dean of Music at the State University of New York at Purchase. In addition, he performs, teaches, and coaches vocal and chamber music at Tanglewood. Formerly on the faculty of Yale University, he has served as music director of the New Haven Opera Theater and as composer-in-residence at the Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival. The recording of his <u>Intermedio</u>, a lyric ballet for soprano and strings, received a Prix de Rome and two Guggenheim Fellowships. He has been keyboardist with the Bach Aria Group since 1970.

Winner of the Michael's Award of Young Concert Artists in 1978, violinist DANIEL PHILLIPS has toured extensively as a recitalist and has been hailed for his guest appearances with orchestras throughout the United States. A distinguished chamber artist as well, he formed with Gidon Kremer, Kim Kashkashian, and Yo-Yo Ma a much praised string quartet. He has also appeared with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center and at music festivals in Santa Fe, Charleston (Spoleto), Austria, and Italy. He records with TASHI and "Music from Marlboro." This is his second season as a member of the Bach Aria Group.

Tenor DAVID BRITTON made his New York debut with Musica Sacra and his New York operatic debut with the Metropolitan's Mini-Met production of Thomson's <u>Four Saints in Three Acts</u> in 1973. Since then he has performed with prestigious oratorio societies, orchestras, and opera companies--from San Francisco to Israel, from St. Louis to Lyon, France. His most recent recordings include Pergolesi's <u>Music Master</u> with the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, conducted by <u>Gerard Schwarz</u>, and Bach's <u>St. Matthew Passion</u>, conducted by Raymond Leppard. This is his <u>third season</u> with the Bach Aria Group.

A winner of the Metropolitan Opera Auditions, soprano BARBARA PEAR-SON is a frequent performer in opera and oratorio and as the guest of major symphony orchestras. She has appeared for several seasons with the Cologne Opera in roles by Wagner and Strauss and has been a frequent soloist with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. Under the baton of Sir Georg Solti, she has sung works by Wagner, Mahler, and Schoenberg; under the direction of Margaret Hillis, she has sung oratorio roles by Mendelssohn, Brahms, and Bruckner.

In recital, oratorio, or opera, bass THOMAS PAUL has earned the enviable reputation as a consummate singer. His enormous repertory and impeccable musicianship have made him the choice of such eminent conductors as Boulez, Dorati, Leinsdorf, Mehta, Ormandy, Ozawa, Shaw, Solti, and Steinberg. His versatility is also evident in his range of roles in the opera house and on recordings. Among his recent recordings are masterworks by Bach and Handel, Berlioz, and Varèse and Carter. He is a member of the faculty of the Eastman School of Music.

Mezzo-soprano JAN DE GAETANI, renowned throughout the world for her particular interpretive gifts, is considered among the finest singers of Lieder our country has produced. Her song recitals are met repeatedly with enthusiasm and glowing notices. Many of her performances, such as her recording of songs of Charles Ives, are considered definitive. She has been a champion of contemporary composers, moreover, and many important compositions have been written for her and recorded by her. Widely known as a remarkable teacher, she is a member of the faculty of the Eastman School of Music. She is a frequent guest of the Bach Aria Group.

Joining members of the Bach Aria Group for toright's performance is flutist STEVEN GEIBEL, Assistant Professor of flute and chamber music at the University of Missouri-Columbia. He is a charter member of the Missouri Arts Quintet and principal flutist of the University Chamber Orchestra. Formerly a member of the faculty of Stephens College, he holds degrees from the University of Illinois and the University of Missouri-Columbia and is currently completing his doctorate at Florida State University, where he is a student of Charles Delaney. He has appeared in master classes with Marcel Moyse, Michel DeBost, and Robert Willoughby. He is active in central Missouri as a clinician and chamber music coach.

JOHANN SEBASTIAN BACH

Johann Sebastian Bach has become one of those cultural icons so universally adulated and so automatically revered that many of us have accepted his legacy and the received opinion concerning it without much thought or effort -- the "Ah! Bach!" school of music appreciation. More is the pity! The law of human nature that declares that one receives from an experience in proportion to what one expends in the process applies emphatically to listening to his music. It can be tuneful. It can be elegant, playful, ominous, or majestic. It often exudes a compelling physical energy. But, at the same time, it is often profoundly abstract. It is often rhetorical (in the best sense of that word) and is frequently fortified by symbolism. It can be overtly fastidious or even It is in many instances deceptively complex and proudly intellectual. Altogether it represents some of the most ingenious musical accomplishments of man. The result of this informed consensus is, of course, that listening (and re-listening) to his creations is one of the richest musical experiences available to man. It should be approached in the spirit of a high--and almost limitless--adventure and should not be overburdened with gratuitous reverence or vapid hero worship.

Bach began his career with a flourish. Soon after his apprenticeship, he began to move through a series of increasingly responsible positions. His reputation as a remarkable virtuoso on the organ spread quickly. In time he enjoyed the patronage and friendship of a music-loving prince. At the age of thirty-eight, when he was appointed Cantor of the Thomaskirche in Leipzig by the default of preferred candidates, his career ostensibly entered a less gratifying phase. There he labored until his death, and there, as the scholar Karl Geiringer has observed, it was his tragic fate not to be appreciated. In spite of mediocre performers, a lack of public acclaim, annoying non-musical duties, and changing tastes in music, Bach remained true to himself, not to his times, and produced a corpus of monumental works in which he single-handedly transcended the practices of the past several centuries. A man tempered by the religious zeal of the seventeenth century, his complicated creations were, in fact, inaccessible to the children of rationalism. The majority of his contemporaries found his music over-wrought and old-fashioned. His passing was not marked with much demonstration of loss. It remained for later generations to realize that he had "provided the crowning glory to the art of a vanishing era." And while it is certainly true that his polyphonic art identified him as a conservative, his mastery of harmony was of the most progressive kind and foretold the developments of the next two centuries.

Tonight's selections--a sacred cantata, a concerto grosso, and excerpts from other sacred works--actually only provide a hint of the scope of Bach's imagination. The cantata, Wachet auf, was written in 1731 for the twenty-seventh Sunday after Trinity and, according to custom, was intended by the composer to amplify the gospel lesson of the day, the parable of the ten wise and foolish virgins. Bach chose Philipp Nicolai's incomparable hymn paraphrasing this text as the musical scaffolding for the occasion. From a theological and ultimately musical point of view, the result is a marvelous example of the strategy of explaining "unknowable" matters of faith by means of perfectly understandable aspects of life on earth. In this case the metaphor for the union of Christ and the Church, of the Heavenly Father and the human soul, is described in terms of the physical union of man and woman, the bridegroom and his bride. The "consummation" of the plot and the music comes in the final iovous chorale, cast in familiar style, in which the congregation would join in the singing of the well-known hymn tune. The remaining vocal pieces are taken from similar works and provide further evidence of how Bach combined all the elements of his product-text, vocal line, instrumental obbligato, bass line, harmony, and rhythmic detail--into a unified expression of faith. Purely musical considerations are heightened, not sacrificed in the process.

Concerto No. 4 in G Major, with its concertino of two flutes and violin, is one of the famous set of six sent in 1721 to the Margrave of Brandenburg. Its movements can be characterized as an optimistic opener in a pastoral mode, a serious dialogue in deliberate tempo, and a good-natured fugal finale. The Baroque concerto was not so much a vehicle for the technical display of soloists as it was a study of the interplay among various sound sources. In characteristic fashion Bach takes the conventions to new heights and depths. Only when one engages the ear, the heart, and the mind is he fully entitled to respond: "Ah! Bach!"



COMING ATTRACTIONS



As another season comes to a close, the staff of the University of Missouri-Columbia Concert Series is happy to acknowledge publicly the assistance and support of individuals and organizations in our community. Unfortunately the arts can flourish only with the generosity and enthusiasm of local patrons. We are, of course, grateful to the concert-going public in general; the following, however, are worthy of our special gratitude.

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CONCERT PREVIEWS

This is the third season that the UMC Concert Series is able to offer its patrons the added feature of informal lectures concerning the repertory of its guest artists. The general success and usefulness of this series of informal talks by audience educator Michael Budds can be inferred from last year's attendance: approximately 1,800 concert-goers attended the fifteen lectures given. This year it is necessary to reduce somewhat the number of such talks, and interested members of the audience should note well the following details.

- --Concert Previews are held at 7:00 p.m. in the Recital Hall of the Fine Arts Building immediately preceding specified concerts. Ample time for a leisurely walk to Jesse Auditorium is provided following each talk.
- --Concert Previews will be provided for each of the five events in the Jesse Series, including a presentation with dancers for the January 22 appearance of the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater.
- --A special "Opera Preview" to Verdi's <u>Rigoletto</u> featuring UMC voice students will be held at 8:00 p.m. on March 8 (Friday), two days before the New York City Opera National Company production. Because the opera will be sung in its original Italian version, this lecture may be especially informative to those unfamiliar with the work.
- --Concert Previews for the Chamber Series will be given only for the two chamber orchestras: the Northern Sinfonia of England on October 17 and the baroque ensemble Ars Musica on February 13.
- --A Concert Preview will also be given for the third appearance this season of the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra, a special event to be held on March 14. Because of the 7:30 p.m. downbeat for this concert, the lecture will commence at 6:30 p.m. It is hoped that a specially-prepared box supper can be made available for purchase as a convenience to interested concert-goers. More information will be announced.

Concert Previews are designed to entertain as well as to illuminate with comments on the style and historical context of the works to be heard that evening. An attempt is made to call attention to those aspects of the music that will heighten both the appreciation and enjoyment of the "live" performance. The lectures are free. Bring a friend. All are welcome!



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AUDIENCE REMINDERS

LATE ARRIVALS

After a performance has begun, as a courtesy to the artists and to other members of the audience, patrons arriving late will be seated <u>only</u> at the first convenient pause in the program. Please cooperate with ushers attempting to execute this policy.

DISTRACTIONS

The auditorium's acoustics enhance the sounds of coughing and other distracting noises; cough drops are available at the Box Office.

CAMERAS AND RECORDING EQUIPMENT

To fulfill contractual obligations with the artists and to insure audience enjoyment, cameras and tape recorders are not permitted in the hall. This equipment may be checked at the Box Office.

PARKING

Vehicles must not be parked in the loading zone of Jesse Auditorium. Any unattended vehicles will be towed away.

EMERGENCIES

Physicians on call should inform the Box Office of their seat locations in case of emergencies. Beepers will be monitored in the Box Office.

AMENITIES

Restrooms are located on each floor of Jesse Hall, including the basement directly beneath the auditorium lobby. Drinking fountains are located on either side of the main lobby. Smoking and the consumption of food and beverages are permitted in the outer lobby only.
