

1992 MMTA CONVENTION ARTIST NELITA TRUE



Nelita True, Professor and Chairman of the Piano Department at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, NY, successfully combines the careers of concert artist and teacher. She has played and directed master classes in forty-seven states, as well as in Europe and Asia. She has presented over 600 recitals and master classes in the United States and over 12 countries abroad. She is the first American to be invited to teach at a Soviet Union Conservatory, and has performed and conducted master classes there. Many of her students have won top prizes, including several first prizes at national and international competitions.

Nelita True completed a bachelor and master's degree at the University of Michigan, studying with Helen Titus, and did three years of advanced study at Julliard School of Music with Sascha Gorodnitzki. She continued studies as a Fulbright Scholar in Paris, where she worked with Nadia Boulanger, and earned a doctorate in piano performance at Peabody Conservatory as a student of Leon Fleisher.

Dr. True has won the hearts and respect of piano teachers in this country and abroad by her sincerity combined with outstanding professionalism and expertise. She relates effectively with students by challenging them to reach higher goals and inspires them with motivation that includes a "you-can-do-it" approach. MMTA is fortunate to have Dr. True as our 1992 Convention Artist.

LeAnn House, West Central Division President, is an associate professor of music at the College of St. Scholastica in Duluth, where she teaches piano, harpsichord, and music theory. She holds a Bachelor of Music degree in applied piano from Kansas State University; a Master of Music degree in applied piano and the Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy degrees in musicology from the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. As a Rotary Foundation Fellow she studied for a year in Vienna, Austria, at the Hochschule fur Musik. She has been very active in MTNA

activities, and is currently the President of the West Central Division of that



organization. She is the founder and past president of the local Arrowhead MTA, and the faculty advisor for the first student chapter in Minnesota. She is certified as a Master Teacher by MTNA. She is also a member of the American Musicological Society.

DONALD BEATTIE Piano Pedagogy, G. Henle Publications

Donald Beattie is piano chairman and director of undergraduate and graduate degree programs in piano pedagogy of the School of Music at Southern Illinois University at Carbondale. Mr. Beattie is also founder and director of the Beethoven Society for Pianists.

His study and love of teaching began at the University of Colorado at Boulder where he received bachelor and master of music degrees in piano pedagogy. He presently nears completion of his Ph.D. in educational psychology.

As the workshop clinician for G. Henle USA, Donald Beattie presents three hour piano music lecture/recitals that survey G. Henle Urtext editions of beginning and intermediate piano repertoire. Since 1988, he has presented more than 50 programs throughout the United States and Canada.

During his 15 years of college piano class teaching, Donald wrote many pieces for piano. In 1992, his first publications were released with Edition HAS Music Publishing Co. In the series entitled "Road to the Masters," the first volume is currently available and sequential volumes are being prepared.

ANNETTE BURKHART Elementary/Junior High Piano Master Class

Annette Burkhart, a native of Kentucky, holds performance degrees from Wheaton College Conservatory and the University of Illinois at Urbana. She has held teaching positions at universities in North Carolina and Pennsylvania and is presently adjunct piano faculty at Washington University in St. Louis. Her recitals have included solo and accompanying appearances in the Northeast, Southeast, and Midwest. She has appeared in recital at Carnegie Recital Hall and in master classes with Elly Ameling and Dalton Baldwin.

In the St. Louis area, she has appeared on the "Live from the Garden" chamber music series. She is heard on KFUO Classic 99 broadcasts of music from Christ Church Cathedral.

MARY W. DELWOOD Computer Session

Mary W. Delwood graduated with a Bachelor of Music degree in music education from University of Houston where she studied piano with Helen Haupt. She received her Master of Music degree from University of Missouri-Columbia in music theory in 1983. Ms. Delwood has taught privately in the areas of piano, composition, and music theory and is currently involved in composing, arranging, church music, and musical desktop publishing under the company name of LiederScribe. She is accomplished in the use of MIDI and music software.

Ms. Delwood has recently had several duo ragtime transcriptions published by CPP Belwin. She composed music for the University of Missouri Newart art show in 1989, presented a lecture/recital at the National Piano Teachers' Institute at SMU in 1991, and has done numerous lectures to computer user groups on the use of computers in music.

JUDY KNUDSON Computer Session

Judy Knudson holds a B.S. Degree in Music Education from the University of Missouri, and a B.A. Degree in Psychology from Stephens College Columbia, Missouri. In addition to teaching in her private piano studio, she operates Carnival of Music, a successful pre-school music readiness program, and a keyboard prep program which is currently expanding into a 6 keyboard piano lab. She and partner Mary Delwood have operated LiederScribe, a music desktop publishing company, since 1989. In 1991 they presented a lecture/recital at the National Piano Teacher's Institute at SMU. Their initial project, a series of two-piano ragtime pieces arranged by Canadian recording artist John Arpin, was recently published by CPP Belwin. In addition to doing the MMTA Convention booklet for the past two years, they are currently desktop publishing a 9 volume piano method plus supplemental materials for the Mayron Cole Music Conservatory in Houston, Texas.

BETTY BANG MATHER Instrumental Clinician, Woodwind Adjudicator

Betty Bang Mather is professor of flute at the University of Iowa, head of the woodwind area, and a member of the Iowa Woodwind Quintet. The first woman to be President of the National Flute Association, she has also served as Vice President, Chairman of the Board, twice as a Director, and for a number of years as an editorial advisor for their journal, *The Flutist Quarterly*. Betty has written numerous articles on flute pedagogy, literature and performance practices, edited early flute music, and recorded several contemporary pieces. Her books include *Interpretation of French Music from 1675 to 1775* and *Dance Rhythms of the French Baroque*. Recently she has been studying how to apply a variety of mind-body integration techniques to flute playing and teaching.

ROGER MATHER *Instrumental Clinician*

Roger Mather is an Adjunct Professor in the School of Music at the University of Iowa, where he shares the teaching of flute majors with his wife, Betty Bang Mather. He has given many local and national clinics, workshops, and lecture-demonstrations in flute playing, including conventions of the National Flute Association in St. Louis, New Orleans, and Washington, D.C. He has written numerous articles on flutes and flute playing and has published a three-volume series of books, *The Art of Playing the Flute*. He is recognized internationally as an authority on tone production on the flute and has often lectured on overcoming stage fright and achieving peak performance.

JOHN OBETZ Organ Session

John Obetz is one of the most widely heard organists in the United States. He has been Auditorium Organist since 1967 at the world headquarters of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, Independence, Missouri, where many thousands of listeners hear his weekly half-hour recital, The Auditorium Organ, broadcast via satellite all across the country.

Dr. Obetz received his bachelor's and master's degrees from Northwestern University and earned a doctorate in sacred music at Union Theological Seminary, where he studied with Vernon deTar. His further study has included work with Marie-Claire Alain and participation in the International Academy for Organists in Haarlem, The Netherlands.

He has concertized throughout the United States as well as in England and on the European Continent, including appearances at Westminster Abbey in London and the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C.

He was recently honored by Sigma Alpha Iota international music fraternity as *National Arts Associate* for "being among the most outstanding gentleman musicians in the United States."

Dr. Obetz has also distinguished himself as a teacher and serves on the faculty of the Conservatory of Music, University of Missouri at Kansas City.

JULIE RIVERS Piano Session, Adjudicator and Piano Clinician

A native Texan, Julie Rivers made her debut as piano soloist with the Dallas Symphony Orchestra under a Rockefeller Foundation grant while still an undergraduate at the University of North Texas.

At the University of North Texas she won every award the music school offered and graduated with high honors.

She has held teaching positions at the University of North Texas, the National Music Camp at Interlochen, Michigan, and the Inspiration Point Fine Arts Colony. She has established independent studios in Texas and Kansas.

Since 1980, Julie Rivers has performed on concerts throughout Mid-America as a member of the roster of the Mid-America Arts Alliance Regional Touring Program, the Texas Touring Program, and the Kansas Musical Artists Touring Program.

Julie Rivers is in demand as a clinician and master teacher for schools and groups throughout Mid-America. Her young peoples' concerts for school children feature both harpsichord and piano performances.

NANCY WEATHERLY-SCOTT Voice Recital

Nancy Weatherly-Scott was the 1992 National MTNA Voice Winner. She has served as an apprentice at Inspiration Point Fine Arts Colony (1991), and the Des Moines Metropolitan Opera Company (1992). In May of 1992 she won the Naptzer Competition. She is presently working on a Master's degree in vocal performance at the University of Missouri, Kansas City, studying with Inci Baskar. Her former teacher at the UMKC Conservatory was Martha Longmire.

LOGAN SKELTON Music Theory/Composition - Theory Session on Bela Bartók

Logan Skelton is a *summa cum laude* graduate of Loyola University, where he was a student of John Murphy and was the first recipient of the Naomi Marie Adams Memorial Music Scholarship. Named winner of the Madewood Foundation Young Artist Grant in New Orleans, he went on to receive his master's degree from the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York where he studied with Rebecca Penneys and was awarded the prestigious Eastman School of Music Performer's Certificate. He completed his doctorate at the Manhattan School of Music as a student of Artur Balsam. He is currently a member of the piano faculty at Southwest Missouri State University in Springfield, Missouri.

Dr. Skelton combines his career as a pianist with a continuing and active interest in composition. His piano work, "Civil War Variations," has received performances in such diverse cities as Tampa, New Orleans, Ann Arbor, and Tblisi, U.S.S.R. His involvement in the life of contemporary music is also reflected in his long-standing commitment to the music of Bela Bartok.

ROBERT SPILLMAN *Piano Clinician, Piano Adjudicator*

Professor Robert Spillman is Chair of the piano faculty at the University of Colorado at Boulder. He studied at the Eastman School of Music, receiving a BM degree and Performer's Certificate in piano and a MA degree in music theory.

In 1964 he received a Fulbright Scholarship and moved with his family to Stüttgart, where he studied with Arno Erfurth, Hermann Reutter, Hubert Giesen, and Henk Badings.

Shortly thereafter, he moved to West Berlin where he spent the next seven years. He returned to the United States and joined the faculty at Eastman in 1973, where he coached opera and taught accompanying and vocal literature.

He has several compositions published through Edition Musicus. His textbook, <u>The Art of Accompanying</u>, was published by Schirmer Books in 1985 and his textbook, <u>Sightreading at the Keyboard</u>, was published in 1990. He is also busy as a clinician and teacher, working with both pianists and singers.

THE ST. LOUIS BRASS ENSEMBLE MMTA Commissioned Composition

The St. Louis Brass Ensemble, established in 1984, is comprised of five of St. Louis' finest instrumentalists, devoted to performing the best in brass music of the last five centuries. Individual members of the St. Louis Brass Ensemble have appeared with such prestigious musical institutions as the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra, the Muny, the Fox Theatre, and the Metropolitan Orchestra. The ensemble has been featured on the Chataqua (Illinois) Concert Series, and the Central Presbyterian Church Concert Series. Guest artist appearances by the ensemble include concerts in conjunction with the Great Mississippi Choir Festival, the Mighty Mississippi Concert Band of St. Louis, and the Washington University Wind Ensemble. MMTA COMMISSIONED COMPOSITION Blues for LA by Kim Portnoy

Blues for LA, composed for brass quintet, is a personal response to the tragedy of the Los Angeles riots. The work is in three parts, with the first and last sections functioning as prelude and postlude to the lengthier middle movement. Though the work is not programmatic, the titles, "Cries," "Rap," and "Blues" provide clues to the character of each section and the nature of the musical materials employed. The music is heavily influenced by Jazz and other African-American forms: blues, funk, etc. This work is offered as a "prayer" for greater understanding and tolerance between people of different races, creeds, and religions.

Kim Portnoy is a composer, arranger, jazz pianist and teacher. He holds an AB and an MA in Music from Washington University in St. Louis. Mr. Portnoy's interest in composition and performing began in his early teens when he first discovered jazz and the music of George Gershwin. Studies with jazz pianist Herb Drury and encouragement from his high school teachers solidified Kim's interest in pursuing a career in music.

While attending Washington University Mr. Portnoy studied composition with Roland Jordan, John Perkins and Robert Wykes, and began his professional career as a musician. As a jazz pianist he has performed in clubs and concert halls and has appeared with Clark Terry, Louis Bellson and Peter Leitch among others.

His compositions and arrangements have been performed by such diverse groups as the St. Louis Symphony, the Midland (Michigan) Symphony, the Metropolitan Orchestra at Webster University, the St. Louis Children's Choirs, the Saint Louis Chamber Chorus, the Legend Singers, the University of Illinois at Evansville Jazz Band, the Meramec Jazz Band and the St. Louis Jazz Orchestra. He is the recipient of two Fiscal Year Creative Artist Project Awards from the Missouri Arts Council and has received commissions from The McDonnell Planetarium, Trinity Episcopal Church and Temple Emanuel. Mr. Portnoy is the composer of the theme for the award winning television show "St. Louis Skyline" and is presently the arranger and pianist for Tapsichore, a rhythm tap dance company.

Kim Portnoy is currently an assistant professor of music at Webster University, St. Louis where he teaches jazz arranging, improvisation and composition.
