

■ A Note from Concert Series Audience Educator Michael Budds

When I joined the staff of the University Concert Series almost seven years ago, I moved to Columbia with my dog, my books, and my records—and a certain sober set of expectations concerning this part of my new job.



Because of the generosity of my parents, I had attended many fine performances. And then, at a certain point, concert-going had become an important part of my musical education—as well as a constant source of pleasure for me.

I don't recall that I held particularly high expectations for the performances that I might experience in Columbia. After all, I had sampled the concert life of Los Angeles, New York, and London and had spent a number of years in lowa City—the home of a prestigious school of music and a new performing arts center that offered many more events of the highest quality than I could attend (or afford) each season!

I had also supposed that the proximity of St. Louis and Kansas City would affect the concert life of Columbia adversely. I do remember thinking that I would be burning up Interstate 70 in an effort to attend exceptional performances, the kind that would never make it to a lesser cultural oasis such as Columbia.

Was I ever in for a big surprise! For me, the Concert Series of the University of Missouri has proved to be a gold mine of musical experiences, a treasury of the performing arts. To think that I have "travelled" only a couple of blocks from my home to hear recitals by Montserrat Caballé and Marilyn Horne, the Modern Jazz Quartet, Philip Glass, Itzhak Perlman, Jorge Bolet, and Yo Yo Ma and to

see performances by the Houston Ballet, the New York City Opera touring company, and the dance troupes of Ailey, Nikolais, and Moses Pendleton is almost mind-boggling!

There have been times when I have been so "overstimulated" by the events I have witnessed in Jesse Auditorium-most recently the concert by Tormé and Shearing-that I have been unable to sleep!

Believe me, when I brag to my friends and associates in other parts of the country about the quality of artists and performances sponsored by the Concert Series—and I do brag about this part of my life—they are sincerely astonished. And it's not just the "Johnny Carson" headliners that arouse their admiration.

The quality of the University Concert Series is no accident. It is a product of a dedicated, hardworking staff, of benevolent support and encouragement from the Department of Music and the University Administration, of the generosity of our benefactors such as the Missouri Arts Council, the First National Bank and Trust Company of Columbia, and the Mid-America Arts Alliance, and, most importantly, of the enthusiasm of its patrons.

Indeed, this enriching and ennobling aspect of life in mid-Missouri could not exist without its audience—without you!

On behalf of the Concert Series staff, I thank you for your support in the past, especially the banner season just ending, and encourage you to continue to support this worthy enterprise in the future. You won't want to miss next season. It's going to be another great one!
