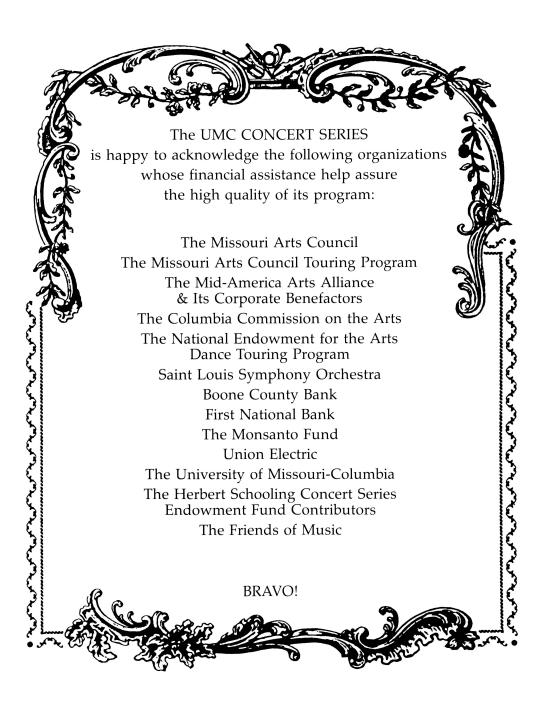

ALWIN NIKOLAIS

The creative work of Connecticut-born Alwin Nikolais spans four decades. It began auspiciously in Hartford in 1940 when, with his first modern dance teacher Truda Kaschmann and the prominent composer Ernst Krenek, he was commissioned to create a ballet. After his discharge from the army in 1946, he relocated in New York City and in 1948 was appointed director of the Henry Street Playhouse. This small theater in New York's lower east side was to serve as his headquarters and the scene of his teaching and choreographing for the subsequent twenty-two years. It was there that he conceived and realized his own form of abstract theater and evolved his own aesthetic and pedagogical theories. While at Henry Street, Nikolais formed his own company, the Playhouse Dance Company, later to be renamed the Nikolais Dance Theatre.

During the late 1950s, the artistry of Nikolais became known in the United States through the success of his company at the American Dance Festival. His international acclaim was the result of extraordinary triumphs at the Theatre de Champs Elysee in Paris during In 1978 the French National Ministry of Culture the 1968 season. invited him to form the Centre Nationale de Danse Contemporaine in Angers, France. In December, 1980, he created his ninety-ninth choreographic work for the Paris Opera. This full evening ballet was hailed as "a creative landslide" and was sold out for its entire Parisian run. At the same time, his choreography for a Gian Carlo Menotti opera was being staged at the Staatsoper in Vienna. all aspects of his work, including pieces for television and film, Nikolais is esteemed as a major revolutionary figure: extended the definition of dance and enhanced the art with a new visual impact. He is, likewise, univerally hailed as a teacher. His theories are taught in the United States, France, China, Brazil, and other countries.

He has been honored with a host of prestigious awards, including the Chevalier dans l'Ordre de la Legion d'Honneur (1984), and serves as a member of several select committees concerned with the dance and the arts in general.

The Nikolais Dance Theatre, the primary interpreter of his thetrical vision, has toured the world regularly since 1968.

Dances number 5, 6, and 7 are selected from The Mechanical Organ, Op. 147, which was premiered at the Spoleto Festival, Charleston, South Carolina, on June 4, 1980. Dances number 1, 2, 3, and 4 are selected from The Mechanical Organ, Op. 153, which was premiered by the Theatre de las Ville at Theatre de Paris in Paris, France, on June 22, 1982. The Mechanical Organ I and II were commissioned by George Soras with partial funding from the National Endowment for the Arts and the New York State Council on the Arts. The score is improvised by the David Darling Ensemble under the direction of Alwin Nikolais, who subsequently compiled and edited the tapes.

THE ITZHAK PERLMAN RECITAL

Future guests on the series include clarinetist Richard Stoltzman (January 24), the Ars Musica Baroque Ensemble (February 12), the Beaux Arts Trio (February 25), and the Bach Aria Group (March 26-28). THE UMC CONCERT SERIES AND THE DANCE

The 1984-1985 Concert Series season offers some extraordinary opportunities in terms of the dance. Three internationally-known companies will bring to Jesse Auditorium the exhilarating spectacle of the dance--its amazing athleticism, its powers of poetic expression, and its compelling display of color, design, and movement. Combined with music, the result is a feast for the senses--not only for the connoisseur, but for the dilettante and the uninitiated as well. Come one, come all!



In a matter of days, on November 12 (Monday), the NIKOLAIS DANCE THEATRE will arrive on campus for a program of four works: <u>Tensile Involvement</u>

(1953), The Mechanical Organ (1980), Liturgies (1983), and Video Game (1984). The latter has the distinction of having been commissioned by the 1984 Olympics Arts Festival and was given its premiere in California as part of the recent Olympic celebration. This dance troupe, under the guiding spirit of Alwin Nikolais, is one of the banner-carrying modern dance ensembles of our day.

January 1985 will be made memorable by two local appearances of the ALVIN AILEY AMERICAN DANCE THEATRE. The work of this company represents another of the marvelous syntheses of African and European elements in American art. As an event in the Jesse Series, the January 22th performance is nearly sold out. Tickets for the free-standing performance on January 23 are, however, plentiful. A concert preview by Michael Budds will precede the first Ailey performance. The lecture will concern the mutually influential Afro-American and European approaches to music and dance. A demonstration with student dancers is planned as part of this preview.

And, as the 1984-1985 season finale, the HOUSTON BALLET will take the stage on April 23 (Tuesday). The program is planned tentatively to be comprised of three important selections from the standard ballet repertory. After this company's lavish rendition of Tchaikovsky's Sleeping Beauty last year, this encore is to be eagerly awaited.

Thus, three distinctive styles of contemporary dance, each interpreted by a world-famous ensemble of dancers, can be experienced this season. Each company has been invited to return to UMC because of the popular successes of their earlier appearances here. Tickets may be obtained for each. Mail orders are encouraged for the performances occurring in the Winter Semester. Bargain rates for groups are also available.



Messiah. A quartet of professional guests--soprano Victoria Thompson, mezzo soprano Patricia Miller, tenor John La Pierre, and baritone Brian Steele--will be featured as soloists. Two performances are planned: Friday, December 7, and Saturday, December 8.

In addition to its importance as an opportunity to commemorate the Christmas season, the concert will have the distinction of being the opening event of the Ninth Annual Chancellor's Festival of Music. The Festival this year will focus on the music of Handel and Johann Sebastian Bach. The year 1985 is the three-hundredth anniversary of their births, and UMC musicians will be joining their counterparts throughout the world in paying homage to these great masters. Supporting the Music Department and the Concert Series in this effort are the University Development Fund Board, the Missouri Arts Council, the Mid-America Arts Alliance, and the First National Bank and Trust Company of Columbia.

Tickets (\$6.00 each) are available for both performances by mail order, at the ticket outlets, and at Jesse Box Office during scheduled hours.

AUDIENCE REMINDERS

CONCERT PREVIEWS

This is the third season that the UMC Concert Series is able to offer its patrons the added feature of informal lectures concerning the repertory of its guest artists. The general success and usefulness of this series of informal talks by audience educator Michael Budds can be inferred from last year's attendance: approximately 1,800 concert-goers attended the fifteen lectures given. This year it is necessary to reduce somewhat the number of such talks, and interested members of the audience should note well the following details.

- --Concert Previews are held at 7:00 p.m. in the Recital Hall of the Fine Arts Building immediately preceding specified concerts. Ample time for a leisurely walk to Jesse Auditorium is provided following each talk.
- --Concert Previews will be provided for each of the five events in the Jesse Series, including a presentation with dancers for the January 22 appearance of the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater.
- --A special "Opera Preview" to Verdi's <u>Rigoletto</u> featuring UMC voice students will be held at 8:00 p.m. on March 8 (Friday), two days before the New York City Opera National Company production. Because the opera will be sung in its original Italian version, this lecture may be especially informative to those unfamiliar with the work.
- --Concert Previews for the Chamber Series will be given <u>only</u> for the two chamber orchestras: the Northern Sinfonia of England <u>on October 17</u> and the baroque ensemble Ars Musica on February 13.
- --A Concert Preview will also be given for the third appearance this season of the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra, a special event to be held on March 14. Because of the 7:30 p.m. downbeat for this concert, the lecture will commence at 6:30 p.m. It is hoped that a specially-prepared box supper can be made available for purchase as a convenience to interested concert-goers. More information will be announced.

Concert Previews are designed to entertain as well as to illuminate with comments on the style and historical context of the works to be heard that evening. An attempt is made to call attention to those aspects of the music that will heighten both the appreciation and enjoyment of the "live" performance. The lectures are free. Bring a friend. All are welcome!

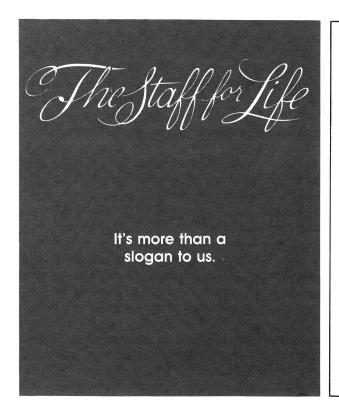

SOLD-OUT HOUSES AND UNUSED TICKETS

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AUDIENCE REMINDERS

LATE ARRIVALS

After a performance has begun, as a courtesy to the artists and to other members of the audience, patrons arriving late will be seated <u>only</u> at the first convenient pause in the program. Please cooperate with ushers attempting to execute this policy.

DISTRACTIONS

The auditorium's acoustics enhance the sounds of coughing and other distracting noises; cough drops are available at the Box Office.

CAMERAS AND RECORDING EQUIPMENT

To fulfill contractual obligations with the artists and to insure audience enjoyment, cameras and tape recorders are not permitted in the hall. This equipment may be checked at the Box Office.

PARKING

Vehicles must not be parked in the loading zone of Jesse Auditorium. Any unattended vehicles will be towed away.

EMERGENCIES

Physicians on call should inform the Box Office of their seat locations in case of emergencies. Beepers will be monitored in the Box Office.

AMENITIES

Restrooms are located on each floor of Jesse Hall, including the basement directly beneath the auditorium lobby. Drinking fountains are located on either side of the main lobby. Smoking and the consumption of food and beverages are permitted in the outer lobby only.

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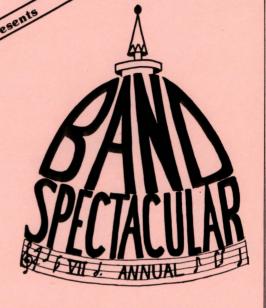
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
