"Religious Expression Through Music", the theme of this year's Chancellor's Festival of Music, provides us with a unique opportunity to understand more fully the influence which religious cultures of the East and West have had on the development of our musical heritage.

Festival concerts will focus on musical settings of the psalms by composers from the Renaissance Era to the 20th-century. Some of the best-known settings of verses from the psalms may be found in oratorios and other large-scale choral works such as Handel's Messiah, Brahms' German Requiem, and King David by Honegger, which will be featured in this year's festival. In addition to these gala concerts, special performances of other psalm compositions, and music for pipe organ, have been planned for Columbia's Missouri United Methodist Church; Christopher Wren's historic London Church of Saint Mary Aldermanbury which is part of the Winston Churchill Memorial at Westminster College in Fulton, Missouri; and the dramatic contemporary Firestone-Baars Chapel at Stephens College which was designed by Eliel and Eero Saarinen.

WILLIAM WARFIELD, the distinguished American singer, actor, and educator, has earned international recognition for his performances with leading opera companies, on the musical comedy stage, in motion picture and television productions (*Porgy and Bess, Showboat, Green Pastures*), as soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra during a State Department tour of Africa, and for a highly acclaimed recital presented at the Brussels World Fair, performances at the Casals Festival and other major international music festivals. Mr. Warfield presently serves as Head of the Voice Department at the School of Music of the University of Illinois.

ELEANORE BERQUIST, soprano, now a member of the Metropolitian Opera, has sung leading roles with the New York City Opera, the San Francisco Opera and the Opera Company of Boston. In addition she has appeared as soloist at Carnegie Hall and Lincoln Center with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Cleveland Symphony, Philadelphia Orchestra and the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra.



JEFFREY STAMM, tenor, is well known throughout the Great Lakes area and in Texas where he has appeared as soloist in oratorio and opera productions, receiving wide critical acclaim. A winner of the Southwest Region NATS Competition in 1979, Mr. Stamm has spent the past two summers with the Chautauqua Opera, and is currently a member of the Metropolitan Opera where he appeared in the 1982 revival of *Der Rosenkavalier*.

KATHRYNE FOWLER, mezzo soprano, has earned praise for her oratorio and opera performances throughout Europe. In addition she has appeared as soloist with the Denver Symphony Orchestra and with the Central City (Colorado) Opera. Miss Fowler holds an Artist Diploma from the Stuttgarter Hochschule fur Musik and the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Colorado. She is presently a Visiting Assistant Professor of Music at UMC.



LAUREN FULTON, soprano, has won numerous awards and honors in vocal competitions including the Detroit Grand Opera auditions. Last year Miss Fulton won rave reviews for her debuts at the Lake George Opera Festival, as Blonde in *The Abduction from the Seraglio* and with the Pittsburgh Opera, as Olympia in *The Tales of Hoffman*.

STEVEN COLE, tenor, made his professional debut with the Boston Symphony Orchestra in a concert version of *Eugene Onegin*. Since then he has been soloist with the Chicago Symphony and the New York Philharmonic in performances of the *Messiah*, *St. John Passion*, and *Carmina Burana*. A specialist in operatic character roles, he has received critical acclaim for performances with the opera companies of San Francisco, Cleveland, Philadelphia and the Houston Grand Opera. He has appeared on Broadway in *Porgy and Bess* and *Most Happy Fella*, and has won numerous awards including a 1981 Martha Baird Rockefeller Grant.



Now a highly acclaimed soloist with the New York City Opera, she has also received accolades for her appearances with other leading opera companies including the Lyric Opera of Chicago, the San Francisco Opera, the Opera Company of Boston, the Sante Fe Opera, the Houston Grand Opera, and the Opera Theatre of Saint Louis.

JAY WILLOUGHBY, baritone, was born and raised in Saint Louis and received his musical training at the Indiana School of Music. He has been soloist with the Boston Opera, New York City Opera, Seattle Opera, and the Opera Theatre of Saint Louis, and has appeared as soloist on numerous occasions with the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra in performances of major orchestral repertoire.



OTTO-WERNER MUELLER, presently Professor of Conducting at the Yale School of Music, was conductor/founder of the now renowned Chamber Chorus of Radio Stuttgart. From 1951-1963 he conducted the Canadian Broadcasting Company Orchestra in Montreal, Toronto and Vancouver, including the CBC production of the *Barber of Seville* which was the first to receive an Emmy in the new category of foreign productions. Mr. Mueller is well-known to Columbia music lovers as the person who helped establish the Chancellor's Music Festival and the University Choral Union. Fr. ROLAND E. MURPHY, O. Carm., has been professor of Old Testament at the Duke Divinity School since 1971, where he was just appointed to the George Washington Ivey Chair of Biblical Studies. He earned a Master's Degree in Semitic languages and in philosophy, and a doctorate in theology at the Catholic University of America. In 1958 he received a licentiate degree in Scripture from the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome. He has served as Visiting Professor at the Pitts burgh Theological Seminary, Yale University Divinity School, Princeton Theological Seminary, and the University of Notre Dame. Fr. Murphy has served as editor-in-chief, and as a member of the editorial board, of the *Catholic Biblical Quarterly*. He is also a member of the editorial boards of *Concilium, Vetus Testamentum, Interpretation, Theological Studies, Old Testament Abstracts* and the *Hermeneia* Biblical Commentary series. Fr. Murphy is an ordained priest of the Roman Catholic Church and a member of the Order of Carmelites. He has been actively engaged in ecumenical dialogue.

JEFFREY ROWTHORNE, is Bishop Goddard Associate Professor of Pastoral Theology and Worship at the Yale Divinity School. He also serves on the faculty of the Berkeley Divinity School and the Yale Institute of Sacred Music Professor Rowthorne holds the B.A. and M.A. degrees from Cambridge, the B. Lit. from Oxford, and the M. Div. from the Union Theological Seminary. He is the author of several scholarly articles, and edited "Landamus Worship Supplement" which has been published by the Yale Divinity School.
