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

Norman Dello Joio

The Italian-American birthright of Norman Dello Joio (born 1913) was an emphatically musical one. At the age of 12, when he was appointed church organist and choirmaster in New York City, he became the fourth generation of Dello Joio men to serve their community, their art and their God in such a capacity. He was groomed to take up the family business by his father, a product of the Naples Conservatory who had immigrated to America as a young man. The composer's boyhood studies were continued under the supervision of his godfather Pietro Yon, organist of St. Patrick's Cathedral. His formal training was taken at several New York City schools, including the Institute of Musical Art and the Juilliard Graduate School. At the latter institution his mentor was Bernard Wagenaar. In 1940 and 1941, as a scholarship recipient, he studied composition with Paul Hindemith at Tanglewood. During the 1941-1942 school year, while maintaining his relationship with Wagenaar, he travelled to Yale University for weekly sessions with Hindemith.

Since 1943, Norman Dello Joio has flourished as a successful free-lance composer. Not only has he been a prolific composer making important contributions to the broadest range of genres over the course of his career but his efforts have been rewarded with regular performances of his works and an impressive number of prestigious commissions and honors dating back to his years as a student. A selected listing of distinctions easily documents the critical response to his music: the Elizabeth Sprague Coolidge Award (1937), a Town Hall Composition Award (1942), two Guggenheim Fellowships (1943 and 1944), two New York Critics' Circle Awards (1948 and 1962), the Pulitzer Prize (1957), election to the National Institute of Arts and Letters (1961) and an Emmy (1965). His stature among American composers was confirmed during the celebration of the country's Bicentennial with the commissioning of at least six new major works, including a Mass, three orchestral pieces (two of which were given première performances by the Philadelphia Orchestra), and works for band and high school choruses.

Dello Joio has also left his mark on music in America as a teacher of composition and as an educational administrator. Between 1972 and 1978 he presided over the School of Applied and Fine Arts of Boston University as Dean. He held prior academic appointments at Sarah Lawrence College and the Mannes College of Music. In 1959 he conceived the Contemporary Music Project for Creativity in Music Education and proceeded to guide the program for the subsequent 14 years.

His duties with the University Singers include rehearsal conductor and tour coordinator. He is also director of choirs at the First Baptist Church of Rolla, Missouri. Greg received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from Oklahoma Baptist University and a Master of Music degree in Choral Conducting from Mizzou. He is currently pursuing a PhD in Choral Music Education at the University.

Julie Atteberry has been the accompanist for virtually every choral ensemble at the University of Missouri - Columbia since entering school in 1983. In addition to accompanying the University Singers, Chamber Singers, and Choral Union during the school year, she also works with numerous summer honors choirs on campus. Julie is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda and Sigma Alpha Iota, and is the recipient of many scholarships and awards, such as "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities" and the Phi Beta Kappa Junior Honor Student award in 1986. She will begin a masters degree program at the University of Notre Dame in the fall where she is a recipient of a full tuition scholarship and a graduate teaching assistantship.
