## **Rocket Men**

he <u>Toledo Rockets</u> and the Missouri Tigers will meet on the gridiron for the first time in history at 2:32 p.m. Saturday on Faurot Field. The Rockets are coming off a 24–6 loss at No. 12 Florida — Mizzou's Oct. 19 opponent — while the Tigers try to keep things rolling after <u>whipping</u> Murray State, 58–14.


The <u>University of Toledo</u> acquired its athletic nickname in 1923 after a game against the Carnegie Institute of Technology. Local sports writers pressured press box student worker James Neal to come up with a moniker for the nameless team. He suggested Skyrockets, indicative of the team's flashy performance that day, but the writers shortened it to Rockets.

The exclamation of surprise "Holy Toledo!" refers to Toledo, Spain, according to the *Morris Dictionary of* 

Word and Phrase Origins (Harper & Row, 1977). The Spanish city was a center of Christian culture after its liberation from the Moors in 1085.

Size: 100 buildings, main campus; 300 degree programs through 17 colleges and schools; six libraries; Health Science Campus and UT Medical Center; Scott Park Campus of Energy and Innovation; and Lake Erie Center

**Pride:** UT has earned national and international acclaim for its expertise in environmental sciences and renewable energy, most notably in the area of thin-film solar photovoltaics technology. The <u>Scott Park campus</u> features a 1.12-megawatt solar array and a 100-foot-tall wind turbine.

**Community:** Toledo, Ohio; population 284,012; nicknamed the Glass City for its history of glass industry innovations; located on the western end of

Lake Erie; claimed by both Ohio and Michigan before the 1835–36 Toledo War helped settle the boundary dispute

**Colors:** Navy blue and gold

Mascot: Rocky the Rocket

**Nickname:** Rockets

**Did you know?** Designed by architect Frank O. Gehry, the <u>UT</u>

<u>Center for the Visual Arts</u> is attached to the privately endowed Toledo Museum of Art.

**Campus treasures:** <u>Bell Tower</u>, a 206-foot-tall structure atop University Hall that symbolizes high aspirations, set the Collegiate Gothic architectural style for the main campus.

During its 100th anniversary in 1999, the <u>American Society of Landscape Architects</u> recognized Centennial Mall as one of the country's most beautifully landscaped areas.

**Traditions:** In October, UT monitors each residence hall's energy consumption compared to the previous year. The most improved hall wins.

Greeks and other campus groups have performed since 1937 in Songfest, a singing and dancing competition for charity.
