

QUALITY

- More than 80 percent of Mizzou's faculty have PhD degrees. The faculty is nationally and internationally respected. Mizzou professors not only read the books, they write the books.
- Mizzou is listed as one of the nation's "best buys in college education" by Edward Fiske, education editor of *The New York Times*.
- The University of Missouri-Columbia's Ellis Library is the largest research library in the state, including all public research libraries.
- Mizzou graduates are prime prospects for good jobs. In 1987 national and international firms, including Upjohn, McDonnell Douglas, *The New York Times* and Edward D. Jones, specifically recruited Mizzou graduates.
- Mizzou ranks near the top of the nation's public universities in enrolling National Merit and Achievement Scholars and, since 1980, has had six recipients of the prestigious Harry S. Truman Scholarship, three Mellon Fellows, two Rhodes Scholars, 10 Fulbright Scholars and one Marshall Scholar.
- Small labs and discussion groups strengthen large lecture sections to provide individual guidance. Sixty-eight percent of freshman classes have fewer than 30 students.

SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES

More of the state's valedictorians choose to attend Mizzou than any other college or university. A quarter of Mizzou's freshmen rank in the top 10 percent of their high-school class and 80 percent in the top half.

Ten of Mizzou's 19 schools and colleges enroll freshmen: Arts and Science; Agriculture; Education; Engineering; Fine Arts; Forestry, Fisheries and Wildlife; Health Related Professions: Home Economics: Public and Community Services; and Social Work.

Admission to the College of Business and Public Administration and its School of Accountancy, and the schools of Journalism and Nursing requires prerequisites prior to admission during your sophomore or junior year. Contact them directly for specific information on admission requirements.

You may decide to aim for graduate admission to one of our professional schools: Medicine, Law, Veterinary Medicine or Library and Informational Science. The on-campus accessibility of these and other graduate programs makes it easy for you to explore the possibilities.

If you've chosen an undergraduate major, you are assigned an adviser from your field. Some degree programs require more credit hours or a higher grade-point average, so be sure to check with the individual schools and colleges regarding specific requirements.

At the University of Missouri-Columbia, the College of Arts and Science is the largest and most

diversified of any similar academic unit in the state. With more than 6,000 students and 29 departments and programs, the college provides a dynamic backdrop for intellectual achievement campuswide. The college offers 45 undergraduate degree programs supplemented by 16 areas of emphasis. There are 400 full-time faculty members, many of whom are internationally recognized in their fields.

Academic opportunities in arts and science span many disciplines. The School of Fine Arts offers innovative courses and interdisciplinary collaboration through art, music and theater. The Honors College gives special academic challenges to particularly talented and motivated undergraduates. The Department of General Studies enables you to design your own academic program. Also, you may earn interdisciplinary (AB) degrees through Black Studies, Film Studies, German Area Studies, Peace Studies, Russian Area Studies and Women Studies.

Preprofessional study for the College of Business and Public Administration or the schools of Journalism, Law, Medicine, Nursing or Veterinary Medicine may be completed through study in the College of Arts and Science. The University of Missouri-Columbia was the first public university west of the Mississippi River, and celebrates 150 years of service in 1989. In the latest edition of Peterson's Competitive Colleges, Mizzou is cited as one of only 316 colleges that consistently has more above-average undergraduate applicants than can be accepted.

nation's largest employment sector, the food and agricultural sciences. The college's diversity is represented in the more than 200 faculty members, 14 academic departments and the School of Forestry, Fisheries and Wildlife. Programs encompass food production, processing, marketing, distribution and consumption.

The School of Forestry, Fisheries and Wildlife is one of a kind in Missouri. The most recent Gourman Report ranked forestry seventh among 48 institutions in the nation; fisheries and wildlife ranked 9th among 88 institutions. The school's programs are fully accredited or certified.

The new three-acre Animal Sciences Center is just one example of the learning facilities that integrate highly specialized laboratories, classroom and computer facilities with thousands of acres of research farms. The recently renovated facilities for biochemistry and food science and nutrition as well as the new Agricultural Engineering Building, place students in the College of Agriculture at the forefront of their disciplines.

COLLEGE OF BUSINESS AND PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION 106 Middlebush Hall 882-7073

The College of Business and Public Administration provides a quality learning environment for those seeking successful careers in business and government. All programs exceed the stringent requirements for accreditation. In fact, the School of Accountancy was among the first 16 in the nation to be accredited. The most recent Gourman Report, which rates programs nationally, places Mizzou's undergraduate business programs in the top 3 percent. The School of Accountancy was placed in the top 2 percent.

The college includes the School of Accountancy, the School of Business—which is composed of the departments of Finance, Management and Marketing—and the Department of Public Administration. The Public Administration Department allows emphasis both in state and local government, an option not available on many campuses.

B & PA offers two undergraduate degree programs, supplemented by nine areas of emphasis. Faculty and staff, many of whom are directly involved in the future economic development of Missouri, provide a realistic perspective on the contemporary business outlook.

The Honors College Difference

Three key ingredients define the Honors College: Highly motivated students, highly regarded professors and lots of love for learning. "Generally, the Honors College gives you the feeling that you're important, and the University isn't as big as it first seems," says Melissa Parisi, a Curators and National Merit Scholar.

The Honors College Humanities Sequence, a long-standing Campus favorite, exposed her to a study of basic works in philosophy, literature and art history from the Greeks to the present.

Approximately 1,400 students study in the Honors College in classes ranging in size from 8 to 15 students.

If you complete 20 credit hours in honors courses (about one honor course a semester), you are awarded a certificate that is noted on your transcript.

As an honors student, you may enroll in any of the special courses or in honors sections of required courses. Sections are not designed to be more difficult. They are designed to motivate high-ability students and develop their intellectual curiosity.

COLLEGE OF EDUCATION 102 Hill Hall 882-8311


The College of Education is the oldest teacher education program west of the Mississippi River. The college offers comprehensive programs leading to a variety of career opportunities in the education profession as well as in education-related human-service occupations.

You may obtain a bachelor of science degree in education or a bachelor of educational studies degree. The BSEd leads to teaching certification at the early childhood, elementary or secondary levels in Missouri schools as well as most other states through reciprocal agreement. The BES is preparation for a career in an education-related human-service profession such as agency counseling, athletic training, legal secretarial, educational media or retail sales.

COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING 1010 Engineering Building 882-4375

The College of Engineering, the second-largest division on campus, offers fully accredited undergraduate and graduate programs in agricultural, chemical, civil, electrical, computer, industrial and mechanical engineering. Engineering curricula provide solid foundations in mathematics and the physical sciences and apply them to the above specialties. In addition, they provide a background in the social sciences and humanities.

The college's Engineering Computer Network (ECN) provides all engineering students hands-on access to the most up-to-date computing capabilities available. There are five super minicomputers, high-resolution graphics terminals in the computer-aided design lab, VLSI and



Elmer Ellis Library and its seven branches are at the heart of the campus academic scene. The Mizzou library system is the home of more than 2.3 million volumes and one of the largest collections of microforms in the country. The library system also subscribes to more than 19,000 serials and journals every year. Other special sections of the main library (Ellis) include the Special Materials Room containing rare books and microforms; a general reference area; a government document collection; a newspaper collection; a record collection that includes a listening area; and the State Historical Society library, which is also housed in Ellis Library. Branch libraries include engineering, geology, journalism, law, math, health sciences and veterinary medicine. Ellis Library's on-line computer services help you find what you want. The computerized card catalog is accessible from any campus terminal, and you have access to more than 200 data bases.

Mizzou was chosen as the site for the statewide program because of its location, diversity and tradition.

image-processing labs, and graphics terminals plus personal computers in the computer-aided manufacturing laboratory.

Pre-engineering high-school credits should include four units in English, two in science with a laboratory and three and one-half in mathematics two in algebra, one in plane and solid geometry and a half unit in trigonometry. Pre-engineering transfer students should consult the dean's office for information about a special program at 19 other Missouri colleges to help them transfer to Mizzou without loss of credit.

SCHOOL OF HEALTH RELATED PROFESSIONS 200 Clark Hall 882-8011

The School of Health Related Professions offers an opportunity to study in diverse undergraduate and graduate programs that include: communicative disorders, medical technology, occupational therapy, physical therapy, radiologic sciences and respiratory therapy. Another study option, medical dietetics, is offered in collaboration with the College of Home Economics.

Freshmen and transfer students enroll directly in the School of Health Related Professions for advisement while they complete prerequisite courses. Preprofessional students become candidates for the bachelor of health science degree only after selection for participation in the professional (upper division) component of a program.

Enrollment in the professional component of each program in the School of Health Related Professions is limited, and is governed by an admissions committee. This policy applies to students who begin their higher education at the University as well as to those who transfer to the University with the intention of

Academic Assistance

Sound academic assistance is a crucial item for all college students. The many options available at Mizzou provide tremendous advantages in terms of academic advising. You can find personal or academic guidance in the residence hall, the classroom, a professor's office, at the Career Planning and Placement Center, the Learning Center, the Counseling Center and, of course, in your adviser's office.

"We believe that effective advising is the key to academic success," says Arts and Science Associate Dean Ted Tarkow.

"Toward that end, we attempt to provide every student with appropriate and understandable information that will allow him or her to get off to a strong start."

When you go through Summer Welcome or regular registration you meet with an adviser to work out your first semester's schedule. At the beginning of the semester, you will be assigned, or you may choose, your personal academic adviser. Mizzou's Academic Assistance Program coordinates a number of other resources that can be extremely helpful.

The Learning Center provides free individual tutoring and group instruction to undergraduate students needing help in math, writing, reading and study skills.

At the Career Planning and Placement Center, you'll find a variety of information on full-time and summer jobs, internships, job-seeking skills, academic programs, career seminars and alumni contacts—all to help students decide on an academic major, career area or specific job opportunity.

Counseling Services offers individual and group counseling to anyone having difficulty dealing with stress, loneliness, depression, interpersonal relationships, making decisions, sexual concerns, drugs, poor grades, family or marital conflicts or other personal problems.

Do not overlook your more immediate contacts. Instructors and resident assistants, for example, also can be excellent advisers.

Whatever source or combination of sources you use, advising is readily available to all students—especially freshmen adjusting to college. All it takes is a willingness to grow.

COLLEGE OF HOME ECONOMICS 113 Gwynn Hall 882-6227

Mizzou's College of Home Economics ranks among the nation's top seven out of 535 units, according to the most recent Gourman report. With about 900 students, it also is among the largest home economics programs in the country. Fully accredited career areas range from apparel merchandising and marketing to rehabilitation—the only undergraduate program of its kind in the United States—and from housing design and child and family development to dietetics, a nationally recognized, interdisciplinary program with the School of Health Related Professions.

Exciting programs offered with other divisions allow students to major in home economics education, home economics journalism and home economics extension. All Mizzou students take at least one writing intensive course before graduation. Mizzou's writing intensive courses help give graduates entering the job market the advantage of being the skillful communicators employers seek.

SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM 120 Neff Hall 882-4821

Mizzou's School of Journalism is the world's first—founded in 1908 and still the most famous. In a 1983 survey, Associated Press managing editors gave Mizzou the most votes when asked which journalism programs provided them the best young journalists, and television news directors, in a recent survey, mentioned Mizzou most often for doing the best job of preparing students for their newsrooms.

At Mizzou, the difference has been and continues to be the real-life experience you receive. You write, sell advertising, edit and take photographs for the *Columbia Missourian*, the city's morning newspaper. You write, produce and broadcast news and public affairs on KOMU, an NBC affiliate television station, and on KBIA, a National Public Radio station. The University operates all three media.

The Missouri Plan provides you with both the broad liberal education considered necessary for a journalist and the necessary professional journalism courses. Freshmen enroll in the College of Arts and Science, then transfer to journalism at the start of their junior year. Contact the school for specific admission information.

The School of Journalism's graduates work all over the world, forming a network of prospective job contacts for new graduates.

SCHOOL OF NURSING S235 Nursing School Bldg. 882-0294

Mizzou's School of Nursing offers a variety of educational opportunities. The location of the school in a health science center and on the main campus of a comprehensive university provides exemplary educational and clinical experiences. The school offers both the bachelor's and the master's of science degrees in nursing.

Freshmen enroll in the College of Arts and Science. Upon completion of designated prerequisite general education, physical and biological science courses, students apply for admission to nursing beginning with the junior year. Registered nurses with a diploma or associate degree are provided advance-placement options.

COLLEGE OF PUBLIC AND COMMUNITY SERVICES 729 Clark Hall 882-7321

The College of Public and Community Services prepares you for careers in the human-serving professions. The Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism, the only nationally accredited recreation program in Missouri, offers programs in leisure management, park programs and operations, therapeutic recreation and travel and tourism. The department offers both the bachelor's and the master's of science degree.

One of the first in the world, the Department of Community Development is recognized internationally. Community Development also offers the master's of science degree.

The School of Social Work, a division of the college, has the only programs accredited by the Council on Social Work Education for both bachelor's and master's degrees in a public university in Missouri. At the undergraduate level you may obtain a dual degree in social work and child and family development, another example of the advantages of a multidisciplinary university like Mizzou.

Your Career Plan

Mizzou's Career Planning and Placement Center is ready to assist you the moment you arrive on Campus. Its professional placement counselors and seminars aid you in choosing an academic major and career direction.

Most new students don't know what they want to major in or where they want to work, says the coordinator of the Career Planning and Placement Center. To find the career that's right for you, start with the center.

You also can learn about job openings through placement offices in Agriculture; Business and Public Administration; Education; Engineering; Forestry, Fisheries and Wildlife; Journalism; Law; Public and Community Services; ROTC; and Veterinary Medicine. In 1987, more than 300 companies from around the country came to Campus to recruit new employees. Just a few of the firms visiting Campus in recent years include McDonnell Douglas, *The New York Times*, Coca-Cola, DeKalb-Pfizer, DuPont, Gannett Inc., Hallmark Cards, Edward D. Jones, IBM, Kraft Foods, Leo Burnett Advertising, Marriott Corp., Monsanto, Procter and Gamble and Upjohn.

You may use the center to do practice interviews and to research companies.

"The practice interview gives you the confidence to interview successfully. You're ready. You know what to expect," Gordon Robertson, a 1986 journalism graduate, says.



GRADUATE AND PROFESSIONAL STUDY

The University of Missouri is the only public institution in Missouri offering doctoral programs. Many of them are available only on the Columbia campus.

In the fall of 1988, Mizzou law students will enjoy a new Law School building that more than doubles the present space. Also, Mizzou stands alone among Missouri colleges and universities in our preprofessional admission programs for undergraduate students.

THE SCHOOL OF LIBRARY AND INFORMATIONAL SCIENCE 104 Stewart Hall 882-4546

Mizzou's program is the only one in Missouri accredited by the American Library Association and one of only two in the Big Eight. The school offers a master's degree. Students also may earn the bachelor's degree in library science through the College of Arts and Science.

THE SCHOOL OF LAW 107 Tate Hall 882-6487

The Law School's new early admission program guarantees eligible Missouri high-school seniors admission to the Law School. You must meet the following criteria: Receive an ACT composite score of 25 or better and graduate in the top 10 percent of your high-school class, or receive an ACT composite score of 29. You also must maintain an 3.3 grade-point average as an undergraduate and be awarded an undergraduate degree from Mizzou.

The Law School offers a three-year

professional curriculum leading to a juris doctor degree.

THE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE MA204 Health Sciences Center 882-2923

The School of Medicine's Preprofessional Scholar's Program (PSP) guarantees bright high-school seniors admission if they meet the following criteria: Achieve a minimum SAT score of 1,300 or ACT score of 30 and be selected through an interview at the School of Medicine.

If selected, you receive provisional acceptance to the medical school. You also must maintain an 3.3 grade-point average as an undergraduate and complete 21 credit hours of Honors College courses. Participants take at least one year of courses with laboratories in each of the following: biology, organic chemistry and physics.

A four-year program beyond the baccalaureate is required for the doctor of medicine degree. You normally spend at least three years in postdoctoral specialty training.

THE COLLEGE OF VETERINARY MEDICINE W203 Veterinary Medicine Building 882-3877


The college is Missouri's only complete animal-health facility. It offers the doctor of veterinary medicine degree, requiring four years for completion. You must have at least 64 semester hours of college work to be admitted, but most students have completed more than 100 hours before admission.

The curriculum includes educational programs, research on animal disease, and advanced specialized training of veterinarians, bioagricultural and biomedical scientists. The 1987 Carnegie Classification of Higher Education lists Mizzou as the only public university in Missouri in its highest classification, Research Universities I. Only two in the Big Eight, Mizzou and Colorado University, were granted that distinction. ⁶⁶ I chose the University of Missouri-Columbia because, to me, Mizzou represents the Big Time. It has an excellent reputation, both academically and socially. Since graduation I've been all around the world. Wherever I've gone, the University of Missouri-Columbia has been a name that people recognize and a credential that's opened doors for me.⁷⁵

FUNDING YOUR EDUCATION

New York Times Education Editor Edward Fiske considers Mizzou a bargain among American colleges. At Mizzou, we have a good record of aiding potential students in securing scholarships, grants and loans. More than half of the 1986-87 freshmen received some form of assistance. The best place to begin, and the main source of scholarship information, is your high-school guidance office.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Some scholarships require submission of either the Family Financial Statement (FFS) of American College Testing, which Mizzou prefers, or the Financial Aid Form (FAF) of the College Scholarship Service (CSS). Scholarships granted annually include:

Missouri Higher Education

Scholarship: In an effort to encourage talented Missouri students to attend a Missouri college, the state legislature has established a \$2,000 annual scholarship. You are eligible if you are a Missouri resident, if your ACT or SAT scores place you in the top 3 percent of all Missouri students taking those tests during the year you graduate from high school, and if you are enrolled or accepted for enrollment as an undergraduate student at Mizzou. This scholarship can be combined with other scholarships you may receive.

Awards For Excellence: You must score at or above the 85th percentile on the ACT (composite score 25) or have a comparable score on the SAT and have a high-school rank that places you in the top 15 percent of your graduating class. This award is automatic and renewable for one year. While an application may be filed through your high-school counselor, Mizzou officials select prospective students who meet the above criteria.

Curators Scholars: You must be a Missouri high-school graduate in the upper 3 percent of your class and score in the top 10 percent on a nationally standardized college aptitude test. **Missouri Scholarship:** You must be a Missouri high-school graduate in the top 5 percent of your class at the end of six semesters and score in the top 10 percent on a national standardized college aptitude test.

G. Ellsworth Huggins: You must be a Missouri high-school graduate in the top 10 percent of your class and score in the top 10 percent on a national standardized aptitude test, participate in extracurricular activities and be recommended by your high-school counselor or principal. For more information contact the Honors College, Conley House, 602 Sanford and Conley, Columbia, Mo. 65211.

Chancellor's Leadership Class: Selections are based on high-school activities, especially ones to which you are selected by your peers. You also must be in the top 25 percent of your class. Nomination forms are available in December.

National Merit and Achievement Scholars: Eligibility is determined by your score on the PSAT exam. Students are recommended to the University by the National Merit Office of Chicago. National Merit and National Achievement Scholars should submit a FFS or FAF.

Mizzou Alumni Scholarships: You must be in the top 25 percent of your class and involved in high-school activities. These are offered only in specific Missouri counties in which there is an active alumni chapter.

Science Fair Scholarships:

High-ranking senior participants in science fairs are eligible.

Special Events Scholarships: These are awarded to Missouri residents through the College of Agriculture, the College of Arts and Science (departments of music, and speech and dramatic art), and the College of Education (department of industrial education).

ROTC Scholarships: Students qualify for two-, three- and four-year scholarships through national and local

competition. For further information, contact the appropriate ROTC office, either Army, Navy, Air Force or Marines.

University Scholars: You must have accumulated at least 24 Mizzou credit hours, be a Missouri resident and have achieved a cumulative GPA of at least 3.5 to be eligible. You need not apply for this award—Mizzou officials notify recipients.

College, School or Divisional

Scholarships: Direct questions regarding specific scholarships to the appropriate dean's office.

FINANCIAL AID

Five distinct types of need-based financial aid are available. Students may use either the Family Financial Statement (FFS) of American College Testing, which Mizzou prefers, or the Financial Aid Form (FAF) of the College Scholarship Service to apply for any or all of the following:

- Pell Grant
- Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG)
- Missouri Student Grant Program
- Perkins Loans (formerly National Direct Student Loan Program)
- College Work-Study Program

Financial Aid—How To Apply:

- October. Obtain the free ACT pamphlet, "Applying for Financial Aid," which describes types of assistance and application procedures, from your guidance office.
- January 1. Get a Family Financial Statement (FFS) or a Financial Aid Form (FAF) from your counselor. File the completed FFS or FAF form with the testing service by *February 26*. Late applications are considered according to the dates processed by ACT or CSS and the availability of funds.

From the information on these forms, Mizzou officials determine how much financial help you can expect. For additional information, contact Financial Aids, 11 Jesse Hall.

ANNUAL COSTS

FEES

This figure is based on a freshman student's taking 14 credit hours for two semesters at the 1988-89 rate of \$52.60 per credit hour for a Missouri resident. The fee is \$157.70 per credit hour for a non-resident. Missouri juniors and seniors pay \$58.20 per credit hour, and non-residents, \$174.50. All students pay an activity fee, which totals \$112 in 1988-89. The fee may change for 1988-89. Several payment plans are available for tuition and fees, including MasterCard and Visa. Some plans offer discounts.

ROOM AND BOARD

This is the 1987-88 cost of a double-occupancy room in a residence hall, 20 meals a week (no Sunday evening meal) and including a \$15 social fee. The 1988-89 cost may be different. Residence hall costs may be paid by the year, semester or four payments each semester. Financial aid recipients are expected to pay by the semester.

BOOKS AND SUPPLIES

This figure is an estimate for an entire school year.

PERSONAL EXPENSES

This is an estimate. Actual expenses for personal items, entertainment, laundry, cleaning, student health insurance and transportation vary with the individual.

TOTAL ANNUAL COSTS

Based on the above figures, the total cost for a Missouri freshman is about \$5,465 for the nine-month academic year at Mizzou. The out-of-state cost is about \$8,408 for the school year.

FRESHMAN ADMISSION

If you are a freshman or transfer student with fewer than 24 hours of college coursework, admission is determined by a combination of class rank and ACT score as well as completion of the following minimal high-school coursework:

At least 14 units of credit (1 unit = 1 year in class) as follows:

- **English:** (4) Four units, one of which may be in speech or debate. Two units emphasizing composition or writing skills are required.
- Mathematics: (3) Three units including algebra I or higher.
- Science: (2) Two units (not including general science), one of which must be a laboratory course.

Social Studies: (2) Two units.

Three (3) additional units selected from foreign language, English, mathematics (algebra I and higher), science or social studies. Among these options, two units of foreign language are strongly recommended.

Freshmen who transfer to Mizzou with

fewer than 24 hours of college-level coursework must have a minimum grade-point average of C (A = 4.0) or better in all coursework attempted.

TRANSFER STUDENTS

If transferring to Mizzou with more than 24 hours of college coursework, you need an overall C average (A = 4.0) in all coursework attempted at previous institutions.

If you hold an associate of arts degree from an accredited Missouri college, with a certified C average, you will be accepted by the University as having junior standing and having completed general education requirements. However, this does not apply to the professional schools of law, veterinary medicine, medicine, health related professions, journalism, business and public administration, education and nursing.

The 60 hours of college level work oriented toward the baccalaureate degree must include not less than 39 hours distributed as follows: communication skills, 9; humanities-fine arts, 9; socialbehavioral science, 9; science-biological and physical, 9; mathematics, 3. The preceding does not waive nor alter any course requirements, basic requirements or otherwise, that are required for the particular degree sought.

TRANSCRIPTS

Transcripts (grades and test scores) cannot be accepted directly from you. Have the school(s) you attended send official transcript(s) to the director of admissions, 130 Jesse Hall, University of Missouri-Columbia, Columbia, Mo. 65211. All transcripts become the property of Mizzou. If you are accepted for

admission and have not enrolled after one semester you need to submit another transcript in order to reapply for admission.

Freshman applicants: Have an official high-school transcript submitted, with class rank and required ACT scores.

Undergraduate transfer applicants: Submit an official transcript from each college attended. If you are entering the College of Arts and Science or the School of Journalism, submit a high-school transcript as well.

The application fee is nonrefundable but is applied to educational fees when the student enrolls.

TESTING

Mizzou requires ACT. The ACT will be used for math and English placement of

freshmen and transfer students who have not taken a college-level math or English course.

Forms of credit by examination awarded at Mizzou include the Advanced Placement Program, CLEP General (limited to students with fewer than 30 semester hours of college credit), CLEP Subject and departmental examinations (offered by individual academic departments on Campus). For more information, request the brochure, Credit By Exam, from the admissions office, 130 Jesse Hall.

OUT-OF-STATE APPLICANTS

Detailed information on residence and educational fee rules may be obtained from the admissions office, 130 Jesse Hall, Columbia, Mo. 65211, (314) 882-7786.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

More than 1,200 students from 90 foreign countries currently are enrolled at Mizzou. If you are not a U.S. citizen or permanent U.S. resident, write to the Office of International Student Programs, A02 Brady Commons, Columbia, Mo. 65211, (314) 882-8148, for appropriate forms.

FINANCIAL AID

An application for admission to Mizzou does not serve as an application for financial aid. Mizzou prefers the Family Financial Statement (FFS) of American College Testing, but also accepts the Financial Aid Form (FAF) of the College Scholarship Service. Both forms are available in school counseling offices. They are released just before the new calendar year and should be filed with the testing service by February 25. Late applications will be considered according to the date received and the availability of funds. Questions should be directed to financial aids, 11 Jesse Hall.

HOUSING

You receive housing information and applications for University-owned residence halls automatically after March 1 if you have been accepted for fall admission.


MEDIA

SPECIAL SERVICES


Mizzou services to students with

Freshmen are not required to live on Campus, but the majority choose to do so every year.

RESIDENCE HALLS

Information, including a residence hall application, is mailed to you after you apply for admission to Mizzou. Residence hall applications are mailed after March 1 to fall semester applicants. You enter into a contract with the University for room and board.

Of Mizzou students who live in residence halls, about 50 percent, or some 3,000, are freshmen. Campus residence halls are located within easy walking distance of classroom buildings.

FRATERNITIES AND SORORITIES

Fraternities and sororities are private, self-governing groups that have University-approved resident directors. Address fraternity inquiries to the IFC Rush Chairman, Brady Commons; for sorority information write to the Panhellenic Council, Brady Commons; and write to Black Panhellenic for both fraternity and sorority information, also at Brady Commons.

COOPERATIVE

Campbell-Harrison cooperative accommodates about 30 women. Room-and-board expenses in the cooperative are somewhat less as you share some of the work in the house with other residents.


STUDENT HEALTH SERVICE

Health service is available to all Mizzou students through the Student Health Center.

A voluntary, prepaid outpatient health plan available for \$30 per semester provides unlimited visits and other benefits. Students may see a physician during regular hours for general medical and health problems with or without an appointment. There is a \$15 clinic fee per visit for those not enrolled in the voluntary health plan. Students pay modest fees for laboratory services, tests and for prescribed medications. Specialty clinics including GYN, dermatology and orthopedics are available. State-of-the-art medical care also is available through the University of Missouri-Columbia Hospital and Clinics.

All entering students are required to show evidence of measles immunization.

The costs of attending Mizzou are kept as low as possible so that the educational opportunities may be within the reach of anyone desiring a college education. And if you place in the top 3 percent of all Missouri students taking the ACT or SAT, are a Missouri resident and have been accepted at Mizzou fall semester 1987, you may receive an additional \$2,000 from the state. In seeking scholarships, grants or loans, the best place to begin is your high-school guidance office.

CAMPUS PARKING

Limited space is available on Campus. All disabled students desiring a space will be assigned one. For information about parking for on-campus residents as well as commuter parking, contact Parking and Transportation Services, 107 Swallow Hall, (314) 882-4568.

OFF-CAMPUS HOUSING

Many students choose to live off campus in apartments or rental housing. Quality of housing and prices vary greatly.

Naturally, rentals nearer to Campus tend to be more expensive and generally are leased several months prior to occupancy. If you plan to live off campus, it is wise to secure living arrangements as soon as possible after making the decision to attend Mizzou.
