Critical Reading of the New Testament in Greek, on Monday morning of each week, in the Junior, Sophomore and Freshman classes.

Books included within the Course, may be obtained at the Bookstores in town on the most reasonable terms.

LECTURES.—On Natural Philosophy, and Chemistry, with use of Apparatus; Mineralogy and Geology, with the exhibition of specimens; International Law and Civil Polity; Political Economy; Philosophy of Rhetoric and Elocution; Classical Literature.

On completion of the full course, the student will, if approved on Examination, be admitted to the degree of Bachelor of Arts; and three years thereafter to the degree of Master of Arts in course.

Young gentlemen desirous of pursuing select portions of the course, will be admitted to the recitations, and other exercises of the regular classes, with the privilege of attending on the Lectures of the several Professors. Such students will, if they desire it, receive a written statement of the number of sessions spent at the University, and of the branches of study pursued by them.

EXAMINATIONS,

Will be publicly holden of all the classes at the close of each session.

EXHIBITIONS.

1. Of the Literary Societies, at the close of the first session
2. Of the Junior class, at the close of the second session.
3. Of the Graduating class, at Commencement.

SESSIONS.

1. From the third Monday of September, fourteen weeks.
2. From the first Monday of January, fourteen weeks.
3. Fourteen weeks, terminating at Commencement; which is fixed on the last Thursday of July.

Tuition, at \$10 per session, - - - -	\$30,00
For wood and other contingencies, - - - -	1,00
Board, with washing, lodging, fuel and lights, (averaging \$1,75 per week,) - - - -	75,00
Total, - - - - -	\$106,00

With view to the preservation of the Edifice, heavy charges will be made for any damages wrongfully committed. It is to be hoped there will be no occasion to add this item to the expenditures of any student. For contingencies, as mentioned above, fifty cents will be paid by each student for the first two sessions.

PAYMENT OF BILLS.

It is provided, by ordinance of the Curators, that no person be admitted by the President as a member of the University for any session, until he present a certificate from the Secretary of the Board, that his bill for Tuition and contingencies have been paid in advance.

DISCIPLINE.

A Record is kept by the Faculty, exhibiting accurately the standing of each student in scholarship, and regularity of attendance on the exercises of the Institution. A low standing on the record will be followed by private admonition, and notice of the same will be given to the parent or guardian. Unexcused absence from a public examination, or continued delinquency will subject the offender to degradation to some lower class, or to separation from the Institution. It is believed, however, that a prompt and judicious co-operation on the part of parents and guardians, will relieve the Faculty from the necessity of resorting to severe measures; and that the ends of good government may be secured by means that will save the feelings and the character of the student.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

The arrangement of vacations is such, as to render it quite unnecessary, during session, for the students to visit their friends beyond the immediate neighborhood of the University, except for urgent and unforeseen reasons. The occasional loss of a day cannot fail to have an unfavorable bearing on the intellectual habits and standing of the student. It is hoped that parents and guardians will concur with the Faculty, in their opinion of the inexpediency of granting leave of absence in ordinary cases.
