Critical Reading of the New Testament in Greek, on Monday morning of each week, in the Junior, Sophomore and Freshman classes.

Books included within the course, may be obtained in the Book-stores in town on the most reasonable terms.

LECTURES.—On Natural Philosophy, and Chemistry, with use of Apparatus; Mineralogy and Geology; International Law and Civil Polity; Political Economy; Philosophy of Rhetoric and Elocution; Classical Literature.

On completion of the full course, the student will, if approved on examination, be admitted to the degree of Bachelor of Arts; and three years thereafter to the degree of Master of Arts in course.

Young gentlemen desirous of pursuing select portions of the course, will be admitted to the recitations, and other exercise of the regular classes, with the privilege of attending on the lectures of the several Professors. Such students will, if they desire it, receive a written statement of the number of sessions spent at the University, and of the branches of study pursued by them.

EXAMINATIONS,

Will be publicly holden of all the classes at the close of each session.

With view to the preservation of the Edifice, heavy charges will be made for any damages wrongfully committed. It is to be hoped there will be no occasion to add this item to the expenditures of any student.

PAYMENT OF BILLS.

It is provided, by Ordinance of the Curators, that no student be admitted by the President to the exercises of the University for any session, until he present a certificate from the Secretary of the Board, that his bill for tuition and contingencies has been paid in advance; and that no drawback be allowed for absence in any case.

DISCIPLINE.

Records are kept by the Faculty, exhibiting accurately the standing of each student in scholarship and deportment. A low standing on either record will be followed by a private admonition, and notice of the same will be given to the parent or guardian. Unexcused absence from a public examination, or continued delinquency, will subject the offender to degradation to some lower class, or to separation from the Institution. It is believed, however, that a prompt and judicious co-operation on the part of parents and guardians, will relieve the Faculty from the necessity of resorting to severe measures; and that the ends of good government may be secured by means that will save the feelings and the character of the student.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

The arrangement of Vacation is such, as to render it quite unnecessary, during session, for the students to visit their friends beyond the immediate neighborhood of the University, except for urgent and unforeseen reasons. The occasional loss of a day cannot fail to have an unfavorable bearing on the intellectual habits and standing of the student. It is hoped that parents and guardians will concur with the Faculty in their opinion of the inexpediency of granting leave of absence in ordinary cases.

The University of the State of Missouri was chartered by the Legislature during the session of 1838-9; and went into full operation under its present organization, on the first of January 1844; since which time it has been in successful operation affording to

students the educational advantages ordinarily enjoyed in institutions of the highest grade in the older States.

The University Edifice, a spacious, tasteful and commodious building, was erected at an expense of about \$85,000 by the liberality of the citizens of the county of Boone, in which the institution is located. The aggregate subscription of the county was more than \$100,000.

The annual revenue of the Institution, exclusive of fees for tuition, is the increase of a State fund of \$100,000, being the proceeds of the sales of lands, donated by Congress to the State, for University purposes. The principal is well invested and is legally inviolable.

The Faculty of Arts consists of a President, who renders instruction in ethics, civil polity, constitutional and international law, and Political Economy; a Professor of Mathematics, Natural Philosophy and Astronomy; A Professor of Mental Philosophy, Logic, Rhetoric, and Christian Evidences; a Professor of Ancient and Modern Languages; a Professor of the Physical sciences and a Tutor.

Liberal appropriations will be made for the annual increase of the Library. The Laboratory and the Philosophical Chamber are supplied with ample means for experiment and illustration. A collection of minerals has been commenced with the prospect of rapid and valuable increase. It is the intention of the Curators to supply promptly and liberally those aids to instruction which may be necessary to the eminent and permanent usefulness of the University.

Columbia, the seat of the University, and the seat of justice in Boone county, is situated near the centre of the State, twelve miles north of the Missouri river. The town contains about 1000 inhabitants. It is confidently believed that no location in the interior combines more advantages for the site of a literary Institution of the highest grade. It is not surpassed in healthfulness; in economy of living; and in those social, moral and religious influences which are conservative of the character of young men, and promotive of good order, sound discipline and industrious habits of study.

The University is easily accessible by the river during the greater part of the year. At the landing in Providence carriages will always be in readiness to convey passengers to Columbia. There is also constant communication with St. Louis and with the upper counties by stage.

Should farther information be desired by parents and guardians, it may be obtained by addressing the President of the University or either of the Professors.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

The Medical Faculty consists of a Professor of Anatomy and Surgery, a Professor of Theory and Practice of Medicine, a Professor of Physiology and Materia Medica, a Professor of Obstetrics and Diseases of Women and Children, a Professor of Chemistry and Pharmacy, and a Professor of Pathology and Clinical Medicine.

The Professors hold their sessions, and deliver their instructions in the city of St. Louis.

The regular Courses of Lectures commence on the first Monday in November, and close the first week in March. During the last two weeks in October, lectures out of course are delivered by some one of the Professors, to such students as may be in attendance before the opening of the session.

In the City Hospital is presented almost every variety of disease, and as the students are admitted to the Hospital clinique, they have an opportunity of observing the symptoms and the treatment of each and all the maladies there presented.

The requisites for graduation in the Medical Department of the University of the State of Missouri, are, that the candidate shall not be less than twenty-one years of age, and of good moral character; shall have enjoyed the advantages of two years private pupilage, and have attended two Courses of Lectures, the last of which must have been attended at this school; write and defend a Thesis on some Medical subject, and stand a satisfactory examination before the Faculty, or shall have attended three successive Courses of Lectures without previous private pupilage, or shall have been engaged in a reputable practice for three years.

The aggregate cost of Tickets, including the Matriculation Ticket, is \$110. Dissecting ticket \$10, which the student is required to take but once; graduation fee \$20.

Comfortable boarding can be obtained, within a convenient distance of the College, at from two to three dollars per week.
