#### PROGRAM NOTES

Mr. Polson's transcriptions of two of <u>Virgil Thomson's Five Portraits</u> are vital, brilliant, and in splendid keeping with the character of the work. Mr. Thomson expressed enthusiasm over these transcriptions during his recent visit to Columbia. Mr. Thomson says, "the description of character through music is an ancient preoccuption of composers." <u>Bugles and Birds</u> is a portrait of the painter Pablo Picasso. It represents the man, not his paintings. The Fugue is a representation of the American conductor Alexander Smallens.

This is the first performance of Mr. Polson's march, Thor's Bokar. The title, meaning Thor's Goats, is taken from Norse mythology.

Grant Sharman lives in California, is a graduate of the University of Arizona, and has studied composition with Arthur Olaf Andersen. The "Concert in the Park" is a sharp-edged, bright piece for band set in a contemporary idiom.

Mr. Lillya's setting of two famous study etudes makes an effective show piece for cornets and clarinets.

We are grateful to Dr. A. A. Harding, Director Emeritus of the University of Illinois Bands, for the use of his transcriptions of Suite Provencale and Symphony 5 1/2. These come from his large library of transcriptions for Concert Band, representing many years of work devoted to making some of the outstanding orchestral repertory available for band. The Finale to Death and Transfiguration is the first of Dr. Harding's transcriptions to be printed.

Don Gillis is musical program director for the National Broadcasting Company. The Symphony 5 1/2, also called A Symphony for Fun, is light musical satire. It is well adapted to the Concert Band.

#### University of Missouri Bands

CONCERT BAND. . . . . is a select group of 80 players from the entire Band membership. Positions in the Concert Band are open to men and women. This band consists of a complete balanced instrumentation. It studies and performs the best literature available for the Concert Band. An Annual Tour is made in the state. An Annual Formal Concert is given as well as a series of Lawn Concerts in the spring.

The 1949-50 Concert Band performed at the Music Educators National Conference in St. Louis. Each member of the Concert Band receives a \$50.00 stipend

for Commencement services at the close of the year.

WOMEN'S BAND.... organized throughout the year, this organization plays on the sidelines with the Football Band at the football games, and helps play for the

basketball games.

FOOTBALL BAND . . . consists of men only. In addition to the home football

schedule, this band makes out-of-town trips with the football team.

VARSITY BAND. . . . . is composed of the men and women not in the Concert

VAKSIIY BAND.... is composed of the men and women not in the Concert Band. Organized after the football season, this group helps with the basketball games and other activities of the winter and spring seasons.

R.O.T.C. BAND..... students who are enrolled in the Basic ROTC course, and who elect to become members of the ROTC Band shall be excused from all Military Laboratory periods (Drill). Instead, they shall be assigned to meet with the ROTC band a minimum of one hour per week. Students thus enrolled in ROTC Band, and taking the ROTC theoretical courses, will remain eligible for advanced courses in ROTC.
