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
National Spotlight on University Singers

The University Singers have had an exceptionally busy year, renewing the longstanding reputation that has brought recognition to the Department of Music and the University of Missouri-Columbia for many years. The invitation to perform at a national professional music convention is among the highest of accomplishments for any ensemble; Mizzou alumni should be doubly proud to learn that the University Singers have received two such invitations in one year.

In March 1988, the University Singers were selected by competitive taped audition to sing at the biennial national convention of the Music Educators National Conference in Indianapolis. Conductor Duncan Couch selected a program devoted to the music of American composer Norman Dello Joio. The group was honored by having the composer appear with it at the convention session to offer commentary on his compositions. The Singers also were joined by a faculty and student brass ensemble from Mizzou. The 90-minute session was well attended by MENC members and was given a standing ovation by the audience.

As a result of this major success, the University Singers were asked to repeat the program, complete with the composer's commentary, for the 1989 national convention of the American Choral Directors Association in Louisville. More than 600 ACDA members attended each of two sessions, and again the University Singers and Dr. Couch received standing ovations.

Not to be overlooked was the appearance of the University Singers at the annual state convention of the Missouri Music Educators Association at Tan-Tar-A in January. Ensembles may only apply to perform at this convention every third year, and the Singers

April 22 marked the date for a University Singers Alumni reunion. The 180 returning alumni rehearsed throughout the day and shared an evening concert with the current University Singers ensemble. Featured performers at the concert were Thomas Mills, Professor Emeritus of Vocal Music and former conductor of the organization, and Missouri Governor John Ashcroft, who sang "God Bless the U.S.A." The festivities included in a banquet on the basketball court of the Hearnes Center, which was attended by more than 200 alumni and friends.

To cap such a successful season, thirtyfive choir members and Dr. Couch traveled to Europe for a twenty-one-day tour in May. They sang six formal concerts and several impromptu concerts in England, Belgium, France, Germany, Switzerland, and Austria.

Sesquicentennial Concerts Planned

The Music Department will bring the University's Sesquicentennial Celebration to its culmination with two special events in the fall semester. At 8 p.m. on Monday, November 6 in the Fine Arts Recital Hall, a faculty showcase recital will feature music by university composers past and present, performed by contemporary faculty members. Yesteryear will be represented by a performance of Piano Quintett in D Minor by William Henry Pommer. Pommer (1851-1937), who received his musical training in St. Louis, Leipzig, and Vienna, founded the MU Department of Music in 1907. The premiere of a string quartet by Thomas McKenney, Professor of Theory and Composition, will represent the present day. Dr. McKenney's Songs of the Sacred Strings will be performed by the Esterhazy Quartet, for whom it was written. Pianist Janice Wenger will join her colleagues for the performance of the Pommer. One highlight of the evening will be an audio-visual presentation concerning the early days of MU's music program. A reception honoring music faculty emeriti and members of their families will follow.

Plans also are being finalized for this year's annual holiday concert at 3 p.m. on Sunday, December 3 in Jesse Auditorium. Distinguished alumni will join the 400-voice Choral Union, University Philharmonic Orchestra, and faculty artists for the Sesquicentennial presentation of a varied program designed to appeal to people of all ages. The many moods of the holiday season will be presented through performances of Vivaldi's Gloria, excerpts from Tchaikovsky's Nutcracker Ballet, and arrangements of traditional carols. Featured on the concert will be the premiere of Propheta Lucis (Prophet of Light), for chorus, orchestra and narrator. This major work by John Cheetham, MU Professor of Theory and Composition, was commissioned to mark the Sesquicentennial and is based on texts of Thomas Jefferson, the "philosophical father" of Mizzou. This holiday concert will cap the University's yearlong celebration.

The Sesquicentennial year has enabled all of us not only to contemplate the University's humble origins and its ensuing growth, but also to reflect on the valuable asset that the



University continues to represent to the people of Missouri. In addition, this year of reflection and planning for the future has brought new insight concerning the rich heritage of MU's programs in the fine arts, which emerged as an important area of study as early as 1860. In that year, the Board of Curators asked Missouri's famous painter, George Caleb Bingham, to develop a plan for art education. Bingham officially joined the University faculty as Professor of Art in 1877. From this beginning, the University's programs in art, music, and theatre, now organized administratively as the only School of Fine Arts in a public institution in Missouri, have become major resources for the cultural life of the campus, the community, the state, and the nation.

In addition to the Sesquicentennial concerts described in this newsletter, I want to extend an invitation for you to attend two additional events to be presented by our Departments of Art and Theatre. The Retrospective Faculty Exhibition, a show illustrating the history of the Department of Art, is scheduled for August 28 through September 24. The exhibition will open formally with a reception on September 10 in the Fine Arts Gallery, which will be renamed the George Caleb Bingham Gallery at that time. The formal opening of the Corner Playhouse, the new home of our laboratory theatre program in the renovated Fine Arts Annex, will take place on November 15. Please join us for these events that symbolize the University's support for our fine arts programs and for the plans for their continued development. Cordially,

Missouri Arts Quintet Debuts in New York

In January of this year the Missouri Arts Quintet, woodwind quintet in residence at the University of Missouri-Columbia, traveled to New York City to give its debut concert at Weill Recital Hall (formerly Carnegie Recital Hall). The concert was the first of many events held in celebration of the University of Missouri's Sesquicentennial.

Among the guests in the sold-out audience were MU Chancellor Haskell Monroe and Mrs. Monroe, and George Walker, Assistant Vice Chancellor for Alumni Relations, and Mrs. Walker. Also braving a raging blizzard to attend the concert were MU music students Todd Waldecker, Denis Swope, Howard Helvey, and Darla Reithmeyer, as well as distinguished alumni and friends of Mizzou from the New York metropolitan area.

Quintet members Steven Geibel, flute, Dan Willett, oboe, Paul Garritson, clarinet, Dan Meier, horn, and Barbara Wood, bassoon, were featured in a program of contemporary quintet literature and transcriptions. The program included *Partita* by Irving Fine and a commissioned work by St. Louis composer James Meyer titled *Quintet for Winds*. The remainder of the program consisted of three transcriptions for woodwind quintet. First was the *Candide Overture* by Leonard Bernstein, which was transcribed in 1985 from the orchestral score by MU senior clarinetist Todd Waldecker, a Columbia native. Selections from Edvard Grieg's Lyric Pieces for piano were arranged for this debut recital by quintet member Dan Willett. The second half of the concert featured the third original transcription, Felix Mendelssohn's Octet, originally written for strings but rescored here for double woodwind quintet by Samuel Baron, flutist in the New York Woodwind Quintet. The Missouri Arts Quintet invited the New York Quintet to join them in this unusual presentation in Weill Hall, just as the two ensembles had collaborated in a concert in Columbia for the University Concert Series last November.

Quintet members managed to find time for sightseeing, shopping, visiting museums, attending a performance at the Metropolitan Opera, and, of course, devouring many meals in ethnic restaurants.

The New York recital was a grand reward after working and performing together for several years. The Quintet's enthusiasm for the performance was reinforced in a favorable review by Will Crutchfield of *The New York Times*, who confirmed to mid-Missourians what an important cultural resource they have in the Missouri Arts Quintet. 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The South American Link Continues

The Music Department's link to South America, begun by the Esterhazy Quartet many years ago (see Fall '88 Music at Mizzou), was reinforced this year by several faculty exchanges. Highlighting the year was the visit to MU by Professor Roberto Escobar of the University of Chile in Santiago. During his week-long residency, Professor Escobar met with faculty and students from the Music, Geography, Romance Languages, Philosophy, History, and Latin American Studies departments.

As part of Arts and Science Week, Professor Escobar delivered a keynote lecture entitled "Romanticism in Latin American Art and Society" and was awarded an honorary faculty membership in the college during the annual Arts and Science Week Banquet.

One of Professor Escobar's missions for this visit was to establish ties with MU for a future collaborative Quincentennial Celebration of Columbus' Discovery of America. After his meetings with administrators, MU Provost Lois DeFleur established a campus task force to plan the Quincentennial activities.

The Esterhazy Quartet continued its tradition this spring with an-

"2 Quintets In Return **Engagement**"

Weill Recital Hall is regularly visited by ensembles from universities across the country; that is one of the traditional ways for faculties to declare themselves to the larger musical community. Not many of them, though, are assisted in their programs by one of New York's best-known chamber groups. This was the unusual privilege of the Missouri Arts Quintet in its visit Friday night, when the New York Woodwind Quintet joined the program after intermission for Samuel Baron's transcription for double wind quintet of the Mendelssohn Octet for strings.

Rare is the woodwind quintet that doesn't have a transcriber or two among its members; besides Mr. Baron's Mendelssohn, (Mr. Baron is the flutist of the New York group) we had five of Grieg's "Lyric Pieces" transcribed by Dan Willett, the Missourians' oboist.

This set was probably the highlight of the pleasant evening's fare. The bright outdoorsy colors of the winds chimed well with Grieg's rustic moods, and the dissociative effect of the stratification of timbres and registers gave "Puck" an eerie, modern sound-arguably an improvement over the piano original. . . .

The program also introduced an agreeable, wellwrought nine-minute quintet by James J. Meyer, loosely based on a familiar sea shanty. In this, in the Grieg, and in music of Irving Fine and Leonard Bernstein, the Missouri Quintet displayed a well-developed sense of interplay, a good though not always ideal blend of sonorities, and sufficient individual virtuosity to carry off the program enjoyably.

common experiences for MU faculty composers this year. John Cheetham, Professor of Theory and Composition, heard the first performance of several of his recent works, including the trio for oboe, 'cello, and piano commissioned by the Missouri Music Teachers Association. Titled Amulets, the trio was premiered at the state convention in Springfield by MU faculty members Dan Willett, Carleton Spotts, and Janice Wenger. MMTA honored Dr. Cheetham as "Composer of the Year" in 1989.

Amulets was next performed at the University of New Mexico Annual Composers Symposium this spring, at which Dr. Cheetham was featured as lecturer and teacher. In addition, the Music Department of UNM honored Dr. Cheetham with a Centennial Distinguished Alumni Award, presented to him by the University in graduation ceremonies last May.

The Missouri Arts Council and the Summit Brass commissioned a composition from Dr. Cheetham for brass choir and percussion that was first performed during the Summit Brass' national tour this spring. Keystone Celebration also was performed for more than 2,000 band directors at this year's national convention of the College Band Directors Association. Variations on a Gregorian Hymn, commissioned by the Springfield (Missouri) Symphony Orchestra Association, was premiered by the Symphony in March.

In addition, Dr. Cheetham was asked to write a major work for the Sesquicentennial for large chorus and orchestra based on texts of Thomas Jefferson. The premiere of Propheta Lucis (Prophet of Light) will take place

other residency at the International Festival of Chamber Music, hosted by the Carlos Gomez Conservatory in Belém, Brazil. Members John McLeod, Eva Szekely, and Carleton Spotts taught masterclasses and performed a series of concerts assisted by Daniel Schene, pianist from Webster University. Gloria Caputo, director of the conservatory, had visited the MU campus earlier in the year to strengthen these important ties to the MU Music Department.

Following the Belém residency, Ms. Szekely and Mr. Schene then toured in Chile with a sonata program, visiting Santiago, Valparaiso, Concepcion, and La Serena. While in La Serena, sister university to Mizzou, Ms. Szekely and Mr. Schene performed the premiere of a new composition for violin and piano by Professor Escobar.

Two other important Chilean educators visited the MU campus this year. Mario Arenas Navarrete, Director of the Music Department at La Serena, spent a week on the Mizzou campus exploring the possibility of faculty exchanges in music. His visit followed one by Provost Claudio Ihl Dausend, also from the University of La Serena.

Junior Honors Band Formed at Mizzou

Forty of Missouri's finest high school musicians participated in the "All-Junior Honors Weekend" at the University of Missouri-Columbia in February. High school juniors, selected by their previous participation in either all-state, all-district, or conference bands, were challenged by rehearsals, discussions, and teaching sessions throughout the two days. The Mizzou band staff, undergraduate and graduate students, and faculty members from the Department of Music interacted with the visiting students.

Students also heard presentations by Paul Bauer, a renowned bass trombonist and Professor of Music at Northern Illinois University. Dr. Bauer emphasized proper breathing techniques and other professional concert skills.

The weekend culminated in a concert featuring the MU Symphonic Wind Ensemble in Jesse Auditorium. For part of the concert, the high school participants joined the Symphonic Wind Ensemble. "This weekend program gave high school juniors from all across the state the chance to interact with other outstanding high school musicians, college students, and University faculty," says Dale J. Lonis, Associate Professor of Music and MU's Director of Bands. "This year's program was a complete success from the standpoint that the quality of musicianship exceeded expectations."

Jazz Festival Still "Hot" After 20 Years

The Department of Music at the University of Missouri-Columbia continues the recently revived tradition of sponsoring an annual Jazz Festival on campus. Following a twelve-year lapse, this annual event once again became a reality in February 1987.

The Jazz Festival began in 1967 during the tenure of former Music Department Chairman Charles Emmons, when the first jazz ensemble was formed at Mizzou to meet the ever-increasing needs of the music education majors in the Department of Music. The ensemble, under the leadership of then Assistant Director of Bands Larry Sutherland, was officially titled "Studio Band." The first University of Missouri Stage Band Festival was held March 2, 1968. Eleven high school bands from Missouri were selected by taped audition to perform at the festival. The MU Studio Band performed in concert at the festival with the rhythm section of Don Kinnison, BS '71, on piano, Jim Widner, BS '71, on bass, and John Brophy, BS '71, on drums.

The second festival occurred February 22, 1969, and was expanded to include eighteen bands. Not only was the MU Studio Band featured in concert at this festival, but the newly formed Stage Band under the direction of John Alexander also performed.

The festival was not held again until March 6, 1971, when MU Music Department faculty members John Cheetham and George DeFoe were the co-chairs. Together they coordinated this event for the next four years.

Beginning with the Winter 1987 term, Jeffrey Lemke, Assistant Professor and Associate Director of Bands, revived the Jazz Festival tradition as part of the the MU Jazz Studies Program. Assisting Dr. Lemke have been members of the Zeta Chapter of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia and the Student Chapter of the National Association of Jazz Educators.

The most respected and highly qualified jazz adjudicators and clinicians are present each year to assist the participants in their growth as musicians. Each ensemble is evaluated by three judges and then sent with



a clinician to a rehearsal area to reinforce those musical items that can be improved through further attention. Throughout the history of the Festival, the quality of adjudicators has always been the cornerstone of its existence. Ron Modell, Brett Stamps, Ron McCurdy, Charles Argersinger, Larry Sutherland, Steven Steele, Thomas Streeter, Doug Beach, Bob Montgomery, Thomas Ferguson, Neil Bridge, Bob Scott, Paul Cherches, Paul Montemurro, and the late Dale Kennedy, recent Director of Bands at MU, have served in this capacity in the past.

A feature of the Festival that has remained consistent since its inception is the hosting of a major jazz great as guest artist. Don Ellis and his Big Band and Bobby Bryant, lead trumpet with the NBC West Coast Orchestra, appeared as part of the festival during the early '70s. More recently jazz trombonist Urbie Green and Mike Vax & TRPTS. were in residence, with jazz trumpeter and studio recording artist Marvin Stamm appearing this year.

The new tradition of the MU Jazz Festival now finds dozens of the finest junior high and high school jazz ensembles entering into competition, with the winning ensembles appearing on the final festival concert with the guest artist and the MU Studio Jazz Ensemble and Jazz Lab Band. Congratulations are in order for all those who performed, especially to Festival Sweepstakes Winners Hickman High School in 1987, under the direction of Tim Baldwin, and Parkway West High School in 1988 and 1989, under the direction of John Baker.

From a Renaissance Band to a New Orleans Jazz Band: The University Concert Series "Tunes Up" for a New Season

Having just enjoyed one of its most successful seasons in recent memory, the University Concert Series is eagerly anticipating its 1989-90 schedule of visiting artists. The range of artistic entertainment noted abovefrom Calliope, whose versatile members recreate the remarkable sounds of the European Renaissance, to the Preservation Hall Jazz Band of New Orleans, whose music is a faithful continuation of the exciting New World developments of the not-so-distant past-should easily satisfy the most discriminating concert-goer. Headliners for the coming season include concert pianist André Watts, jazz vocalist Cleo Laine, and one of the world's foremost recorder players, Michala Petri. The concerts are organized according to three subscription series: the Jesse Auditorium Series, the Chamber Music Series (generously sponsored by the First National Bank of Columbia), and the Contemporary Arts Series.

The orchestral tradition will be well represented by the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra, a perennial favorite with the Columbia audience, and by the local debut of the Warsaw Philharmonic. The latter ensemble will feature pianist Zoltán Kocsis in a rendition of Rachmaninoff's lush Concerto No. 2. The dance tradition will be given equal prominence with performances by the David Parsons Company, a troupe that has collected rave reviews in the world of contemporary dance, and by the State Ballet of Missouri, which will present a newly commissioned work in honor of the University's Sesquicentennial. The New York City Opera National Company will return to Jesse Hall for the seventh consecutive year in a new production of Puccini's crowd-pleaser La Bohème. The chamber music offering promises to be especially gratifying with music for two pianos-the Paratore brothers, for piano trio-the New York Amati Trio, for string quartet-the Emerson, and for cham-



ber orchestra—the twelve-member I Solisti Italiani. And certain to make the season memorable will be the popular minstrels of yesteryear, the Kingston Trio, and the acclaimed National Theatre of the Deaf in an engrossing version of Homer's *The Odyssey*.

The Concert Series continues to work closely with the Music Department in its efforts to bring world-class performers to the Columbia campus. Concert dates for these performances are listed in the calendar of events published on page 12. For ticket prices, alumni and friends should contact the University Concert Series, 321 Jesse Hall, or call (314) 882-3571. Special series subscription rates remain in effect until the first concert in each series in early October. Students and groups of ten individuals or more are entitled to a three-dollar discount for all individual concerts.

The Boone County Bassoon Band is Growing!



The unique arrangements and transcriptions for the Band are provided by Phil Wood and Don Ross, former bassoonist with the U.S. Army Band. Selections featured on the Band's spring program included *Fugue in G Minor* and *Chorale No. 220* by J. S. Bach, arranged by Don Ross; *Egmont Overture* by Beethoven, also arranged by Don Ross; and *Second Suite* by Gustav Holst and "The Mad Major" by Kenneth Alford, both arranged by Phil Wood.

The Boone County Bassoon Band has performed for the Midwest Double Reed Society, the Missouri Music Teachers Association state convention, and the Missouri Music Educators Conference state convention. The Band also has been invited to perform for the 1989 International Double Reed Conference in Manchester, England.

Mizzou Alumni in Michigan




Earl Coleman, BS '70, MM '76, MM '81, recently has been appointed as Associate Professor of Voice and Assistant Dean for Minority Affairs in the School of Music at the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor.

While performing and teaching mainly as a singer, Professor Coleman also served as principal second violinist with the Chattanooga Symphony Orchestra from 1983 to 1986, played violin as a recitalist and in string quartets, served as church choir director, performed jazz and popular music, and taught public school music. As singer, he has appeared with more than twenty symphony orchestras including the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra, the Colorado Philharmonic, the Chautauqua Symphony Orchestra, and in opera with regional companies. He was a district and regional finalist in the Metropolitan Opera Auditions and a national semifinalist in the the WGN-Chicago Lyric Opera Auditions. He was also a regional finalist in the National Association of Teachers of Singing Competition and the Music Teachers National Association Collegiate Artist Auditions.

Previous to his Michigan appointment, Mr. Coleman was a member of the faculties of Columbia College, Stephens College, Bemidji State University, the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, and Memphis State University. This summer he served on the faculty of the National Music Camp at Interlochen.

While at the University of Missouri-Columbia he served as concertmaster of the University Symphony for four years. He also participated in the University Singers, Collegium Musicum, and the Rollins String Quartet and was a band manager for Marching Mizzou. While attending MU, he studied violin with Rogers Whitmore, Melvin Ritter, Carolyn Kenneson, and John McLeod, and voice with Merrily Culwell and Virginia Pyle.



Charles Smith, BS '63, MEd '63, has been Director of Choral Activities at Michigan State University since 1978, where he conducts the Chorale and the Choral Union, guides the Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degree programs in choral conducting, and teaches graduate courses in the choral area. He has appeared frequently throughout the United States as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator. His choral groups have toured extensively and have performed for regional and national conventions of the American Choral Directors Association and the Music Educators National Conference.

Dr. Smith was chosen to participate in the first International Federation of Choral Music (IFCM) German-American Exchange last June. Student Organizations

The MU Collegiate Chapter of the Music **Educators National Conference (CMENC)** had a busy and productive year. The chapter provided a major service to the state's high school instrumentalists by producing and selling cassette recordings of district and state band audition music. Orders were received from 76 schools, so the chapter plans to continue this successful project annually. The funds raised were used to support a chapter scholarship award and other service projects. Another major undertaking was providing banquet entertainment at the Missouri Music Education Association (MMEA) state convention at Tan-Tar-A in January. The students planned and produced an imitation of the game show "Name That Tune" with Missouri music educator "celebrities" as contestants. It was difficult to decide whether the students, contestants, or audience had the most fun! Additional activities this year included presenting a CMENC recital with performances by chapter members, purchasing strings for the department's guitars and having a pizza party where members learned to string the instruments, sponsoring a workshop on country-western dancing, and sending several sets of the Music Educators Journal to our sister school in La Serena, Chile.

The chapter also was awarded a plaque for having the most collegiate members in attendance at the MMEA convention, the second year in a row that the MU chapter won that award.

The Student Chapter of the National Association of Jazz Educators at Mizzou was recognized as the "Largest Collegiate Student Chapter" in the nation for an unprecedented fourth consecutive year. The MU Student Chapter is the only student chapter in the nation that publishes a state newsletter for NAJE, and it received the 1987-1988 "Most Outstanding Newsletter" award presented this past January at the NAJE National Conference in San Diego, California. Members also assist with the annual MU Jazz Festival.

The **Sigma Alpha Iota** student chapter donated proceeds from fund-raising activities this year to the Ellis Library Compact Disk Collection. Members of SAI, along with members of the **Zeta Chapter** of **Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia**, continue to provide ushers for all Concert Series events and special Music Department concerts held in Jesse Auditorium. The Zeta Chapter also is the co-host for the annual MU Jazz Festival.

School of Fine Arts News

The School of Fine Arts has led the way in the Sesquicentennial celebration by supporting several major events. In addition to the successful production of Cole Porter's *Anything Goes* in Rhynsburger Theatre in February, students and faculty from the School have been traveling throughout the state to share the Mizzou pride.

Through a special grant from the University Sesquicentennial Fund, in cooperation with the University of Missouri Cultural Heritage Center and McDonald's restaurants, **Tom Prater**, a doctoral student in theatre, wrote and directed *Missouri Legacy: Unconditional Surrender*, a play about the dilemma facing students at the University during the Civil War. The play was performed in schools around Missouri.

Carla Waal, Professor of Theatre, and Barbara Korner, Assistant to the Director of the School of Fine Arts, received a grant from the Missouri Humanities Council to travel and present another living history lesson—"Hardship and Hope: Heroines in Life and Art," which portrays the dreams and disappointments of nineteenth-century Missouri women.

William Berry, Professor of Art, was the recipient of the Byler Distinguished Professor Award in 1989. This award, established in 1978 by the United States Radium Corporation, recognizes outstanding abilities, performance, and character. Only one other Fine Arts faculty member, Larry Rugolo, Professor of Art, has ever been awarded this important prize.

Larry Clark, Professor of Theatre, who was serving as Interim Dean of the College of Arts and Science, has been named to the position permanently. **Patrick Atkinson**, Professor of Theatre, is now the Chair of the Theatre Department, and **Oliver Schuchard**, Professor of Art, is the new Chair of Art.
